Horse Racing Begins at Fairgrounds Saturday, May 20

Detroit. — Everything is in readiness for the opening of the annual spring and summer meeting at Detroit and the sport which gets under way at the Fairgrounds course Saturday, May 20, and, embracing 73 days, will not conclude until Saturday, Aug. 12. Attracting to Detroit a number of the country's outstanding thoroughbreds and many strong racing establishments whose colors have been seen here in previous seasons, the meeting will offer racing of the highest caliber. The richer handicap events to be run include two events, each endowed with \$15,000 in money, six at \$10,000, seven at \$7,500 and eight at \$5,000. The minimum purse during the Motor City meeting is \$1,200.

Charles F. Henry, racing secretary, has arranged a brilliant card for opening day and the eight race program features the running of the \$7,500 boots and saddle handicap. The event a six furlong sprint will attract the leading handicap stars stabled on the grounds and those most likely to face: Bryan Steele, starter, are A. Hirschberg's good three-year-old Black Badge who garnered the top two-year-old honors here last year. Jack Hodgins, trainer of the pretentious Dixiana racing establishment will send Amber Light for the top honors. Fig Tails, the property of Milt Shagrin, Cleveland racing enthusiast, Dearborn stable's Samborombon, Valinda Senora, owned by Mrs. B. Hernandez, Loango the hope of W. E. Ball, Darby Dan's Darby Dingbat, Smacked recent arrival from Bay Meadows, Mrs. E. McCuna's Wise Moss, Hirschberg and Wyatt's Good Going, and Likeashot owned by Lieut. Comdr. T. D. Buhl.

Supporting features carded are the \$4,000 inaugural handicap at one mile and a sixteenth and the \$3,000 bugle call purse for two-year-olds at four and a half furlongs.

Jockey Johnny Adams, first to win the national riding honors three years will again be seen in colors and will have been competition to garner local honors from William Bailey, Charley Bianco, Ralph Ecard, Porter Roberts, Mike Cafarella, Eddie Hust, Jack R. Layton, Kempton Knott, George Burns, Bernie Thompson, Don Scurlock, Charles L. Martin, George McLeod and Pat Milligan.

Post time for the first race will be 4:30 p.m. except Saturday's and holidays when the sport gets under way at 2:15 p. m.

Grosse Pointe High Student Asks Lower Age for Voting

The following article is reprinted from the Grosse Pointe high school Tower. Art Antonissen is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Antonissen, 1353 Beaconsfield.

Grosse Pointe high school has one advocate of lowering the voting age to 18 who is doing something about it.

Art Antonissen, 11A, has written to Michigan's senators, the Hon. Homer Ferguson and Arthur Vandenberg, and to Rep. Louis C. Rabaut, from the 14th district, urging adoption of an amendment to allow 18-year-olds to vote.

The congressmen all favor the plan and Senator Vandenberg introduced an amendment for that purpose in the senate, but the judiciary committee did not let it get to the senate floor for a vote.

The matter of who can or cannot vote is largely up to the state and state legislature. So far, however, only Georgia permits 18-year-old voting.

If a constitutional amendment were passed in congress, it might hasten state action — even though three-quarters of the states would have to ratify it before it became a law.

A vote is to be taken in home-rooms to gauge student feeling on this question. If the results are favorable, other high schools in the Detroit area will be asked to participate.

Should the idea receive strong student backing, a petition will be sent to Governor Kelly asking him to take it up with the state legislature. Art has always been interested in politics and feels that if 18-year-olds can fight, they can vote conscientiously. He says that boys and girls of 18 are taken to circuit court for criminal offenses and "if the law punishes you as an adult, the government should give you adult privileges at the same time."

Hil F. Best Aspires to Congressional Seat for 14th District

Hil F. Best of 1215 Nottingham road, Grosse Pointe Park, has announced his candidacy for the office of representative in congress from the 14th district, on the Republican ticket, to be voted for at the primary election to be held July 11, 1944.

Hil F. Best was born in Schenectady, N. Y., on Dec. 18, 1899. He first came to Detroit in 1919 in newspaper work and then returned to New York, where he was active in advertising circles and in the American Legion. Mayor James J. Walker appointed him a member of the New York city commission for the bi-centennial celebration of the birth of George Washington.

Mr. Best was associated with the late Frank H. Hitchcock, Republican leader and former postmaster general, acting as his general manager of the Hitchcock newspaper properties in Arizona, where he was active in Republican circles.

Mr. Best returned to Detroit in 1933 and has maintained his business at first: 3090 East Grand boulevard and at present in the Transportation building, acting as a publisher's representative.

Although never having run for a public office he has handled some of the most important campaigns successfully for others. He has run and been successful in organizations and in the Legion having served as adjutant of Ad-Post No. 209 until his departure for Detroit.

He has successfully organized various relief drives and is 100 per cent for, first: A complete victory and return to constitutional government and second: Intends to work in congress for proper handling of service people after the war, believing in educational facilities over charity.

He is married and has two sons, one of whom is in the navy and now is in Italy.

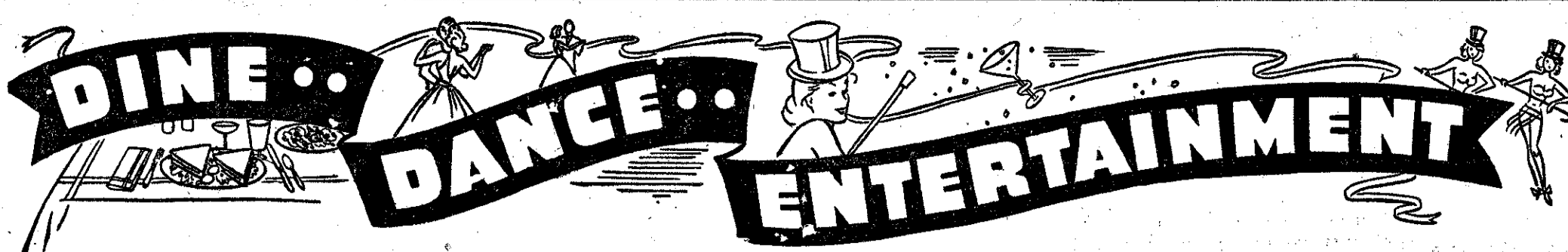

The Isthmus is one of the historic Crimea One of Historic travel routes of the world. Over it

flowed hordes of migrant settlers, nomadic tribes, conquering armies. The ancient Scythians, the Goths, Huns and Tatars used it. The Greeks built Taphros at what is now the settle-

ment of Perekop. During the 15th century under a Tatar Khan, a great ditch was dug across the narrow northern stretch of the isthmus. Later stone towers were built by another Khan to guard the approaches to the Crimea.

During the Russian counter-revolution that followed the overthrow of the Tsar, Perekop isthmus, like the Siwash railway route, became a path of retreat for White Russian forces

Selmeier Announces Summer School at Grosse Pointe High From June 19 to Aug. 11

The regular Grosse Pointe summer school will be maintained in the high school building from June 19 through Aug. 11. As in former years a full program of activities is planned. Two important additions have been made in 1944. Shop and mechanical drawing classes will be given on the high school level and special coaching sections in the work of the third grade will be offered.

During these war years the summer school enrollment has shown a definite increase over the prep war years. Apparently the old idea that summer school was only for failing students has broken down as some of the best high honor roll students are now to be found represented in almost every section.

As the call to military service faces the boys at the age of 18, many of these students acquire the credits in summer school which enable them to graduate before entering the armed forces. To help these people a student may now take three advanced courses for credit. While this is normally considered a very heavy summer school schedule the success of those who were accorded this privilege in 1943 has justified its continuation.

With summer school periods being double the usual class period length a regular semester's work can be covered in eight weeks time. The facts that the classes average less than 20 persons each and that more frequent reports are given upon class progress help maintain a high degree of scholarship.

Survey to Make Known Essential Goods and Services Unobtainable at Present

A survey aimed to determine the essential goods and services necessary to the maintenance of Detroit's civilian morale is planned for this week by the civilian requirements committee in co-operation with the WPB, the Detroit Victory Council, and the Detroit board of education. Because of the tremendous effects upon production output, continuity of employment, and civilian morale, it is essential that vital civilian requirements be known, declared Warren E. Bow, superintendent of schools and chairman of the Detroit Victory council in announcing the survey.

Planned to reach 18,000 homes throughout Detroit, Grosse Pointe, and Ypsilanti, the survey will be made by questionnaire. It will attempt to determine what obtainable merchandise, inadequate personal and home services, and transportation difficulties citizens have a need for but are not getting in sufficient quantities. Also included is an item concerning the most desirable shopping hours for the purchase of groceries. It is expected that the survey will help government agencies to better allocate existing materials and manpower to the community's most urgent needs as well as help adjust in the return to peacetime conditions.

Children in the fourth grade of elementary schools will serve as couriers in soliciting the aid of their parents in filling out the brief form. Answers to the questions will furnish information pointing to local civilian needs in furtherance of the war effort and in determining immediate postwar needs of residents, declare officials of the sponsoring organizations. Chairman Bow calls attention to the fact that only a limited sampling of residents will be made. Each questionnaire will in effect represent

Park Joins City and Farms in Huge Waste Paper Campaign to Start Next Monday

Grosse Pointe Park will revive interest in waste paper salvage when a new campaign will go into effect Monday, May 22 in this community. How the Park's waste paper is going into the war effort, and how the City of Grosse Pointe salvage plant prepares waste paper in bales for sale to paper dealers, has been made into a very effective window display at the AWVS office on Kercheval avenue, by the salvage chairman, Mrs. Edward Isbey. Everett B. Lane, Park village manager, has supervised the preparation of bulletins to be distributed in the

village announcing plans for the campaign. These will be distributed by the Neighborhood War club block leaders and by LeRoy H. Selmeier at the Grosse Pointe high school. Mrs. Edward C. Bahm, AWVS chairman of War clubs, has announced the appointment of Mrs. Raymond Krause as leader of zone 1 which covers all of the Park. Block leaders will be assisted by junior block leaders.

"The nation is appealing to all householders to save waste paper," Mr. Lane states in asking the cooperation of all residents in this campaign. "Paper mills need your waste paper to fill vital war orders. Do not burn your paper. Start saving it now. Help to conserve paper by accepting merchandise at the stores unwrapped and return paper bags to your local stores."

Neil Blondell, chairman of the salvage committee of Grosse Pointe and Gratiot township areas of the OCD also stresses the importance of this drive and the continuance of collections in all the communities.

"It is not necessary to call any outside agency for the collection of waste paper in the City," Mr. Blondell states. "All we ask is that people place their waste paper, cardboard and old bottles in the bag provided by the City. Those who do may be assured that all those materials are being salvaged and sold to the proper dealers, so that the people profit not only from the satisfaction of knowing that their refuse is being salvaged for the war effort, but also from the sale of these materials. Everything collected is taken to the City salvage plant at Radnor and Warren, where it is prepared and sold."

"For three months the Farms has been handling collection of waste paper," says Harry Furton, village clerk. "It is handled through the office of Murray Smith, village engineer and has proven to be most satisfactory."

Residents of the Park are asked to read their bulletins and co-operate. All waste paper will be collected by the village trucks on the regular collection day. Residents are asked to put all waste paper on the curb in front of their homes in the following manner:

Newspapers: Fold flat, tie in bundles about 12 inches high; magazines: Tie in bundles 12 inches high; corrugated paper: Flatten and tie in bundles about 12 inches high; waste basket paper: Pack down in bag or box to avoid blowing around on street.

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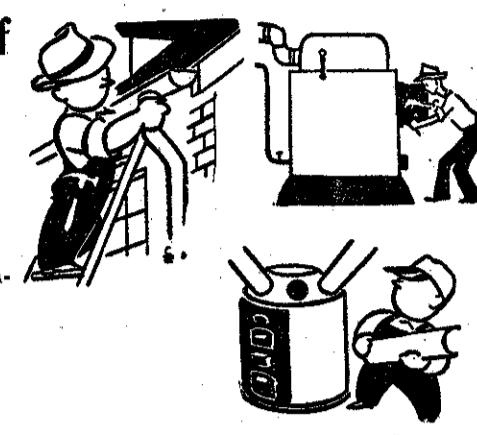
