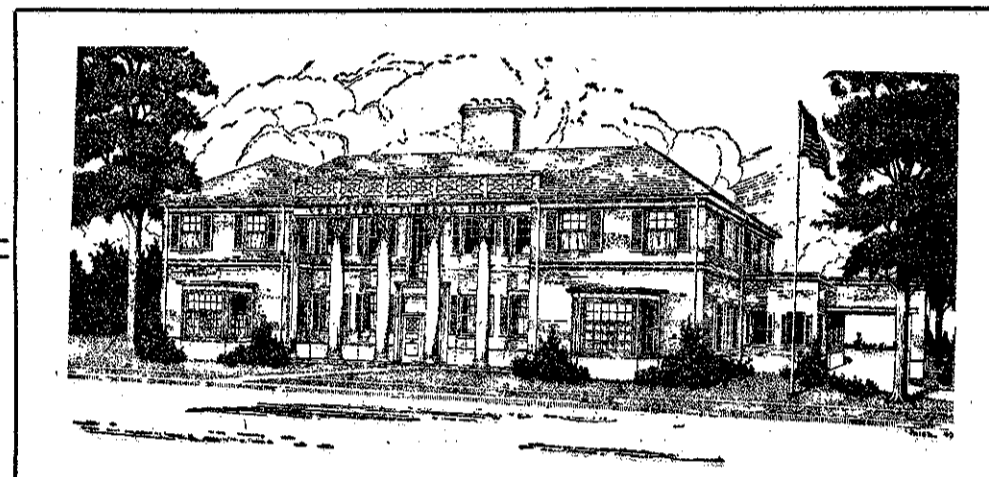

## I Am a Wac

Some patriotic editorial writer for The New York Post has taken the need for Wacs sufficiently to heart to write a rather heated editorial on the subject of selective service for women to back the coming invasion. He says there are five million women in this country who have no children oldest son is eight years old and has not slept since his father reported

my approbation of his feeling about the married men with children who are being forced into the army while thousands of single women are allowed to live at home in comparative ease.

We have a school teacher in our recruiting office in the Buhl building who told me a story the other day about a youngster whose father was preparing for the draft. The draftee's are not employed. He further declares that he cannot understand the people who take it as a matter of course that married men with three or four children are drafted into the army. For these same people, he says, are horrified at the idea of women in the army.

I shall like to shake the gentle-

man's hand for writing such a fine piece in our behalf. I want to shout for his pre-induction physical. One night not so long ago the child went into his mother's room and said, "I just wanted to see if you were all right, mother. Father is going away to become a soldier, so I have to take care of you." . . . Granted this child is over-sensitive and probably his reaction to a home without a father is more serious than that of the average child. Nevertheless, in many homes the father is the symbol of family security. To take that security away sometimes threatens the normal adjustment of a child.

Think it over, you five million unemployed, childless women, and see if you want the tears of even one maladjusted child on your conscience.

BE IT RESOLVED that this Commission deems it advisable to vacate that portion of Goethe Street above described, so as to become part and parcel of the adjoining property, upon such conditions and subject to such restrictions as this Commission may hereafter determine, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Commission shall meet to hear objections to said vacation on Monday, May 8, 1944 at 8:30 P.M., and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a notice of such meeting, with a copy of this resolution shall be given by publishing a copy of same in the Grosse Pointe News and Grosse Pointe Review at least ten days prior to May 10, 1944, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that objections to such proposed action of the Commission shall be in writing and filed with the Clerk of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park prior to said meeting.

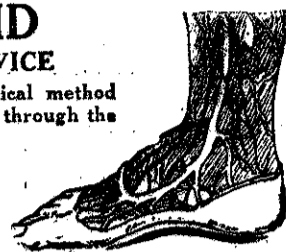
