## Periodical Tin Can Collection Set For Monday

### Thousands Jam Polls; Home Rule Defeated

Complete election returns from the City of Grosse Pointe and incomplete returns from the township Wednesday afternoon show that Grosse Pointe overwhelmingly voted the Republican ticket in the national election Tuesday, Nov. 7.

Gov. Harry F. Kelly carried Grosse Pointe by a large majority; in the township he polled 11,290 and in the City, 2,665. His opponent, Edward J. Fry, received 3,478 and 662 in the township and City respectively.

In the tally in the City, Governor Dewey received 2,282 against President Roosevelt's 799. At this writing, Henry Lavers, township clerk, did not have the complete report on the presidential returns but it was evident from a spot check that Dewey received a large majority over his opponent in the rest of Grosse Pointe.

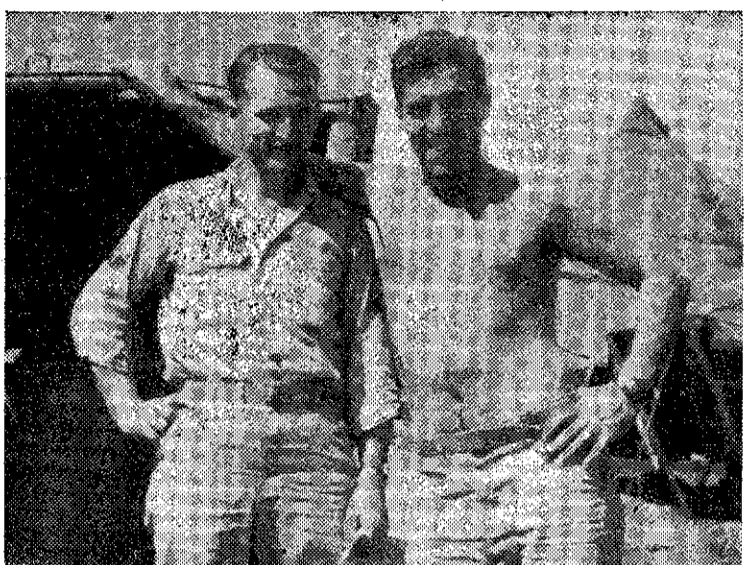
### Japanese Type

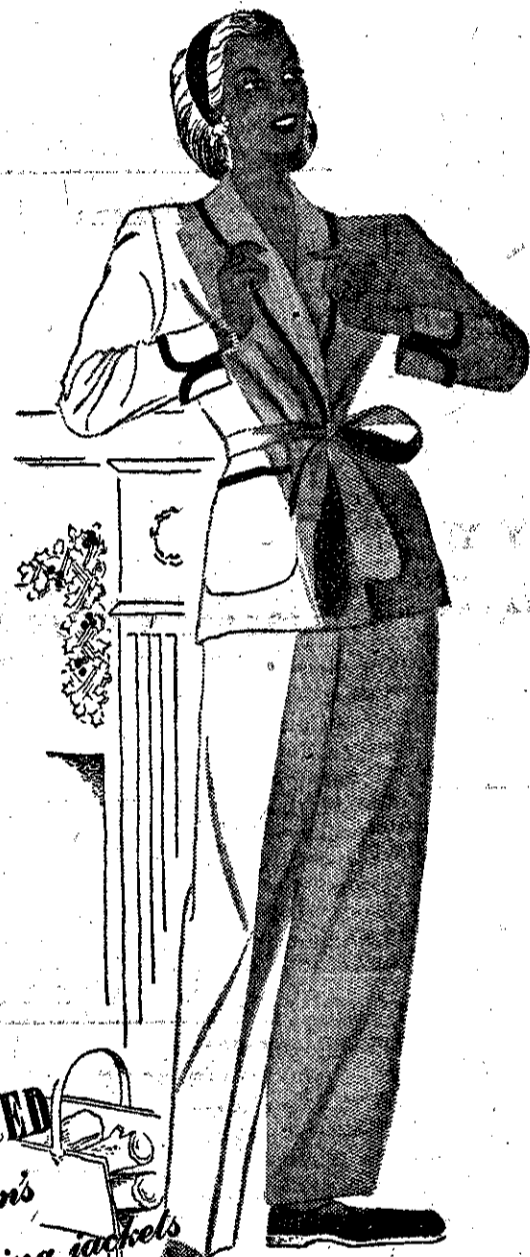

With U. S. Forces in France. — It was early in August, 1944, that the spectacular advance of Gen. George S. Patton's Third army toward Paris made it evident that innovations in transportation facilities were vital. Shattered rail lines to the front needed restoring, and the work was given A-1 priority.

At midnight, on Aug. 12, the commanding officer of a U. S. Army engineer service unit, encamped near Valognes, received orders to lay a single-track mainline from Sille le Guillaume to Le Mans. He had four days to do the job.

Half of the unit was alerted, under Capt. Carl J. Lenander, 38, of 3601 Burnham road, Minneapolis, Minn., and at dawn took to the road, complete with equipment.

Their headlong dash to Sille le Guillaume, over sniper-infested roads was an outstanding feat. They bypassed elements of two armored divisions, moving for an attack and at

Sille le Guillaume found only scattered forward detachments of the Third Army ahead of them.

At Le Mans, the bridges were entirely demolished. Steel beams were located and rushed to the spot, and the first bridge was built, ready to carry heavily-laden trains, in less than 12 hours.

When the job was completed, the men had earned a well-deserved rest, but within eight hours orders came to push the line through to Chartres. This project was completed in an additional five days with the same conditions prevailing.

There was some more swapping, but no free giving. The crews exchanged cigarettes and sugar out of their rations for peaches.

It was the first time men of this group had landed on French soil. Previously they were greeted by flak and fighters. Now they were welcomed by friends.

### I Am a Wac

Doris Fleeason, ace woman foreign correspondent, was in Detroit last week, and made a speech at the Aircraft club luncheon Friday. She had some nice things to say about the Wacs and the army nurses which we should like to pass along.

Miss Fleeason sailed with the first Wacs to receive overseas orders, so she has seen the army women under the stress and uncertainty of a sea voyage in wartime. She spent some time with the Wacs in Italy and North Africa and she has nothing but praise for our women in khaki.

"I didn't sit in a swivel chair and form my opinions about the Wacs," Miss Fleeason declared. "I went out and lived with them."

To give her listeners an idea of the gallant spirit of the Wacs assigned to overseas stations, Miss Fleeason said that when the Wacs were given an opportunity to work near the front in Italy, handling communications, the women in khaki were thrilled instead of frightened. She added that the Europeans are edified by the good work the Wacs do and by the attitude of the American women in uniform.

Miss Fleeason told one story about the army nurses in Italy. Approximately fifty nurses were transported part of the way up a road which

separated the Americans from Nazis. It was necessary for the men to get out and walk the rest of the way to the hospital. Upon their arrival, they were exhausted from long, hard trip, but were asked to volunteer for work that had to be done immediately. All 50 volunteers were selected. The women dropped their packs on spot, and worked for 12 hours without relief, applying bandages to soldiers' wounds, assisting surgeons' operations, and in countless tireless other ways keeping up their efforts to bring our injured soldiers back to health.

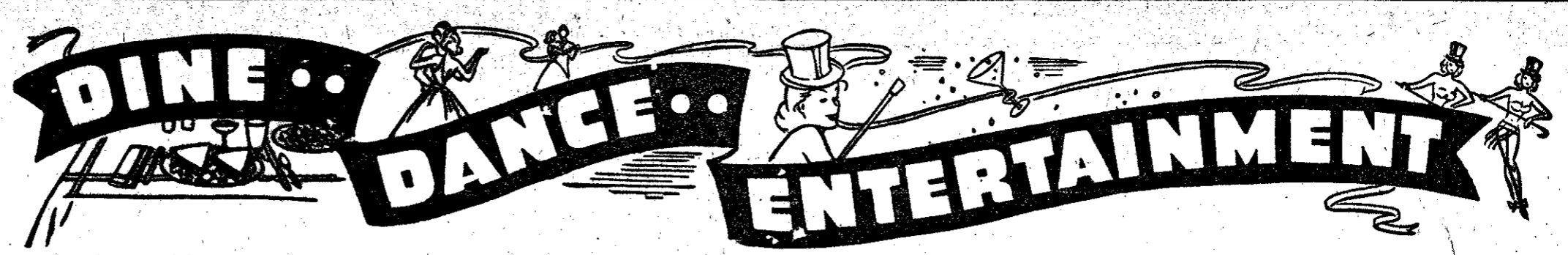
### Casa Bella Cafe Entertainer Escapes Serious Injury

Long ago, aerial photographs had disclosed these obstacles, so the corps of engineers built exact replicas. Special explosives, including RDX, that would destroy these anti-tank devices in a minimum of time were then developed by ordnance.

In the opening phase of the Battle of Germany, army engineers placed the plastic explosives around the base of the obstacles. They embedded a detonator cap in the explosive, withdrew to a safe distance, and then blasted the obstacles off at their bases.

The old method of using blocks of TNT would require a larger quantity of explosive to do the same job that is being done today with a small quantity of RDX, the super explosive of the Ordnance department, army service forces.

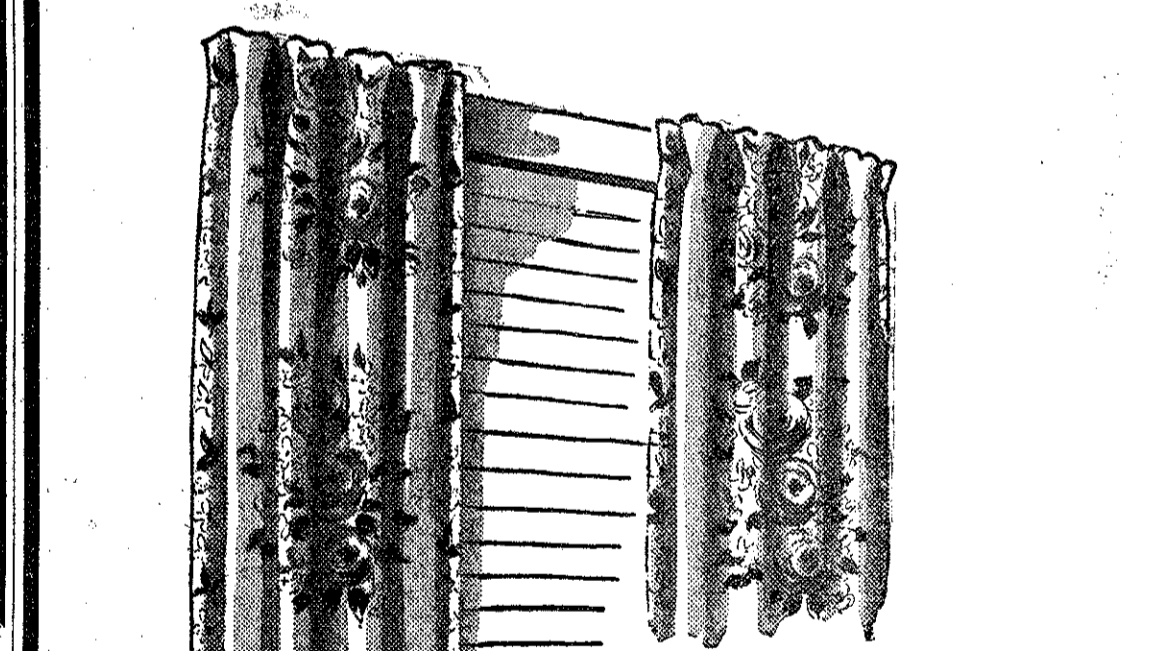

The officials of the national pigeon organizations have indicated that many fanciers desire to have their original pigeons returned for display purposes in their lofts when and if conditions make such action practicable and possible. In view of the desire of the fanciers to obtain their birds and since the facilities of the signal corps are now adequate to meet existing and anticipated requirements of tactical units for young birds, an effort is being made to return a number of the loaned and donated pigeons. This, however, can be done only with respect to the birds remaining in the continental United States.

Our records indicate that you voluntarily supplied to the signal corps of the army 37 homing pigeons, among which were those band numbers are listed in the acceptance form attached hereto.

The government is highly appreciative of the patriotic motives which caused you to supply these pigeons to the signal corps without compensation. Because of excess supply, the pigeons listed in the acceptance form will no longer be needed for service in connection with the prosecution of the war. Therefore, in accordance with the understanding at the time of your gift that the birds would be returned to you when and if the signal corps had no further use for them, this letter is written to advise that, if you so desire, the pigeons

will be returned to you. It is requested that you indicate your acceptance of the return of the pigeons, subject to the provisions of the enclosed acceptance form, sent in triplicate, by affixing your signature to each of the three copies of the acceptance form. One copy may be retained by you and the other two should be forwarded to the undersigned. A self-addressed envelope which requires no postage is enclosed for this purpose. All fanciers are urged to limit their correspondence to the return of the two copies of

the acceptance form. Your co-operation in advising within the next ten days whether or not you can receive the shipment will greatly assist in completing this project. Upon the receipt of your acceptance in duplicate, the pigeons listed will be shipped, express prepaid, to the address indicated by you. It will not be necessary that the shipping crate be returned, since it was constructed specifically for this purpose.


