



# UPHEAVAL SEEN IN MONDAY'S ELECTION

## Bon Secours Hospital Campaign Passes Goal

### New Men In All Councils; Park Re-elects Stamman

The annual election which was held in three Grosse Pointe villages last Monday caused an upheaval for all three village councils. In Grosse Pointe Park, three new commissioners were elected and in the Woods and Farms, one new commissioner will take office.

One of the important contests which took place resulted in returning the incumbent clerk, William G. Stamman, to his post in Grosse Pointe Park. He defeated Village Treasurer, Charles D. Heise by a vote of 1,213 to 600.

The three commissioners to take office in the Park are James Mc-

Millan, Elmer F. Ulrich and William Gillett. They defeated incumbent Paul I. Moreland and Gilbert W. Groehn.

In Grosse Pointe Farms, the upset was caused by the election of William G. Kirby, and the defeat of incumbent George L. Schlaepfer for the Board of Trustees. The total votes cast for the trustees are:

 Kirby ..... 318  
 Schlaepfer ..... 278

Those who were unopposed and the votes cast for them were: James K. Watkins, president, 459; Harry A. Furton, clerk, 466; and Francis J. Beaupre, assessor, 466.

Incumbent treasurer, Alonzo J. O'Connor was returned to office with a vote of 318 over his opponent, Traver J. Pelkey with 240 votes.

Of special interest in the Farms was the submission of an amendment to the village charter in the form of a retirement system for all the village employees. This amendment was carried by the taxpayers of the village by a total of 404 against the 80 who opposed the plan.

Pfc. Baker was reported missing the latter part of January; it is believed, since he was with the 28th Division, that he was included with

### Need Registrants For Water Safety, Life Saving Class

A course in water safety and life saving will be offered at Grosse Pointe high school beginning Monday evening, March 19th at 7:30. This course is sponsored by the Adult Education Department of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education and the American Red Cross. No charge.

There are certain requirements for enrollment in this course, namely: (1) sixteen years of age or over; (2) standing front dive; (3) swim 20 yards; (4) dive from surface to minimum depth of six feet and swim two body lengths under water; (5) tread water one minute with hands beneath surface; (6) float motionless or rest in a floating position with minimum movement of arms and legs for one minute.

The course will require 15 hours of class work and two hours of examinations.

Upon successful completion of the course the individual will receive a Senior Life Saving Certificate and the Water Safety Certificate of the American Red Cross.

### News of Wounded Pointe Soldiers Reach Parents Here

After spending less than one month in combat, Pvt. Joseph L. Verstraete, eighteen-year-old son of Mrs. Gudula Verstraete of 383 Kercheval avenue, was wounded in action on February 2 in Germany. He was with the Third Army in Germany at the time.

At the present time, Pvt. Verstraete is recovering in a hospital in England; his stay there will be two months. As far as can be determined, the extent of his injuries was a compound fracture of his right arm.

A graduate of St. Paul's high school, he entered service in August, 1944 and went overseas on January 7.

Just prior to his injury, Joseph was making arrangements to visit his mother, Mrs. Albert who was in England, but the visit was cancelled when Verstraete learned of his injury.

Another Grosse Pointe youth, the Honorable Earl J. Bernier, Jr., 1229 St. Clair, was wounded in action while with the army in Europe.

Honoring her son, 2nd Lt. Kenneth McKenzie Dewey, U. S. Army a memorial presented by the University of Michigan has been received by Mrs. Irene Beznar Dewey, 1684 Cranford Lane, Grosse Pointe. Lieutenant Dewey, who was killed in action on Saipan Island, July 12, 1944, attended the University from 1926 to 1929.

Mrs. Shirley M. Mills, 7 Woodland Place, also of Grosse Pointe, likewise received a memorial from the University honoring her husband, Lt. (jg) William Joseph Mills. Lieutenant Mills, killed in action in the Solomon Island Area, May 27, 1944, attended the University from 1935 to 1937.

The memorial says: "The University of Michigan has placed this name upon the roll of those students and alumni who, in the fine tradition of loyalty and self-sacrifice established by former generations, served their country in time of peril and have given their lives in defense of our national liberties. It will forever be held in honor. To the family and friends, who have suffered bereavement, the Regents and faculties of the university offer their deepest sympathy."

It is signed by Alexander G. Ruthven, president; and Shirley Smith, secretary.

Thus far 217 have given their lives and the University has sent these memorials to their students.

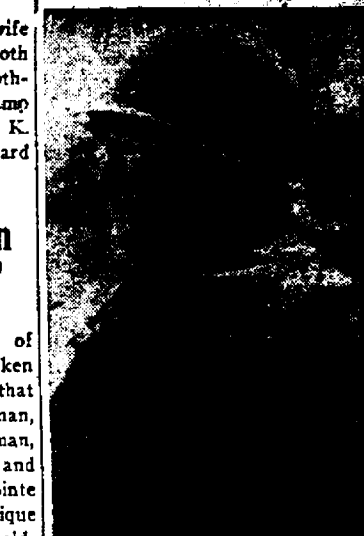
Neighborhood children have been

Pfc. Chargot was wounded in the back and has received twenty shots of penicillin.

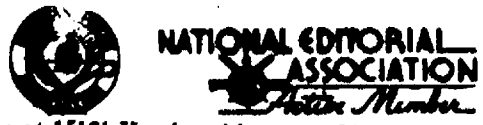
### Governor Kelly Endorses Annual Easter Seal Sale

NO DICTATORSHIP HERE

Residents of Grosse Pointe Park resented the village commission's attempt to tell them who they wanted for village clerk enough on Monday to snub that body more than two-to-one in the local election.

And, in the same action the only commissioner seeking reelection brought up the last rear place and lost his seat on the commission. Mr. Moreland was one of the five commissioners who endorsed Mr. Heise to oppose the veteran village clerk, William G. Stamman.

With all due respect to Mr. Heise and his qualifications, it has become quite evident that the Park electorate has awakened to some of the actions of the present "economy" members of the commission and didn't want to be told "how to vote." Their vote of confidence for Mr. Stamman was a direct slap in the commission's face.

Now there are three new commissioners entering office on April 1. They face the responsibility of clearing up the water raise situation in the Park and it is the hope of this publication that they press forward with vigor and dispatch. The current "economy" group seems indisposed to answer the more than quadrupled water rate raise exposed in last week's Review and evidently prefers to lay the matter in the laps of the new commission. Perhaps, also, they can persuade Village Manager Lane that the Detroit Water Board deserves a reply on misquotation of rates and that taxpayers of Grosse Pointe Park likewise are due an explanation.

The three new commissioners will inject some "young blood" into the village council body. Theirs is not an easy task, for they will be judged by a newly awakened electorate.

Unseating of a commissioner, failing to heed the dictum of the current "economy" group and the vote of confidence to the village clerk may herald a return to a more efficient and common sense management of village affairs. Let us hope.

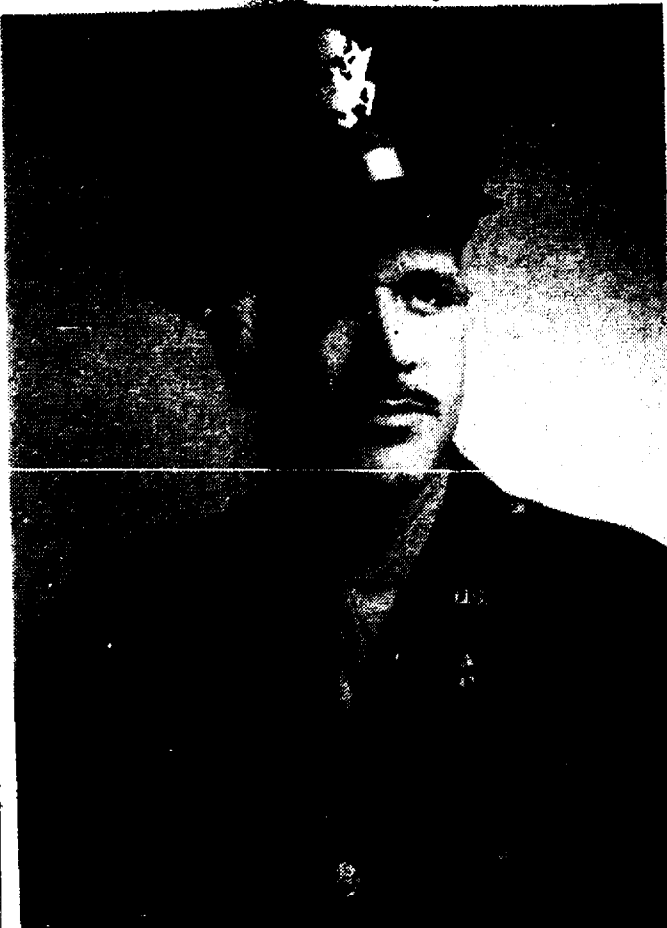

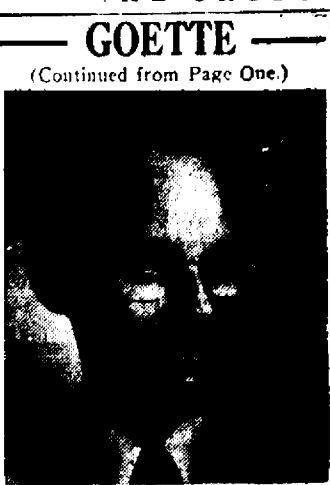

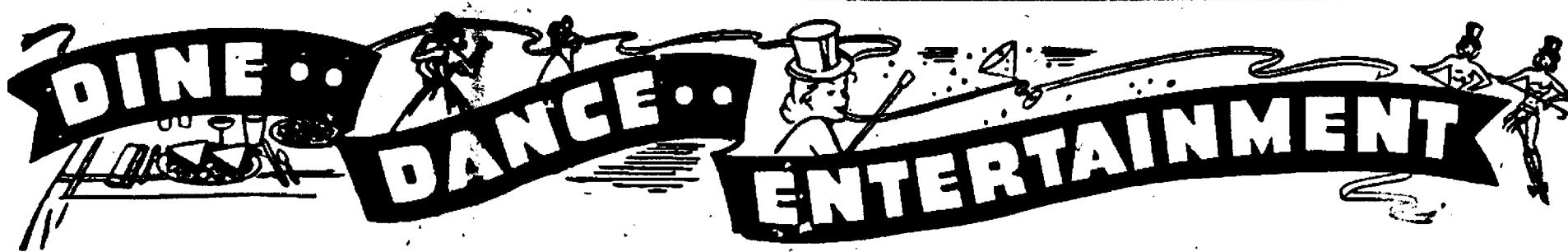
