# SERVICE PARADE

new assignments. Theme of the AAF redistribution program is designation of each man to duty for which he is best fitted. Returnees live at a redistribution station under conditions that encourage natural response to processing, the greater part of their two-week stay being devoted to rest and recreation.

AAF personal, enlisted men and officers alike, are assigned to a redistribution station upon their return to the United States, but do not report to the station until completing a furlough or leave of three weeks.

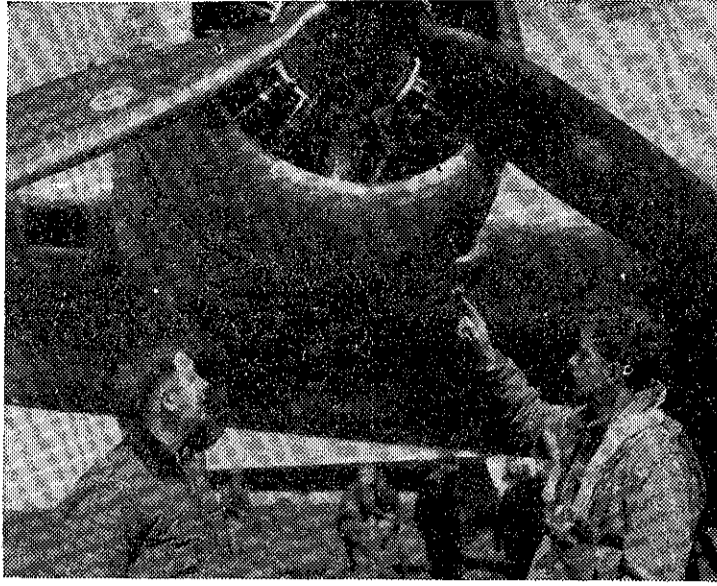

RESOLUTION BY COMMISSIONER CUNNINGHAM ORDINANCE No. 133 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE No. 73 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO LICENSE VENDORS, HAWKERS, PEDDLERS AND JUNK DEALERS IN THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE PARK," ADOPTED JUNE 7, 1929

Section 1. Ordinance No. 73 of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park entitled "An Ordinance to license and regulate itinerant vendors, hawkers, peddlers and junk dealers in the Village of Grosse Pointe Park," adopted June 7, 1929, is hereby amended by amending the title and Sections 1 and 2 and by adding two new sections to be known as Sections 8 (a) and 8 (b), to read as follows:

Section 2: The terms "itinerant vendor, street vendor, hawker, or peddler" shall include any person who canvasses from house to house for the purpose of selling or sells or peddles on the Village streets or alleys or from door to door of homes, offices, stores, restaurants, or other places of business, any article, thing, merchandise, commodity, food or food products. Said terms shall not apply to the delivery of such articles, things, merchandise, commodities, food or food products to established customers or pursuant to orders previously taken.

Section 8 (a): The provisions of Section 7 and Section 8 shall not apply to former soldiers, sailors, or marines of the military or naval services of the United States who hold peddler's licenses issued under the provisions of Act No. 359 Public Acts of Michigan of 1921, as amended.

Section 8 (b): The vehicles used by itinerant vendors, street vendors, hawkers, or peddlers, when engaged in their business on the village streets or alleys, must be kept in motion except when making sales, and their movement must be timed and executed so as to cause a minimum interference with traffic.

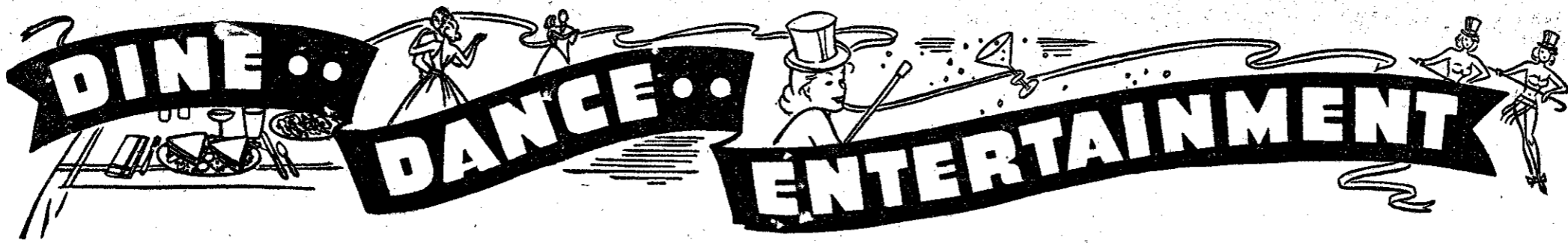

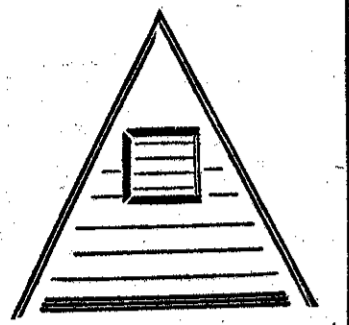

Reminding all individuals who intend to take such employment or who are already employed in commercial canning that such work is covered under the provisions of the Social Security Act, Mr. Francis L. Pendergast, manager of the field office of the Social Security Board at 8037 Harper avenue, today urged all such workers to obtain their social security account number cards if they have not done so.

"The Social Security Act," said Mr. Pendergast, "requires that all employees, regardless of age, who work in the canning industry obtain an account number so that their Federal insurance credits, which protect them and their survivors in the event of the worker's death, may be properly listed on their wage records. Employers are required to report the correct amount of wages each calendar quarter, and unless the worker's account number is properly registered, the worker may lose cer-
