



# BURGLARY CHAIN SNAPPED IN POINTE

## Fisher Road Residents Protest Widening

### Thief Makes Full Confession To Police Officers

Eight of Grosse Pointe's burglaries which have taken place since the beginning of the year, were solved Tuesday night, with the confession of 23-year-old Irving Goldfarb, of 2631 Vicksburg in the county jail.

Goldfarb, who was questioned throughout the day by Henry Piel, Park police chief, and Detective Lt. A. Louwers, told of his participation in these breaking and enterings

after an accomplice on Detroit thefts, Arthur Goldman, was apprehended and sentenced.

The six burglaries in the Park which were cleared off the books were of the following homes:

Feb. 13, E. L. Newitt, 1310 Nottinghamham, small amount of jewelry; March 2, T. J. Villeneuve, 1346 Bedford, Goldfarb was interrupted in ransacking the home by the return of the family. He escaped with a small amount of money;

Fred Reese, 1364 Bedford, the family reported nothing taken;

D. T. Finn, 1159 Nottinghamham. The burglar was frightened away when Finn, alone in the darkened house, heard him at the door and turned on a light;

March 17, W. H. Kildow Jr., 1248 Bedford. He was frightened away by the family returning and left empty-handed;

May 30, Albert Leclerc, 688 Balfour. The burglar made several attempts to get into the house and finally succeeded in getting into a bedroom; he left with a small amount of cash after passing up jewelry and a fur coat.

In the Farms, Goldfarb admitted the theft of furs and jewelry from the home of George B. Hefferan, 109 Merriweather. He said that a mink coat which he stole was sold for \$1,000 and a wrist watch for \$500; the other pieces of jewelry were passed on to fences, he said.

This daring robber also admitted stealing Lieut. Boyd Hill's automobile from the garage at 610 University Place on March 24, and abandoned it in Detroit.

Pointe police were reasonably certain of the thief's identity, but were waiting to catch him red-handed. Goldfarb was aware of this and was extra cautious when working in the Pointe.

Assisting him on his "jobs" was his wife, who usually waited for him in an automobile. His method of operation was to jimmy a rear door or window and proceeded to the bedrooms where he thoroughly ransacked drawers and closets.

Goldfarb admitted to Detroit police that he took part in 125 burglaries in that city. This was the total up to and including June 14.

### Pointer's Husband Listed as German Prisoner of War

Mrs. Anna McVittie of 1379 Maryland, was notified recently that her husband, Lieutenant Kenneth McVittie, is a prisoner of the German government. Mrs. McVittie is the

former Anna Robertson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Robertson. Lieutenant McVittie is a navigator on a Flying Fortress and was reported missing in action over Munich on April 24, 1944. He had returned to combat duty shortly before this after being hospitalized for wounds. The mission was believed to be his twentieth.

Lieutenant McVittie's brother-in-law, Pfc. Peter Robertson, is stationed somewhere in the South Pacific. The lieutenant received the Air Medal and Oak Leaf clusters and forwarded them home to his wife. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth McVittie of Waterford, Mich., were notified of his custody through the Red Cross.

### To Enforce Waterfront Park Regulations Immediately

Regulations for the waterfront park in the Park were made clear at the commission meeting Monday night, when Commissioner Sage, park committee chairman, announced that only those who are residents or taxpayers will be allowed park permits, and others who wish entrance, will be admitted on guest cards only.

Owing to the new regulations, four church and social groups will be notified by the commissioner and the village manager that unless enough guest tickets can be provided by members in their respective groups, they will not be allowed to hold picnics or gatherings in the park.

### Confiscate B-B Gun

Patrolman Van DeGinste of the Park police department, confiscated a BB gun owned by a Park resident who was using the weapon in the vicinity of Beaconsfield and Nottinghamham.

### No Further Action Taken on Goethe Avenue Injunction

No further action has been taken on the restraining order issued by Judge DeWitt H. Merriam, of the Wayne county circuit court, restraining the Park village commission from taking any further action on vacating Goethe avenue between Maryland to the alley-way between Charlevoix and Mack and turning it over to the First Christian Reformed church to use a playground for the Grosse Pointe Christian Day school children.

The village officials were to answer fully their reasons for vacating Goethe at a court session on May 26, however, the hearing was postponed to a later date.

The injunction was issued at the request of Leonard Richards of 1451 Lakepointe and Sebastian Mocer of 1449 Lakepointe, who are opposing the closing of Goethe.

### Bishop Road Question Pops Up Again Before Park Commission Monday Night

Definite steps should be taken if the noise and general nuisance at the foot of Bishop road does not stop, decreed the Park commission Monday night.

Three recommendations were made by Commissioner Paul Moreland which would help alleviate the conditions. 1. Removal of the popcorn wagon operated by Tony Koinas at Bishop and Jefferson to a new location, preferably at Somerset and Jefferson. Mr. Moreland said this should eliminate any customers

### Park Changes Fire Route in Lower Part of Village

The village commission of Grosse Pointe Park authorized the change in the village's fire routes Monday evening, when Village Manager E. B. Lane proposed the change after a study was made of the routes on the lower end of the village.

The new route allows the fire trucks to remain on Maryland avenue from the fire hall near Jefferson to Mack avenue. Formerly, the route turned from Maryland at St. Paul, then down Wayburn to Mack. With the changed route, the difficult turn which the fire trucks have always made is eliminated.

The "No-Parking" signs will be erected on the east side of Maryland to Charlevoix where they will be changed to the opposite side of the road, because of an offset in the street.

Mr. Lane said that in the very near future he would confer with officials of the Lake Shore Coach Lines to determine a change in their route for the buses after they leave Keroheval and Charlevoix avenues and proceed to Jefferson.

### Leonard J. Brennan Dies of Heart Attack Yesterday Morning

A lingering illness, climaxed by a heart attack proved fatal to Leonard J. Brennan, 42, of 1099 Beaconsfield yesterday morning at eleven o'clock. A native of London, Ont., Len as he was known to all in the Pointe, had been a resident of Grosse Pointe Park for approximately 20 years. He was employed at Tiny's Cafe, 15117 Kercheval avenue.

The remains will lie in state at the Griffith & Wade funeral home, Beaconsfield and Jefferson, all day today and tonight.

Funeral services at eleven o'clock tomorrow morning from St. Ambrose church.

### Children Conclude Paper Drive Season With Huge Total

The children of the Grosse Pointe public and parochial schools have concluded their monthly school waste paper drive with a final drive last Friday. Between eight schools, approximately 422,000 pounds of waste paper was collected and prepared for baling.

Mason school in Grosse Pointe Woods came out on top in this drive with a total of 30,400 pounds or approximately 15 and one-half tons. The children of this school are to be commended with this fine showing as their departing gesture in the war effort as school children. Many have promised that throughout the summer they will have paper and prepare to bring it to school when classes resume in the fall.

St. Paul's school, the only parochial school which took part in the drive, was second in the totaling of pounds; the pupils carried, carted or drove 2,800 pounds to the school grounds. Following closely behind St. Paul was Maize school with a total of 2,700 pounds. The other public schools' totals are: Richard, 1,300; Vernier, 2,300; Kerby, 1,500; Pierce, 1,000 and Defer, 200.

Vernier School on Vernier road in Grosse Pointe Shores, was awarded the Certificate of Merit for an outstanding endeavor in salvaging waste paper for the Victory Waste Paper drive. The award was made by the Wayne County Salvage Commission of the Wayne County Council of Defense.

The school was awarded this certificate because its students have turned in the most paper per pupil than any other school in Grosse Pointe that participated in the monthly drives.

The smallest vote ever recorded in the annuals of the Grosse Pointe school board elections was made last Monday, June 12, when 131 voters in Grosse Pointe cast their ballots at their respective precincts.

Officials of the board said this small vote was probably the result of an election with no opposition, and because the people are very busy with war and volunteer work.

Of the seven precincts, the Defer school precinct recorded the most votes—28. The results of the six other precincts are as follows: Trombley, 14; Maize, 25; Richard, 26; Kerby, 4; Vernier, 13; and Mason, 21.

Of the 131 votes cast, Ralph M. Clark, secretary of the board received 127 while Charles A. Parcels, president received 124. Only two other names were recorded on the ballot and they appeared only once.

### Two Youngsters Return Lost Billfold to Police


Two youngsters, about six years old, appeared at the Park police station last Saturday morning and turned in a billfold they had found in a DSR sand box.

### Lake Front Property Owners Ask for Tax Reduction

Fred A. Behr, representing shore line residents in Grosse Pointe appeared before the Grosse Pointe township board of review last week to ask for a reduction in the assessments on these homes.

The plan, if adopted, would throw the burden of taxes on the remaining residents of the township to such an extent that they would be paying seven to 15 per cent more taxes. Mr. Schweikart felt that if such a drastic step is to be taken, much thought should be given to pros and cons of the plan.

In the study which Mr. Behr presented, it states that a reasonable good job of assessing Grosse Pointe properties has been done but "100 per cent of the lake front property improved and vacant assessed above 100 per cent of market value it is evident that these minority types of property are inequity overassessed and that insufficient consideration has been given by assessors to obsolescence and to declines in value over the past 10 years."

For this reason, the 80 taxpayers ask that immediate attention be given this matter.

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
**Serious Consideration Warranted**

**Representative Rabaut, Backer of Strong Foreign Service, Receives Award**

WASHINGTON. — At informal ceremonies held at the department of state, Rep. Louis C. Rabaut, Democrat of Michigan, last Thursday, received the International Economic Council's annual award for outstanding services in the advancement of the nation's world trade.  
 Among those attending were Edward Stettinius, acting secretary of state, and R. J. Lynch, assistant to the secretary.  
 Commemorating the tenth anniversary of the passage of the trade agreements act by congress, the award is an original oil painting of the "S. S. Savannah," first steamer to cross the Atlantic, and symbol of America's two-way trade with the world.  
 "Two-way trade," declared Mr. Stettinius, "between the United States and other countries, on a basis of fairness and in the greatest possible volume, is both indicative of international good relations and a key to those relations and to international security. Such trade is essential to the improvement and the maintenance of American economic welfare at maximum levels."  
 "What American government officials and other Americans do to foster and encourage economic co-operation and mutual benefit for all nations," he continued, "is a direct contribution to the establishment of economic welfare here and abroad, and of true and lasting security for and for the rest of the world."  
 In making the presentation, Joseph A. Jones, a director of the council, commended Mr. Rabaut's efforts over many years in maintaining the strength of the American foreign service, the men and women of which he described as "among the true promoters of friendly reciprocal relations with other nations." He indicated that Mr. Hull's trade policies have helped maintain peaceful relations with those nations with which the United States has entered agreements, adding, "of the 27 nations with which reciprocal trade agreements have been concluded during the past 10 years, not one is at war against the United States."  
 That these policies will be an important factor in world recovery, peace and commerce is the belief of Mr. Rabaut who declared: "I feel strongly that if the peace for which we are fighting is to be a lasting one the only possible foundation must be a sound economic policy; and the only sound economic policy which I can envisage is one built upon the lowering of trade barriers after the war along the same formulas as those which Secretary Hull has been fighting for ever since the passage of the trade agreements act in 1934."  
 As chairman of the house subcommittee on appropriations for the departments of state, commerce, and justice, the representative also took a leading role last year in helping to retain the field offices of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce.

The entire faculty rated all of these seniors whom they know on character, leadership, and service.  
 After the students were marked on those traits, a composite rating of each candidate was mathematically tabulated. Those having the highest total scores for scholarship, extra-curricular activities, character, service, and leadership were the group finally elected to the society.  
 Because the National Honor Society specifies that the maximum number of students from each graduating class to receive membership must not exceed 15 per cent of the graduating class, there are always many students who, in spite of the fact they have received at least a B average, miss the award because they might have failed to enter extra-curricular activities, or because they were not outstanding in character, service, or leadership.  
 "Fifteen per cent of this year's graduating class figures out to be 31 students and there can be positively no more than 31 students who can receive this honor. It is too bad that we have to stop where we do because there are always some students who are almost as high as some who are taken into the National Honor Society," said W. R. Cleminson, principal.



## ★ I Am a Wac ★



by LIEUT. FREDDIE BOYLE

Out at the army air show at the Detroit city airport this week Wacs are on duty to demonstrate the job of Link trainer instructor. This is one of the 239 jobs that Wacs do, and seems to be one of the most interesting. In this work, Wacs teach pilots to fly planes by instruments. I have never tried to do the job, but I have looked inside the Link; and from the number of complicated-looking instruments on the panel, I imagine it takes several weeks to get the knack of teaching the trade. Most of the Wacs assigned to Link trainer instruction are taught work right on the job, and all those that I have talked to are very fond of their work. I guess it takes a little bit of concentration and intelligence, as well as technical knowledge to give the pilot the right signal and to keep him from flying several miles under ground, which seems to be the standing joke of the trade.

Another of the fascinating jobs air Wacs do is control tower operation. Two Wac corporals who were in radio school with me are working in the control tower now at Hondo Field, Tex., and from the reports I hear they wouldn't trade places with Colonel Hobby, director of the Wac. It is something of a thrill to speak through the microphone to an air corps pilot up in the sky, and say something like: "Hondo tower to army 62, okeh to land on the grass." For there is a great satisfaction in knowing that your efforts helped the pilot to land safely, and that in a little while you will give another signal for still another pilot to take off in a giant bomber, possibly on a mission overseas. It is one of the most glorious of glorified jobs in the army air forces, and it carries with it a great deal of responsibility. No control tower operator wants the blame of an airplane crash on his shoulders because the consequences can be quite serious. So these traffic cops of the air are serious about their work and glory in their opportunity to have such an important part in winning this war.

The repair of aerial cameras is one of the newest jobs for which Wacs are being trained.



# “I DIED TODAY” WHAT DID YOU DO TODAY?

**NOTE:** The following poem, "What Did You Do Today?" was written by Lieutenant Dean Shatlain, a tank commander in the United States Army in Africa, who was wounded in battle and forced to amputate his own foot. While, so far as he knew, he was dying, the lieutenant wrote the poem which found its way to America. Shatlain did not die, but is recuperating in a hospital in England. His thoughts in poetry stand as a living challenge to every man, woman and child on the Home Front.

## WHAT DID YOU DO TODAY?

What did you do today, my friend,  
From morning till the night?  
How many times did you complain  
That rationing is too tight  
When are you going to start to do  
All the things you say?  
A soldier would like to know, my friend,  
What did you do today?  
We met the enemy today  
And took the town by storm.  
Happy reading it will make  
For you tomorrow morn.  
You'll read with satisfaction  
The brief communique,  
We fought, but are you fighting?  
What did you do today?  
My gunner died in my arms today  
I feel his warm blood yet:  
Your neighbor's dying boy gave out  
A scream I'll never forget.  
On my right a tank was hit,  
A flash and then a fire,  
The stench of burning flesh  
Still rises from the pyre.  
What did you do today, my friend,  
To help us with the task?  
Did you work harder and longer for less,  
Or is that too much to ask?  
What right have I to ask you this,  
You probably will say,  
Maybe now you'll understand,  
You see . . . I died today.

**NOTE:** A reply to the lieutenant's poem has been written by the Rev. H. C. Stehling, a Catholic priest of Hartford, Wis. Both poems were read over the air by Kate Smith last month. The reply is reproduced at the right.

## WHAT HAVE I DONE TODAY?

What have I done today, my friend?  
I prayed that soon this war might end.  
That God, Our Lord in Heaven above,  
Might keep you ever in His love;  
From ills of soul and body, free,  
Return you safe and sound to me.  
And, tho it may be just a mite,  
I gave a pint of blood tonight.  
I bought a bond, as I bought bread,  
Refused to ride and walked instead.  
I salvaged paper, rags and tin,  
Some metal scrap, I too sent in.  
I'm grateful for the things you've done,  
The bitter, bloody battles won,  
The time you fought and fought in vain,  
Your sorrows, sufferings, all the pain,  
The hardships, trials you endured,  
Are keenly felt, please be assured.  
I know your fight for liberty,  
It, too, a sacrifice for me,  
Your wounded gunner's anguished cry,  
As he fell in your arms to die,  
The stench of burning flesh, the pyre,  
The mud and water, jungle fire,  
I try to feel as you have knelt,  
You fought, as I in prayer knelt.  
I'm just a plain civilian Joe,  
Who tries to understand, to know,  
To know, these things must sere your soul  
And wonder, is it worth the toll.  
It is; and tho at times you're blue,  
Take courage, soldier, see it through.  
For sweetheart, sister, mother kind,  
For dad and brother left behind.  
The rank and file at home are true,  
Will do and give their all for you.  
So buck up, soldier, fight again,  
We'll pray at home, it's not in vain.

After the police visit, Morris Soloway, 3797 Laurence, drove away with his fare, who had a date in court for next Tuesday. This is his second offense.



### Colleges to Give School Credits for Navy Radio Course

Many major colleges have indicated they will give school credits to men who successfully complete the navy's 10-month course in radio electronics.

This information was received by Lieut. Comdr. Byron E. Flechtner, officer in charge of lower Michigan navy recruiting and induction, from Comdr. W. C. Eddy, who has charge of the navy radio technician program for the nation.

Men, 17 through 50 years old, can qualify for this valuable training by passing the Eddy radio technician test, given at all navy recruiting stations. Draft-age men must be in Class I-A to take the test.

Commander Eddy pointed out that the course is especially valuable to men who have had a somewhat complete educational background, but lack technical training. The first part of the course is devoted to theory while the last six months are spent in actual work, he said.

There are no specific educational requirements for men to take the test. Most important is a sound knowledge of mathematics and physics.

RESOLUTION BY COMMISSIONER CUNNINGHAM

An Ordinance to Amend an Ordinance Entitled "An Ordinance to Provide for the Furnishing of Water and Sewage Disposal and the Establishment of Rates for Water Service and Sewage Disposal Service," Passed June 9, 1941

The Village of Grosse Pointe Park Ordinances:

Section 1. Sections 2.6, 2.7, 2.9, 2.10, 2.11, 2.12, 2.13, 2.16, 3.5, 3.10, 3.11, 4.1, 4.4, 4.5, 5.1, 5.3 and 5.7 are hereby amended to read as follows:

2.6—All water pipes in streets, alleys, avenues, or public property shall be laid not less than five feet below the established grade of same.

2.7—All extension connections must be extended into the basement at least five feet below the established grade before any branches or tees are taken off for any purpose.

2.9—All buildings divided into separate business places must be supplied with a manifold job or separate connections for each building.

2.10—In all cases where a new service is required the owner shall pay for the entire installation from the main to the meter, with the footage figured from the middle of the street.

2.11—Where property is served by two water connections and the owner desires to discontinue one meter, the expense of making the change must be paid by the owner.

2.12—In no case shall there be any connection between water pipes receiving their supply from the Village water mains and pipes receiving their supply from some other source.

2.13—All work performed by any person, firm, or corporation pertaining to any part of the installation of water service pipes, fittings, or extensions shall be inspected by a qualified inspector of the Water Department before said pipes, fittings, or extensions are covered with earth or backfill.

2.16—The applicant for a water connection and water extension shall pay to the Department the following fees which shall include the permit fee, the inspection fee, the tapping charge and the installation of the corporation cock and the water meter, to-wit:

Table with 2 columns: Pipe size and Fee. 1/4 inch \$10.00, 1 inch 12.00, 1 1/2 inch 22.00, 2 inch 24.00.

The cost of tapping in excess of 2 inches shall be determined by the Water Department from time to time.

3.5—A pipe entering a building through a coal bin shall run exposed to the meter and shall be provided with a valve where it enters the building.

3.10—The Department shall have the right to shut off the supply of water to any premises where the Department is not able to obtain access to the meter.

ers are installed for the purpose of reading, testing, removing, or inspecting same and no person, firm, or corporation shall hinder, obstruct, or interfere with such employee of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park in the lawful discharge of his duties in relation to the care and maintenance of such water meters.

3.11—Any damage which a meter may sustain resulting from carelessness of the owner, agent, or tenant or from neglect or either of them to properly secure and protect the meter as well as any damage which may be wrought by frost, hot water, or steam backing from a boiler shall be paid by the owner of the property to the Village on presentation of a bill therefor; and in cases where the bill is not paid the water shall be shut off and shall not be turned on until all charges have been paid to the Water Department.

4.1—Water service charges and sewage disposal charges shall be in accordance with the following schedule and based on the water consumption:

- (a) Water rate charge: First 100,000 cubic feet per quarter at \$1.15 per 1,000 cubic feet. Over 100,000 cubic feet per quarter at \$1.00 per 1,000 cubic feet. (b) A minimum charge of \$1.50 per quarter shall be made for each meter. (c) Ten cents per 1,000 cubic feet of water used will be charged if bills are not paid on due date. (d) Sewage disposal charge: Thirty-five cents per 1,000 cubic feet per quarter. (e) Meter service charges per quarter: 3/4 inch Meter \$1.00, 1 inch Meter 1.50, 1 1/2 inch Meter 2.00, 2 inch Meter 2.50, 3 inch Meter 3.00, 4 inch Meter 3.50.

4.4—The Department is hereby empowered to discontinue water service for non-payment of any water charges, disposal rates, assessments, charges, costs, expenses or rentals due the Village after they have become three months delinquent or for the violation of any provision of this ordinance.

4.5—(a) Every person, firm, or corporation using water from the public water mains in the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, or whose property in said Village is connected with said public water mains, shall pay therefor to the Village of Grosse Pointe Park at the time prescribed by ordinance such water rates, charges for water and sewer service, penalties, and imposts for or in relation to such public water service as may be now or hereafter fixed or established by resolution or ordinance of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park.

(b) Unpaid water rates or charges may be collected by suit brought in the name of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park against any owner or occupant of the premises, or property, or both.

(c) In addition to all other remedies now possessed by the Village for the collection of all charges, the Village shall have as further security for the collection of such charges, a lien upon such house or other building and upon the land upon which such house or other building shall be situated to which such service was rendered. Such lien shall become effective immediately upon the service being supplied as aforesaid. The lien created herein shall be enforced in the manner prescribed by State Statute for enforcing tax liens.

5.1—(a) No person shall tap or connect any water main or insert any corporation cock therein, nor open or close any valves in the water main or water connection nor molest or interfere with any valve or valve box cover excepting employees of the Department.

(b) No person shall open any hydrant or fire plug or drain water from any hydrant. No member of the Fire Department, Water Department, or any Village employee shall let out or suffer or permit any person to take any wrenches furnished by the Village except only on occasions of fire or conditions of emergencies; or give any person permission to open or draw water from any hydrant or main without first securing a permit from the chief clerk of the Water Department.

(c) No person, firm, or corporation shall tear up or break into any public street, alley, public place, sidewalk, intersection, pavement, or open such street or highway in the Village of Grosse Pointe Park without first having made application for a permit so to do.

5.3—The Water Department shall maintain the water service from the water main in the street to the stop box or the lot line, whichever comes first, when said service line runs

perpendicular to the water main in the street and to the building which it serves. The maintenance of water service lines running through alleys and connected to water mains on side streets or streets not abutting the property shall be termed "private service lines" and shall be maintained from the water main to the stop box by the owner or owners which the line serves.

5.7—This ordinance shall take effect July 2, 1944.

Diagram of street grid showing Fromm's location at Kercheval and St. Clair. THE DETROIT EDISON COMPANY



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

## To The Residents of Grosse Pointe Woods:

Above is a perspective view of the tentative plan of commercial development for the large tract of unsubdivided property lying at the southerly limits of your village.

This property is presently zoned to a depth of 300 feet from Mack Avenue for business purposes but such a depth would not permit us to provide adequate off-street parking facilities for such a project nor permit us to construct all buildings to the depth required under modern merchandising policies.

A petition has been filed with the Village Commission of Grosse Pointe Woods to amend the present zoning ordinance to enable us to carry out this development in proper fashion and in a manner that will most completely protect neighboring residents from crowded street parking. A public hearing on the matter will be held at the Mason School on Vernier Road at 8:00 o'clock P.M., on Monday, June 26th, and it is hoped that all interested residents will attend.

Following is the text of the petition that has been filed with the Commission:

### To The Village Commission, Grosse Pointe Woods, Michigan

## Petition for Amendment of Zoning Ordinance

Your petitioner is the Parkwood Land Company, a Michigan corporation, owner of the parcel of land consisting of approximately thirty-two (32) acres situated at the extreme southerly limits of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods, with a frontage of approximately 639 feet on the westerly side of Mack Avenue. This property formerly belonged to the Trombly Estate, Hall Estate Company and Edward C. Roney, and is unplatted.

The southerly boundary of the parcel is the boundary line between the City of Detroit and Grosse Pointe Woods and extends back a distance of approximately 2500 feet so that the rear portion is located in Grosse Pointe Woods.

The northerly line of the land in question abuts Grosse Pointe Woods Country Club Subdivision, and petitioner owns all of the adjoining lots consisting of the lots platted for residence in the two blocks, as well as the lots platted for business fronting on Mack Avenue.

It is proposed, with the approval of the Commission, to develop this land as a high-grade, modern shopping and theatre center, to be tenanted by the leading firms operating in this territory.

To this end petitioner seeks amendment of the present zoning ordinance with particular reference to this parcel of land, such amendment to provide for the designation for business purposes of the front 702 feet at right angles to the North boundary. The purpose of this request is to provide a minimum structure depth of 600 feet from the West line of Mack Avenue, 204 feet wide, as proposed.

If the proposed plan is acceptable, petitioner would be agreeable to voluntary dedication of the necessary land for the widening of Mack and incidental sewer easements.

It will appear offhand that a structure depth of 600 feet is in excess of the usual requirement. We wish to point out, however, that this development is to be in conformity with the modern trend toward structures of greater floor area and less height and to provide for large scale merchandising with extensive and varied lines of merchandise.

The angling line of Mack Avenue makes a considerable portion of the front area impractical for use other than for entrance colonnade and, allowing for delivery ramps at the rear and display windows both front and rear, the structure area will not exceed the space requirement for this type of development.

It is common observation, of course, that markets, department stores and similar merchandising establishments are tending more and more to larger ground floor areas in the Detroit district. That trend is even more pronounced in other sections of the country and this project is planned as above in conformity with the trend and popular demand.

In addition to an outstanding department store, the project will include an ultra-modern television theatre with upwards of 3500 seating capacity and several lesser merchandising establishments as indicated on the project plan as prepared by Mr. C. L. Kendrick.

Of equal importance to store owners is provision for adequate off-street parking. While the zoning ordinance directs that adequate parking facilities be provided, there is no formal designation of parking areas and petitioner requests that the proposed zoning amendment provide for a parking lot area to embrace the entire rear portion of the parcel. In this connection we wish to point out that the proposed parking area will be graded, surfaced and well lighted.

The playground area is proposed to be enclosed and to be supervised. The plan, of course, is to provide a place for the entertainment of children while parents are shopping, but the facilities would be available also to children of the vicinity.

It is recognized, of course, that Grosse Pointe Woods is predominantly a residence community and that by and large even the Mack Avenue frontage is projected for residence construction. That being the case, we believe it is most desirable that residents have proper and convenient shopping facilities and the project in contemplation is calculated to provide the best.

A survey of the area demonstrates that there is no complete merchandising center for a distance of several miles and it is with this in mind, of course, that the development is deemed feasible.

Another factor giving rise to the soundness of the location is the proposed St. Joseph's hospital to be constructed on the North side of Seven Mile Road, just West of the Mack intersection. Two large parcels of land have been acquired for this purpose at the foot of Chandler Park (Outer Drive) and these conveyances are now a matter of public record. We are advised that this site will be the location for one of the largest and most modern hospitals in the state.

If there are any objectionable features to this program and we do not foresee such, the location in question is calculated to minimize the disadvantages, if any.

The parcel is located at the extreme limits of the Village on a tract which has never been developed in any way. On the one side is the City of Detroit and the Detroit Edison Company power station, on the other is land owned by petitioner and across the street is another municipality.

While, as observed above, much of the Mack Avenue frontage is projected for residence use, there are lots on Mack Avenue in close vicinity to petitioner's land which are not so restricted, and it is to be observed that nearly all of the lots on Mack Avenue for the next half mile North have reverted to the State of Michigan for non-payment of taxes.

The advantage to accrue to the Village in greater assessed values will be considerable. Not only will the land itself be made productive and real estate value increased by the addition of buildings, but a large amount of personal property will become the subject of local taxation. In addition to inventories which will necessarily be large, there will be store fixtures and incidental property which in the case of a single large department store may run as high as \$100,000.00.

It may appear that the project is uncertain of development due to present restrictions on the use of construction materials. The time factor is admittedly uncertain, but it should be borne in mind that a development so extensive requires a great deal of preliminary preparation and as much as a year and a half in normal course between the inception of the plan and the commencement of construction.

Construction will be commenced as soon as materials are available and we believe the Commission will readily recognize the value to the community of such a post war project. Large amounts of material will be required and a great deal of labor and supervision, much of which can be local.

Your petitioner is willing to conform to any reasonable restrictions or regulations which may be established by the Commission in connection with this development, and petitioner respectfully requests favorable action to the end that this project may be commenced at the earliest possible date.
