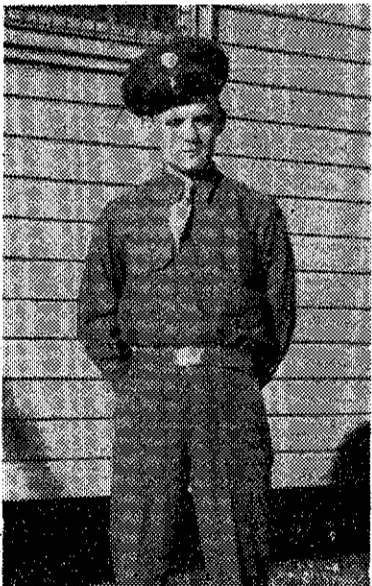

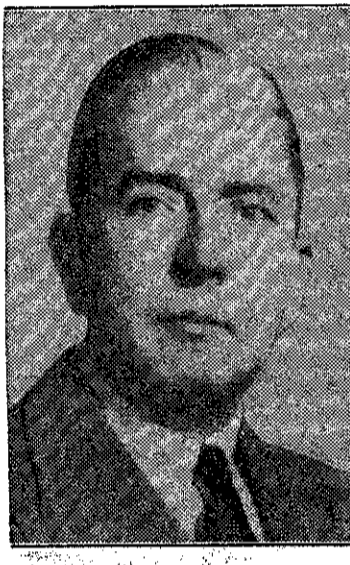

Air Medal, Clusters Presented to Wife of Lieut. H. J. Pattison

Selfridge Field, Mich. — Twenty-one next of kin of Michigan AAF heroes were invited to Selfridge Field last Saturday, Nov. 18, to receive decorations for feats of their fighting men.

The ceremony was scheduled for five o'clock in the post gymnasium No. 1. Lieut. Col. William U. Bruch, director of administration and services presented the decorations to the relatives of the officers and enlisted men who are prisoners of war, missing or killed in action.

Selfridge Field personnel participated in the ceremony along with the 525th AAF band.

Pursuant to General Orders 17, 1943, Headquarters Fifth Wing (US) General Orders 21 and 24, 1943, Headquarters Northwest: African Strategic Air Force, the Air Medal and three Oak Leaf Clusters were awarded First Lieut. Herbert J. Pattison Jr., for meritorious achievement while participating in 20 sorties against the enemy.

Lieutenant Pattison having made the supreme sacrifice in defense of his country, presentation of the Air Medal and three Oak Leaf Clusters was made to his widow, Mrs. Herbert J. Pattison Jr., 954 Lakepointe avenue, Grosse Pointe Park.

3 War Casualties Revealed in Pointe During Recent Week

Casualties announced by the War and Navy Departments last week included 109 men from Michigan, three from Grosse Pointe. The Navy casualty list revealed that Pfc. Richard M. Hauser, of the Marine corps has been wounded in action. He is the son of Mrs. Lola M. Hauser of 1096 Beaconsfield, Grosse Pointe Park.

Mrs. Nancy Mance was informed recently that her husband, Pvt. Robert O. Mance, son of Frank Mance of 1452 Nottingham has been killed in action, after a report which she received that he was missing on European soil.

Private Mance, a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school, 1940, entered service last January and left for overseas in July following training with the infantry. It is believed that he was killed near Aachen for he wrote his wife that on his birthday, Sept. 18, he was one of the first on German soil.

Surviving in addition to his wife and father are two brothers, Sgt. Raymond Mance, of the AAC in Germany; Frank and two sisters, Mrs. Edith Tidswell and Mrs. Elizabeth Roller.

Mr. and Mrs. Laurence V. Meldrum of 1124 Beaconsfield learned this past week that their son, Pfc. Harry Meldrum, is now a prisoner of war. He, too, was reported missing in action.

Captured in southern France after fighting in Italy, Private Meldrum graduated from Grosse Pointe high school in 1940 and entered service in April, 1941.

Woods to Vote on Bond Issue to Buy Municipal Park Site

The location of the proposed park is opposite Torrey Woods between Mack avenue and the village line, extending approximately from Kenmore to Allard roads. Additional plans of the building or the park were not disclosed.

This morning's mail brought us a letter from Pvt. Marian E. McCord who is in training at Fort Des Moines, Iowa.

Winter is beginning to set in at Fort Des Moines, and Marian writes that on crisp mornings at drill her platoon has to step lively and snap to orders to keep warm even beneath snug overcoats.

Basic training days are full of surprises and unusual experiences. Marian will probably never forget the first time she saluted — or failed to salute; or the first time she tried to do an about face or a column right; and at last, the tremendous excitement of bands, rhythmic tread of many feet, and garrison flags waving in the wind, at a parade.

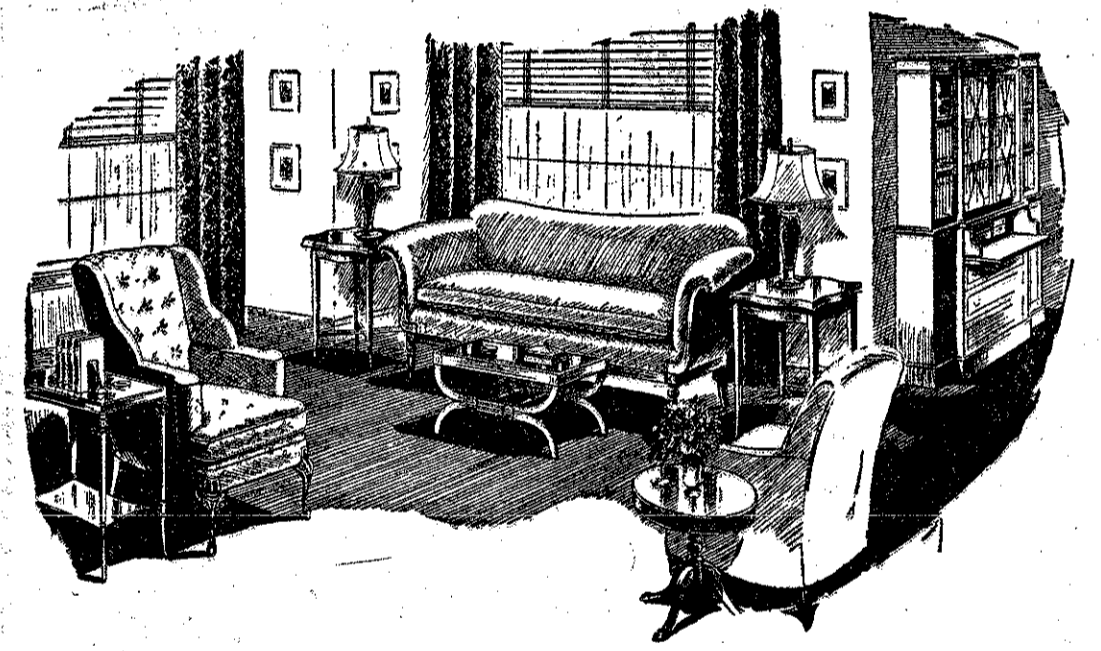
Registrations Now Being Taken for '45 Victory Gardens
 Registrations are being taken now at the Park, City and Farms municipal offices for next season's Victory garden plots.
 The Kerby, Lothrop, Oak Street, and Radnor Park properties in the Farms have been plowed and will be disked in the spring. As it is planned to increase the sizes of the individual gardens to between 1,800 and 2,000 square feet, there will be fewer available than last year. Those applying first will have the first chance to obtain one.
 In Grosse Pointe City gardens on the Lakeland-Charlevoix, Cadieux-Kercheval Place, and Bon Secour plots will be made ready again for next year. Those around the Bon Secour home on Cadieux, now about sixteen hundred square feet in size, will be made larger but the number will have to be reduced. The gardens on the Cadieux and Lakeland plots had an area of more than 1,800 square feet last year and will be staked out approximately the same next season. As there were almost double the number of applicants for the 20 available gardens at Lakeland-Charlevoix in 1944, those persons desiring renewals should fill out the blanks and pay their application fees promptly.
 In Grosse Pointe Park the Cadieux-Kercheval property will be available for gardens but it is doubtful if permission can be obtained for that on Harcourt. To take care of part of the latter group a section has been plowed at the lake end of Three Mile Drive. The Harcourt plots accommodated 121 families last season; the present plowing on Three Mile will accommodate 48. All of the gardens in the Park are over 2,000 square feet in area.
 The fee is \$3.00, the same as last season, payable at the municipal offices in Grosse Pointe Farms, City and Park.

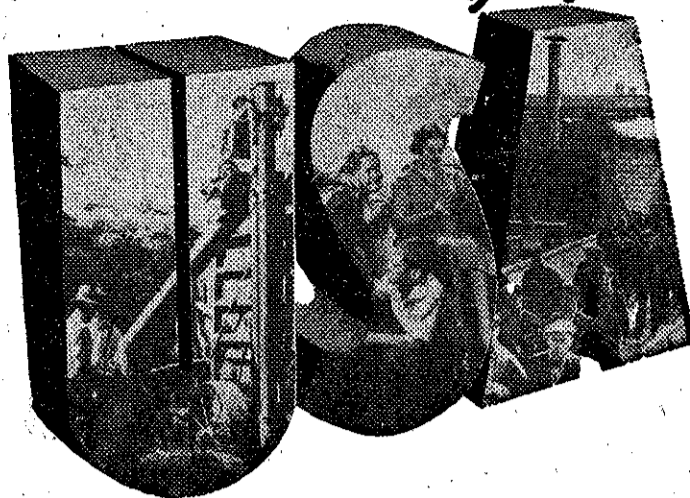


27-Ton Slugger Amazes Germans

The 240-mm howitzer is the largest mobile field artillery weapon used by the Allies in Holland and Germany. This 27-ton slugger has amazed the Germans, accustomed to seeing such giants only when mounted on railway carriages. The big howitzer has proved itself able to go anywhere and inflict enormous damage. It is used principally to destroy heavy rear-line enemy fortifications and emplacements. The 240 tonner has a range of nearly fifteen miles and can get off about one projectile a minute. Each shell weighs 345 pounds, while the weight of the high explosive powder charge that sends the shell on its way is more than 36 pounds. The 240 recently distinguished itself in the siege of Nancy, France.

erected first in order to obtain architectural funds from the Michigan planning commission, the board concluded that all levels of the school program, would be best served by planning to build first a large combined elementary and junior high school plant on Mack and Vernier. This plant, as proposed, would house 900 pupils. It would be so constructed that one wing of it, practically separated from the rest of the building, would house from 300 to 400 elementary school pupils from the present overflow and congestion of Mason and Kerby schools. The remainder of the plant would house all junior high school pupils living north of Moran road. This would also relieve the Grosse Pointe high school of its present junior high school enrollment and provide room for expansion and population growth expected in the high school.

The second step in the program would be that as soon as population growth in Grosse Pointe Farms justified it that a primary school unit housing grades kindergarten thru grade 2, constituting one wing of the ultimate elementary school plant would be built on the site at Kerby and Beaupre relieving the present Kerby school of all grades from kindergarten through grade 2 and making it a four-grade school. If this were done the plan would be to make alterations in the present Kerby school to provide a small auditorium and playroom and other facilities necessary for the upper elementary grades.

If elementary and secondary population expanded still further, the plans under consideration would provide for the gradual transition of the proposed Vernier and Mack junior high school into a complete junior high school unit, taking care of the elementary pupils in an additional elementary school building located either on the Roslyn road, Torrey Woods or Gratiot sites now owned by the school district.

While these plans are purely tentative and do not bind the board of education to any particular program they do provide for qualifying for future state aid on architectural services from the Michigan planning commission and also provide a basis for further study by the board of education and the community. The amount of state aid for architectural services to the Grosse Pointe board of education is \$3,931.95.

It is the hope of the board in the near future that representatives of the board or the administrative staff can appear at community meetings to discuss the proposed plans and to get suggestions and ideas from the community. There is no immediate possibility of building any of these buildings and so there remains time to do a good job of community planning and thinking about them.

Recommends for Alleged Thief Warrant Be Issued

Clark's 5th army that recently broke severe German counterattacks on battle mountain in Italy and supported infantry capturing Mount Cappello.

In a little more than six months in combat the outfit destroyed 18 tanks, 37 field guns, many pillboxes and a large quantity of motor transport.

Its howitzers have been called upon to shell enemy installations within 50 yards of American infantrymen. Evidence of this devastating fire, one captured enemy document refers to these weapons as 155-millimeter heavy artillery pieces.

The battalion first went into action at Cassino Feb. 28. It's cannons fired 1,288 rounds of ammunition in the first hour of the offensive that began last

the fight on through Formia, Itri, Fondi, Valle Cossa and Cori and on May 31 moved 76 miles to the east to attack Rome. The outfit knocked out two German tiger tanks and an enemy truck column, paving the way for infantrymen who entered Rome two days later.

They found rugs and curtains in tattered conditions venetian blinds crooked and furniture and decorations in a very untidy order. Finding no one on the first floor, the three advanced to the second.

It was in one of the bedrooms that the officers found what they were looking for — the vagrant who had upset the first floor.

Patrolman Walsh noticed something unusual about the bed, and swooping down, he gathered all the blankets he could into his arms and ran out of the room. Opening the blankets, he and his buddies found the fox squirrel, thus answering all their questions as he hurriedly scampered away.

A native Detroit, Vivian Dunham received her early training under Francis Mayhew and majored in music at Wayne university. She later studied under Andrew Haight at Cornell, and the composer-pianist Anis Fuleihan in New York City. While in that city she met Walter Damrosch, and in a series of conferences with him, worked out the idea of her "Conversation Concerts" in which she prefaces each composition with a brief, informal talk in a chatty and conversational manner. Critics in New York and throughout the Midwest have been unanimous in their praise of Mrs. Dunham's unusual concerts. "As refreshing as a midwestern breeze"; "a power and technique no less than amazing"; "stimulating and exciting" are typical comments. In Mexico the leading critic praised her "witty remarks in Spanish" and "her brilliant gifts as an interpreter."

Begin Campaign for Funds for Science Center

Wendell W. Anderson, president of the Medical Science Center of Wayne university, has been named chairman for the first cycle of the Medical Center's fund-raising campaign.

The board of directors of the Medical Science Center made this announcement yesterday.

Goal of the first cycle will be approximately ten million dollars. The four buildings to be constructed in the first cycle program are the halls of the medical sciences, to house the Wayne university College of Medicine, the College of Pharmacy, the School of Mortuary Science, and allied programs; a university hospital for teaching and research; a classroom, administration and dormitory building for the recently authorized College of Nursing; and a powerhouse, laundry and service building.

Eventual goal of the Medical Science Center campaign is \$50,000,000, of which approximately twenty million dollars will be for construction and equipment of buildings, and

\$30,000,000 for the endowment of program and research.

The city plan commission has approved a 53-acre, 15-block site for the Medical Science Center, situated east of the Art Center. The corporation counsel has begun the condemnation of the first three blocks of this site.

Scholarship Funds Accepted by Board

Acceptance by the Wayne university Foundation of a \$10,000 gift from the Power and Equipment company was approved by the board of education last week, according to Gordon W. Kingsbury, secretary of the Foundation.

The donor, represented by Stanley M. Hanley and Donald R. Middleton, stipulated that the principal and interest of the fund are to be used for the purpose of aiding promising students and encouraging research in electrical engineering. Students who are to receive awards will be selected by the staff of the electrical engineering department of Wayne university college of engineering.

Piper Cub Planes Spot Trouble Zones

Army ordnance has developed a new method to keep automotive equipment in the fight in Germany.

Col. Alexander G. Stone, commanding Fort Wayne ordnance depot, said today that ordnance is now employing Piper Cub planes to spot trouble zones on French, Belgian, Dutch and German roads, and to send out ordnance wrecking crews by radio when it is necessary.

There are no American tanks, half-tracks, self-propelled artillery, jeeps or trailers bogged down on the muddy November roads in western Europe. The reason is that ordnance has perfected an aircraft radio system of getting stuff up to the front when it is fit to fight and back

to ordnance repair depots when it needs major repair and overhaul.

Minor repairs are done on the spot. The contribution of the ordnance department, army service forces, to the science, said Colonel Stone, has been the department store system of supply and the electric refrigerator system of servicing.
