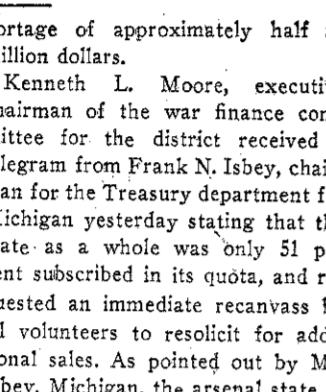
Identity of Body Still Unknown

THE REALLY BIG THING

America's servicemen have come into their own with passage of the "G.I. Bill of Rights." Now they know as they fight the folks back home will go on caring about them even when they're through fighting. They know that what they're fighting — \$100 to \$300 dismissal pay, assurance of help in finding a job, unemployment payments for 52 weeks if needed, opportunity to complete their education, loans to buy a farm, home or business, hospitalization — comes from all the people, motivated from the heart of a grateful nation.

That brings us to the really big thing. How about opportunity — in general? Opportunity for initiative to get a tailwind to go some place. What kind of economy is G.I. Joe going to? Education and a business are no good in a vacuum or in an economy hostile to risk, improvement, expansion.

That's the next objective. We've got to assure the veteran kind of American economy that's going to encourage the kind that's in him; to get ahead the best way there is — on his own.

The Question Before the Commission

Since more than one effort, instigated for the most part by one person, has been made to have Bishop road south of Jefferson closed by the village commission, we are wondering if the present effort to remove a Grosse Pointe institution in the former well-known and popular "popcorn man" is not a move toward the same end.

For years, Ernest "Tony" Koinis has operated a mobile popcorn, soft drink and candy stand at the corner of Bishop and Kensington, where neighbors by the scores and passing motorists have freely sampled his stores and enjoyed them. Thirteen residents who live on Bishop, Kensington and Ellair place have signed a petition asking the commission to let "Tony" stay. And, the American Legion, too, is interested in seeing that their veterans is given fair treatment.

The chief of police states that there has never been a report to his department of any accidents at the corner, even though it is a busy spot. Petting parties at the foot of Bishop are as infrequent, too, as in many other spots in the Grosse Pointes. Only two parked cars were reported at the foot of Bishop during the previous two weeks.

The question resolves itself into this, is one man's or a minority's wishes in the matter to be served by the village commission, or will a World War veteran be allowed to continue as a Grosse Pointe institution for the pleasure and convenience of his patrons.

Country Fair To Open Here July 13

A real old-fashioned country fair—

with brightly colored booths, the excited cries of competing barkers, amazing prizes and the pound of the auctioneer's gavel—will spring up, July 13, on the hockey field of Grosse Pointe's Sacred Heart Academy, 171 Lake Shore Road.

Mrs. Henry Ford II, who is the chairman, has announced that it will be called the Lake Shore "Country Fair" and that it will run from 2 to 10 p. m.

Sponsored by the Detroit and Grosse Pointe alumnae of the Sacred Heart, the Fair will help raise funds for the rehabilitation of Sacred Heart convents in Europe. According to Mrs. Ford, 36 convents overseas have been bombed, damaged or captured by the Nazi and the fate of 14 others is uncertain. The Religious of these colleges and academies are scattered and homeless. Many of them have been forced to work for the Nazis who have confiscated their property, made barracks of their buildings.

The Sacred Heart Academy at Grosse Pointe, with the Academy on Lawrence avenue in Detroit, has served the community for more than 90 years. Proceeds from the Fair, which is a joint project, will go to the Emergency Relief Fund of the Alumnae of the Sacred Heart.

At every fair, there will be a "midway." Gay booths will offer toys, china, glassware, fancy work and an assortment of merchandise "finds." A single large tent will be used for games.

Highlight of the day will be an old-fashioned auction. Thirty cases of poultry, two milking goats, two lambs, six suckling pigs, a spirited pony, a blue-ribbon boar, a prize black ram and a prize Hereford calf will be brought to the auction block. Besides this, the auctioneer will raise his gavel over two dogs—"Ranger," a pedigreed spring spaniel, and a chubby black and white puppy. Walter Hagen has contributed a championship golf stick which, like the two baseballs autographed by Tiger players and the two autographed sets of Jack Dempsey's boxing gloves will go to the highest bidder.

Besides the auction there are special prizes. For the lucky ones there is an heirloom china tea service, valued at more than \$275, a prize Tennessee walking horse that would make any stable proud, two five-hundred dollar war bonds as well as a thousand dollar bond.

Even the children haven't been forgotten. For them there are rides on sleek little ponies or a bouncing trip in any Army jeep around the Academy grounds. Roving clowns will add to the "fair" atmosphere and fun.

For everyone there will be outdoor

dancing—with a few group square dances well as modern dances.

Working with Mrs. Ford, as vice-chairman, is Mrs. James Remick.

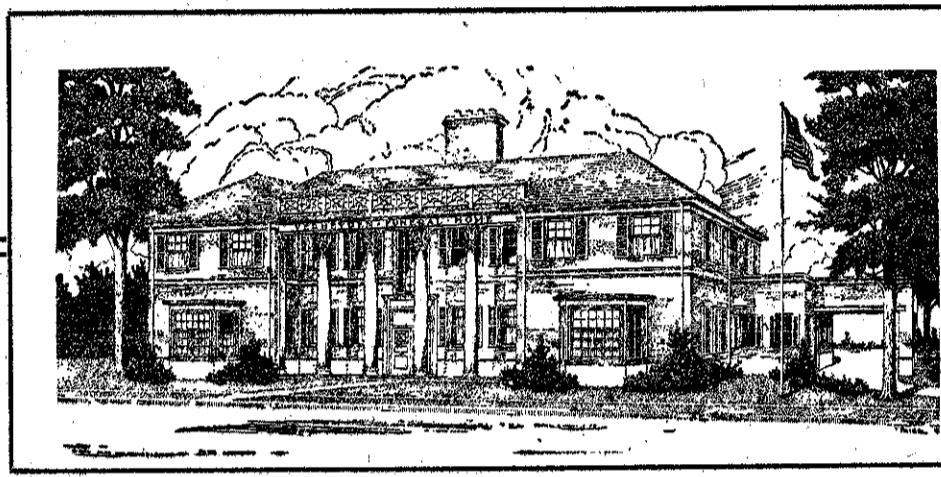

AFHQ, Mediterranean Theatre. In North Africa there is one of the largest ordnance arsenals overseas—the first of its kind in the U. S. army. With a streamline design, it has kept the army fighting with the best and latest equipment. The battalion, commanded by Lieut. Col. Albert P. Bas-

ton of Minneapolis, Minn., has been doing its part since the invasion of North Africa. This ordnance base armament battalion is a complete shop that repairs automotive armored equipment, heavy tanks, artillery and fire control instruments, small arms, and

even tires for vehicles. Everything from a one-quarter ton jeep to a 60-ton tank is torn apart, repaired or modified with the latest improvements. Rocket guns and 240 millimeter howitzers are also repaired and returned to action.

This battalion played an important role in keeping troops in Tunisia, Sicily, and Italy supplied with the best. Since November, 1942, it has repaired over 15,000 pieces of artillery, 17,000 fire control instruments, 350,000 small arms weapons and over 10,000 vehicles. The tire repair company, the only unit of the sort in the Mediterranean, has saved many tires for the army. At the rate of 1,500 tires a week, the rubber shortage has been licked by this company. Included in this highly qualified specialized battalion is Pvt. Marcel Ver-vacke, husband of Mrs. Adeline Ver-vacke, of 1346 Beaconsfield.

Flight Officer Ramm now becomes

one of the army air forces new "triple-threat men" — airmen who have completed instruction in dead-reckoning navigation and aerial gunnery in addition to the regular bombardiering course.

As an officer in the army air forces ready for active duty, his destination is not disclosed. He is a former student of Wayne university.

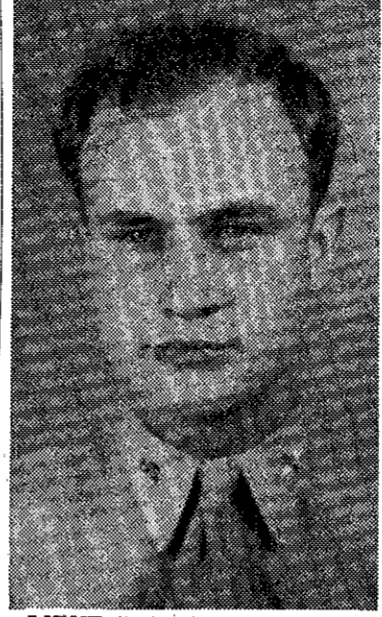
Outside of that we really have nothing to kick about, with the exception that every now and then we read about the strikes in Detroit.

That some such action should be taken is apparent in the fact the township is growing and has grown from a population of 858 in 1940 to over 5000 at present.

The retaining of the right of the residents to vote on all issues is an economy measure in itself. The proposition of building a centrally located building and housing all departments under one roof is another, he explained.

The appropriation for the operation of the fire department is also an economy measure. In the first place these men must be paid if they are to continue to function for the protection of the township homes.

The cost of these two proposals combined would be about \$4.50 per year based on the present average assessment on the average home. After the building has been paid for only the cost of operating the fire department would remain.

Mr. Houtekier urges that these matters be left in the hands of those who have and still understand them. Gratiot Township is now operating on the lowest tax rate of any community in Wayne county.

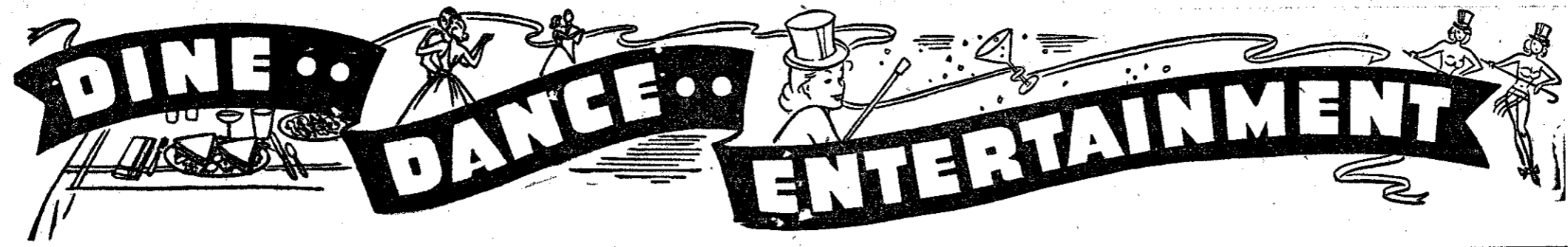

Edmund McGuire Is Candidate for County Auditor






