





Warm weather means an added burden on your refrigerator. The hotter the weather, the harder it works to keep things cool. If you notice a "snow-man" forming inside—heavy frost on the cooling coils—it's time to get busy and defrost the refrigerator. That layer of frost is costing you money: It means that the refrigerator must work overtime to absorb heat through a blanket of frost around the cooling coils. And for economical operation, the motor should run as little

It's only human to keep "putting-off" the chore of defrosting-especially in summer, when ice cubes are in big demand and you hesitate to have your refrigerator out of commission even for a few hours. But see that it is done regularly. Do not use an ice pick or a sharp instrument to remove ice; this sometimes punctures the refrigerating coils. After defrosting, wash the whole interior (coils, shelves, trays, etc.) with lukewarm water and mild soap. Unless the motor of your refrigerator is hermetically sealed, have it oiled and inspected periodically. Remember that your refrigerator must last for the duration. Treat it accordingly! 



Recreational materials sent Japanese war prison camps for use of United Nations war prisoners and civilian internees have arrived at their destination, it has been learned through neutral sources.







### **Allow Motor Boats** Gas to Keep Them in Good Condition

Basic motor boat rations for unrestricted use are granted to prevent deterioration of the craft and the motor, A. A. Ghesquiere, chairman of the Grosse Pointe war price and rationing board, said today.

In the opinion of military and war igency officials, Ghesquiere said, allmotors are to be kept in as good running condition as possible in case of a national emergency. While the fortunes of war are bright at the present tme, he said, it is felt by officials that this policy should not he relaxed.

Non-occupational rations are issued for motor boats in much the same manner as the basic A book is issued for automobiles. No restrictions on the use of gasoline are set up in either case. Under national regulations, inboard motors are granted a ration of two times the manufacturer's rated horsepower for three months but in no case canthe ration exceed 125 gallons. For outboard motors, the ration is 21/2 times the manufacturer's rated horsepower but in no case can the ration exceed 20 gallons for this

Provisions are made under the regulations, Ghesquiere said, to receive additional gasoline rations for occupational use for motor boats. As in all other ration programs, he added, application must be made to the local board with proof of need estab-
