Grosse Pointe Park reports that 94.9% of their year's taxes have already been paid as compared with 92.4% in 1943.

Although the Park president is perfectly willing to pay his own expenses as has been the custom in the past to attend municipal officers' conventions, members of the Park "economy-minded commission" upon motion of Commissioner Paul I. Moreland, Monday night, elected to break a four and a half year precedent by voting to pay all the expenses for the president, village manager, E. B. Lane, and comptroller, William Johnson, to the above meeting. It is particularly ironic that a commission which cannot "afford" to give the residents of the Park adequate police protection should send three representatives to a convention and pay all their expenses. This is another inconsistency on the part of the economy group.

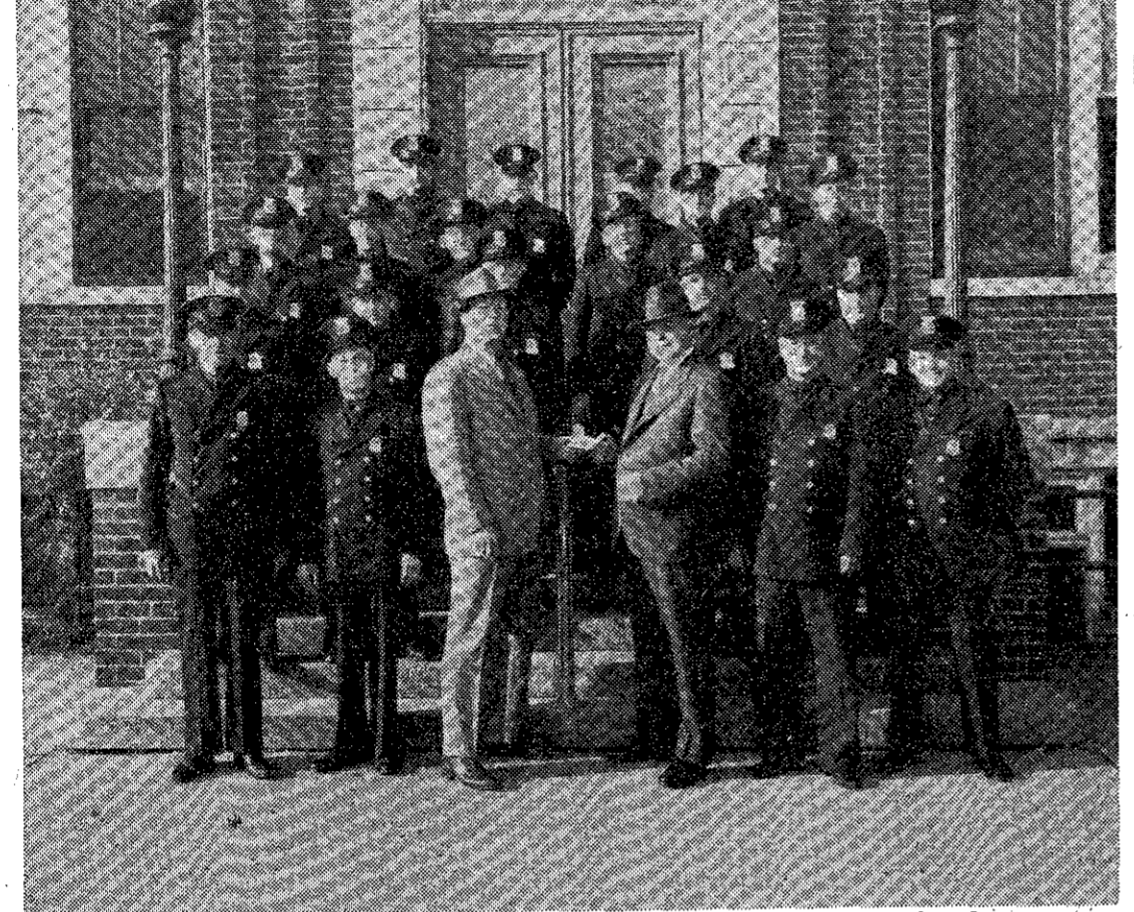

THE ABOVE is an approximate idea of the size of the present Grosse Pointe Park police department at the present date, cut to the size which the commissioners believe is adequate for a more populated village. Although four men are missing from this picture and one appearing in it is no longer with the department, one can see that such a small force cannot cope with the breaking and entering, robberies and general crime which have been taking place in the Park for the past several months. The few men on each shift cannot properly perform their duties as police officers for they are busy doing the work of two, or possibly three men. If this condition should continue to exist, it is up to the Park residents to protest to their village commission, and ask that better protection be given them, their children, their homes, their business establishments and their village in general. The pictures in this case tell the story of the decrease in the department with the same tax rate as of 1931.

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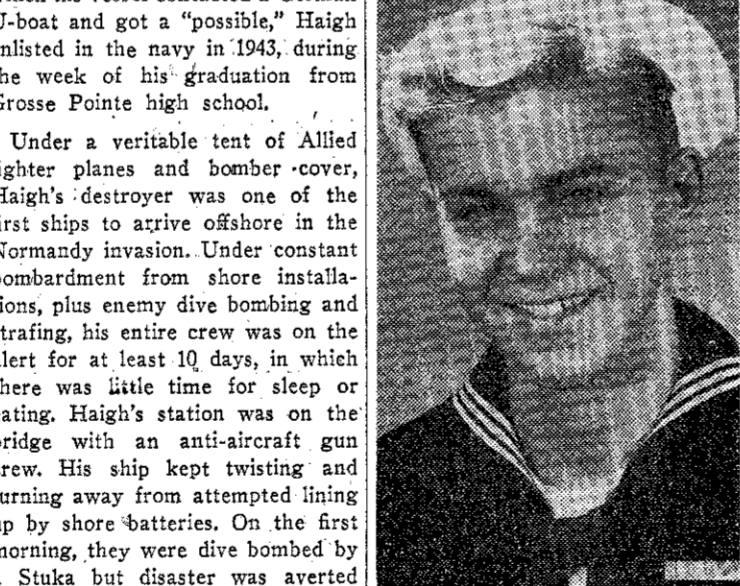
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Grosse Pointe Youth, Veteran of Two Invasions, Tells Experiences

Marauder Groups With Local Lads Cited by DeGaulle

With a 12th AAF B-26 Marauder Bomber Group. — Capt. Richmond F. McConnell of 704 Washington road, and Sergt. Robert F. Hughes, of 606 St. Clair, and their AAF B-26 Marauder groups in the Mediterranean theatre have been cited by Gen. Charles DeGaulle and the provisional French government.

The citation was for outstanding achievement during April, May and June, when the 12th air force Marauders flew important missions over Italy, many of them in direct support of the French forces.

As president of the French government and chief of the French army, General DeGaulle awarded the Croix de Guerre with palms to the group commander. The citation attributed the highly successful precision attacks in the face of enemy opposition to flight discipline, skill of the combat crews, and superior technique of command.

Col. Eugene B. Fletcher, the group commander from San Diego, Calif., said, "The success of our air crews during that three months period was a direct result of fine work and hard work by maintenance and administrative sections. As always, the ground personnel played a vital part in combat operations."

During this period when their groups flew 2,000 sorties and dropped over 3,000 tons of bombs for a loss of only six planes, Captain McConnell served as a pilot and Sergeant Hughes served his group as an armorer gunner.

Action for Vacation of Goethe Avenue Dropped by Park

Upon recommendation of the Park village attorney, the village commission rescinded their action taken on the vacation of Goethe avenue, during the summer, and authorized the attorney to have the case dismissed. They further recommended that the restraining order which two Lakepointe residents had, prohibiting the village from taking further action on this matter, should also be dropped.

Several weeks ago, officials of the First Christian Reformed church, who originally asked for this action, to transform the closed street into a playground, told village officials that it was their intention that the case should be discontinued.

Taxpayers Vote Down 'Tuition Aid' in Gratiot Township

At a special election at the Beacon school in Gratiot township last Tuesday night, 175 residents gathered to vote upon the question: "Should the school board pay out of its general fund the average of \$49.50 in tuition in addition to the \$106.00 which the state pays as required by Detroit and other districts for sending high school students of the township to outside schools?"

While some of the petitioners who asked for the election suggested and favored raising taxes and building a high school in the township, others dissented, and the result was that the proposition lost by a vote of 142 to 72.

The voting was limited to taxpayers only and the election was, according to some of them, very fair and well conducted. For the time being, residents with high school age children will have to continue paying the tuition if they are to receive a higher education.

Hugh McHugh Makes Settlement With Park Out of Court

After waiting since June, 1943, to receive final action on his writ of mandamus to show cause why the village commissioners of Grosse Pointe Park should not rehire him as a member of their police department, Hugh McHugh reached a settlement with the village out of court.

A resolution adopted Monday evening by the commissioners was a confirmation of the resignation of Mr. McHugh, effective July 1, 1943. The mandamus case was dismissed by delivery of a check in the amount of \$1,500 upon the receipt of proper releases signed by Mr. McHugh and a stipulation for the dismissal of the writ of mandamus.

The case had been on the Wayne county circuit court docket for approximately a year, soon after the writ was issued. At this time, Carter Zeleznik, McHugh's attorney, presented a petition to the commission seeking reinstatement of his client, stating that two important facts should have had much to do with the reinstatement: He was injured while on police duty on Aug. 29, 1933, and as a World War I veteran, under the Veteran Preference act, his dismissal was null and void. The only answer to this was the court action.

McHugh had been a member of the police department for over nineteen years.

Park Infantryman Recovers From Shrapnel Wounds

Here's something that everyone who has anything to do with postwar planning should realize before he goes any further: Americans want jobs, not doles.
When he knows this, the planner will then realize that the thing to do is not dream up vast government projects or relief schemes, but to encourage industry to maintain the kind of production which will mean more jobs.
The government should make provisions for settling its bills with the manufacturers of war material so that they will have funds with which to reconvert and meet payrolls. Then the owners of big factories must have the authority to remove government-owned machinery from their premises in order to install new machinery to make the things the people want and need.
That there will be a tremendous demand for goods and services after the war is undeniable; that industry is capable of fulfilling the demand is, after its war production record, assured.
Americans want jobs, not doles. Planners should plan and act accordingly.

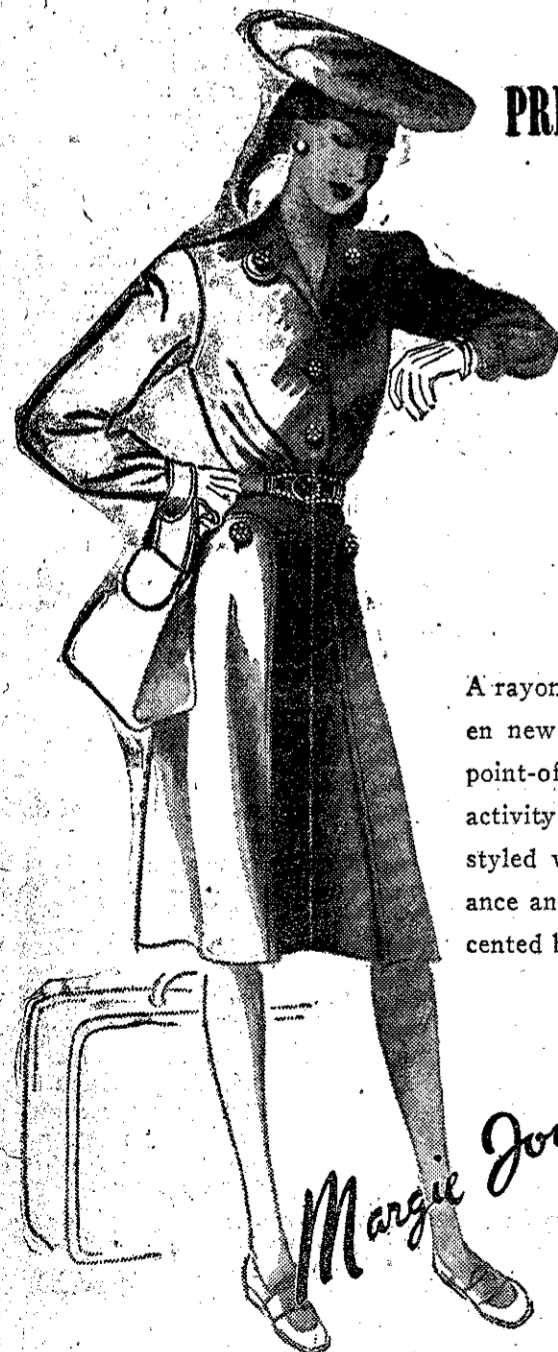

Like all out-of-town students, they are residing in a supervised college residence hall on the Midway. In addition to the program of the college, a residential plan, providing tickets to the better musical events, theaters, and movies in Chicago, is carried on for the students.

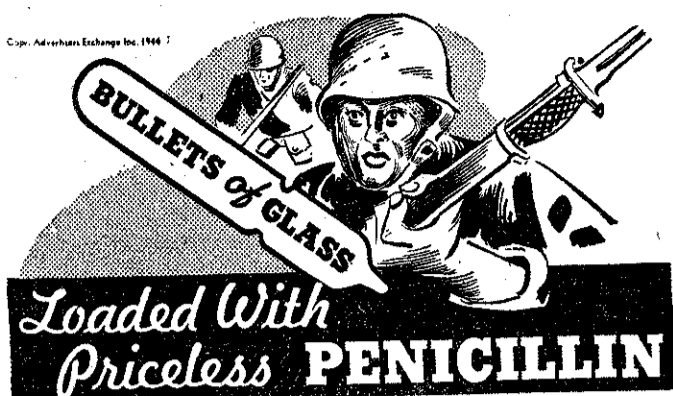

Private Joslin attended MacKenzie high school. Private Joslin has two brothers, Lieutenant Albert in the army and Ensign Robert in the navy.

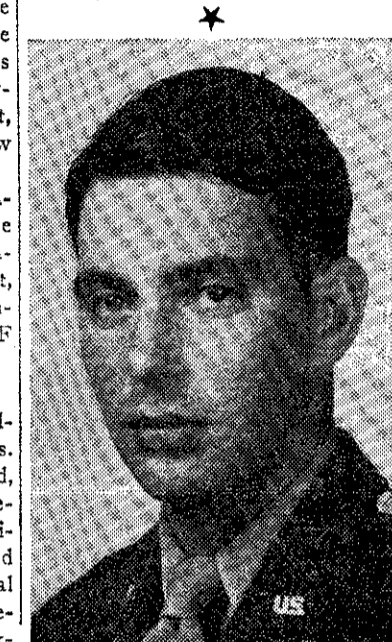

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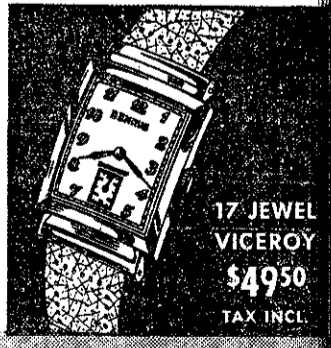

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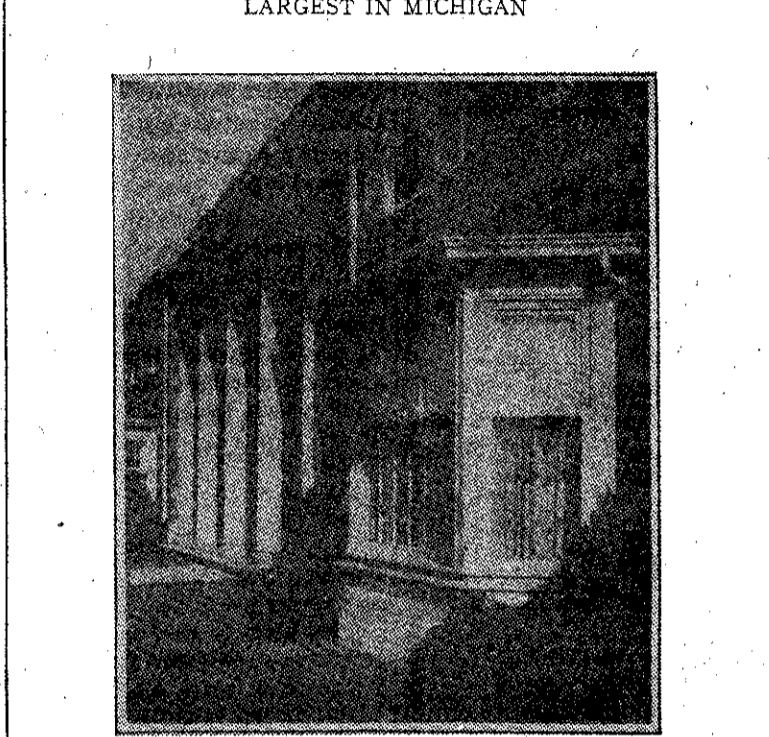

### Petitioners Object to Factories Locating in Gratiot Township; Lowers Valuation

At a meeting regarding the new zoning law in Gratiot township, Wednesday night, Sept. 20, approximately 150 petitioners emphatically and with considerable heckling, expressed their consensus that the new law is illegal and no factories are wanted in the township.

In opening the meeting at the request of the objecting group who are opposed to the rezoning of the east side of Harper avenue from the Detroit city limits to a point about 300 feet north of the Drive-In theatre, Odilon Houtekier, township supervisor, stated at the outset he was serving his last term as a public official of the township—that no politics would be involved in the meeting—and he introduced Herman Roeke, chairman of the township planning committee, to point out the merits of the change in the zoning law.

According to Mr. Roeke, the district involved under the old ordinance was already a commercial section. A zone 150 feet in depth allowing for light manufacturing not to exceed 10 employees or 25 horsepower in relation to machinery.

Buildings could be not over 40 feet in height and not to exceed three stories. But they could be built on the front of the lot line, side by side, with no off-street parking facilities provided. Such buildings could house bakeries, bottling works, canneries, wood working shops, creameries and other such industries over which a factory might be an improvement.

He went on to recount the benefits of the new zoning law by pointing out the extension of depth to 350 feet. No building would be permitted closer than 40 feet of the sidewalk line. An ornamental or landscaped lawn would be required and the intervening space between the walk and the structure could be used for no other purpose.

The new ordinance requires that employee or any other parking facilities shall be provided in the rear of the buildings not to include the 20 feet set aside for an alley. Building areas are limited to 20,000 sq. feet which, should they be erected to their maximum area, would allow 110 feet at the rear. They will be limited to one story in height with a side yard of 15 feet providing a space of 30 feet between each building constructed. There is no limitation on man or horsepower although the new ordinance fully covers noise or nuisance objections. No accessory building may be erected that is not directly attached to the main structure.

The tax benefits to the township were pointed out when it was stated that the assessment of a firm which has started to build in the township, would be the equivalent to that of 35 average homes in the township, with no expense involved such as sending children to school, etc. In general, it was made clear the assessed valuation of industrial property would keep the tax rate down.

Despite these facts as they were pointed out, the petitioners still contended they were dissatisfied with the new ordinance—that it was illegal although the proposed change was made public prior to its passing, posted on the township bulletin boards and advertised. Both Mr. Roeke and Mr. Houtekier attempted to show how the new law would add to the beautification of Harper avenue through the township without any apparent success. The evening's discussion came to an end when a motion was made and passed that the counsel for the petitioners, their chairman, Harold Day, and the township board members get together again and decide who wants what—and why?

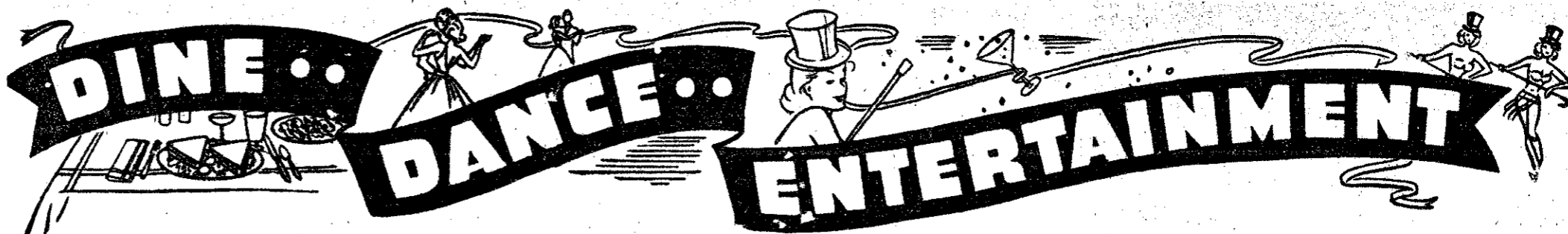

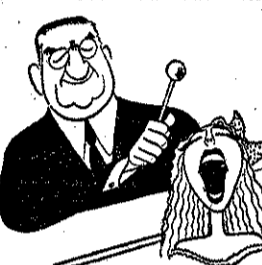

The hospitalization fund is entirely controlled by the employees through their department head sitting as a board of directors with two members of the council who operate the fund on a purely voluntary basis.

Street Maintenance Program in Farms Very Successful
