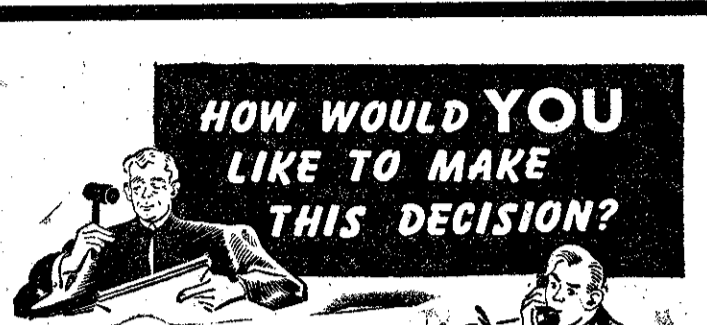

Recently enrolled in a month's radio refresher course at the Pre-Radio Naval Training School, located at the U. S. Naval Armory in Michigan City, Indiana was James O. Hoyt, 38, husband of Louise M. Hoyt, 1150 1/2 Lakepointe avenue, Grosse Pointe Park.

The Bluejacket's radio ability was discovered in a series of aptitude tests given during his recruit training. The short course includes the basic principles of electricity, algebra and slide-rule fundamentals. Successful completion of the short course sends the Bluejacket on to an advanced school where he is eligible to win a petty officer rating before being sent on to active duty.

AFHQ, Mediterranean theatre — Take a refrigeration mechanic, train him intensively as an all-round soldier, make him an expert driver and machine-gunner, then give him the toughest assignments you can find—and you have a typical member of a mobile quarter-master refrigeration unit serving in the Mediterranean theatre.

With its fleet of 10-ton refrigeration trucks — "iceboxes-on-wheels," the soldiers call them—one of these units, commanded by Captain Patrick N. Pastors of Nutley, New Jersey, is delivering thousands of tons of meats and other perishable foods a month to fighting troops of the Army.

From refrigeration ships landing at one of the Mediterranean ports, food is hauled by these "iceboxes-on-wheels" to cold storage plants, and from the cold storage plants to rail-

heads as needed by the troops in the field. These distribution points are scattered over an area 1400 miles long, and the unit covers more than 35,000 miles during an average month. Often cargoes include vaccines, penicillin and other life-saving medicines and drugs.

THE DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE OFFICE

They have kept bird feeding stations. The club has worked with State and Federal conservation agencies in many of its activities. Recently, I had occasion, together with other residents and property owners of the village of Grosse Pointe Woods, to attend a public meeting in the Municipal building on Mack avenue, at which meeting, certain promoters interested in amending the zoning law of the village so as to permit the erection of business projects in what is now a residential section of the village, gave their views and reasons in support of an amendment to the zoning law.

Although this meeting was public, the residents who attended were asked not to voice their opinions concerning the matter because they were informed that at a subsequent public hearing to be held, permission so to do would be granted. I understand that notice of this public meeting to discuss the matter pro and con will be published in the newspapers in advance of same. It is to correct the wrong impression given by recent articles in your paper that the residents of the village took part in the discussion at the meeting held, that this letter is written.

The matter is important enough that it should be called to the attention of the village that no public discussion was had in the matter, so that they may, at a public meeting to be held in the future, attend and voice their objections, if any, to the proposition above stated.

Personally, I believe that the amendment should not be allowed because the subdivision and the property in this section was held out to the public as a strictly residential section and the majority of the people who own property purchased same on that assumption. The property owners and especially those adjacent to the proposed project have valuable vested rights which will be affected. It does not seem fair that business interests should be given preference at this late date, a preference over residents who purchased property years ago and desired to establish their homes in the peace and quiet of that section of the village. Because of the importance of the matter to the residents, I believe that more publicity should be given about the next public meeting so that the voice of the majority of the people in interest may be heard.



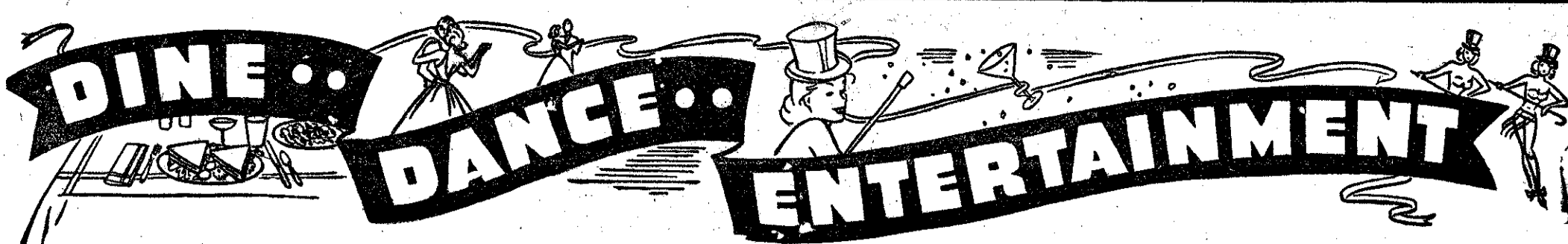

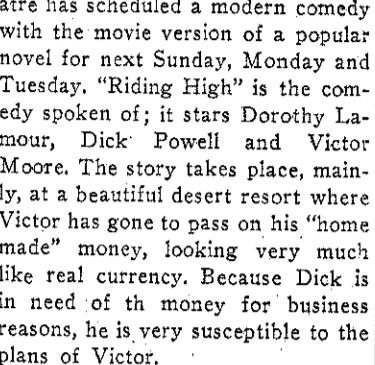
