## Present Revised Plan of Business Development

At the public hearing which is scheduled for the residents of Grosse Pointe Woods for next Monday night at the Mason school on Vernier road for eight o'clock, the village commission will decide, upon the expression of the residents' opinion, as to whether or not the zoning ordinance should be amended to allow construction of a theatre and to provide adequate off-street parking facilities. If the decision is favorable, this theatre would then be erected along with the shopping center which our zoning ordinance already permits and the development will be located at the southerly limits of the village, on Mack avenue near Seven Mile road.

A Woods resident, very much interested in this development, has the following to say about the proposed amendment:

"The present shopping facilities in the Woods are very inadequate and the people are in need of more stores to properly service the community. Numerous public improvements could be made in the village but the village does not have sufficient assessed valuation to be able to bond for these improvements; this development would tend to alleviate this condition.

"Grosse Pointe Woods needs another school and the taxation from this development should hasten its erection as both the land and personal property will be taxed without increasing the present school enrollment and school expense.

"The development will not materially increase the services now rendered by the village and township. There will be a tier of undeveloped lots and one city block between the proposed project and the nearest of eight houses on the nearest street and the character of this undeveloped and unrestricted tract of land within the village limits will be established.

"This project would be of great convenience to every resident of the village and why should not the developers be allowed to provide parking on their own land, rather than have parking on all the streets of the village."

Impartial observers claim that more than 65 per cent of the residents of the Woods want the new project designed as the developer suggests, with a small minority objecting to it. It is pointed out by proponents that objectors are losing sight of the fact that by letting plans go through as suggested by the backers, the village will acquire a business district of which it can be proud and from which it can realize generous tax aid.

All Woods residents are urged to attend this meeting and express their opinion in order that the village commission may make its decision.

The list of names on it is as complete as the records available permitted at the time of erection. All possible effort is being made to include all names of those who were residents of the village when they left for the service and the co-operation of everyone is solicited to keep it up to date. Anyone having knowledge of any individual with the armed services whose name belongs on but does not appear on the roll, should immediately give such information to the village clerk. After office hours leave the information at the police desk. The names will be added as soon as possible, usually in multiples of ten.

## Proposed Petition Fee Still Under Study

The proposition which was offered by Commissioner Joel Sage of the Park to charge a fee for all petitions submitted to the village commission which would involve the expenditure of taxpayers' money through legal and publication expense, is still in the investigation stage, it was reported Monday.

The reason the village commission is calling this special election at this time to give the taxpayers a chance to express their desire regarding the purchase of this property for municipal purposes are as follows:

1. It has been contemplated for some time that a site of this nature should be acquired for numerous municipal and recreational purposes. Because of the great activity on the part of real estate developers in the acquiring of all the desirable pieces of acreage left in the village it is necessary to act at this time, in fact negotiations were in progress between a real estate developer and the owners of this particular site when the commission started proceedings.

2. It will provide a suitable site of which to perform some postwar projects.

3. The time appeared opportune to act before prices on real estate increased, something that is bound to appear immediately when building starts again in the village.

4. It is possible at present to easily sell the bonds at a low interest rate, probably between 1 1/4 or 2 1/4 per cent. (Continued on Page 5.)

At this hearing the Village Commission will decide, upon the expression of your opinion, as to whether or not the zoning ordinance should be amended to allow construction of a theatre and to provide adequate off-street parking facilities. If the decision is favorable, this theatre would then be erected along with the shopping center which our zoning ordinance already permits and the development will be located at the southerly limits of the Village, on Mack avenue, near Seven Mile Road.

The present shopping facilities of this Village are very inadequate and we are in need of more stores to properly service the community. Numerous public improvements could be made in the Village but the Village does not have sufficient assessed valuation to be able to bond for these improvements and this development would tend to alleviate this condition. We need another school in Grosse Pointe Woods and the taxation from this development should hasten its erection as both the land and personal property will be taxed without increasing our present school enrollment and school expense. The development will not materially increase the services now rendered by the Village and Township. There will be a tier of undeveloped lots and one city block between the proposed project and the nearest of eight houses on the nearest street, and the character of this undeveloped and unrestricted tract of land within the Village limits will be established.

This project would be of great convenience to every resident of the Village, and why should we not allow the developers to provide parking on their own land, rather than have parking on all the streets of the Village.

Come to this meeting and express your opinion in order that our Village Commission may make its decision.

If purchased this site can be used for any or all of the following:

a. For the construction of a new municipal building to house offices, and the police and fire departments. The present municipal building is

very inadequate and will become more so when the village starts growing again after the war is over. The fire department will have to be increased and housing provided for more equipment.

b. For the development of a park for the use of Grosse Pointe Woods residents only. Such a park should

include picnic grounds and all sorts of equipped playgrounds.

c. In the event bathing facilities prove impractical to acquire on the lake shore there are possibilities on this site of constructing a pool or pools either in the open or enclosed to provide the desired facilities.

All these further improvements will require the expenditure of additional funds in the future and when the taxpayers desire them. The present decision to be made on Dec. 27, 1944 is only for the funds to purchase the site. No improvements of this kind can be constructed for the duration.

Further facts concerning this proposition are that the 32 acres of this site that lies within the village is assessed at \$35,000 and pays taxes to the village amounting to \$507.50 annually.

The increase in taxes to pay the interest and principal on the bonds in order to pay them in full within 15 years will be about 40 cents per one thousand dollars valuation of about \$120 per year for the average home in the village.

The village commission is not committed for or against this proposition and is only offering the taxpayers the opportunity to express their decision on the matter. All are urged to do so. Only citizen resident property owners are permitted to vote on this proposed bond issue. Those not registered may do so on or before Dec. 7, 1944 at the village clerk's office and on Dec. 7, 1944 at the various precincts.

25 years. In addition it is there they have their novitiate and they also operate the St. Martin's day nursery. In Philadelphia they operate a convent for home nursing and a home for crippled children. In Darby, a suburb of Philadelphia, they operate a home for convalescents and also a home for incurables. In addition they have a convent in Washington, D. C., from which they conduct home nursing. For over 35 years the Sisters of Bon Secours have done home nursing in and around Detroit and in September, 1941, ground was broken at Cadeux and Maumee for the erection of the present home for convalescents.

The severe shortage in hospital facilities has made it advisable and necessary to proceed with the plans for a fully equipped hospital at this time. Practically no critical materials are involved as only relatively minor changes are needed. The value of the land, buildings and equipment (before these changes and additions) is over \$250,000.

He also stated that there is an increase of three per cent in the enrollment of service men and women at USO religious programs and at forums, lectures and movies.

Detroit Edison Prepares For Huge Post-War Spending Program

Because of its faith in the post-war growth and prosperity of Detroit and southeastern Michigan, Detroit Edison company has set its sights to spend \$125,000,000 during the ten years after the war to keep pace with demands for electricity in the area. James W. Parker, president and general manager, has just announced.

Parker disclosed that a new 75,000 kilowatt, 100,000 horsepower turbo-generator is on order, now held up for many months by the urgent need of critical materials for war industries. "This will be one of the first items of post-war construction we shall do the moment the demands of the war permit," Parker said.

"Pent-up demand for automobiles and the power needs of the many new war industries which will continue in Detroit after the war; growth in the use of present and new electrical appliances, better home and industrial lighting; growth in population in our territory; and high frequency induction heating for industries are factors which make us feel optimistic on a basis of factual studies."

"We feel that after the war there will follow one of the greatest eras in expansion of uses for electric power we have ever seen. The electric industry is still young and, granted a minimum of restrictions and interference, is in a position to make an important contribution to the overall prosperity of the country in the years immediately following."

Mr. Parker estimated that by 1950 average residential customer appliance use should increase to 1,257 kilowatt hours from a present usage of 702 kilowatt hours. This increase will result from a great use of such things as: electric water heaters, frozen food devices, electric cooking equipment, home cooling and heating devices, television, incinerators.

Portrait Lighting to Be Explained

Models at the Grosse Pointe Camera club on Tuesday night will be lighted by the famous portrait photographer, Douglas Cramer. Mr. Cramer will give a lecture on the same evening on the technique of portrait lighting for which he has gained national fame.

Don Thomas, club president, said that several unusual models had been obtained for the evening and that the members will be allowed to take pictures as long as they please.

carious position, a solidarity still exists in the western hemisphere, with one dangerous exception, namely Argentina, the totalitarian state in this area of the globe, with some 250,000 German nationals within her borders and a dictator-military type of government.

Tomlinson paid highest tribute to our recently resigned secretary of state, Cordell Hull, and credited him largely with welding the degree of solidarity and co-operation which exists between the Americas and cited his history-making declarations at Montevideo in 1933 when the secretary promised that the United States would never again interfere in politics in great or small countries to the south; then, again at Buenos Aires when he declared a status of equality for all South American

countries, regardless of size and suggested arbitration on any inter-country difficulties which might arise; and, again at Lima, Peru, in 1938, when the secretary made his famous declaration of solidarity of the hemisphere, with equal responsibility for all nations in the defense of this area of the globe.

So strong is the solidarity pact with some countries that little Costa Rica declared war on the Axis after Pearl Harbor, a full 12 hours before war was declared by the congress of the United States.

The speaker told the audience that there are three spheres of influence which the United States must regard seriously in future relations: Mexico, an up and coming democracy destined to become a power; Brazil, next to the United States, the greatest military power in addition to all her natural resources; and Argentina, always a danger be-

cause of the totalitarian state that she is. He warned that this country should not countenance her in any manner.

Mr. Tomlinson finally expressed hope that we would use the utmost in diplomacy and extend long term credit to our neighbors thus establishing future trade markets.

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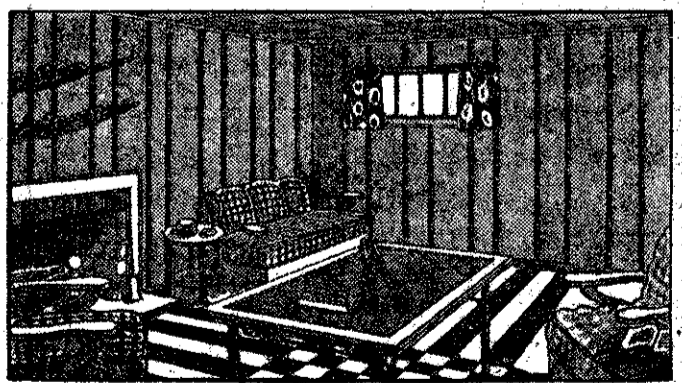



World War II is getting on in years. We have been engaged in war for so long that people are becoming alarmingly accustomed to reading casualty lists, doing without prewar "necessities," and taking our state of war in general, as a matter of course. But our soldiers have no choice. They still continue to receive APO numbers; they still die; they still need equipment of every description; they still need help from the home front. The last blows our army deals the enemy must be as powerful as the first and the ones intervening.

Women in uniform are added blows to the forces that would destroy our freedom. Women serve with unflinching patriotism in many vital ways. From control towers they guide our brave airmen who have written history across the clouded skies of the world; they serve as radio operators, communicating in code; they handle clerical jobs of many types; they plot maps and sort and deliver mail — that all-important item to soldiers everywhere.

Women guide our wounded back to health. Every day that bombs fall and shells explode, more wounded arrive at hospitals to receive urgent care from Wac medical technicians. As patients' increase in army hospitals all over the United States thousands more Wacs are needed to aid in the care of these gallant wounded. Wacs in army hospitals are mapping out their future through experience, and are, at the same time, brightening the futures for injured men by constant good care and understanding.

During World War II no job with greater satisfaction can be found than the many jobs being performed by Wacs daily, in the United States and in battle zones.

"Bonfire," he reports, "originally meant a fire for burning up bones or corpses—not a fire of celebration. And even now many bonfires set in a gay spirit throughout the fall from Election day to Christmas end in disaster which often includes loss of life."

Chief Rector advises the people of Grosse Pointe Park both children and adults, never to set bonfires for fun. If you must start a fire for practical purposes, such as burning brush or rubbish, be careful. Don't light a fire if there is a wind blowing sparks travel far. Don't start a fire where there is any chance of its spreading to dry leaves, grass or wood. Never build it near your house or near a tree. The most important precaution to take in handling a fire, according to Chief Rector, is to stay

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**Report Success in Rat Elimination**  
 Murray Smith, Farms engineer, reported that the rat elimination work has been carried on steadily for the past month and has proven a success in partially ridding sections. The work has been done by Peter Allard of the public works department.

The process involves visiting premises where rat burrows have been found and after cyanide gas has been pumped into the holes they are covered up and checked the following day. If the holes have been reopened the process is repeated until the holes remain closed. There were 46 calls made during October.
