### Reasons to Vote 'No' on Home Rule

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following reasons are part of a series of 16 reasons to vote "No" on the proposed Wayne county home rule amendment to the state constitution, and were prepared by the committee for representative government, opposing the adoption of the home rule amendment. They are submitted in the interest of interpreting the proposed amendment. It is to be remembered that the Grosse Pointe township board is unanimously recommending the rejection of the proposal.

5. It is unnecessary. Under the present system, Wayne County is as well governed as any major county in he country. The txa rate is as low, or lower, than that of any county of comparable size and structure. Wayne County debt is negligible-less than 1/2 of 1% of the legal limit, and its services are adequate and efficient.

6. It is unpatriotic to engage in local government re-organization at this time. A critical shortage of manpower exists. All available human effort is needed for the prosecution of the war. It is at least morally criminal to divert the time and effort of patriotic citizens from warwork to non-essential local government re-organization. A vast amount of irreplaceable manpower would be consumed in the process of passing on the amendment, choosing a charter commission and delbierating on the drafting and adopting of a charter which would supersede the Constitution in Wayne County.
