AWVS Million Sale of War Bonds

Grosse Pointers have purchased \$9,052,719 worth of bonds and stamps through the local AWVS office on Kercheval avenue, it was announced by Mrs. Gideon A. DuRocher, chairman of the war savings division, and Marjorie Walker, chairman of the stamps and bond office. A total of \$1,421,040 were sold during the recently completed Sixth War Loan drive.

He is survived by his wife, the former Christine Morehead to whom he was married in September, 1942; brother, Donald; sister, Mrs. Doris Lamore.

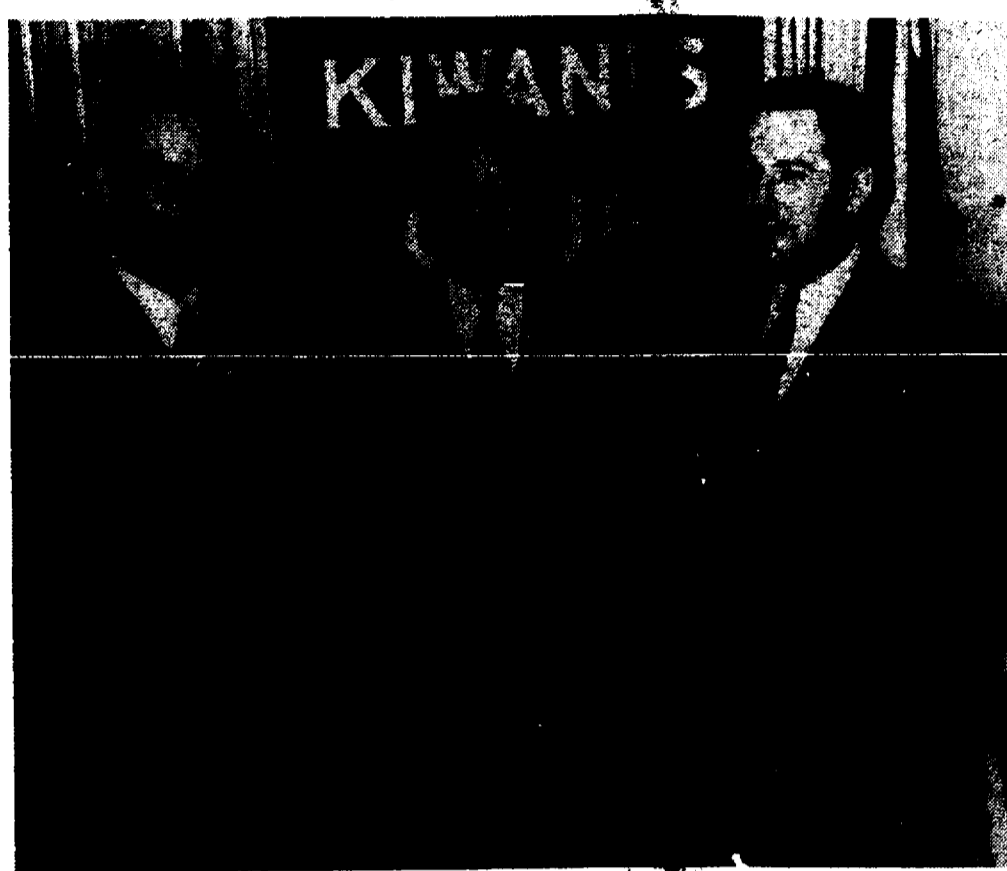
Mention Former Resident in Newscast

Lieut. Comdr. George Ghesquiere, a former resident of Grosse Pointe and a graduate of the Grosse Pointe high school in 1934, was mentioned in a newscast over WJR on Jan. 1 at 6 p.m. and commented for his leadership in the war in the Pacific.

The newscaster reported: "A group of American top-Pacific airmen have returned to the United States for a well earned rest. The flyers make up the bombing and torpedo squadrons of Navy Air Group 18; a group which destroyed or damaged 557 Jap planes, sank or imperiled 184 ships in 80 days of the hottest warfare the Pacific theatre has ever seen. These squadrons were in the thick of the second battle of the Philippines flying 'around the clock' missions for three straight days. Their aim was good; their courage unsurpassable. Bombing Squadron 18 is led by Lieut. Comdr. George C. Ghesquiere of Detroit and Alameda, Calif."

Lieutenant Commander Ghesquiere's wife resides in California; while in the Pointe, he stays with his brother, on Somerset.

Robert St. John to Appear Tuesday on Pointe Lecture Series Program

Robert St. John, NBC's famous commentator and war correspondent, will be the speaker for the Grosse Pointe community lecture series, Tuesday night, Jan. 23 at the John D. Pierce school auditorium located on Kercheval at Balfour road, at 8:30.

Mr. St. John is the author of two books, "The Land of Silent People" which has been called the best book to come out of World War II, and "It's Always Tomorrow."

Robert St. John knows what it is like to see bombs rain from the sky, how it feels to be in a troop train, the abdication of King Carol, the Rumanian earthquake, the two Iron Guard revolutions, the entrance of Nazi troops into Bucharest and then into Bulgaria, the fall of Yugoslavia, the bombing of Belgrade, the fall of Greece and Crete, the new drive in the Middle East and the arrival of the Robin Moor survivors at Cape Town in South Africa.

Robert St. John lived for months under German occupation, studied at close hand the Nazi army, had his own agents in Soviet territory. He fled from Yugoslavia in a 20-foot sardine boat, was bombed and machine-gunned in Greece and went on to Corfu in time for the blitzing of that island. Cairo was his next stop and from Egypt he flew the length of Africa to arrive in Cape Town in time to score a 24-hour beat on the rescue of the Robin Moor survivors at that port.

Britain came next on his odyssey to the war fronts. There he worked in a munitions factory, helped dig for air raid victims in the Nazi Bader-decker raid on Canterbury, went down into the mines, flew above the North Atlantic with the RAF. He spent nights in air-raid shelters in a coast city which still gets raided several times a week by the Nazis. He is intimate with scores of cabinet ministers in the refugee governments in Britain and is credited with having created the phrase, "The little People of Britain." He covered the arrival of American troops in Britain and has spent many hours since observing and reporting their activities, including the Normandy invasion for the NBC.

European Casualties Revealed to Grosse Pointe Families

Another Grosse Pointe lad to make the supreme sacrifice during World War II was revealed recently when Mrs. P. D. Fitzpatrick of 1076 Beaconsfield was notified by the war department that her son, Pfc. David B. Fitzpatrick was killed in action in Germany on Dec. 13.

Private Fitzpatrick entered service in May, 1943 and after his training, was sent to Africa where he served in the North African, Sicilian and Italian campaigns. He returned to the States the following April but upon his own request, was sent overseas for the second time.

He was a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school, class of '39. He is survived by his mother and a sister.

Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Stahl of 332 Hillcrest road, Grosse Pointe Farms, were notified that their son, Serg. Richard A. Stahl was slightly wounded for the second time while with the American forces in Germany. He received his facial wounds on Dec. 17.

Mrs. Oscar Gaeremink of 2038 Brys drive, Grosse Pointe Woods, received word that her husband, Sgt. Oscar Gaeremink, 32, received injuries to his leg on Nov. 10 in France. However, the extent of his wounds are not known. He has a 15-month old son Gerald; his father lives at 5039 Neff.

Safety Campaign Urges Caution Be Used on Icy Walks

The following is the first in a series of articles presented by the Grosse Pointe unit of AWVS as a part of the national AWVS safety campaign.

With the winter storms comes the injunction to clear your porches, steps and sidewalks from snow and ice, so that no slips or falls will occur. Over half the lives lost in home accidents in 1943 were due to falls.

In other words, out of the 32,500 who died as a result of home accidents, more than 16,200 of this number lost their lives as a result of falling.

While all these accidents were not due to ice and snow, many of them could have been avoided if care had been taken to clear away the patches of ice and if the snow either had been removed entirely, or at least a foothold path cut through it, so that walking would be made safer.

When driving, keep the vision clear, to the rear as well as front and sides. "Slacken Your Pace" too, on icy or slippery streets, is another "must" for hurrying around has caused many a needless fall or collision.

Farms Fighter Pilot Causes Destruction of 2 Enemy Planes

An Eighth Air Force Fighter Station, England. — Capt. Richard S. Spencer, Jr., 23-year-old P-51 Mustang fighter pilot of Grosse Pointe, destroyed two FW-190s in an aerial battle over Western Germany while escorting heavy bombers recently.

Captain Spencer, who leads a flight in Lieut. Col. Kyle L. Riddle's 479th Fighter Group, spotted a dozen German planes attacking a nearby group of bombers, and led his flight into the battle. Getting on the tail of one of the 190s which was harrying one of the heavies, he blasted it with a few quick bursts from his guns, saw the enemy pilot bail out, and turned on the second enemy plane which tried to elude him by going into a steep dive. Captain Spencer followed close behind, scoring his second kill of the day without firing a round of ammunition when the German pilot apparently losing control of his ship, crashed into the ground.

It was interesting to note that of the approximately 470 contributions received, averaged \$88 each.

Although the full amount of \$50,000 has not as yet been realized, the operating room has been completely equipped and has been in use for the last several weeks. All of the equipment, the most modern available, has been installed in the X-ray department. The medical laboratory is complete and functioning and the accident emergency room has been completely prepared and equipped. All those who have visited the hospital or are familiar with it have expressed their surprise at the very excellent added facilities and services that are now available to the community. When the approximately eighteen rooms (beds) have been a filed, which are a part of the present program, this hospital, whose services will be available to everyone in the community, will represent an investment of approximately thirty thousand dollars, as well as the services of a community and a professional staff, whose importance to the future well-being of all of the people in the entire area.

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Planning Commission Members Named

Pres. Ward S. Van Deusen of the Park commission announced the additional members of the village planning commission Monday night, Jan. 8. They are John R. James, 1015 Cadieux; Mrs. John Pear, 707 Trombley; Richard Courtville, 1410 Bedford; William C. Oddy, 803 Three Mile Drive; and Bruce N. Tappan, 850 Westchester.

In addition to the above members, the six village commissioners will also sit on the board. This commission has been planned to act in an advisory capacity, only, to the village commission.

The first meeting has been scheduled for Thursday, Jan. 25, at 8 p.m. in the Park municipal building.

Important Step Taken for Future of All Employees

The village of Grosse Pointe Farms has taken an important step in protecting the future of its municipal employees when it laid on the table for 30 days a retirement plan drawn up by a special pension committee appointed on Dec. 6, 1943. This constitutes an amendment to the village charter.

After 13 months work by Committees B. Dave Bushaw, William Muir, Lewis Garred, Glenn Coulter, Raymond Moore, Sidney DeBoer and Edward Goosen, the plan was submitted to the Farms board of trustees last week for their study.

In the meantime, the proposed plan will be sent to Gov. Harry F. Kelly for his approval and it will be published in The Review for study by Farms residents.

The Farms is the second of the five Pointe municipalities to provide for all its employees; the Shores took this step two years ago.

The new plan provides for all other village employees other than police men and firemen, for the latter have had their own pension system since July 11, 1938. The proposed plan follows closely many other pension plans now in operation.

On the basis of an estimated annual payroll of \$180,000, the approximate cost will be \$10,671; this includes the police and fire pension as well as the remaining municipal employees. The plan will cost more for the time being because of the ages and service records of the employees. It is expected to fluctuate between six and ten thousand dollars in the near future.

Provision has been made that at no time can the cost exceed seven per cent of the payroll.

After a petition was submitted to the board of trustees over a year ago, asking that consideration be given for a pension system for the employees, a committee was formed, made up of board members, members selected from the ranks of the employees and members selected from the village at large. In addition to this committee, A. G. Gabriel was engaged as actuarial consultant who drew up the first plan.

Trustee William F. Connelly, chairman of the committee, submitted Gabriel gave the opinion that the prior service of the employees was high, a suitable plan could be worked out. Changes in the plan were suggested, and after due consideration and discussion, and the plan was ordered re-drafted.

The final plan proposed was given the unanimous approval of the committee on Friday night, Jan. 5.

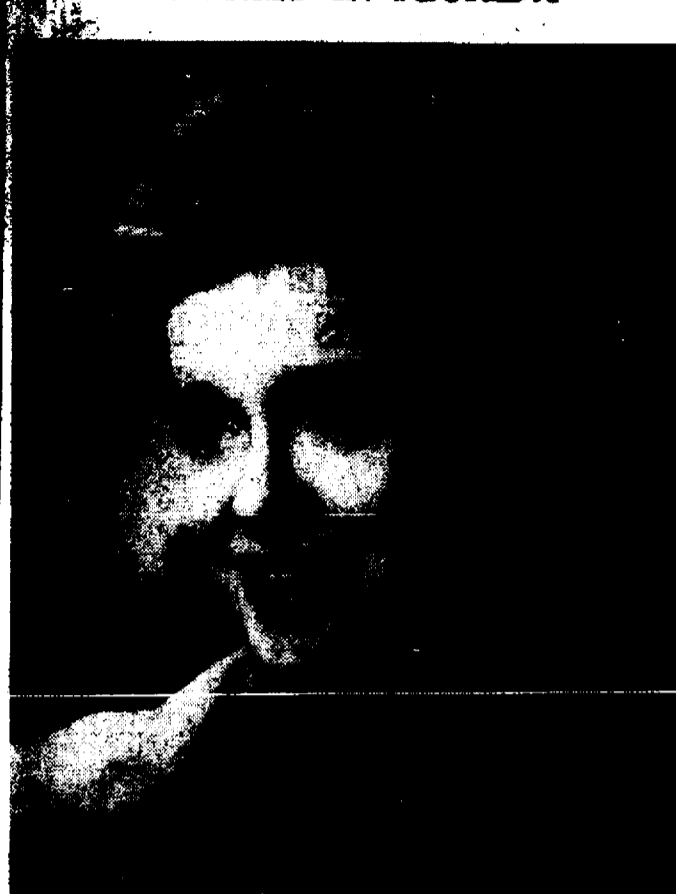

tures of the plan concern the management; it is vested in a retirement commission of five members, two from the board of trustees, two from the employees and one from the village at large.

The eligible retirement age is to be 60 years, which may be raised only in time of war or national emergency. Compulsory retirement age will be 65 years which may be extended upon written request and approval of department head and commission to 70 years or four years after the effective date of their retirement system, whichever occurs later.

The retirement benefits paid for by the village will be: A basic pension of \$100; a prior service pension equal to one-ninth of average final compensation times years of prior service; a membership service pension equal to one-hundred thirty-fifth of average final compensation times years of membership service; service limited to 30 years of either prior or membership or both combined.

The retirement benefit paid for by the employee will be an annuity which shall be the actuarial equivalent to his accumulated contribution standing to his credit at the time of retirement. The employee contribution for the annuity will be five per cent of the salary or pay for regular work which is refundable in case of separation or death.

If this plan is approved by the governor within the next 30 days, and is approved by the council at its next meeting on Feb. 19, the plan will be republished a second time, and will then be submitted to the voters of the village at the next regular general election on March 12.

Due to the sudden change in the situation on the Western Front, the rising casualty lists make the need for Wacs in the medical corps greater than ever before. Wac technicians can release soldiers already trained in medical lines for replacements overseas.

Our corps is honored by the award of the Distinguished Service Medal, third highest army decoration, to Col. Oveta Culp Hobby, director of the Women's Army Corps — for the citation is couched in these words: "The high standards of conduct and discipline, the efficiency and devotion to duty exhibited by members of the Wac, both overseas and in the U.S.A. testify to the character, ideals and leadership of Colonel Hobby."

And last, the consolidation of all military training for the Wac at the First Wac training center, at Fort Des Moines, Iowa. Recruiting in 1945 will mark the enlistment of women possessing specialized skills, together with those qualified for training and service as medical and surgical technicians in army hospitals. Every medical and surgical technician will receive specialized training in hospitals and schools after completion of basic training.

We look forward to 1945 as a year of opportunity for greater service and as an end to the war on the Western Front.

**Grosse Pointe U. of M. Club Sponsors Scholarships for Local Students**

One of the more important functions of the University of Michigan Club of Grosse Pointe township is the activity the club takes in co-operating with the university in sponsoring the award of scholarships to deserving students of this community while attending the University of Michigan. The number of applicants which it can nominate for scholarships depends on the number of members the club has. The scholarships are technically referred to as the "University of Michigan Regents-Alumni Scholarships." This program replaces the former Alumni Undergraduate Scholarship program and the University List Plan, which were established in 1931 and 1943, respectively. All of the scholarships carry a stipend equivalent to semester fees for the freshman year, with provision for renewal through the sophomore, junior and senior years if performance warrants.

Any young man or young woman graduating from a high school in Grosse Pointe township will be eligible to make application for scholarships. In determining eligibility the following, amongst others, will be given primary consideration:

- a. be in upper one-third of his graduating class,
- b. have demonstrated social awareness and a capacity for significant participation in community life,
- c. have a real desire to acquire a university education,
- d. have good health, a relatively high degree of maturity and unquestioned integrity,
- e. have financial need.

Such need will be assumed to exist if without the scholarship he going to the university would make an actual financial strain upon his family. Students desiring to make application for a scholarship will obtain the proper blanks from Walter Cleminson, Grosse Pointe high school principal. After these have been filled out and returned to Mr. Cleminson, the

Scholarship committee of the University of Michigan club of Grosse Pointe township will interview personally each candidate and make its report and recommendations to the Scholarship committee at the University of Michigan. The applications and the reports of these interviews must be completed and sent to the university before Feb. 28, 1945. Applicants should, therefore, complete their application forms as soon as possible so that the scholarship committee can make the personal interviews early in February. After the Scholarship Committee has made its report and recommendations, nominees will receive further examinations by the committee at the University of Michigan.

The University of Michigan Club of Grosse Pointe township is proud to announce that last year four students from this area nominated by the club received scholarships to the University of Michigan. Since the organization of the club 15 such scholarships have been awarded to students of this area.

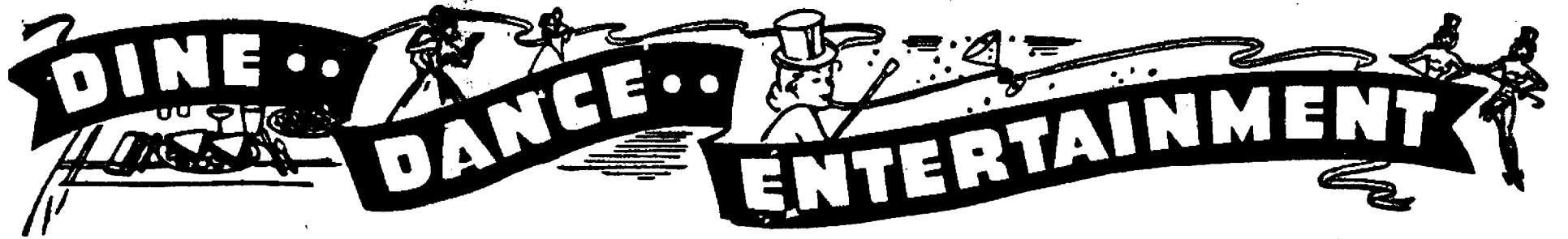

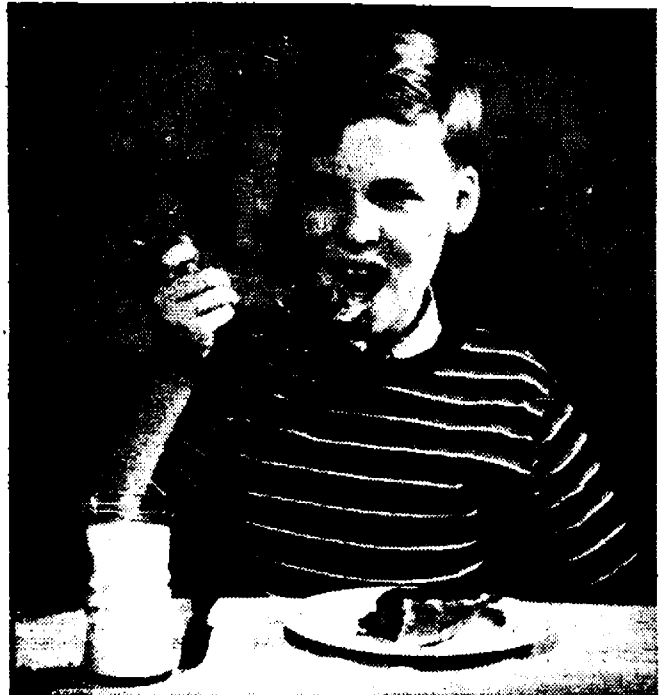

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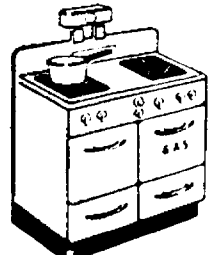
