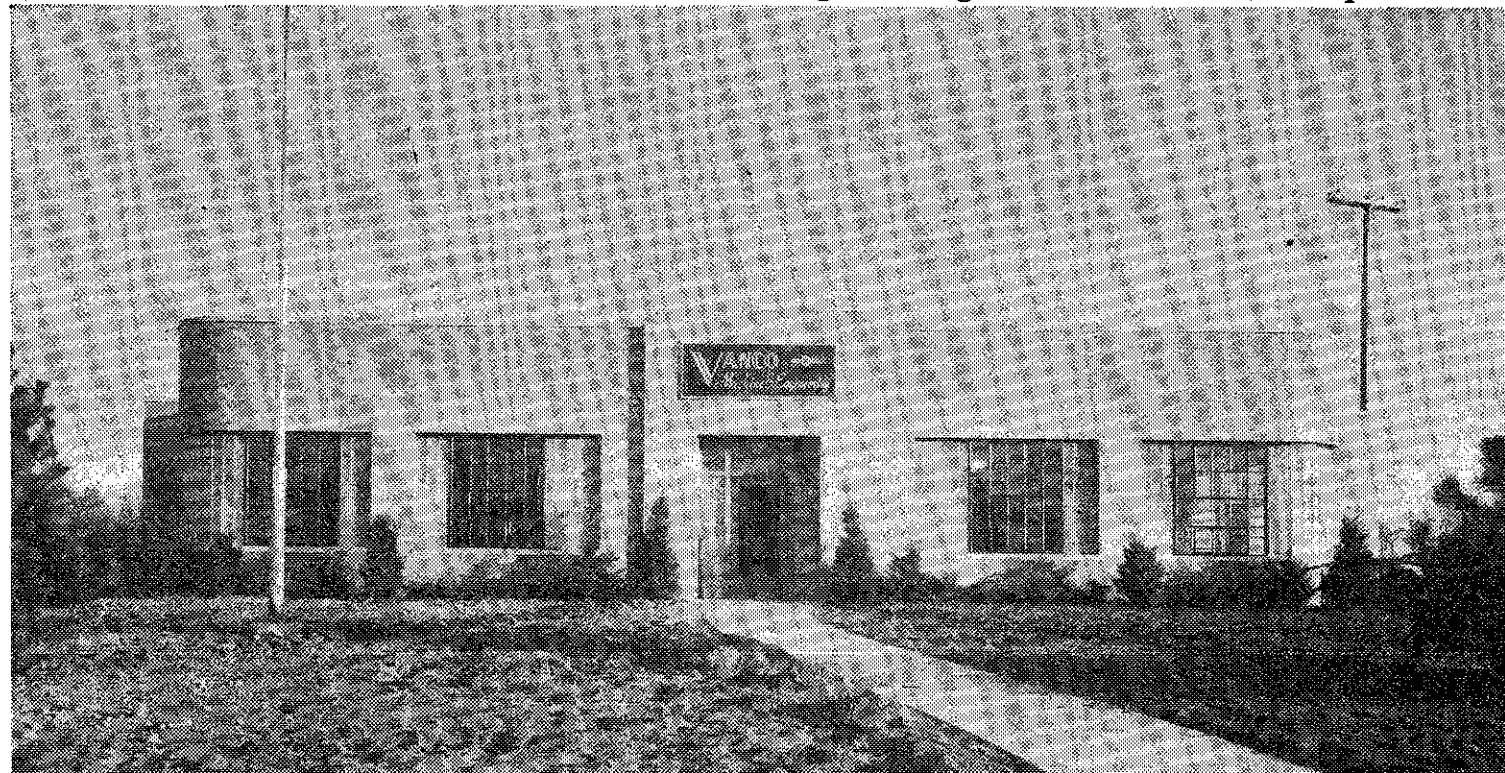

Park Aerial Gunner Awarded Air Medal

Fifteenth AAF in Italy.—Staff Sgt. Robert J. Brougham, son of Mrs. Martha S. Bachers, 979 Barrington, Grosse Pointe Park, has been awarded the Air Medal at a 15th AAF base in Italy. He is an aerial gunner on a B-24 Liberator heavy bombardment plane.

The award, made by Lieut. Col. Jack L. Randolph, group commander, of Fort Worth, Tex., was for meritorious achievement while participating in sustained operational activities against the enemy. He is a member of a group that has staged more than 155 missions against Nazi installations and industrial targets throughout Hitler's tottering empire and has received two war department unit citations for outstanding bombing achievements.

Recently, in order to provide better service for the needy families of Grosse Pointe who are recommended by the welfare division of the Neighborhood club, the mothers and fathers are invited to visit the display of toys which will be exhibited beginning Monday, Dec. 18 through Friday, Dec. 22, between 2 and 4 p.m. and select those articles which were

Lieutenant Beaupre Awarded DFC at Indian Air Base

Air Transport Command Base, India.—First Lieut. Albert D. Beaupre, pilot, 274 Kerby road, Grosse Pointe Farms, has been awarded a Distinguished Flying Cross, it was announced by Brig. Gen. William H. Tunner, commanding general of the India China division, Air Transport Command.

The award was made upon completion of 300 hours of operational flight in transport aircraft over the dangerous and difficult India-China air routes, where enemy interception and attack was probable and expected.

The air trail over the Hump, famed route through the towering peaks of the Himalaya Mountains, blazed by the Air Transport Command, is recognized by airmen as the world's toughest. Today the Hump route is the only lifeline of vital military supplies for the Allied forces fighting the Japanese in China.

The citation accompanying the award reads:

"Flying at night as well as by day, at high altitudes over impassable mountainous terrain through areas characterized by extremely treacherous weather conditions necessitating long periods of operation on instruments . . . requiring courageous and superior performance of his duties to overcome . . . he accomplished his mission with distinction . . ."

The award was made for the period of service Nov. 1, 1943 to June 30, 1944.

Park Officer Escapes Injuries When Struck by Moving Auto

Officer Arthur Conlan of the Grosse Pointe Park police department escaped serious injury last Monday morning when he was hit by a motorist who failed to stop for the policeman's signal.

While Officer Conlan was on school traffic at Kercheval and Wayburn at 8:20 a.m. Simon W. Abraham, 47, of 458 Lakewood approached the intersection from Alter road and ignored the former's signal. Conlan, thinking that the driver heard the blasts from his whistle and saw him raise his hand to stop, turned his back to the car and began assisting children to cross the street.

Soon after Conlan turned around, the car side-swiped him, causing him to fall backwards, striking his hand on the door of the car. As he was getting up, a truck, whose driver did not see him, narrowly missed him.

Meanwhile, the children had returned to the curb.

Examination showed his hand and arm were bruised.

Abraham will appear in the Park justice court Wednesday 20, on the charge of ignoring an officer's signal at a school crossing.

Hospital Drive Will Close Sat.

Officials of the current drive to raise fifty thousand dollars for the conversion of the Bon Secours convalescent home on Notre Dame at Maumee into a modern equipped hospital, have announced that the campaign is well on the way. Up to Tuesday the actual cash received by the hospital totaled in excess of \$16,000. While none of the workers had made a complete report, it was stated that the project was being well received and there were large numbers of commitments to the effect that a check was being mailed direct to the hospital.

Hospital equipment is also being rapidly assembled. The X-ray equipment, which is capable of handling all medical and surgical cases, has now been installed. It is the latest type of shockproof apparatus, and includes a motor-driven tilting table complete with fluoroscopic screen and Buckeye Potter diaphragm. Provisions are made for the speedy development of the films.

The Roentgen Ray department is under the direction of Dr. Eldwin R. Witwer of Berkshire road, who has had long experience in this field. He is a chancellor of the American college of radiologists, and is a diplomate of the American board of radiology, and a past president of the American Radiological society.

War Casualties Announced Here for This Week

Staff Sergt. William T. Stewart III, who has been missing in action since November, 1943, after failing to return from a mission over Austria as a reconnaissance plane photographer, has been listed as killed in action by the war department.

His widow, Mrs. Barbara K. Stewart, and daughter, Barbara Ellen, age four, live with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William K. Kelsey, 1380 Kensington. Sergeant Stewart's parents live in Upper Darby, Pa. He enlisted in January, 1942 and went overseas 18 months ago.

The Purple Heart has been sent to Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Zechiel of 840 Lincoln by their son, Pvt. Leon Zechiel who was wounded in Germany on Nov. 2. Word has been received that he is recovering in a hospital in France.

He left for overseas last September after entering the army in November, 1943, when he was a student at DePauw university. He is a member of the armored command.

Thief Identifies Park Homes Entered During Past Months

Openly admitting that he broke into at least 16 Grosse Pointe Park homes as well as driving away eight automobiles, Harry P. Williams, who was apprehended in Flint last week by State Police, cleared up several robberies and stolen car entries on the Park police docket, announced the chief of police this week.

Williams, alias Freddy Jury, was found in a Flint hotel after he had been frightened from a Park home which he had been attempting to burglarize and after a hasty escape, left his car at the scene of the attempted crime. Upon investigation by police, a telephone number and a hat inscribed with the initials HPW led to his arrest.

Flint police allowed Park police to hold Williams for two days, Dec. 7 and 8, so that they might clear up several of their unsolved break-ins. This Williams has done, both by circumstantial evidence and confession.

Williams will be prosecuted in Flint but Grosse Pointe Park will also make a recommendation for warrants against him.

Paper Mills Face Shutdown; School Paper Drive Dec. 15

Warning that Michigan paper mills may be forced to close this winter because of lack of waste paper has been issued by Neil Blondell, chairman of the Grosse Pointe and Gratiot township salvage committee, in reporting that paper collections have been declining.

"Only by shipping in waste paper from California, Texas, Montana and Florida have Michigan paper mills been able to maintain operations," Blondell stated. "In the East six paper mills have been closed down part time because of lack of waste paper. Michigan mills have been kept going only because of the efforts of hard working salvage volunteers and because the mills have been able to obtain paper from the West Coast. The latter is not only an expensive process, but ties up urgently required railroad facilities."

Grosse Pointe children and grown-ups may assist in this worthwhile salvage project by collecting all available waste and scrap paper and deliver it to the schools tomorrow for their monthly paper collection.

Rent payments are sometimes met or assistance is given with doctor bills. These are only some of the charitable works carried on by the Lions Club.

Carl Schweikart, township supervisor of Grosse Pointe township, has again been named chairman of the annual drive; his co-chairman is Justice Victor H. DeBaeke. S. Willard Hosking has been named to assist the co-chairmen in the tabulation of the funds while George Elworthy of the Neighborhood club will again handle the welfare department of the Goodfellows.

Presenting an unusual program of Christmas music, the Albion college choir of 60 women's voices will be heard in concert Sunday afternoon, Dec. 17, at 4:30 in the First Methodist church of Albion, with David Strickler, director of college vocal organizations, conducting. The public is invited.

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SERVICE PARADE

With the Fifth Army, Italy. — Staff Sergt. Thomas J. Kauffman, of 422 St. Clair, Grosse Pointe, a squad leader, is fighting in Italy with the 361st infantry regiment, which spearheaded the advance of Lieut. Gen. Mark W. Clark's Fifth Army from Velletri to the Arno river without having once given ground.

The 361st is part of the 91st "Powder River" division, currently in the Florence-Bologna drive.

The regiment landed in Italy last May 31; in two days moved into the line and fought its first battle just north of Velletri while attached to the 36th "Texas" division. The 361st was one of the units that took the Albano Hills and Lake Albano making possible the fall of Rome.

Bypassing Rome, the regiment continued to advance north on Highway 1 and participated in the capture of Tarquinia, which fell June 8, and Montalto, 10 miles further north, which fell on the following day. The 361st then went on to defeat the key terrain feature of Poggio di Germano at Magliano and capture Moscano on June 17.

The outfit next won a signal victory at Ponte d'Istria, where the unit captured more than 200 Germans. One company of the 361st had crossed the Ombrone river and entered the town; two other companies had flanked the village. A German force counterattacked in the town and was taken by surprise by the flank companies.

France. — Pfc. Charles Ciaramitaro is now fighting in France with the famous fighting 90th division, one of the first divisions to land in the invasion of the continent. His regiment, commanded by Col. Christian H. Clarke Jr., and his division, have received much praise for magnificent contributions to the Battle of France. The 90th division gained its fame in combat among the hedgerows of Normandy in the early days of the invasion and later the famous Battle of Foret de Mont Castre. This same outfit figured in the capture of the important city of Le Mans and was instrumental in closing the bloody Falaise Gap and the resulting capture of several thousand German prisoners.

Pfc. C. Ciaramitaro joined the division in February 1944, and has participated in some of this division's many big battles across France. This soldier is a pioneer ammunition bearer.

He has been awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge awarded to combat infantry fighters.

From the modest beginning in half of a double garage at the rear of his home at 1377 Beaconsfield in 1941, Vanco Machine & Engineering is now housed in a new \$250,000 building at 19550 Harper avenue, Gratiot township. The women in our ranks who probably feel the deepest sense of patriotism are mothers. The Women's Army Corps is proud of its mother enlistments, of which there are many.

Mothers make good soldiers. Their aims in joining the service are substantial ones. Some have sons in uniform, some have daughters. Many mothers have joined the service after receiving war department notes which begin with the all too familiar words, "We regret to inform you—"

Attempts have been made to define patriotism. But those unfortunate people who have experienced the destruction a war department note can cause, need no definition. Their aim is to end this war as quickly and as completely as possible.

A Wac mother whose goal shines forth like a clear bright light wrote the following letter:

"I am the mother of Lieutenant , missing in action. It is in that capacity in which I am writing. "During World War I, I served as a yeomanette in the navy. "My son is just a name to you, but to me, he was a handsome, brilliant boy with great hopes and dreams for the future. He lived a longer lifetime in his 20 years than many people who reach a much older age. He didn't want to die, but there was no choice for him when it came to fighting for and protecting the great American ideals which I hope have not been lost sight of in this struggle for life itself.

"I have been assigned to recruiting duty in the Wac since receiving the message of his death . . . and I have been able to steel myself to the point that I can stand before groups and tell them about him . . .

"I will fight to the finish. When it is over, there is nothing left for me except a clear conscience and the fact that I can look myself in the face and say: 'I did my part!'"

Holiday Mailing Facts and Schedules

Postal officials, after carefully studying the current situation and observing the little response to early mailing, are fearful of what is in store for them from now until December 25. Movement of the huge volume of holiday mail is a serious problem even under normal conditions. With space limited, transportation facilities overburdened and the present manpower shortage very critical, the 1944 holiday mailing is expected to seriously cripple the United States Mail Service. This must be avoided if possible in order that items and official correspondence incident to the war will not be delayed.

It is expected this year's holiday mailing will far exceed last year when over 68 million letters and greeting cards and 435,000 sacks of parcel post were dispatched from

Detroit. In the same time over 80 million greetings and 278,000 sacks of parcels were received for delivery. If delivery is assured before Christmas, this huge volume must be mailed early.

Thus far only a small percentage has been presented. Now is the time to buy postage for greeting cards. No investment pays more dividends than a supply of postage stamps. Much time and many steps are saved when an im-

portant message must be sent on short notice. The lines are already of considerable length at stamp windows. In a few days post office lobbies will be congested with people buying stamps for greeting cards. The smart mailer will be prepared with a supply.

Ammunition Plants Triple Output

Ten typical army ordnance ammunition plants are turning out approximately 100,000 tons of smokeless powder and TNT a month.

Col. Alexander G. Stone, commanding Fort Wayne ordnance depot, said today that every effort is being made to step up production, not only in these plants, but in an additional 50 army ordnance ammunition plants in various parts of the country.

Although the production of certain types of ammunition has tripled since the beginning of this year, the needs of our armed forces in Europe and the Southwest Pacific have gone up even faster.

Here are a few examples:

American combat units in Holland and Germany need six million rounds of artillery and two million rounds of mortar ammunition every month.

According to recent overseas and training reports, our soldiers used up nearly 140,000 rounds of bazooka ammunition in one month.

The army ordnance carbine is only one of the smaller lightweight weapons used by our infantrymen and paratroopers. Yet in one month alone more than 25 million rounds were fired.

Chemical Solution Protects Christmas Trees From Fire



Lighted candles hold no fears for the young lady trimming her Christmas tree, for it has been sprayed with a non-inflammable wash.

Christmas trees are still a hazard. Electric lights may have short circuits, and some folks are careless with cigarettes and matches.

To fireproof the tree, first get it from four to six days before you intend to decorate it. Then weigh the tree and buy one-fourth as many pounds of ammonium sulfate as the tree weighs. This chemical is available in most stores that sell seeds and fertilizers.

For each pound of ammonium sulfate use 1 1/2 pints of water to make the fireproofing solution. Mix the solution in something tall and narrow that will hold the tree upright. Then saw off the end of the tree diagonally so as to give a large cut surface. Set the tree in the solution in a cool place, away from the direct sunlight, and leave it there until most of the solution is absorbed. The foliage will stay green if the temperature of the room is from 55 to 65 degrees Fahrenheit.

Crayon, Lipstick Add Gay Colors To Yule Candles

Christmas candles for gifts or table decorations can be made at home from bits of discarded candles, and the whole family may have fun doing it.

There is no limit to the shape and size of mold to be used. Card-board boxes such as salt packages or ice cream cartons are very satisfactory. The cartons in which butter is sometimes sold are good for the tapered candles. Good results have even been reported with fancy gelatin molds of certain types and with jelly glasses.

The wick may be fastened through a hole in the bottom of the card-board containers, but in smooth-bot-



tomed molds, it must be kept in place by pouring in a little wax at a time around it, and then allowing it to harden.

Arrange two small sticks at right angles at the top of the mold and tie the wick in the center so that it will be held securely in place during the whole process.

Common string, the wick from an old candle, or commercial candle wicking sold at variety stores or in needlework departments may all be used for the homemade candles.

All wax to be used in a single candle should be melted in the same container, as it is difficult to match colors. Wax crayons are good coloring matter, and some women have used lipstick with success. As the wax cools in the mold, a hole will be formed down the center. Enough wax of the same color should be saved to fill this hole.

Lacking enough old candles to make the large ones now so popular, tallow candles can be made from these proportions: 10 ounces of tallow, 1/2 ounce of camphor, 4 ounces of beeswax and 2 ounces of alum. Melted paraffin, which is sometimes used, is hard to dye and breaks easily.

To make dipped candles, one end of the wick is fastened to a stick or pencil, and the wick dipped into the melted wax for a short time. As many candles as can be fully immersed at each dipping may be made at one time. If the surrounding air is cool, it is not necessary to dip the candles in cold water.

For a clear bright red candle, it is best not to use such dark colors as blue and green candles in the melting down process. However, very often the layer of color is just on the outside, and it can be scraped off and the rest of the candle used.

Chef Describes How to Carve Turkey Properly

Fine roast turkey reigns supreme over the American Christmas table. But no matter how large or small it may be, the obstacle of carving the bird must first be overcome before it can be enjoyed.

Since carving is almost an art in itself, a few expert suggestions are made by Maurice Gonneau, chef at a downtown hotel in New York.

Before starting to cut the turkey, sharpen the carving knife with the steel. The correct way to sharpen the knife is to hold the steel securely in the left hand, passing the blade against the far side of the steel with a quick stroke toward the left hand.

When the knife is sharpened, remove the second joints by putting fork between second joint and drumstick. Insert knife between carcass and second joint and cut, then with the fork pull the joint free from the carcass. If turkey is properly cooked this will be easy. Next remove the wings by cutting very carefully, inserting knife toward the joints and pull out as with the second joint. Take care not to cut into the breast.

With the breast of the turkey facing you, slice the white meat with a downward stroke and away from the bone. Next cut the drumstick free from the second joint and slice the latter. Then cut the tail with lower back meat and cut out the "oyster" which is a small amount of dark meat on the back which is always in demand because of its delicate flavor.

Serve the meat with the stuffing, giblet gravy and cranberry sauce. Spoon out the stuffing which is placed first on the plate. Cover with one piece of dark and one piece of light meat, unless there are special preferences, and cover with giblet gravy. Place helping of cranberry sauce on the side.

Part Time Employees Need Social Security

All persons, young and old alike, expecting employment during the holiday season in helping merchants with the Christmas rush must have Social Security account numbers, Francis L. Pendergast, manager of the Harper field office of the Social Security Board, announced today.

It matters not whether the work is to be full or part time, a Social Security account number will be needed by you if you accept such

employment. One reason this is so essential is that the assignment of an account number and card assures the worker that all wages he receives will be credited to his Old-Age and Survivors Insurance Account. Another reason is that Treasury law requires an employer to report the wages paid to his employees. In reporting these wages, the employer must show the names of his employees as they appear on their Social Security cards and also their account numbers.

Families Assisted Through Social Security Benefits

The distribution of the million "so-
cial security" benefits now in force
illustrates vividly the family impor-
tance of federal old-age and surviv-
ors insurance, Francis L. Pender-
gast, manager of the Harper office
of the social security board at 8037
Harper avenue, pointed out yester-
day.

While many persons think the
program provides benefits in old age,
Mr. Pendergast said, it is significant
to note that nearly forty per cent of
the million beneficiaries are children
and young widows who have children
under 18. There are 109,000 young
widows with children receiving \$2-
155,000 a month in benefits, and 288-
000 children of deceased or retired
workers receiving \$3,500,000 a month.

When wives of retired beneficiar-
ies, who must be 65 to be eligible,
and the 65-and-above widows of in-
sured workers who have died are
added to the young widows and chil-
dren, Mr. Pendergast said, the fam-
ily value of the program shows up
even more — with approximately six
hundred thousand women and chil-
dren and about four hundred thou-
sand aged men on the benefit rolls.

More than one retired insured
worker in every four has a wife who
is drawing half as much in benefits
each month as he gets. There are
418,500 retired workers (many of
them women) receiving \$9,846,000 a
month; 122,000 of them have wives
past 65 and they are receiving \$1-
\$18,000 a month.

"While the number of aged widows
of insured workers is smaller, with
58,000 receiving \$1,172,000 a month,"
Mr. Pendergast pointed out, "their
protection under this insurance pro-
gram enables them to maintain their
dignity and enjoy a peaceful old age.
Most of them have earned this by
helping their husbands through use-
ful working lives."

The smallest group of monthly
beneficiaries, Mr. Pendergast said, is
made up aged dependent parents of
insured workers who died without
leaving a widow or child. They num-
ber 4,500 and receive \$59,000 a
month.

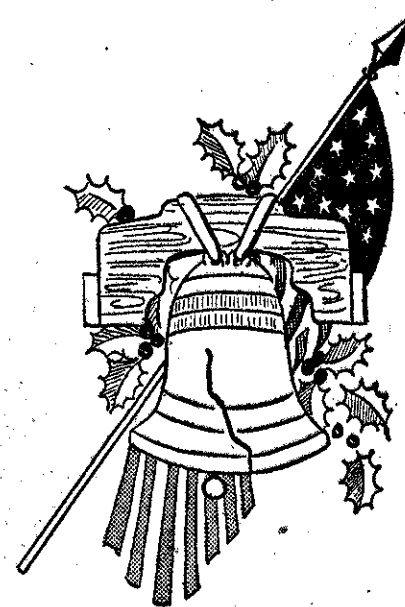

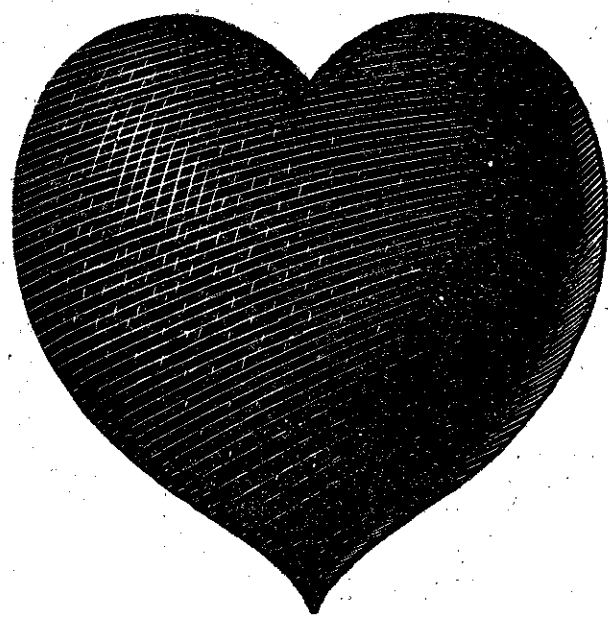

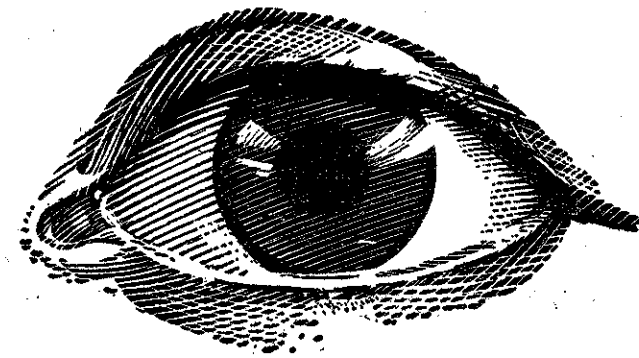

General Hines Praises Michigan Veteran Program

Michigan's system for handling rehabilitation of its veterans continues to be a model for the entire nation, Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, administrator of veterans affairs, said in Chicago last Wednesday.

General Hines said that only three or four states had met the full requirements of federal standards for readjusting former service men to civilian occupations.

Michigan, he said, was the first state to have a workable plan in operation and has continued its lead through the work of the state office of veterans' affairs, which was established by the 1944 legislature at the request of Governor Kelly.

General Hines predicted the peak of government responsibility for veterans' care will be reached in 1975 and will then cost six million dollars a year.

Over 100 local councils of veterans affairs, sponsored by the office of veterans' affairs, have been created in Michigan communities to service the returning veterans.

Soldiers Record Christmas Songs, Poems for 'Home'

Not all the recorded Christmas messages that fathers and mothers receive this year from their boys and girls in service will be the "Merry Christmas, Everybody, How is everything at home?"—type.

At the Detroit USO, which is one of the 24 agencies receiving funds from the recent Community War Chest campaign, workers in the Recordio room report that many of the service people visiting the club are singing their holiday greetings. "White Christmas," "Silent Night" and "Noel" are proving very popular.

One serviceman searched through the library until he found several appropriate poems, one for "mom" and one for "dad." These he read into the microphone, one on each side of the record, to send home his Christmas greeting.

Christmas Tree Season Here Again

Again we are in the season of the year when Christmas trees are being cut and hauled to towns and cities to take their important part in the Christmas season. Charles Figy, Commissioner of Agriculture, states, that already the department has found that some folks have forgotten that there is a state law requiring anyone moving Christmas trees or decorative boughs on the highway, to be ready for a check up of credentials showing a bill of sale where the trees were purchased. If they are cut from a party's own land he should carry some legal document denoting ownership of said property.

The written bill of consent shall contain the legal description of the land where such Christmas trees, boughs, shrubs, vines or native plants were cut as well as the name of the legal owner, and must be signed by two witnesses. This law was enacted in 1933 and was put on the statute books for the purpose of protecting Michigan's Reforest Program and to prevent the taking of trees from property unknown to the land owner.

Warn Motorists That Tires Must Be Recapped

Indicating that there is little relief in sight for passenger tire users, Mel F. Santmyers, Chief Tire Rationing Officer, advocated extensive recapping for truck and car owners in the important Detroit defense area.

"Recapping of tires in Detroit has fallen off 50 per cent during the last thirty days despite the fact that the tire outlook is dark," said Santmyers.

"The December tire quotas, although approximately the same as in November, constitute a warning to the operators of public and private transportation vehicles which cannot be disregarded. In the Detroit District alone there is a backlog of over 6,000 large truck tire applications. Instead of being able to work off any of this backlog during the month, our quota by the War Production Board will enable OPA to meet only 25 per cent of the estimated December eligible applicants."

Pointe Navigator
Assists in Rescue
of Marine Pilot

In a dramatic rescue by a Navy PBV-Catalina, a critically injured Marine fighter pilot was hauled from the open sea near here recently shortly after a forced water landing in his disabled plane.

The PBV was piloted by Lieut. (jg) Lindsay C. deGuebery (27), USNR, of Hannibal, Missouri. Copilot was Lieut. (jg) Charles Warren Pacey (28), USNR, former Paxton, Illinois, attorney.

The incident occurred during a training flight by the PBV, with Lieut. (jg) deGuebery acting as patrol plane commander. He was directed to the rescue scene by a fighter plane which had been on a training mission with the downed plane.

When picked up, the injured Marine pilot was near exhaustion and suffering from shock, severe concussions, and lacerations of the face and loss of blood. Injured in the landing, he had been unable to inflate his life-rat. Medical officers declared that only the timeliness of the rescue

and first-aid measures aboard the PBV had saved his life.

A number of Michigan men, including two from Grosse Pointe, are among the personnel of a fighter group which has just been cited for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy in the Mediterranean theatre of operations.

The award of the streamer of a Distinguished Unit was made by Maj. Gen. John K. Cannon to Sergeant Robert H. Proffitt, 1137 Nottingham, and Thomas R. Swegles, formerly of 15127 Windmill Pointe drive. In company with the group commander, Lieut. Col. Areile W. Nielsen of California, and in the presence of the officers and men of the group drawn up in parade formation, General Cannon advanced to the group's color guard and affixed the Distinguished Unit streamer to the group's regimental colors.

The group, which was formed in Great Britain in 1942, has been overseas for two years, and has taken part in every major campaign in the Mediterranean theatre.

The citation, read at the ceremony by Capt. Walter Maciej of Frackville, Pa., read in part as follows: "In contributing to the success of the operation strangle, a vital phase of the Allied effort which resulted in the liberation of Rome, the 350th Fighter Group performed above and beyond the call of duty in rendering unique and heroic services. Of their own volition and in addition to their designated duties, personnel within the group successfully interdicted supply routes at such strategic points as Tarquinia, Grosseto, Leghorn and Pisa, while continuously maintaining their regularly assigned reconnaissance patrols and sea searches covering Corsica, Sardinia, Tunisia, Italy and the Tyrrhenian and Ligurian seas. The outstanding leadership, tireless devotion to duty and extraordinary heroism displayed by the officers and men of the 350th Fighter Group during combat operations on April 6, 1944 have set this group above and apart from other units involved in comparable effort during the same period and have given great credit upon themselves and the military service of the United States."

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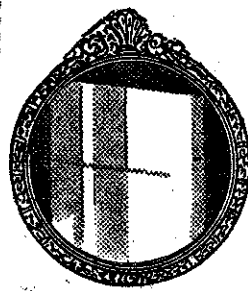

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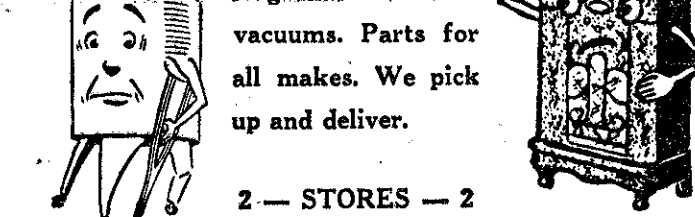
