Large amounts of tin are used in the manufacture of containers for food and medicine while thousands of tons of tin go into the manufacture of guns, tanks, planes, ships, submarines and other war materials.

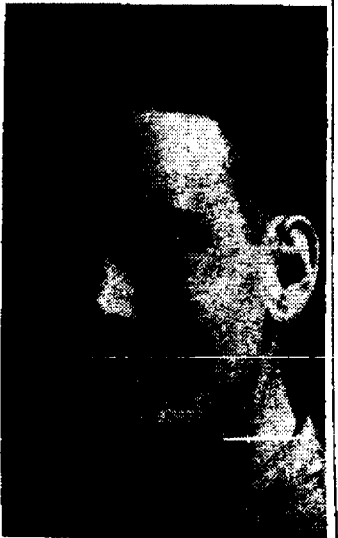

Nominations for Board of Review

The primary election will be held in Gratiot township, Monday, Feb. 19, which saw 31 residents serving seven offices, and several hundred casting their ballots.

When the votes were counted, Odilon Housteier, incumbent supervisor for the past few years, was overwhelmingly returned to office with a total of 419 votes. His closest opponent in the race was John Graham with a total of 156; the two other residents who were seeking this office were Charles O. Millard, 117 and Alfred Claire with 73 votes.

For the clerkship, the incumbent, Noreen Woodworth, scored heavily with 421 votes and was trailed by Charles V. Garber, 162; and Leona Vuchay, 144.

Michael J. Skurda Jr., is the nominee for township treasurer with 357 votes; his opponent, Lloyd Lyle, had 335 votes.

Harry Garman, 267 votes; and Edward A. Krati, 236; will fill the two posts of justice of the peace; whereas Victor Van Hulle, 272; will fill the vacancy in the justices' ranks; his closest opponent, Julian Rivard collected 259 votes.

The four new constables are Russell Campbell, 306 votes; William Livermore, 274; Robert A. West, 251; and James F. Keeney, 218. Kenneth G. Woodworth and Philip Hittenberger are the members of the board of review.

The proposal to borrow money for the erection of a township hall and the purchase of a site for it and the purchase of a new fire truck was favored 485 to 296.

In the interest of fairness, The Review has interviewed Mr. Stamman and presents below his refutation of the whispering campaign:

Rumor No. 1: It is alleged that Mr. Stamman cancelled a certain party's taxes in consideration for past favors. Mr. Stamman says "the books are open to the public for inspection, such a procedure is illegal and I certainly wouldn't wish to lay myself open to prosecution."

Rumor No. 2: It is being rumored that Mr. Stamman asked Mr. Heise to be his opponent. Mr. Stamman says "Since I am a candidate to succeed myself in this office, why should I ask someone to oppose me? I also doubt very much if Mr. Heise is running on his own initiative."

Rumor No. 3: It is also alleged that Mr. Stamman was appointed by Al Garska. Mr. Stamman points to his record, "I was appointed by the late George L. 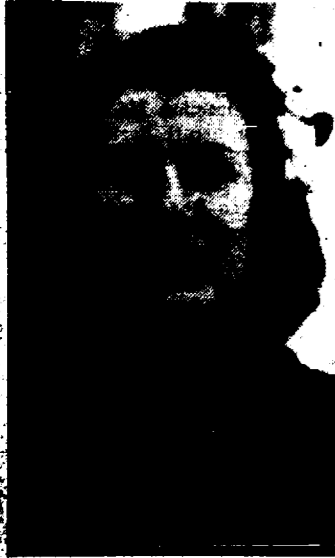
To Earn More, Buy More, Have More

PROPOSED ACT TO RAISE SOCIAL SECURITY COSTS

Enactment of the proposed Wagner-Murray bill will raise the costs of the social security program to a level of more than 11 billion in 1950 or more than the total federal budget in 1940, according to a report just published by the Tax Foundation. This would be nearly five times the amount spent by all levels of government for public education in 1940 and 4 billion more than we spent on national defense in the fiscal year 1941. By contrast, it is estimated that the present social security program will cost about 4 billion by 1960.

favor in 1904-05 when Russia was in her humiliating war with Japan. Since we have been allies in two World Wars.

Our countries are analogous in many respects, said Stevens. Both are a mixture of nations; both are expansive with plenty of natural resources and "general elbow-room"; both have become industrialized, dating with Russia from the inception of the first five-year plan in 1927.

Neither peoples of either countries understand the politics and internal conflicts of the other. Russians do not approve any more of our internal set-up than we do theirs. Strong democratic tendencies are cropping up in Russia, said the speaker. Also, there is a general return to religious worship and increased respect for marriage and divorce conventions.

Stories of the German atrocities in Poland and Russia are "the McCoy," according to the speaker, who has seen cremation plants and mass murder and burial grounds.

Russia has lost 30 million men, women and children, including the army. Six to seven million have been lost at the front. Russia is a depleted nation with such loss of the flower of her manhood, famines, etc. Home front workers including heavy contributions from the women, work a 14 hour day. Russia is tired and wants peace.

Rotary Clubs in every country are composed of men representing the principal business and professional interests in the community, as well as various religious and political beliefs. Therefore, they are in a particularly advantageous position to be of aid in wartime emergencies. Rotary Clubs are vitally interested in the problems of the post-war world, and for the last four years, Rotary has had a special international committee to study these problems.

Emphasis is now being given by Rotary Clubs to the development of plans for the economic and social readjustment of demobilized servicemen and women and unemployed war workers.

President Meyer of the local Rotary Club announced that Rotary Clubs throughout the world are celebrating Rotary's 40th anniversary this week, with emphasis on wartime service activities. He read three special service activities.

The local Rotary Club was organized on June 3, 1937 and now has 64 members. The first President of the Club was Fintan Henk.

Local Washington Officials Urged to Keep Postoffice Here

Further repercussions were heard of this week from Grosse Pointers and officials in Washington regarding the proposed closing of the Grosse Pointe branch post office, and which was later rescinded.

Some of the men who led the fight when word was first received here

that the branch would be closed wired and wrote Sens. Vandenberg and Ferguson, Representative Rabaut, as well as officials in the post office department in the capital.

In addition to residents, managers of several of the business houses in the Pointe also registered their protests.

Rep. Louis C. Rabaut, Democrat of Grosse Pointe, vigorously protested contemplated action by the postal authorities as contained in their letter of Feb. 3. The letter read as follows:

"My dear Mr. Rabaut:

This has further reference to our letter of Nov. 2, 1943, concerning the need for additional postal facilities from the Detroit, Mich., post office in the Grosse Pointe district.

In view of the fact that money order facilities have not been provided at the temporary station serving this district for the past year, and carriers would not be attached to the proposed classified branch, there appears to be no urgent need for the establishment of such a branch at the present time.

Furthermore, all departments and agencies have been requested to extend only essential service for the duration.

It has, therefore, been decided to withdraw the service now provided at the present temporary station and to take no further action to establish a classified branch.

It is believed that after the war contract facilities will, in all probability, be available for this district.

(Signed) K. P. Aldrich, First Ass't Postmaster General."

The protest by Rabaut brought forcibly to the attention of the department that any interferences with the Grosse Pointe facility would be looked upon as an abandonment of a necessary project which had merited the congressman's whole-hearted support. The congressman refused to be put in the light that he served his constituents only in a time of election, and the reinstatement by the letter from the post office department under date of Feb. 9 was a result of the protest. The letter read as follows:

"My dear Mr. Rabaut:

Please refer to our letter of Feb.

3, 1945, advising that no further action would be taken at this time to establish a classified branch of the Detroit, Mich., post office to serve the Grosse Pointe district.

After further consideration, it has been decided to establish such a branch to serve this district and, as soon as quarters are available, orders will be issued establishing the Grosse Pointe branch.

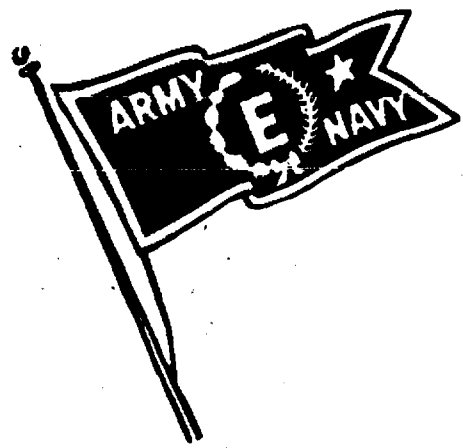
Accidents Increase in Grosse Pointe

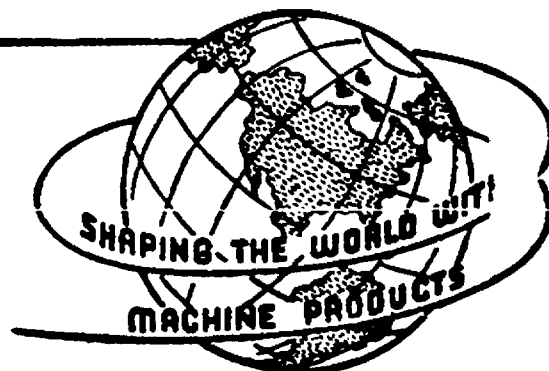

'Know Your Fire Alarm System,' Says Park Fire Chief

There are two important things every man, woman and child should know. First, the location of the nearest fire alarm box to his home and, in the case of workers, to his place of business.

The second is, how to turn in an alarm from the fire alarm box.

Knowledge of the location of the nearest fire alarm box is of growing importance in these days of warfare when most telephone systems are being used to their utmost and there is little chance of the service being expanded. Instances are more frequent of delays in making calls especially in manual systems.

The operation of a fire alarm box is really simple. It would pay everyone to stop and read the instructions which appear on the door of all boxes.

The newer boxes have a cover over the hook, which has to be pulled. This cover pulls down, thus making it possible to pull the hook, and that is all you have to do except to wait for the fire apparatus and tell the driver where the fire is.

In the older type of boxes the glass cover over the key has been removed to expedite time. On this type the key is turned, the door opened and the hook inside is pulled.

The importance of knowing how to pull a box is shown by several occurrences in the Park, where citizens admitted to the chief, who responded on a telephone call, that he had been at the box for some time, endeavoring to send in an alarm, but did not know how to operate it. These de-

lays often result in heavy losses. If you use the phone method to report a fire, dial the operator, and ask for the Grosse Pointe Park fire department. For other fire department business call Lenox 6400, 6401 and 6402.

SOCIAL SECURITY ACTS As Insurance Benefits Upon Earner's Death

"Jim and me never took a penny of public charity in our lives and I won't take it now." This statement was made to the manager of a social security board office by a tired little woman in the kitchen of her home. She was surrounded by four small children who looked as though a good meal would do them good.

"Jim was a good provider while he lived," the woman went on. "He built this house himself. I'll try to get some sewing to do. Our relatives will help. We'll get along."

Incidents of this sort are not uncommon in the working day of the staff of social security board field offices. The man explained to the widow that Jim had not only provided for his family during his lifetime, but that through his social security

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account had provided for them after his death.

"It's because we're poor you're saying this," the woman answered, still unconvinced.

"Did your husband carry life insurance?" the manager asked her.

"He did for awhile," she replied. "But he got sick one time and stopped paying the premiums."

"Didn't you know he was carrying another kind of insurance, that he was paying social security premiums every week? Didn't his boss take something out of his wages every week?"

"Oh, that," the widow declared. "Twenty-six or twenty-seven cents a week. I never could see the sense in that."

The manager explained that these weekly sums taken out of Jim's pay represented insurance premiums. Millions of American wage-earners, he said, were paying similar premiums under the federal old-age and survivors insurance system and when a wage earner died his family often was entitled to collect insurance payments. Convinced finally that this was not a form of charity, the woman produced her husband's social security card. Today this family is receiving \$56.76 a month in social security payments.

Nonstop Chicago Plane Trips Now in Operation Here

Detroit's air-travelers are offered new flight facilities, which started last Saturday, when PCA (Pennsylvania-Central Airlines) dispatched

its first nonstop trips to Chicago, and new high-speed flights from this city to Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Washington and other eastern cities, J. B. McCullough, PCA district traffic manager, stated today.

Authorization by the CAB 10 days ago for the opening of the new nonstop route to Chicago has resulted in PCA's rushing to completion the necessary arrangements for this express-type service.

With 12 flights leaving Detroit daily for Chicago, Mr. McCullough said, PCA will be able to reduce the existing air-bottleneck between these cities. Seven flights will be nonstop, the remaining five continuing to service the cities of Flint, Lansing, Grand Rapids and Muskegon en route to Chicago.

PCA's schedules to Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Washington and other eastern cities have been stepped up accordingly, Mr. McCullough reported, to expedite the great amount of essential war traffic between Detroit and these other PCA-served capitals of industry.

2,200 Vets Employed

The Fisher Body division of General Motors has employed more than 2,200 war veterans, nearly seven hundred of them former employees, on war production jobs as of Jan. 1, T. P. Archer, vice-president of General Motors and general manager of Fisher Body, disclosed today.

Archer said 13,659 hourly rated and salaried Fisher Body employees have been called up by the services since the outbreak of the war.

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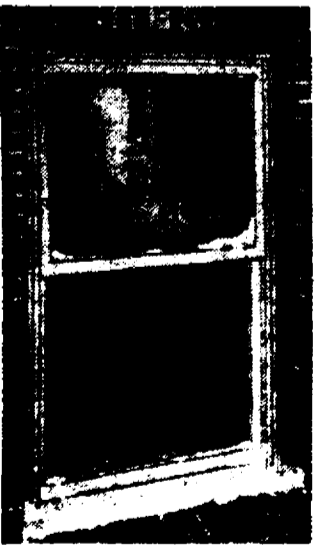
