Detroit and Grosse Pointe housewives and business women are answering the navy's call for automobile drivers, and today you will see pretty women clad in natty blue-grey uniforms piloting navy cars through the city's traffic.

They wear the garb of the motor transport service of the AWVS, which accepted the driving assignment when all naval activities in Detroit formed an automobile pool to conserve machines and manpower.

Members of the Grosse Pointe and Detroit chapters of the motor transport service are devoting a minimum of one day a week to driving naval personnel on the frequent trips required in their daily work.

A call for more women to join the AWVS and do their bit for the war effort by driving navy automobiles has been issued by Mrs. M. A. Shaw, captain of state headquarters of the motor transport service.

"We're far short of drivers now, and in the future our driving assignments will increase," she said.

Marsh and Clarence LaChance gave consideration to all reports, statements, assessment studies and tax analysis of Carl Schweikart, supervisor of Grosse Pointe township and the attorneys for the taxpayers.

In denying the appeal, the commission upheld Mr. Schweikart's assessment, saying that it was fair and equitable to all residents in the Pointe.

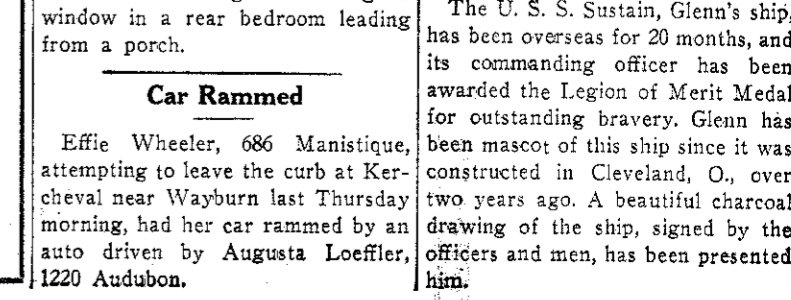

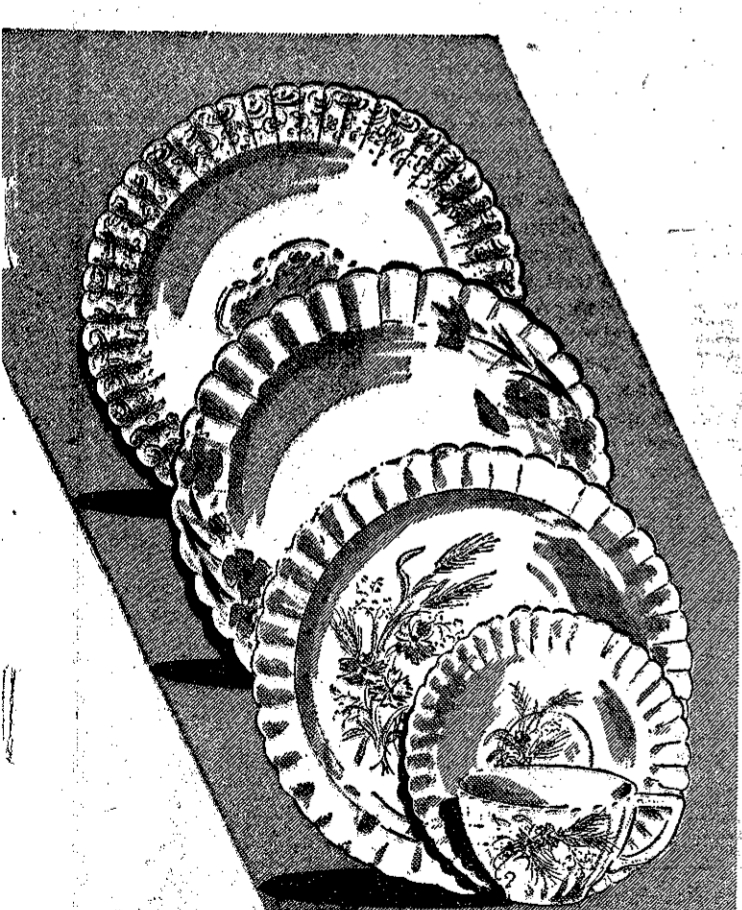

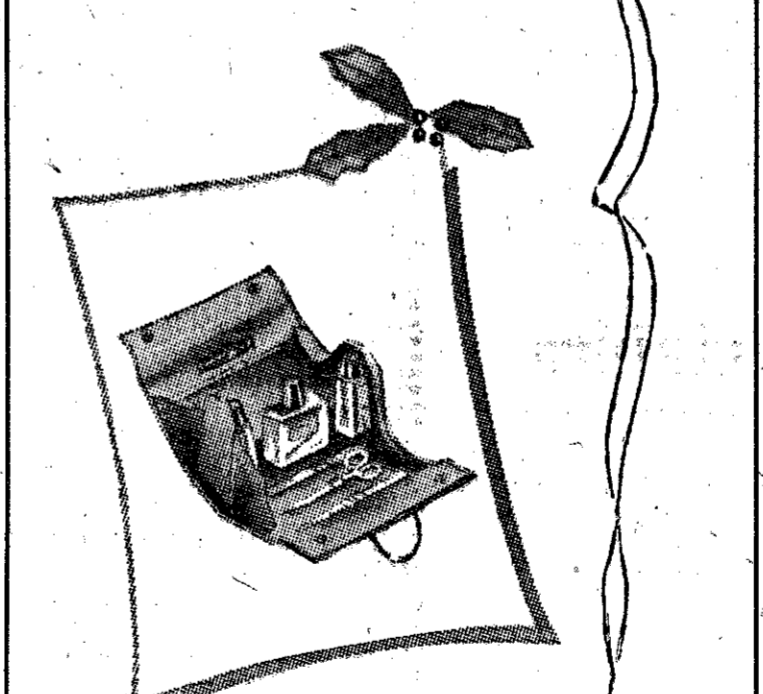

He is a former student of Wayne university. Each naval aviator is an expert flyer, navigator, aerologist, gunner and radio operator.

Naval aviators fly carrier-based or land-based planes in combat zones, or at naval air stations at home and abroad.

Types of planes in naval aviation include fighters, dive bombers, scout and observation, multi-engine bombers, patrol planes, and air transports.

Whether in the Marine Corps or in the navy, naval aviators wear the famous "Wings of Gold."

Over one hundred senioritas from Puerto Rico have joined the Women's Army Corps and are taking basic training or are already serving at camps, posts and stations all over the country.

The number of Puerto Rican men in the army is increasing daily as they serve in the Caribbean area and in overseas units. For this reason Puerto Rican young women feel an ever increasing responsibility of serving side by side with their soldiers.

The old practice some Puerto Rican families follow of strict chaperonage over unmarried daughters is respected in the states during the recruit's training. Army chaperones are on duty at Wac areas, and MP protection is afforded.

When Puerto Rican women show their interest in becoming soldiers their only source of information about the Wac was to contact

the nearest recruiting office which was located in Miami, Fla. In September a recruiting team of four arrived in Puerto Rico. After three weeks the first induction ceremony took place and the senioritas were told that "the patriotism of Puerto Rican womenhood matches that of Puerto Rican men."

The recruits are flown from their native island to Miami by the ATC with an army nurse accompanying each flight. From Miami they go to Fort Oglethorpe to receive basic training.

Many prominent Puerto Rican women are among those who have joined the corps. Pvt. Clara M. Gomez of Santuree is the daughter of the state guard's adjutant general; Pvt. Rainelda B. Morales is the daughter of a former member of the island's house of representatives. One of the most recent recruits was Miss Pilar Morillo of Santuree who lived for 12 years in the United States and conducted a Spanish language program for short wave station WRUL in Boston before returning to the island last year.

But whether these patriotic young women came from prominent homes or are of modest parentage, each one feels her individual duty is toward the defense of her country. They know there is no better way in defending it than to become members of the Women's Army Corps.



**A**S WE MOVE closer to victory, it wouldn't be surprising if you were saying to yourself—"What's the big idea of asking for all this additional money now? Isn't the war almost over?"

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### Catholic Theatre Gives Irish Comedy

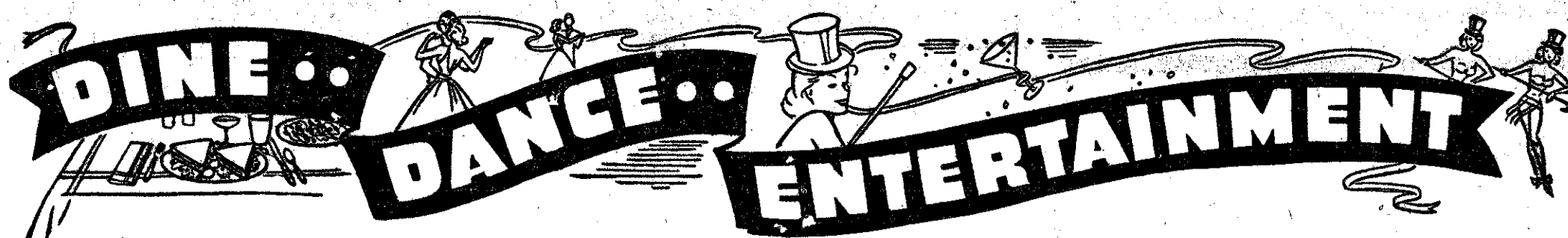

### Laundry Service Available on 2400 Mile Airline Journey

Anyone who has trouble getting his laundry back from around the corner before being driven to buy a new shirt or to sleep on the bare mattress might try sending it to Africa, where laundry received Monday is returned half way across the Atlantic on Friday, all washed, starched and ironed.

O'Connor's Consolidated Laundry Services, Ltd., organized by young Richard J. O'Connor of Bloomfield, N. J., while stationed in North Africa as American Airlines treasury representative, was a one-man organization for the purpose of helping out his fellow-employees based on an island 1200 miles away in the North Atlantic where laundry service was unavailable. Every Monday morning, when an Air Transport Command plane flown by an American Airlines crew, stopped at the mid-Atlantic base, two huge duffle bags of laundry were put aboard. When it arrived in North Africa, O'Connor would pick it up in the command car at his disposal and cart it off to the local laundry where there was no shortage either of labor or soap. Promptly on Friday morning it was carted back to a returning plane, and within a few hours had completed its 2400-mile airborne journey. At latest reports, not a shirt or sack was missing.


