JUSTICE COURT LEVIES HEAVY FINES

1944 Very Active In Area Attuned to War Tempo

Scanning through the files of 1944, The Review takes time out to give a recapitulation of the news and events of the past year and outlines the achievements of Grosse Pointe's civic, service, social, patriotic and municipal bodies during the past 52 weeks.

It was in January when George Elworthy, OCD director, announced to the people of Grosse Pointe that all air raid alerts and blackouts would be discontinued because of changing war conditions. This order came from the state OCD headquarters and was announced throughout Michigan.

With the OCD functioning less and less in the Pointe, the AWVS was just as active. The Pointe women have worked hundreds, and some even thousands, of hours on community volunteer service in the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth War Loan Drives, in salvage campaigns and in national and local drives having to do with war activities.

Because the war is the foremost thought in people's minds, the war casualty lists were one of the most widely read articles in The Review as well as in the dailies. The Review announced to Grosse Pointe the heroic deeds of many of young men wearing the uniforms of all the services. It was happy to relate many of the stories which returning servicemen had to tell; the hardships which had to be endured; the hiding by sympathetic peoples of foreign lands; and the rescues by invading American troops.

In addition to this, The Review had to announce the sad news of the numerous Pointe men who made the supreme sacrifice for their country. Approximately thirty-five such entries were made; in addition to this, 14 men were reported missing (several of these were later rescued or reported as prisoners of war). Stories relating the presentation of awards for "meritorious achievement," "for bravery," and for "gallantry in action" were carried almost weekly.

Three national war loan drives were carried on in the nation and in Grosse Pointe, and local quotas were met in all cases, although a little urging on the part of campaign officials was needed to spur the purchases of bonds.

Salvage was foremost in the minds of Grosse Pointe housewives and residents for throughout the year periodical collections were made of tin cans and waste paper. Record paper collections were made by Vernier school in Grosse Pointe Shores as well as Mason school in the Woods and Kerby school in the Farms. A new peak was reached in the tin can pick ups when 146 tons of salvagable cans were turned into the salvage department.

One of the finest achievements was realized during the beginning months of 1944 when the Grosse Pointe Honor Roll was dedicated to the men and women in service. Announced at the conclusion of 1943, detailed plans were made in January, with the election of William Watkins, formerly of the local board of education, as president of the Grosse Pointe Honor Roll Association. The first subscription was announced as coming from Mr. and Mrs. Alger Shelden in the amount of \$500, and weekly lists of donors from the entire area were published in The Review. The site was selected in the latter part of February; the memorial was to be located on the grounds of the Grosse Pointe high school at the corner of Grosse Pointe boulevard and Fisher road. Dedication ceremonies on Memorial Day brought out several thousand Grosse Pointers to the school grounds. Periodically, names of additional servicemen and women are added to this \$5,000 structure.

September 1 marked the 25th year which George Elworthy has spent as director of the Pointe Neighborhood club. The growth of the club was described in articles and pictures in the August 31st issue of The Review.

High tribute was paid to the late Mason P. Rumney who died on January 20, while serving the City of Grosse Pointe as its mayor. Mr. Rumney was succeeded in his post by Dr. Hugh Dill who was appointed on February 21.

The temporary post office which was again established for the Christmas rush in the City-owned building on Maumee near St. Clair for 1943, remained in its location while plans were formulated by the postal officials to establish a permanent branch in Grosse Pointe. Bids were sought two times throughout the year, but the branch appears to have been doomed by the demand for high rental; this was announced November 9.

Elections in Grosse Pointe took place in the spring and the fall; the former were local and the latter was national. A record vote was set in the national November election in the township and the City.

Several public issues were brought to the residents of Grosse Pointe by their respective governing bodies. Among them was included the changing of the Fisher road boundary line by the City and the Farms. The question was brought up in January and discussed through subsequent months by the City council and board of trustees until August when neither municipality could agree on the proposed new line. Petitions were also presented to the Farms to block the widening of Fisher road by residents living on that street.

A move to change the zoning ordinance in Grosse Pointe Woods to allow a huge shopping development to be erected on Mack adjacent to Seven Mile road was begun in May, but after two public hearings scheduled for the residents to voice their opinions on this, the village commission would not grant a change. The business developers were told to build only in the established business frontage. Latest word on this is that an "L" shaped theatre will be built at Bournemouth and Mack.

Other headline "dispute" stories carried in The Review related the pros and cons which were given by the Park, City and Farms on a proposed mutual fire aid agreement. A contract was submitted to be signed by the three municipalities last summer

The display is arranged to call the attention of the people to the pricing program, which the OPA has put into effect to hold down the cost of living.

It is hoped that as many people as possible will take note of what is actually happening in respect to avoiding inflation for our country.

During World War I and period following, without price control an individual could purchase 50 pounds of sugar for \$15; it was being sold for 30 cents a pound. This is displayed in one window.

With price control we can purchase 50 pounds of sugar plus 36 other staple commodities for the same amount, \$15.00. This is displayed in another window.

We hope that the people of this community will help to hold down the cost of living by checking purchases to the ceiling price and reporting any violations to the local board.

This display is scaled to an OPA Group II store prices. Display is donated by Farms Market and displayed by the price division of the local board.

We wish to call your attention to the fact that while food, which is the most important item in our cost of living has received the greatest attention, there are thousands of other items controlled, such as the sale of certain used commodities and services of all kinds.

Corporal Zauner was a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school, June, 1940 and entered service on Nov. 21, 1942. He had been overseas three months. He is also survived by a brother, F2C John, of the navy.

One of the happiest boys in Grosse Pointe this holiday season is Glenn Forcier, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Forcier of 464 Manor, because the ship of which he is the mascot, has pulled into port for the first time in two years. Glenn recently was commissioned an honorary ensign in the navy and is mascot of the U.S.S. Sustain. There are only seven such mascots in the country.

The personnel of the ship sent word to Glenn that all of his Christmas boxes have been received and the men are enjoying the fruit cakes and candies during this yuletide.

In appreciation for what he has done for them, the ship's company sent Glenn a wooden box of souvenirs collected from ports all over the world.

Rabaut Obtains More Air Facilities

Washington.—Congressman Louis C. Rabaut, Democrat of Grosse Pointe, has been notified by the CAB that authorization has been granted the Northwest Airlines, Inc., and the United Air Lines, Inc., to provide additional air facilities to Detroit.

Rabaut has been pressing for a decision in this matter for some time. Because of his position as chairman of the subcommittee on appropriations which has jurisdiction over both the CAA and the CAB, Rabaut has been particularly interested in better air service for the Detroit area.

Pointer's Husband Bags Two Japs, Wings A Third

Marine Capt. David Thomson, of Oak Park, Ill., husband of the former Patricia Hudson Thomson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William R. Hudson of 1653 Hawthorne, led three Hellcats into a scrap with Nipponese planes before dawn Dec. 12, and downed two enemy fighters and damaged a third.

Captain Thomson, included among seven Marine fighter pilots, attacked a large force of Nipponese planes and shot down 11 without damage to themselves. The pilots, members

"With the odds 11 to 1, I was scared green when we went into the attack," Thomson said.

An aviation enthusiast since boyhood, Captain Thomson graduated from high school in 1938 in Illinois and enrolled at Northwestern university where he took a flying course in 1941. Commissioned in 1942, he spent a year in Minneapolis as an instructor, before going to Florida for special night combat training.

Captain Thomson met his wife in Texas in 1942; when she heard he had bagged two Japs, she said "This is only the beginning of what he's going to do." They have a son, Randy, 15 months old. Mrs. Thomson is a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school.

Jail Sentence Given Shoplifter; Youths Fined

The City Justice court meted out stiff fines and a sentence last week for the group of Grosse Pointe youths who stole an automobile earlier in the week and for the two shoplifters who were apprehended in the City on Dec. 15.

Justice Leslie Young found five boys guilty on a disorderly conduct charge and fined Clarence E. Pinkston, 18, 832 Neff road and William Pierson, 17, 327 Merriweather, \$65 and restitution to the owner of the damaged car which they stole from Max Stringer of 282 Rivard. Their accomplices were a juvenile who is to appear in juvenile court and Frank Levenseller 17, 201 Oak street, and Richard and Robert DeSpelder, 17 year old twins, 1452 Yorkshire. The latter three were fined \$50 and restitution.

Bon Secours Hospital Drive Gathering Momentum Daily

Officials announced Wednesday that the \$50,000 campaign for the conversion of the Bon Secours convalescent home into a modern equipped hospital to serve the Grosse Pointe area is daily gathering momentum. "Some sizeable gifts are already in hand," they said, "and others are on the way."

The amount already solicited for the drive up to and including last night was \$31,075. It is hoped that the goal will be reached soon.

Approximately two hundred fifty individuals have signified their intent to contribute to this worthy cause and many of these will contribute before the end of the year so as to take advantage of the tax deduction on their 1944 federal income tax return.

The home is rapidly being converted into a hospital with enthusiastic co-operation coming from the medical profession. Several operations have already been performed at the hospital.

The committee members who are supervising the campaign are G. Russell French, Herbert Mendelsohn, John M. Mottschall, William C. Roney, Joseph F. Verhelle, G. Herbert Zimmerman and M. J. Kearins.

Pointe Servicemen Given Air Medals at European Bases

Fifteenth AAF in Italy. — First Lieut. James R. Sullivan, 92 Mapleton road, Grosse Pointe, bombardier in a B-24 Liberator group commanded by Col. Philip R. Hawes, Pearl River, N. Y., has been awarded the Air Medal "for meritorious achievement in sustained operational activities against the enemy."

Sullivan entered the AAF Oct. 10, 1940 and received his second lieutenant's commission and his bombardier's wings at Midland, Texas, Oct. 10, 1940. Prior to entering the army, he was a commercial photographer employed by the Ford Motor company in Dearborn, Mich. He is a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school, class of '33, and attended Wayne university.

His father, James E. Sullivan, lives at the Grosse Pointe address. For "meritorious achievement" while participating in bomber combat operations over Germany and enemy occupied Europe, T-Sergt. Thomas F. Harris, so of Harold J. Harris, 1035 Audubon road, has been awarded the Air Medal.

Sergeant Harris, engineer on a B-17 Flying Fortress, is a member of the 91st Bombardment Group, a veteran group of more than two years in the European Theatre of Operations. This group is the combat home of such famous Flying Fortresses as the "Memphis Belle" and "General Ike" and was the first group to complete 100 daylight high altitude bombing missions in this theatre. Sergeant Harris recently took part in the group's 250th aerial assault.

Sergeant Harris graduated from Central high school in Detroit in 1941 and attended Michigan State college in East Lansing.

Missing Bombardier Awarded Air Medal for Aerial Flights

Fifteenth AAF in Italy. — Second Lieut. George C. Phelps Jr., 1312 Berkshire road, Grosse Pointe, bombardier on a 15th Air Force B-24 Liberator bomber, reported missing in action by the war department, has been awarded the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement in aerial

Lieutenant Phelps has participated in major attacks against such strategic targets as the Munich rail yards, Germany, the Graz rail yards, Austria, and other important targets in Austria, Germany, Italy and Hungary. He failed to return from a mission against the Vienna Osterreichische Motor Works, Austria.

Before entering the army on Nov. 14, 1942, Lieutenant Phelps attended the University of Michigan. He received his commission at Victorville, Calif., on April 29, 1944.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Phelps, live at the Grosse Pointe address.

SERVICE PARADE

Ninth Air Force Headquarters, France. — Four officers and 40 enlisted men from Michigan are part of the P-47 Thunderbolt fighter group which was recently awarded a Distinguished Unit Citation for smashing two German armored columns near St. Lo on July 11.

The Germans attempting to drive a wedge into American lines extending from Bayeaux to the Cherbourg peninsula, were spotted and attacked under a 1,000 foot ceiling. Nearly a third of the tanks were knocked out. The Thunderbolts landed to refuel and rearm, then attacked again. This time the Nazi tanks were only 200 yards from American positions. The second attack completely disrupted the enemy columns, striking a decisive blow at enemy armor during a critical time of the Normandy campaign.

Michigan men who are eligible to wear the gold-framed blue citation ribbon include Pvt. Henry J. Donovan, 2032 Hawthorn, Grosse Pointe Woods.

★ Members of the unit, the engineer forestry battalion, supplying lumber, pilings, railway ties, and other forest products for United States construction engineers, have many claims to distinction. Serving here is Pvt. Nicholas J. Leto, of 1017 Balfour, as a clerk.

★ They are the only soldiers in the American army privileged to wear "black boots" — the traditional loggers' boots with metal spikes, or calks, in the soles, and they claim to be members of the most spread out battalion in the world.

★ When the battalion, commanded by Capt. Winton M. Bernardin, of Albuquerque, N. M., was trained, the organization which now is in France was battalion headquarters. It was to have been a company which furnished supply, survey, transportation and administration services for three other companies.

★ But the battalion was split up, and now the only part of it in France is the headquarters. The three other companies, although still officially part of the battalion, are somewhere in the South Pacific. "They still belong to me, outfit," says Captain Bernardin. "But I don't have very much control of them at that range."

★ Corp. Joseph Crothers, 632 Notre Dame, Grosse Pointe, was recently promoted from the grade of private first class at Westover Field, Mass., where he is presently on duty.

★ Madison, Wis. — Pvt. Charles B. Johnson Jr., 26, husband of Mrs.

★ Corporal Allard and his nine crewmates have been thoroughly schooled in simulated heavy bombardment tactics, including interception by pursuit planes, "shooting them down" on film with cameras rigged to machine guns, navigation flights, bombing missions, air to ground gunnery missions and other procedures which have fitted the crew for aerial combat overseas.

★ Corporal Allard entered the service in February 1943. He attended Grosse Pointe high school. Prior to entering the service, he was employed by the Chrysler corporation.

Large Coal Users Save Fuel During Campaign

A savings of 46,306 tons of coal has been effected in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties through the National Fuel Efficiency program started last July according to Paul W. Thompson, co-ordinator of the Detroit area committee conducting this drive. This drive covers all but residential users of fuel, and as coal for this type of user has been cut nationally 10 per cent, the total overall saving is quite impressive in this territory, Mr. Thompson points out. Typical large savings in individual establishments have run from 1,022 tons to 8,000 tons per year and include a large variety of coal users — small machine shops, distilleries, paper companies, hospitals, laundries, automobile companies and provision stores. This work has been carried on by 300 regional engineers, working on a voluntary basis.

CHRISTMAS COOKIES. For youngsters—and oldsters, too—a Christmas recipe from our Home Service Department:

English Christmas Cookies
1/2 cup butter
1 egg
2 tps. baking powder
1 cup brown sugar
1 1/2 cups sifted bread flour
Top decoration:
1 tsp. cinnamon
Granulated sugar
Egg white
Blanched almonds if sliced, or cake confetti or colored sugar
Cream butter, add sugar gradually, then well beaten egg and the flour and baking powder sifted together. Place in refrigerator overnight. (This dough may also be sliced or rolled out to 1/8-inch thickness or cut in fancy shapes; sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar and arrange nuts on top.) Put through cookie press onto sheets. Brush tops with egg white, sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. You may use colored sugar or cake confetti, if desired. Time, 12-15 minutes. Temperature, 375-400° F.

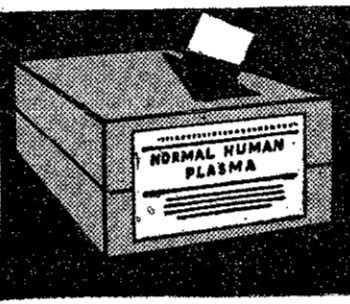

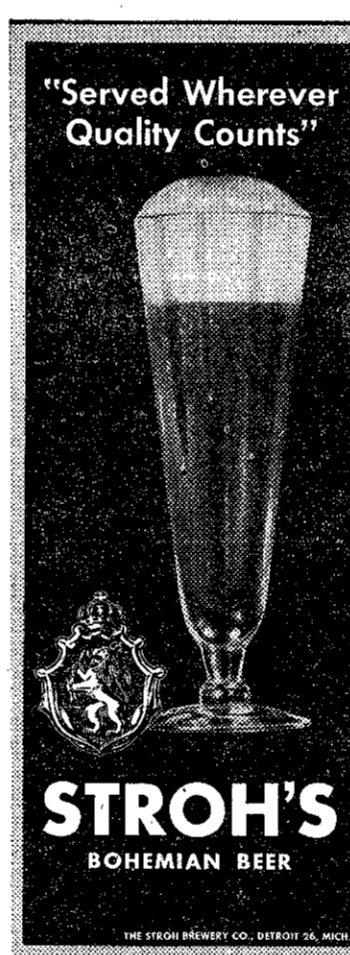

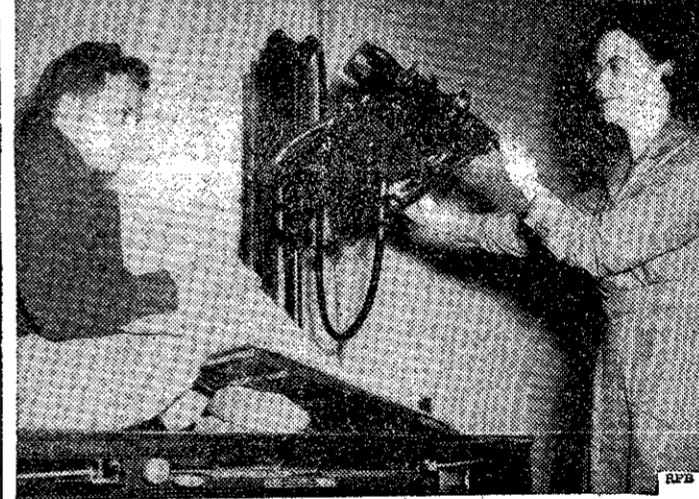

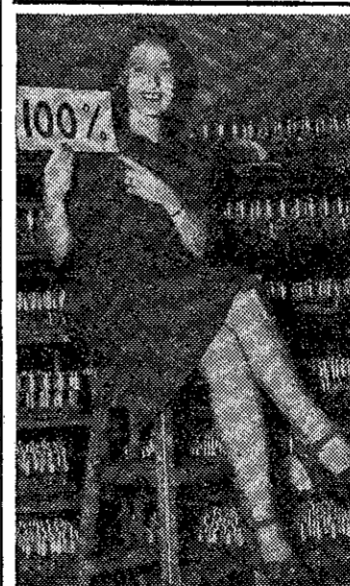

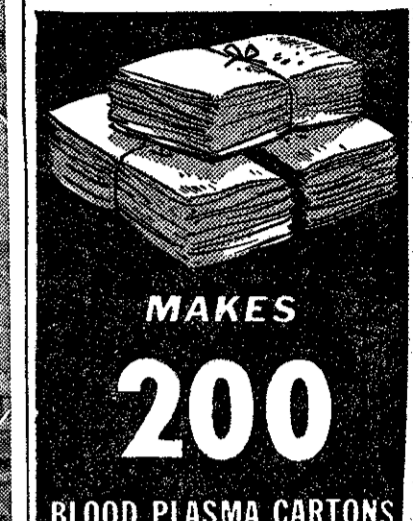

Park Sailor Arrives Home After Rescue in Philippine Sea

Rescued after his ship, the escort carrier Gambier Bay, was sunk in the famed battle off the Philippine Islands on Oct. 15, William J. Bretz, PhM3C, 1385 Lakepointe, is relaxing

at the home of his mother, Mrs. John Bretz, for the holiday season.

He tells of the harrowing experience of abandoning ship and tossing for hours in the waters off the Philippines before being rescued. The Gambier Bay, a baby flattop,

participated in a 45-minute duel with three heavy Japanese cruisers when the enemy's eight-inch guns finally found the range and began lobbing their missiles into the thin-skinned American vessel.

The men were ordered overboard and Capt. Walter V. R. Vieweg, of New York, the skipper, swam among the rafts and supervised the task of lashing them together and getting the men aboard. After a while the rafts were split into two groups and the men were ordered to lay doggo in the water for hours because a Jap battleship lay dead in the water only three miles away. The Americans were afraid that they would be rescued by the enemy if they were seen.

The Jap ship was badly damaged and by morning, it had disappeared beyond sight of the ship's crew. After some forty hours, the men were picked up by American ships, and were sent to San Francisco.

Bretz, injured in action, will receive the Purple Heart and a Presidential unit citation.

Corporation Purchases Large Number of Bonds

E. A. Rolley, vice-president of the Universal CIT Credit corporation, announced today that local goals in the Sixth War Loan Drive were brought nearer by the purchase of \$850,000 of coupon bonds, allocated to the state of Michigan by the subsidiaries of Commercial Investment Trust corporation.

Navy Men May Take 10 Months Training

The navy wants men, 17 through 26 years old, to train for combat air-crew duties, according to an announcement today by Lieut.-Comdr. Byron E. Flechtner, officer in charge of navy recruiting and induction in lower Michigan.

To qualify, candidates must have normal vision without glasses and meet other special physical requirements. They must pass written examinations covering general intelligence and certain mechanical aptitudes.

Men who qualify receive approximately 10 months' training, either as aviation radiomen, mechanics or gunners. They comprise the fighting teams of navy combat planes. On successful completion of training, they are authorized to wear the air gunner's sleeve insignia and silver wings.

Accept Enlistments for Senior, Cadet CAP Training

Squadron 633-7 of Civil Air Patrol, Army Air Forces Auxiliary, is now accepting enlistments both in the CAP cadets and in the senior CAP, according to Capt. Kelly S. Higley, squadron commander.

Age limits are from 15 through 17 for CAP cadets and from 18 up for CAP senior members.

CAP was formed a week before Pearl Harbor as a division of the OGD to mobilize the civilian pilots and planes of the country for volunteer wartime duties. From the beginning a large part of its work was of a military nature, carrying out assignments for the AAF, such as rescue, search, anti-submarine, courier, and many other types of missions. The CAP members performing these duties did so on their own time and with their own equipment.

This help was valued highly enough that in April, 1943 the entire CAP was transferred by Presidential order to the war department as an auxiliary of the AAF.

The purpose of CAP has been to get ready for missions that will be useful to the AAF. Volunteer flights and squadrons in all parts of the country have drilled, trained, and conducted practice missions to that end.

Back of these missions is the training in military procedure, aviation and civilian defense subjects which is required for all members so that flying personnel will learn military discipline and ground workers will understand the fundamentals of flying. While CAP does not itself give flight training, its courses cover more than the requirements of a private pilot's license.

Through its training program and its files of personnel, CAP has been able to furnish many specially qualified men to the armed forces; over 15,000 of its members have gone into various branches of the service as well as into flight and ground school instructor jobs and to the airlines.

CAP women members have gone into the Wac, Waves, and Waifs. The commandant of the Marine Corps women's auxiliary, Maj. Ruth Streeter, is a former CAP officer.

Squadron 633-7, CAP, is based at Wings Airport, 18 Mile and Mound road, near Utica. 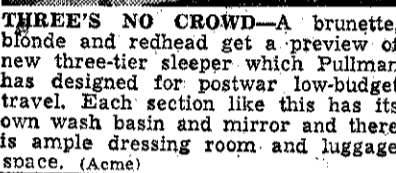

'So your daughter is a Wac! You weren't quite sure when she mentioned the Women's Army Corps to you at first, whether the army was the place for your daughter. She was so young, you thought, even though she was of age; she loved pretty clothes; she had grown up under your careful guidance—The thought of her going away for no one knew how long, wasn't what you had planned for your daughter at all.

But she is a Wac, now, and you feel completely different about it. You realize that parents of soldiers hadn't planned their sons' lives the way they were being spent, either. You know now, that being a member of such a great, vitally important organization was what your daughter needed to be before she could really live a happy life in a free land. You made this discovery the day she came home after a few months of training and work in the Wac. Her enthusiasm for her work, for her new-found friends, and for the part she was playing in the fight for a free nation's survival, convinced you. You decided that your daughter made a wise choice the day she spoke the oath of allegiance that made her one of 90,000 other American women who proudly wear the uniform of the U. S. Army.

You know since your daughter's visit, how important it is that other parents share your convictions. Your daughter told you, first hand, of the need for women in all branches of the army; as medical, dental, and X-ray technicians; as aides in hospitals for wounded soldiers; in communications and other important work on many battle fronts; as control tower operators and weather observers at air bases.

After you were told by a Wac, herself, of the need, you wished you had other daughters who could offer a few years of their lives for this great cause; daughters who would be just as typically American, just as fine in body, mind and spirit as your one; daughters who would realize their talents and efforts could be utilized to obtain and preserve world peace for future generations.

List Qualifications for Scholarships for Pointe Seniors

One or more graduating seniors from this community can have all their tuition paid at the University of Michigan for the next four years if they qualify for one of the Regents-Alumni Scholarships being offered in every accredited high school in the state.

These scholarships, first offered two years ago, are for one year but will be renewed annually for a total of four to all students who continue to do satisfactory work. Applications can be filed any time after Dec. 15 with Feb. 28 as the final deadline for mailing.

To be eligible high school boys and girls must be in the upper third of their graduating class, have shown a capacity for leadership in their school and community, have a real desire for a university education, have good health, and take a series of qualifying examinations given by the university. These latter are given in the spring at a number of places throughout the state.

Boys who will come under the draft within the first eight months after they enter the university are not eligible. Selection of the winners will be made by a scholarship committee from the university. Co-operating with it in suggesting and picking applicants will be alumni clubs or individual alumni, local teachers, and community leaders.

The school superintendent and principal have been sent full information and the necessary application blanks for all students who wish to apply.

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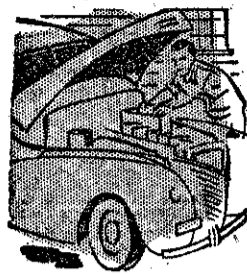
