LOCAL GOODFELLOW SALE REACHES TOP

Automobile, Gas Thefts Exposed in City, Park

Five Grosse Pointe youths were to appear before Justice Leslie Young today in the City of Grosse Pointe justice court on the charge of stealing an automobile. A sixth one will appear in juvenile court.

The boys, Clarence E. Pinkston, 18, 832 Neff road; William Pierson, 17, 327 Merriweather; Richard and Robert DeSpeider, 17 year old twins, 1452 Yorkshire; and Frank Levenseller, 17, 201 Oak street, were implicated in the theft of an automobile stolen from the garage of Max Stringer, 282 Rivard early last Sunday morning.

The names of the five have been released by City police with the warning that any future crimes of this nature will be dealt with severely. It was while the five and their juvenile friend were riding about Grosse Pointe in the Levenseller car when they decided to steal a car; they made plans and at Rivard and Jefferson, Pinkston left the car and proceeded to the garage at the rear of the terraces on Rivard. After searching through "four or five" cars, Pinkston came upon the Stringer car with the keys above the visor.

After leaving the garage, Pinkston returned to the waiting Levenseller car and picked up Pierson and the juvenile. The three drove out Lakeshore road with the second car trailing closely. At Oxford road, Pinkston turned and deliberately began knocking down mail boxes. It was shortly after this when they were apprehended by Lieutenant Demling and Officer Lietke of the Shores police. Pinkston and Pierson were taken to the City police; the juvenile escaped from the car before the officers arrived. After some questioning, the remaining boys were soon picked up.

In addition to admitting that they stole the Stringer auto, Pinkston and Pierson confessed damaging the windows and dash board instruments of the car. Police Chief Thomas Trombly has issued a warning to the youths of Grosse Pointe that such crimes will not be tolerated here. He complimented Lieutenant Demling for apprehending the boys; it was this officer who shot and captured a Negro bandit who had been terrorizing Grosse Pointe during the past summer.

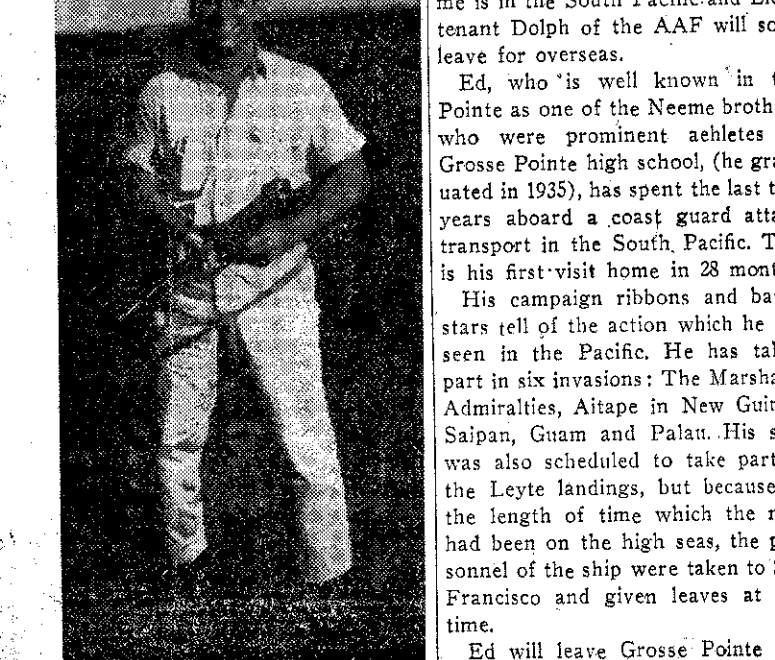

Word has been received from the war department that Sgt. Edward Fluary has been wounded in action in France on Nov. 24. He has been overseas since last August. Sergeant Fluary is the son of Mrs. Joseph Fluary of 153 Oak street, and is one of four service sons; the others are PFC. Gervase, in France; PFC. Willard in the Philippines and S2C Joseph Jr., in naval construction in the Hawaiian Islands.

Wounded for the second time is the word received of Pfc. Jack Laing who is believed to be in Germany serving under General Simpson. He has already been awarded the Purple Heart and the Combat Expert Infantry men overseas who have shown outstanding bravery during actual combat. He is a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school.

Issues Statement on Village Bond Issue

A number of residents of Grosse Pointe Woods, especially those living in the immediate vicinity of the proposed park and municipal building site have expressed some concern and asked questions to get a better picture of the proposition on which the property owners are asked to cast their votes on Dec. 27. To further bring out the facts, A. A. Ghesquiere, village president, has at the request of the village commission, placed an advertisement in this paper and reassures the local residents that all further improvements on this site, if approved by the voters, will be of a kind that will serve the desires of the residents and which will have a minimum of nuisance value.

President Ghesquiere further states that if this bond issue is approved, he will, with the approval of the village commission, appoint a committee of citizens from various parts of the village to work out details and plans regarding the proper development of this site as a recreational center and that later, upon this committee's recommendation and approval of the commission, architects and engineers will be engaged to design the improvements to be in keeping with the neighborhood. It should be definitely understood that the present bond issue is only for the purchase of the land and that all future improvements will require further approval by the taxpayers.

Mr. Ghesquiere also said that real estate developers were negotiating for this proposed site when the commission started negotiations and that if purchased by them, the Mack avenue frontage could be used for business purposes. He also said that contrary to general belief, the village commission cannot force developers to set high monetary or cubical content reductions on lots in a subdivision. Only by demanding a guarantee of all improvements such as water, sewers, sidewalks and pavements, can the commission tend to keep the nature of the property on a high character basis.

Sale Is Termed "Best in History" by Co-Chairmen

"Buy A Goodfellow Paper" was the cry heard from every prominent street corner in Grosse Pointe last Tuesday morning, as Lions club members supplemented by policemen and firemen of each municipality began their sixteenth annual "Old Newsboy" paper sale.

To this cry, thousands of Grosse Pointe residents generously rallied, contributing between \$4,000 and \$4,500, a new record, according to Carl Schweikart and Victor H. DeBaeke, co-chairmen of the drive.

On the street from 6:00 to 11:30 a.m. Pointe "newsboys" terminated the sale with a noonday luncheon at the Detroit Turners, each Lion playing host to policemen and firemen. Additional funds will undoubtedly be received by mail, and Lions members eventually hope to swell the fund to a final total of over five thousand dollars.

Phil Skillman, president of the club, presided at the Turners and introduced the co-chairmen of the drive who complimented the Goodfellows on their efforts. Subsequently, Skillman introduced Charlie Carlisle, emcee from the Bowery who had in tow two of Barbara's topliners, songstress Miss Dawn and Johnnie King, the Irish tenor.

Shoplifters Found in City

A series of shoplifting episodes were cleared up this past week in the City of Grosse Pointe with the apprehension of two women by City police last Friday afternoon on Kercheval avenue.

The women, Jessie Nelson, 29, of 59 Seward, and Joan Drag, 28, of 51 Sproat, stood mute at their arraignment Monday and will appear for examination Friday in the City justice court before Justice Leslie Young.

Martha Chandler, 21, of 4116 Phillip, a clerk in Kopp's drug store, became suspicious of the two women when she noticed that a perfume bottle was missing from its box immediately after they left the store. Knowing that shoplifting was prevalent in the business district, she called the police and gave the descriptions of the suspects.

Officers Andrew Teetaert and James Flannigan, answering the call, searched the district. Officer Teetaert found the two women leaving the Peck & Peck establishment and immediately gave chase. While taking hold of one, the second began running. Although the officer called to a passerby to "catch that girl," she ran into Officer Flannigan as he was coming around the corner.

When they were searched at the police station, Chief Trombly and officers found 11 men's scarfs, valued at \$66, which were taken from Proper's; four bottles of perfume, valued at \$80, taken from Kopp's; and a pair of gloves taken from Best's. Some of the articles were found in the lining of one of the women's coats, while the rest were carried in paper bags.

The women refused to identify themselves and they were without identification on their persons. They were taken to Detroit police headquarters and through their files, police records were found for both women. They have been arrested several times since 1938 on the same charge. It is believed by Chief Trombly that these are the same individuals who stole three dozen ties from Proper's two weeks ago, as well as taking articles from other stores which have reported shoplifting.

Pointe Soldier Home on Crutches

Hobbling about on crutches this Christmas Day will be Pfc. Alfred Baron, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Baron of 1364 Wayburn, who will spend a week in Grosse Pointe after leaving Billings hospital in Indiana where he is being hospitalized for injuries received in action.

Private Baron was wounded July 31 at St. Lo in France when the American troops were attempting a landing on the Normandy beach. He received a severe injury to his leg and hip and a broken arm. He was hospitalized in England until he was recently returned to this country and the hospital in Indiana.

Mutual Fire Aid Plan Dropped by City Council Monday

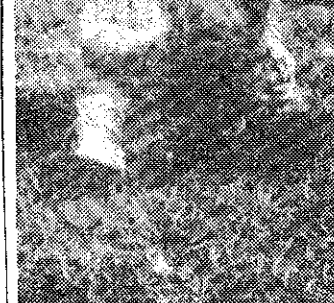
Officially the City council of Grosse Pointe Monday night closed the door on the co-operative plan which had been proposed for mutual fire aid between the fire departments of the Park, City and Farms.

Unofficially, Councilman Chester F. Carpenter was appointed by Mayor Hugh Dill to serve in whatever capacity is necessary in order to keep in touch with the neighboring municipalities in case any new substitute plans are offered.

Because of the lack of co-operation which the council believes to have been presented by the Farms board of trustees, it was agreed that the plan should be dropped even though the City and Park were in agreement with the proposition. Councilmen Ferry, Waterfall, Mack and Smith voted that the present plan be dropped; Councilman Carpenter voted against the motion.

It was recommended that the telephone service which had been installed between the Park and City fire stations be terminated.

Special Attention to Be Given Drunk Drivers

Aroused over the sharp increase in traffic accidents caused by drinking drivers, Police Chiefs Thomas V.

Trombly and Henry W. Piel this week warned that all motorists found guilty of driving while drunk would face a jail sentence, a heavy fine, or both.

Chief Trombly predicted an even greater increase in this type of accident during the holiday season unless police and traffic courts apply stern corrective measures. "Because of liquor rationing," Chief Trombly said, "many persons who, in ordinary times, had parties at home or in offices will patronize bars and taverns. We expect all proprietors of such establishments to cooperate by making every effort to prevent persons under the influence from driving their automobiles. Citizens must be made to realize that they cannot drive after drinking without risking a serious accident, a jail sentence, or both."

Chief Trombly said the policy established by Detroit traffic court judges in meting out jail terms and stiff fines for persons convicted of driving while drunk has proved particularly effective. Records show that, so far this year, 133 motorists convicted of the offense have been sent to jail for a total of 3,624 days or an average sentence of 27 days each.

In support of the current campaign against drunk driving being carried on in this community, the Traffic Safety Association of Detroit has prepared for distribution thousands of street-side posters with the warning message — "Drunk Drivers Go to Jail."

Smaller copies of this poster are being displayed in all drinking establishments throughout the metropolitan Detroit area.

The chiefs said instructions have been issued to all men under their

command to give special attention to drunken motorists during the next month.
