

Enactment of the proposed WagnerMurray bill will raise the costs of the social security program to a levcl of more than 11 billion in 15 years February 28, at Newherry House on or more than the total federal budget in 1940, according to a report just published by the Tax Foundation. This would be nearly five times the ment for public education in 1940 and 4 billion more than we spent on pational defense in the fiscal year 1941. By contrast, it is estimated that the present social security program will cost about 4 million by 1960.



It has, therefore, been decided to withdraw the sevrice now provided at the present temporary station and to take no further action to establish a classified branch.

It is believed that after the war contract facilities will, in all probability, be available for this district.
