### Village Attorney to Draw Up Woods Chicken Ordinance

Berns, has been asked by the village commission to prepare an ordinance governing the raising of chickens. This was the action taken Tuesday night at the bi-monthly meeting.

Woods residents, angered by the noise, odor and general nuisance, have asked for definite action by the commission. They said they have been awakened each morning by roosters crowing and have watched rats, drawn to the chickens, dig up their gardens. The commission agreed that the complaints already received are to be investigated by the police department who are to warn the chicken fanciers that any nuisance which they are causing, must be cleared up. If not, a complaint will be signed and they will be prosecuted under the nuisance ordinance.

amendment to the "Vendor's Ordinance" and a resolution making Bishop road between Jefferson and the lake a "No Parking" area.

Grosse Pointers have not surrendered their rights to the village commissioners nor have they delegated to them authority which is to be misused; to set one individual against another individual or to mistreat one at the behest of another to trade for personal or political favors.

This is evident in the number of "ballots" which have reached Mr. Stamman since the Grosse Pointe Civic league asked for the opinions of the residents regarding this situation. Of the ballots received, 68 are in favor of allowing Tony to remain in the same spot he has held for the past 20 years. Of this number, 56 signatures were from the Park, while nine were mailed from the Farms, two from the City and one from the Woods.

This shows that the citizens of the Park resent the commission's attempts at passing ordinances and resolutions which to the unsuspecting, have the appearance of general laws, but which are actually intended against one individual, or designed to benefit another.

The commissioners will answer the injunction tomorrow morning, Friday, at nine o'clock in the Wayne county circuit court.

### Democracy Analyzed by Mount Clemens Attorney in Talk

As a guest of Ernie Provo, members of the Grosse Pointe Rotary club heard Macy Watkins, Mount Clemens attorney, describe the "Four Cornerstones of Democracy" at the Monday noon meeting at the Whittier hotel.

Although classed as a democratic nation, our form of government isn't purely democratic but more of a republic, inasmuch as we elect representatives who select our federal officials. It has been necessary, however, stated the speaker, for the so-called democratic nations to align themselves side by side to combat the Axis powers.

Drawing a distinct contrast between the treatment of the four cornerstones by Axis nations, Mr. Watkins enumerated his four foundation stones as the church, the home, the school and the ballot.

Wherever dictatorship exists, the freedom of these four principles is definitely restricted and subjected to the will of the dictator or the state. In the Axis nations, there is no religious liberty; the home is not sacred; the schools are permitted to teach only the state principles and there is no recourse to public ballot, by which, in America, we remove or attempt to remove officials who displease us, said the speaker.

### Leader Reports Scout Paper Drive in Woods A Success

The paper drive sponsored last Saturday in Grosse Pointe Woods by Boy Scout Troop No. 290, was a huge success, according to Mr. Bachelor, in charge of the collection. ### Charles Wade Tells of Fierce Battle in South Pacific

Aboard a Coast Guard-Manned Assault Transport in Pacific Waters. — How they watched the bloody battle for Saipan from a ringside seat and dodged Jap planes in two air raids within 72 hours was told today by Charles W. Wade, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Wade, 1136 Maryland, Grosse Pointe Park. He is a water tender second class in the Coast Guard.

Wade and his shipmates watched the fight for the control of the Mariana Islands' major stronghold, which is only 1,300 miles from Tokyo, from his battle station in an ammunition supply compartment by an anti-aircraft gun.

"The Japs put up a bitter fight from the very first," they said. "Only a couple hours after we had put troops ashore from our ship under heavy mortar fire, some of them were back aboard with bad wounds. We could tell by that stream of wounded evacuees in the next 72 hours that we had another Tarawa on our hands.

"Through glasses we could see tanks creeping up the hills engaging Jap tanks. They looked like beetles. Shells fell into the surf by the dozens and every once in a while we saw a puff of black smoke and knew one of our boats or tanks had been hit.

"As we put out to sea the first night — we offered too much of a target to stay around after dark — four Jap bombers came over us. The air was filled with so much ack-ack it looked like a pin cushion. We gave them everything we had, but they were too high. The bombers got away, but they didn't have a chance to drop their loads.

The Coast Guardsman told how a native woman of Saipan and her 10-day old daughter were brought aboard for medical treatment and became favorites with everyone.

"She was scared at first, but someone broke out a few words of Japanese and pretty soon she was smiling. It didn't take her long to come around after that. There was also a boy about eight years old, who we called 'Little Tojo'. He never smiled or talked, and was serious as an owl. He had a bullet wound in the leg. But he ate ice cream for the first time and liked it, and we gave him a little brown dog one of the troops had left aboard. We put them ashore just before we left Saipan."

Wade participated in several invasions prior to Saipan, including the Marshall Islands operation. "Red," as he is known to his shipmates, has been in the Coast Guard two years.

The first call, by an anonymous party, claimed they heard a gun fired at 1741 Maumee and asked officers to investigate. Investigation showed there wasn't any such number.

Soon after, Mrs. George Loersch, 1836 Brys Drive, called and said she had a call from an Earl Anderson, 1741 Maumee, saying his wife threatened to shoot him. Police thought that Mrs. Loersch was the object of a joke as they had been.

Later a funeral director called to say that he had been asked to pick up a body "in a hurry." He asked if the number given was in the city. It proved to be correct.

Police investigated the correct number and found everything in order. They believe that the residents were victims of a practical joker.

### Farms Police Rescue Man Entangled in Weeds in Lake

How two Grosse Pointe Farms policemen rowed a speedboat with one oar and a mop was told this week in relating the details of the rescue of a retired Detroit fire lieutenant, from the seaweed-filled waters of Lake St. Clair.

Ferdinand Pray, 57, was reported missing from the Walters Convalescent home, 315 Fisher road about eleven o'clock Saturday night, but it was not until 4:30 Sunday morning that he was found in the lake.

A watchman told police he heard groans coming from the lake, and thinking something was wrong, he called them. Officers George Champagne and Lester LaBroski of the Farms police answered the call. It was pointed out to them that the moaning was coming from that section of the water near the Dillman estate and the Little Club.

Not being able to find a rowboat, the officers jumped into a nearby speedboat and started paddling with one oar and a mop.

At this time City police arrived and began showing their spotlight on the water. Through this, Champagne and LaBroski were able to find Pray who had become tangled in the seaweed and was able to stay afloat only by leaning on his cane. Later when police attempted to question him, he was too ill to answer them.

Mr. Pray was taken to Cottage hospital by Officers Albert Wyffels and Bernard McFarlin of the City police. Sunday afternoon, he was transferred to Receiving hospital in Detroit where it is believed that he will recover.

A worried mother has brought to our attention; something that we're afraid has not only slipped our minds for a while, but perhaps yours too.

Many families of late have been so busy worrying for their own particular GI Joe in the service, that GI Joe's younger teenage brother and sister are left to shift for themselves. We realize it is not willful disinterest on the part of the parents, but when these growing youngsters no longer find the entertainment and interest of their parents at home they go out and seek newer and more exciting adventures.

It is illegal, of course, to sell liquor of any kind to persons under 21, but youth has always found a way to get what they want, and we know by previous experiences that they usually do. Using someone else's identification card, or birth certificate is only two of the more common methods, and can usually be detected, but what can be done about those who willingly sell alcoholic beverages to these youngsters, whether it is in a beer garden, dance hall, or through other channels, and who are yet unknown to law enforcement authorities.

Today these young people have to forego the pleasures of the high school days we knew; long drives in the country for hikes and picnics, fishing trips up north, driving down to Ann Arbor for the Saturday football games, formal dances and probably above all the companionship of their old brothers and sisters who always "understood."

Mother and Dad we elect you to take over and make that "difficult" age easier for your children, so that their memories will be happy ones and when our GIs come home to say they'll find their younger brothers and sisters eager, fun-loving, good clean American youths who'd rather have a hamburger and a coke at their favorite curb service stand than a "hot" in some "dim-lighted, smoke filled bar."

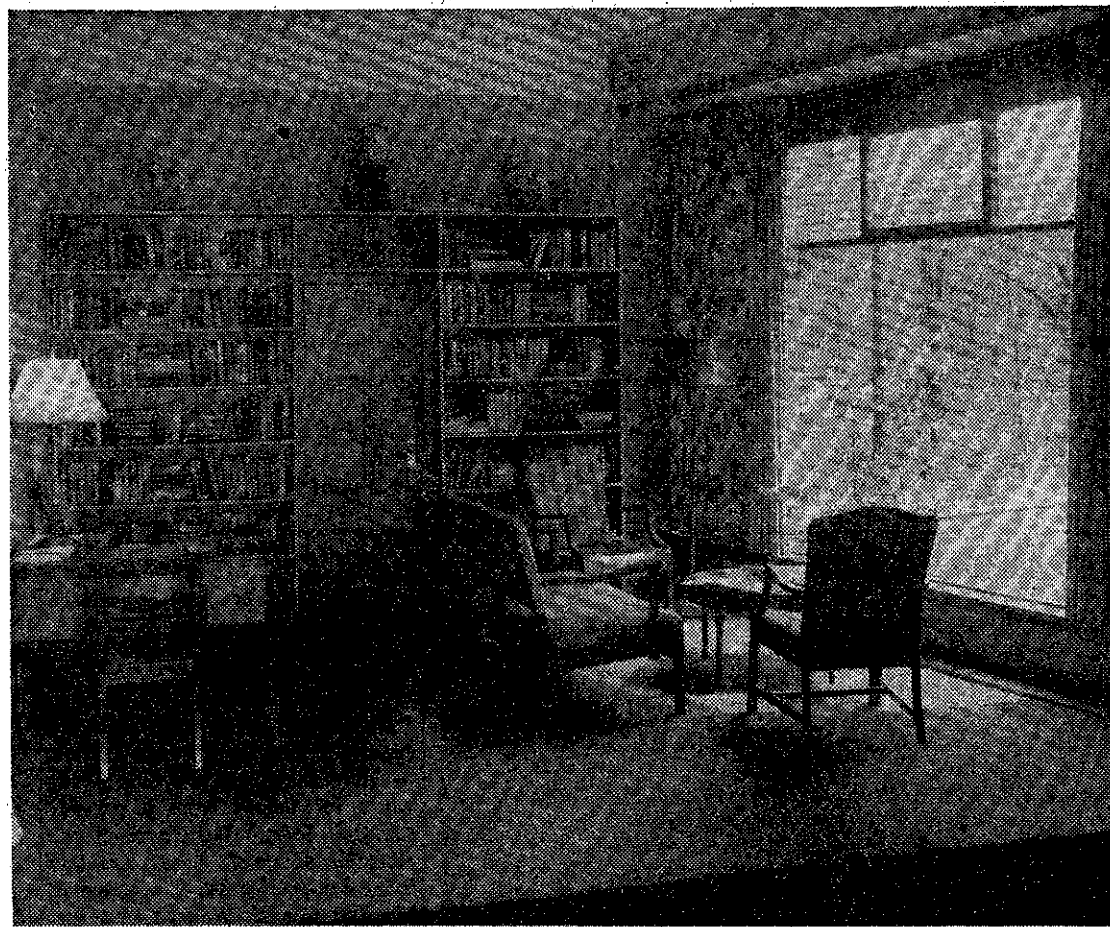

## RESTFUL CORNER AT OFFICERS CLUB



THIS IS one corner of the lounge overlooking Grand Circus Park which can be seen through the window of the Officers club in the Hotel Tuller. It is seldom that this spot is not occupied by some man reading or "just looking," watching Detroiters passing by.

It is a matter of record that Detroit led the way for industry in its co-operation with the armed forces. At the beginning of the war Detroit had a very small permanent commissioned officers staff. With industry stepping up war production, Detroit became one of the large centers of officer personnel. One of the very bad features of this large officer population was, they had no place to go, no place for entertainment because unlike other cities who had had large officer population, Detroit had no facilities for its commissioned officers.

How different that picture is today, can be seen in the clubrooms of the Detroit Officers club, the finest in the country.

It was in 1943 that a group of patriotic Detroiters worked around to a non-profit organization to be known as the Officers Club of Detroit. On Jan. 2, 1944, first publicity was printed in Detroit papers about their plans.

Redecorating of the club rooms on the lobby floor of the Tuller hotel was completed and the doors were thrown open on March 3, 1944.

One of the novel features is that the Detroit club has its own separate entrance and is centrally located.

Everything from this entrance on Bagley and ending with the lovely interior decorating, leaves visiting officers with the impression so often stated that the Detroit Officers club

is the finest in the country.

The wall decorations done in a soft green-blue shade, together with a high ceiling painted ivory and the large display windows facing Grand Circus Park and curtained, all go to set the Detroit club as a leader.

Two pool tables, two ping pong tables, numerous card tables, writing desks, big sofas, easy chairs, a juke box and dance floor, all go to make the officers feel at home.

The weekly dances held on Saturday night have been well patronized. The first 10 days of operation, more than a thousand officers visited the club and the first month's membership totaled nearly five hundred.

It has been noted that the Detroit Officers club has played host to officers of every branch of the armed services, both men and women and to most of the United Nations officers including Canadian, British, French, Russian, Chinese, Australian, New Zealanders, Polish, Norway and many others. From generals to second lieutenants the story of service in the Detroit Officers club has been the same.

No small credit for the operation of the Officers club can be given to the efforts of Mrs. Mary C. Burdoo, resident director, and Miss Frances Booth, vice-president. These two individuals have spent most of their time in the interests of the club and have been ably assisted by other officers and members of the executive staff.

The Officers club provides complete information service and the service desk is prepared to answer any question which a visiting officer might make. The social staff in addition to the resident director has sufficient senior and junior hostesses at the club at all times to chat and dance with unaccompanied officers.

Wives of officers are invited to make use of the clubrooms but due to space limitations after five o'clock only those accompanied by an officer can remain.

Perhaps one of the most appreciated services of the Detroit Officers club are the Sunday afternoon tea dances. This feature is growing each week—the buffet is served, a sample menu was nut bread sandwiches, fruit salad, potato chips, cake and iced tea. It goes without saying that to those away from home who are able to come into their own club and enjoy the hospitality to be topped off by this buffet, helped make their Detroit stay more pleasant.

Another appreciated service that is constantly expanding in size and scope is the home hospitality. Invitations to meals, to spend a day or an evening with some friendly Detroit family are constantly received at the Officers club and by sending out officers this service helps fill a touch of home. Detroit can be proud of its many families who have offered this hospitality to officers through the Officers club.

From the beginning the service desk has had calls for furnished rooms, apartments and houses. Over 175 officers have found suitable living quarters through the Officers club. This does not include temporary hotel rooms or quarters for short stays.

The Detroit Officers club with its outstanding record as the leading officers club of the country has the following officers: Edward J. Jeffries, mayor, honorary president; George M. 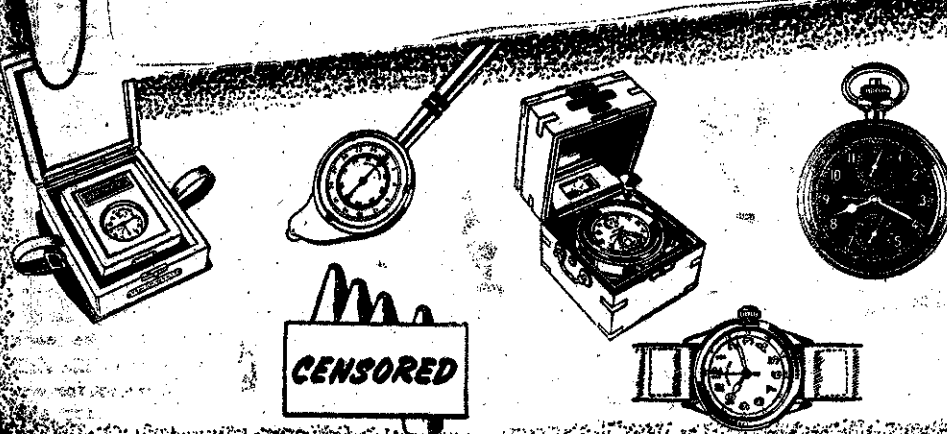

July 16, 1944

Hello Friends:

Thanks a million for The Review! It is really swell reading about home, in fact when reading The Review it's almost as though I were really home — only the arm chair is missing. In place of the old easy chair there's only a bunk under a tent top.

I wish I were able to tell you all the things I'd like to about this country and the places I've visited, but regulations won't permit. Instead I'll just talk about the places, but omit the names.

I was in the nearest town to our camp the other day, and as I was walking down the street I suddenly heard a voice call, "Say Yank, you look as though you could stand a bitter." (A bitter is similar to our 32 beer in the states). Well, it struck me sort of funny, there I was tired and a bit disgusted and here the old gentleman was inviting me to have a drink with him. Well, I accepted, although I'm not much of a Yank for pubbing, (a pub is equivalent to our beer garden) because before I left I promised my Mom that I would keep away from pubs, and so I've been keeping my promise. I knew one drink would be enough, and I still wouldn't be breaking Mom's faith in me.

The old gent and I went in the pub and he introduced himself as Edward McLevey — yes, a Scotsman, but believe me I've never yet met a Scotsman that was scotch. On the contrary they're generous and swell people!!

We finally made our way to the bar which was really crowded with Yanks and ordered our drinks. I tried to pay for the drinks, but Mr. McLevey would have none of that. He started to tell me who he was, and about his business. His business was airplane spotting. After awhile he started asking questions about the states and one of the first was whether or not I had ever been to New York, and then he began to talk of Michigan — and that's when I sat up and took notice! I asked him when he had been to Michigan and just where he stayed. His answer nearly floored me! He talked all about the Book Cadillac hotel, and other familiar places and buildings and then he asked if I had ever been to Grosse Pointe. Imagine that!

Mr. McLevey said that a very kind American family had had him out to dinner one evening, and all he could remember was that they lived on Nottingham, but he couldn't remember their name or address.

I almost burst asking questions from then on, asking about all the different places and things and he'd keep answering, "Aye, that I do." It seemed to me that he must have just returned from the United States, but when I questioned him he said that it had been about eight years since he left, and that he had been still young enough to be a good seaman. He asked me if perhaps I could find out the people's name and address, and that if I could he'd be very grateful, as he'd like to write them.

He went on saying, "You see lad, I've stopped a lot of Yanks, but never have found anyone from Grosse Pointe, (he pronounced it a little differently, but I knew what he meant), and when you said you knew Grosse Pointe, well I felt 20 years younger." I believe him too, because all the while he was talking he had a faraway look in those soft pleasant eyes of his. He made me promise that if I ever went to Glasgow, Scotland, that I would look him up and if I didn't he warned me that he'd box my ears. I had to promise I'd visit him some time for I'm sure he'd fulfill his threat of boxing my ears.

I hope I get to visit with him again, not in a pub, but in his home city.

Thanks again for The Review and please keep it coming. It makes me feel swell to receive them, and I know the other boys feel the same way I do. Thanks again.

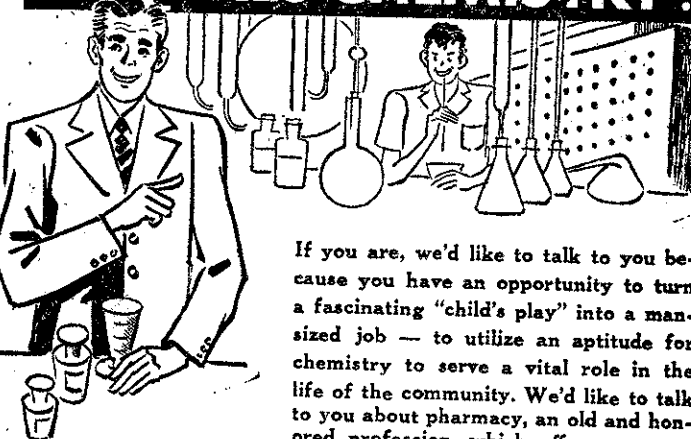

Taking sure that every returned veteran who wants to continue his education gets started right, the University of Michigan is helping an average of 10 to 12 a week to map a program covering the months of the year immediately ahead. Two surprising things mark this year to the veteran. The first is the roughness with which the university goes after the job. The second is that in more than one-third of the cases so far, the university has suggested to men who wanted to

enroll at Ann Arbor that their individual case would be better served at some other institution.

As soon as it was determined that veterans would be returning to the campus in numbers, the university set up a Veterans' Service Bureau. Its purpose is to see that the former soldier or sailor gets every possible help the institution could give.

Right from the start the service bureau has been guided by two basic ideas: That each man is an individual and his case and needs are to be considered as such; that each man has many sides besides the educative one and all must be taken into account if a satisfactory educational program is to be worked out.

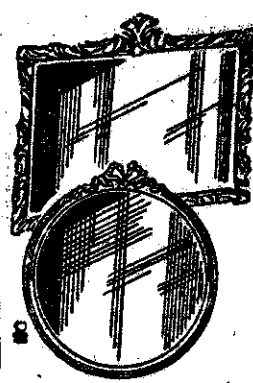

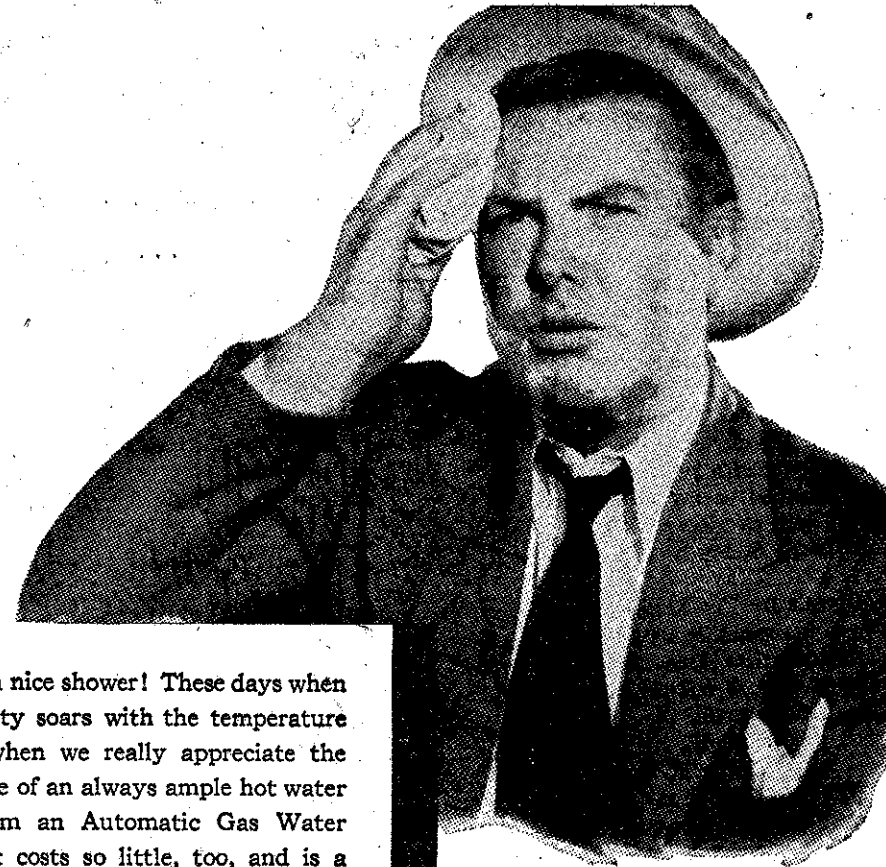

# Grosse Pointe Day Camp Pleases Parents Here

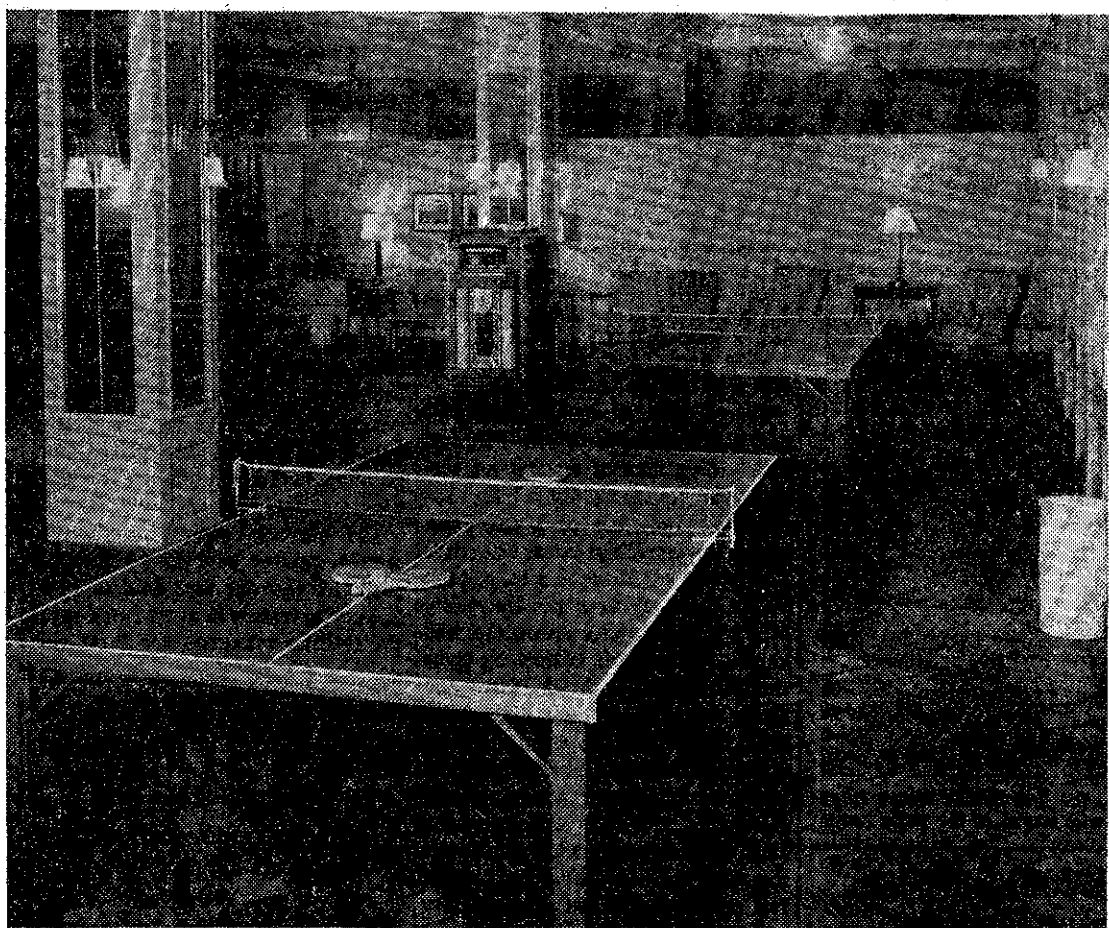

# Edison Patrol Dogs Join the Marines

With their home front services ended, Lance V. Liebestraun and Rhett of Palm Hill, two registered German Shepherd patrol dogs of the Detroit Edison, recently departed for active roles with the "Devil Dogs" of the U. S. Marine Corps.

According to William C. Miller, superintendent of the company's electrical system, "these dogs were acquired two years ago to assist the company's plant protection men in patrolling outdoor bulk power 120,000-volt step-down stations." These trained dogs increased the effectiveness of each patrolman, thereby saving manpower for other important war work. Miller said: "Government authorities charged with the security of plants have ruled that this type of supplemental protection is no longer necessary."

The company has received a citation from Lieut. Gen. A. A. Vandegrift, commandant USMC, for donating the services of these two canine warriors.

# United Nations Send Ordnance Students to School Here

Fort Wayne, Mich. — Allied need for automotive mechanics familiar with U. S. army equipment is being demonstrated by the arrival of foreign students for special training with the military training division of the ordnance department, ASF, Col. Harri Adamson, commanding Fort Wayne, said today.

Among the number of foreign students arriving recently at the ordnance school, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., were 15 enlisted men and two noncommissioned officers from Martinique, French West Indies. As personnel of the French army, they were specially picked for the ordnance school training because of previous technical experience, Colonel Adamson said. Upon finishing their training, all of the men expect to go directly overseas.

Special instructional methods have been adopted to handle the Martinique students. The French military mission in Washington has provided three interpreters to assist the ordnance school instructors. The language difficulty is also solved by the preparation of a French classroom text translated from an American technical manual. Blackboard diagrams accompanied by parts names in French have also proved valuable.

A second group of foreign students, consisting of an officer and 10 enlisted men of Netherlands army, Colonel Adamson said, are taking automotive courses at the ordnance school. Previously, other United Nations students taking automotive courses included Chinese and Brazilian officers.

# American Legion Handles Veteran's Cases Here

A total of 147 veterans were handled in the past week by the Detroit American Legion, Larry Webster, service director, announced today. All but a few of these involved veterans of World War II.

"As more men return from camps and war zones in this war, the work of the service officers in the 74 Legion posts, and the cases in headquarters increase markedly," said Webster. His office, where veterans apply for assistance, is in Legion headquarters, 375 State street.

Webster's records show that the week's cases included a burial of a destitute veteran of World War I; rush two World War II veterans to hospital in Dearborn; giving direct financial aid to 37 veterans of World War II; finding a home for a veteran, his wife and two children; preventing the dispossession of a veteran from his living quarters; making application for an honorable discharge for a veteran dishonorably discharged; and a number of other things.

"The dishonorably discharged veteran will get his honorable discharge," said Webster. "A mistake was made."

In the same week the Legion made application for pension for two World War II veterans, suffering disability; and pressed three cases for insurance and five for delayed mustering out pay.
