Grosse Pointe Park reports that 94.9% of their year's taxes have already been paid as compared with 92.4% in 1943.

Although the Park president is perfectly willing to pay his own expenses as has been the custom in the past to attend municipal officers' conventions, members of the Park "economy-minded commission" upon motion of Commissioner Paul I. Moreland, Monday night, elected to break a four and a half year precedent by voting to pay all the expenses for the president, village manager, E. B. Lane, and comptroiler, William Johnson, to the above meeting. It is particularly ironical that a commission which cannot "afford" to give the residents of the Park adequate police Ransacking Auto protection should send three representatives to a convention and pay all their expenses. THE ABOVE is an approximate idea of the size of the present Grosse Pointe Park police department at the present date, cut to the size which the commissioners believe is adequate for a more populated village. Although four men are missing from this picture and one appearing in it is no longer with the department, one can see that such a small force cannot cope with the breaking and enterings, robberies and general crime which have been taking place in the Park for the past several months. The few men on each shift cannot properly perform their duties as police officers for they are busy doing the work of two, or possibly three men. If this condition should continue to exist, it is up to the Park residents to protest to their village commission, and ask that better protection be given them, their children, their homes, their business establishments and their village in general. The pictures in this case tell the story of the decrease in the department with the same tax rate as of 1931.

Charles DeGaulle and the provisional French government.

The citation was for outstanding achievement during April, May and June, when the 12th air force Marauders flew important missions over Italy, many of them in direct support of the French forces.

As president of the French government and chief of the French army, General DeGaulle awarded the Croix de Guerre with palms to the group commander. The citation attributed the highly successful precision attacks in the face of enemy opposition to flight discipline, skill of the combat crews, and superior technique of command.

Col. Eugene B. Fletcher, the group commander from San Diego, Calif., said, "The success of our air crews during that three months period was a direct result of fine work and hard work by maintenance and administrative sections. As always, the ground personnel played a vital part in combat operations."

Hugh McHugh Makes Settlement With Park Out of Court

After waiting since June, 1943, to receive final action on his writ of mandamus to show cause why the village commissioners of Grosse Pointe Park should not rehire him ment, Hugh McHugh reached a settlement with the village out of court.

A resolution adopted Monday eve- Frank P. Marsack of 213 Oak street. ning by the commissioners was a confirmation of the resignation of Mr. McHugh, effective July 1, 1943. The mandamus case was dismissed by delivery of a check in the amount of \$1,500 upon the receipt of proper releases signed by Mr. McHugh and a stipulation for the dismissal of the writ of mandamus.

The case had been on the Wayne county circuit court docket for approximately a year, soon after the writ was issued. At this time, Carter Zeleznik, McHugh's attorney, presented a petition to the commission seeking reinstatement of his client, stating that two important facts should have had much to do with the reinstatement: He was injured while on police duty on Aug. 29, 1933, and as a World War I veteran, under the Veteran Preference act, his dismissal was null and void. The only answer to this was the court action.

McHugh had been a member of the police department for over nineteen'years.

Among eight of the demands, those that are receiving foremost attention concern overtime and leave days. The men want all time over eight hours in one day and over 40 hours in one week to be compensated for at the rate of time and one-half of their regular rate of pay. EDITOR'S NOTE: The following reasons are part of a series of 16 reasons to vote "No" on the proposed Wayne county home rule amendment to the state constitution. and were prepared by the committee for representative government, opposing the adoption of the home rule amendment. They are submitted in the interest of interpreting the proposed amendment. It is to be remembered that the Grosse Pointe township board is unanimously recommending the rejection of the proposal.

7. Its proposal at this time is unfair to the people in the armed forces. Such a radical change in their local government should not be undertaken while hundreds of thousands of our people are away fighting for the preservation of the American system. They have carned the right to choose the kind of local government under which they

8. It provides for unrepresentative government, proven to be both costly and irresponsible. The amendment provides for the election at large from the city of 12 of the 21 charter commissioners and substitutes of governing body, two-thirds of which may be elected at large from the city of Detroit, for the present board of supervisors upon which all local units of government have representation. In the war year of 1918 the same people who sponsor this amendment effected a similar complete reorganization of the Detroit government, substituting a small nine-man council elected at large for the larger governing body then elected by districts, just as they now propose to replace the representative board of supervisors of the county with a small body, two-thirds of which may be elected at large in the city of Detroit.

Under this new government with a small council elected at large, Detroit has, in the past 24 years, increased its tax rate by over fifty per cent and multiplied its bonded debt more than 11 times. During the same period, under the same conditions, the present system of Wayne county government with a large representative board of supervisors has decreased the county tax rate without increasing its negligible debt. Recent grand jury disclosures in connection with the Detroit common council and the legislative delegation from Detroit, both elected at large, indicated a weakness in that system of selection. The voters of a city of nearly two million people choosing a body of 14 men at large simply cannot and do not know the caliber and character of the men whom they are electing.
