Officials Rescind "Stop" Notice With New Order

The facilities of the Grosse Pointe branch post office located on Maumee between St. Clair and Neff, will be expanded, for post office officials in Washington announced that money orders will soon be sold there, making this a classified station.

This announcement came as a surprise to Pointers yesterday morning, because of a notice received by the superintendent on Monday saying that the branch office would be closed permanently at the close of business on Feb. 28.

When the termination notice was first made public, protests from Pointers residents were sent to post office officials and others in the Pointe, Detroit and Washington.

Postmaster Roscoe Huston of Detroit received word to disregard the "close" order from the postmaster general in Washington.

The branch will continue in its present quarters.

In November when it appeared that suitable bids for permanent quarters for the office were not forthcoming from the Pointe, and in order to keep the branch here, the City was asked to make an offer to the post office department for the rental of the present building. The council agreed to this and the offer has been under negotiation since.

The volume of business which has been carried on in this branch speaks for itself, for it shows the great number of Pointers who have been patronizing it. Records from May, 1944, through January, 31, 1945, show that stamp sales amounted to \$50,003.14; and 185,639 ordinary parcels were sent out.

The Christmas rush was beyond all expectations of the branch superintendent, Leland F. Lindlow. Stamp sales amounted to \$13,428.67 with insured parcels totaling 1,989 and ordinary parcels totaling 4,591. In general, the branch has been successful.

On Tuesday, there were 126 persons who crossed the threshold.

Schedule Two Salvage Drives in Near Future

Park Police Chief Warns of State Small Arms Law

A warning has been issued by the Grosse Pointe Park police chief, H. W. Piel, regarding the holding and purchasing of all small arms. Chief Piel said that all such arms, including pistols and revolvers must be registered with the police department of one's community.

Before any man or woman may purchase a revolver or pistol, he or she must first obtain a permit from the chief of police. The state law also specifies that no one under 21 years of age shall be allowed to possess a revolver or register one.

The provisions laid down by the law for one to be permitted to carry or possess concealed weapons are first, a request to do so must be made to the chief of police and second, a registration form must be filled out and sent to the gun board, which is made up of State police, and Wayne county authorities.

All residents of Michigan must abide by these laws regardless of any federal law, the chief concluded.

Edmund Stevens, roving correspondent for the Christian Science Monitor, will be the speaker for the Grosse Pointe Community Lecture Series, Tuesday evening, February 20th at the John D. Pierce School auditorium located on Kercheval at Balfour. Time 8:30 p.m.

Mr. Stevens topic will be "Russia, I Was There." Starting in October, 1943, Stevens has traveled all over Europe, North Africa and parts of Asia, gathering news.

He covered Hitler's and Mussolini's barbaric campaign against the Greeks, the Ethiopian campaign, the Eighth Army triumph in Africa, the Tehran and Cairo conferences, acting as interpreter for Winston Churchill, accompanied Wendell Willkie on his trip through the Near East, reported the trial and hanging of the first group of German conspirators.

The accident report shows that Hart was traveling west on Jefferson when the bus cut in front of him going east on Jefferson to make a left turn onto Fisher road. Both drivers were given tickets for reckless driving to appear in City traffic court next Monday evening.

A young boy, traveling on his bicycle east on Fisher in coming within on the main road at Mack and Manistique, was struck by an automobile, but whether he was or not is not stated.

Grosse Pointe residents, you have now been given the opportunity to dedicate your blood to a man overseas! This announcement was made this week by Mrs. Edward C. Huebner who is taking reservations for the mobile Red Cross blood bank unit which will come to St. Clare's school, Mack at Audubon, on Monday, March 5.

Arrangements have been completed so that now, for the first time in the history of the mobile unit in Grosse Pointe, blood donors can donate a pint of blood and sign his or her name to it. It may be inscribed in honor of a husband, a son, a brother or any relative or friend in the armed forces.

The package of blood plasma is sent overseas to the battle fronts with a label attached to it which reads: "The plasma contained in this package was processed from the blood of volunteer donors enrolled by the American Red Cross and symbolizes in part the blood gratefully donated by _____ (name and address) in honor of _____ (son, husband, etc.) of the U. S. armed forces."

War Department Adds White Star

The equivalent of a second Army-Navy "E" award was conferred upon Vanco Machine and Engineering on Feb. 10 by the under secretary of war, Robert P. Patterson, in behalf of the war department, when a White Star was awarded the company for maintaining the high standard of war production which won them the original award last July.

From the thousands of machine shops working on subcontracts for defense in this country, only a few are honored by being awarded the

Army Air Field, Mountain House, Idaho - Staff Sgt. Peter A. Spitaels, of Grosse Pointe Park, was one of the 10 airmen decorated this week by Col. Keith K. Compton, commanding officer of the Mountain Home Army Air Field. He received the Distinguished Flying Cross and one bronze Oak Leaf Cluster and one Air Medal with a silver Oak Leaf Cluster in lieu of five bronze Oak Leaf Clusters to his Air Medal. Sergeant Spitaels, armament gunner, was awarded the DFC with one Oak Leaf Cluster with the citation reading "A Distinguished Flying Cross is awarded by the commanding general, United States Army force-

ments, as is the case with Vanco. Yet, the additional distinction is conferred for continued production, including a period when the plant was moved from the original headquarters at 15010 Kercheval to the handsome new modernistic building at 19550 Harper avenue.

All of the operation of moving tons of heavy machinery was accomplished without interruption of any production schedule or production effort.

Full credit for receiving the additional award is ascribed by Jasper Van Oynen, sole owner of Vanco Machine and Engineering, to the loyal efforts of his many employees.

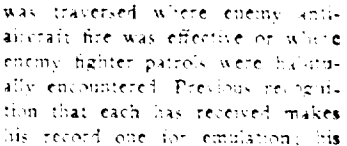

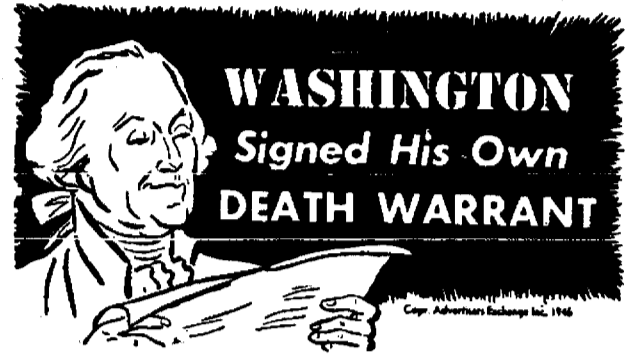

With the Fifth Army, Italy. — Pfc. James W. Burnham, of 1088 Beaconsfield, is a rifleman and member of the third battalion, 351st infantry regiment, which has been awarded a war department distinguished unit citation for a four-day battle which resulted in the capture of Laiatico during the Fifth Army drive to the Arno river last July.

Laiatico, a mountain town and key German stronghold south of the Arno river, fell to the third battalion after the 88th "Blue Devil" division unit had withstood three days of savage counterattacks before launching its own successful offensive on July 13.

Announced by Brig. Gen. Paul W. Kendall, 88th division commander, the official citation stated that "during the attack on strongly fortified German positions in the vicinity of Laiatico, the third battalion occupied an advanced position devoid of cover with both flanks exposed and for three days frustrated all enemy efforts to defend the town and surrounding strategic positions. On the fourth day, the third battalion launched a night attack and penetrated the German stronghold from the flanks and rear.

"Aggressively exploiting its breakthrough, the battalion seized a German regimental command post, after a savage hand-to-hand struggle in the darkness, and cut the main escape route from the Laiatico hill mass. As a result of the third battalion's prodigious efforts, 425 prisoners were taken, 250 Germans killed or wounded, and a large quantity of enemy weapons were captured and promptly employed with telling effect against the battered German forces.

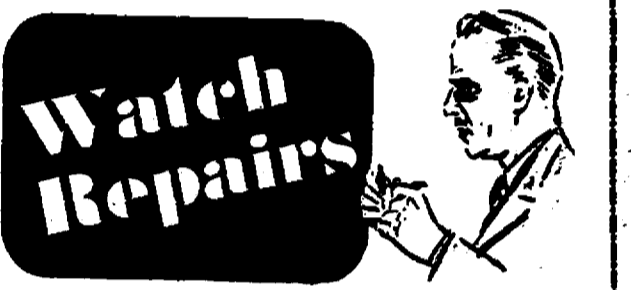

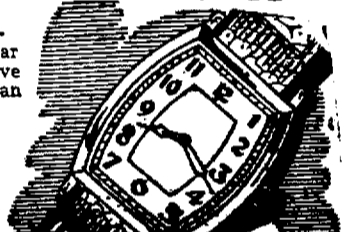

This was not a hint that the War Chest Agency wants the books kept in good condition. Subjected to continuous usage, books wear out rapidly in the prison camps. To extend the period of their usefulness the men have requested repair supplies so that prisoners skilled at bookbinding repair them.

What about little tots at the mercy of speeders on the side streets? Why so much delay on the part of the Township board, the tabling of vital issues from meeting to meeting? What is to become of Victory Park? Why so many persons running for offices that are so few?

Judging from the number of groups that have been gathering in private homes, parties and club meetings these last two weeks, it is apparent Township residents are out to obtain some answers—that they have decided the township is no longer a group of scattered homes along Harper avenue but a community that has reached big business proportions.

steps taken immediately to arrange for the building of an edifice to house the rapidly growing community. The property already purchased and secured and arrangements met with the city of Detroit to close the alley through the property and dedicate enough land for an "L" alley at the rear of the lot, opening on Manistique.

A building committee was appointed, an architect selected, plans approved and a contract signed for the erection of an edifice. On Sept. 6, 1938, excavation work was started and the corner stone was laid with appropriate ceremonies on Dec. 5, 1938. In a little less than a year from the time of breaking ground, the first services were held in the new edifice on Aug. 27, 1939.

The building is of classic design, constructed of Indiana limestone. A beautiful bent-grass lawn and a generous planting of evergreens give the church a dignified setting, fronting on Kercheval avenue.

The auditorium, seating about eight hundred, is without windows or skylights, and has indirect cove lighting and a large pendant over the center. Air conditioning makes it comfortable in both summer and winter; two deep wells supplying the necessary water for the cooling system. Heat is supplied by an automatic stoker furnace, in which the coal is passed to the firebox on a fully enclosed bin.

The organ, a gift from a member, is an Aeolian-Skinner of the three-manual type, with chimes. There are four pipe selections, swell, great choir and pedal, with about sixteen hundred pipes.

A large reading room, which is open daily to the public, occupies a rounded bay at the east end of the building, while the executive offices and the directors' room occupies a corresponding wing at the west end.

The furniture of the directors' room, the gift of a member, consists of a beautiful table of Honduras mahogany and 19 chairs heavily upholstered with maroon top-grain Spanish leather.

The Sunday school room is below the auditorium and tiered, and accommodates about five hundred pupils. An K-Y public address system makes it possible to carry Christian songs and hymns to all the corners of the building, thus making it possible to sing about the same time.

Woods Soldier Awarded Bronze Star in France

Word has recently been received in Grosse Pointe Woods of the presentation of the award of the Bronze Star medal to Staff Sgt. George P. Mamer of 1695 Roslyn road in France on Jan. 10, 1945, for heroic achievement in action.

The citation accompanying the award and issued by Brig. Gen. J. T. Pierce of the U. S. Army, read as follows:

During the night of Nov. 27, 1944, in the vicinity of Dieffenbach, France, Sergeant Mamer, communication sergeant, with two comrades, courageously drove over mine-infested roads to lay vital communication lines between Company . . . infantry regiment and the battalion headquarters. The lines were unable to be repaired because of constant enemy shelling which disrupted communication lines for a period of 14 hours.

It is especially imperative that a . . .

The enemy was known to be in the immediate vicinity of the approach, but, regardless of the dangers confronting him, he pushed relentlessly on. When Sergeant Mamer observed that the wire on hand would be insufficient to reach the objective, he, with his comrades, returned over the mine-infested roads to procure additional wire. Sergeant Mamer was on the road for over five hours, working tirelessly and fearlessly, with enemy lurking about him. Thru his untiring efforts and devotion to duty, communication was restored between Company . . . infantry regiment and the battalion, materially assisting in the success of the tactical operation.

During this assignment, Sergeant Mamer was wounded and has also received the Purple Heart, which has been forwarded to his sister, Mrs. Agnes L. Conklin of the Roslyn road address.

Evening Water Safety, Life Saving Classes Offered

A course in Water Safety and Life Saving will be offered at Grosse Pointe High School, starting Monday, February 19th, at 7:30 p.m., providing at least 15 registrations for the class are made.

This course is sponsored by the Adult Education department of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education and the American Red Cross. Frank Banach, high school swimming coach, will be in charge.

There are certain requirements for enrollment in this course, namely: (1) sixteen years of age or over, (2) standing front dive, (3) swim 22 yards, (4) dive from surface to minimum depth of six feet and swim two body lengths under water, (5) tread water one minute with hands beneath surface, (6) float motionless or rest in a floating position with minimum movement of arms and legs for one minute.

The course will require 15 hours of class work and two hours of examinations.

Upon successful completion of the course the individual will receive a Senior Life Saving Certificate and the Water Safety Certificate of the American Red Cross.

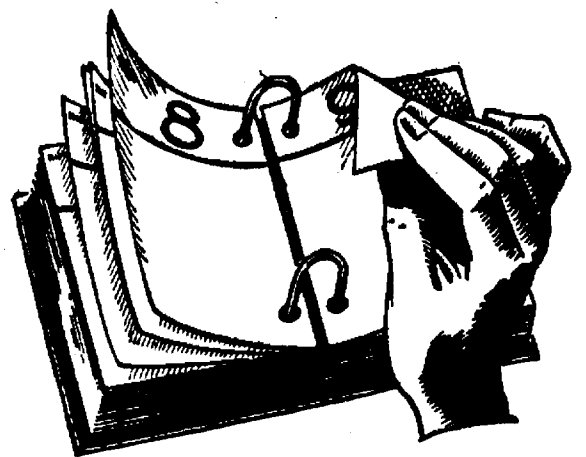

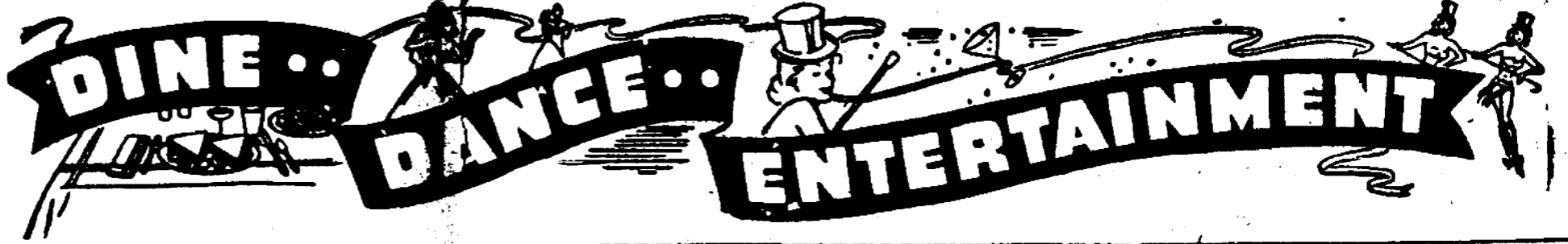
The companion feature is "Make Your Own Bed" starring Jane Wyman and Jack Carson. It is a mad,

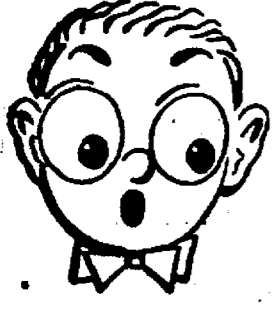

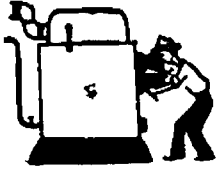
