

In one week's concentrated activity high school students brought in orders for bonds with this evaluation, including \$125,900 worth of Series E bonds.

The high school has participated in five of the nation's six bond drives and has carried on the sale of war stamps on a weekly basis through homeroom groups. The result is that high school students have been the agents for the purchase of the impressive total of more than \$1,866,000 worth of bonds and stamps to date. It is believed that few schools in

the country have sold a higher average per pupil of bonds and stamps. The bond sales were carried on under the supervision of H. L. Selmeier, who organized Victory Corps members into a checking crew to help with the handling of the orders and money. Twenty-five students

had reported last week their eligibility to receive war department certificates for gallants.

Location: West side of Mack Avenue between Kenmore and Huntington Drives - 32 acres in Grosse Pointe Woods - 12 and 2-3 acres in Gratiot Township.

Reasons: 1. To provide taxpayers an opportunity to express wishes regarding a site which many residents have requested.

2. To acquire property before real estate developers acquire all desirable acreage and prices increase.

Will Provide Site for Postwar Projects:

1. New building for Municipal Offices, Police Department and Fire Department.

2. Picnic grounds and playgrounds.

3. Wading and bathing pools, outdoor or indoor, if it remains impractical to obtain such facilities on the lake.

All the above projects to be for use by Grosse Pointe Woods residents only and to be later designed by competent architects and engineers under the guidance of a Citizens' recreational committee and the Village Commission.

Financing: The purchase price is \$42,000.00, the exact amount of the Bond Issue; probable interest rate 13/4 to 21/2%. The 32 acres in Grosse Pointe Woods is now assessed at \$35,000.00 and pays \$507.00 in taxes to the village annually.

The proposed Bond Issue will increase the tax rate 40 cents per \$1,000.00 assessed valuation or \$1.20 yearly on average home.

All future construction to be financed by additional Bond Issues to be later approved by taxpayers.




