



FARMS TO AIR HOUSING PROJECT PROTESTS

Park Village Commission Names New President

Special Meeting Scheduled For Tuesday Night

A great amount of interest has been centered in the proposed housing development by Grosse Pointe Farms residents this past week following a story which appeared in The Review regarding a communication which the village council received at their regular monthly meeting on March 19 from a real estate company.

The latter notified the council of their intention to erect a group of duplex homes, numbering approximately 70-80 dwellings, in their village. Tentative plans called for the renting of these homes for the duration.

POINTE PARAGRAPHS

The Detroit Water Board cooled off worthy Village Manager E. B. Lane last week but they didn't have to use water, though it apparently is something they have plenty of. It seems that the Village Manager started to take certain Detroit officials apart for objecting to Lane's misquoting them. We understand that they told him in no uncertain terms that they didn't appreciate it and did expect the courtesy of a reply to their letter of January 3, 1945, in which they plainly pointed out the errors in their charges for water service to Grosse Pointe Park. And, there is still no explanation.

The development would be located west of Chalonte avenue and south of Moross on property known as the Roland acreage. Many telephone calls have been received by Harry Furton, village clerk, and by Murray Smith, village engineer, protesting the erection of anything but single residents in this locality. Many residents intend to send letters of protest and others will attend the next regular meeting at which time this matter will be discussed.

Because of this wide-spread interest, village officials have planned a special meeting to be held next Tuesday evening at 8 p.m. in the village council chambers. At this time the report of the building and zoning committee will be heard and the real estate communications which was referred to them on March 19 will be explained to greater detail. The council members making up this committee are William G. Kirby and R. Gervys Gyllis. President James K. Lane's Communique Misleading—?

Three months have elapsed since the Detroit Board of Water Commissioners directed a letter to the Park Commission, demanding an explanation of the misquoted water rate charges by the City, made in a notice sent to water consumers of Grosse Pointe Park.

Nearly a month ago The Review exposed the discrepancies, naming Village Manager E. B. Lane as the author, and suggested that the taxpayers of Grosse Pointe Park were entitled to an explanation on the large increase of their quarterly bills, which many have already complained about.

Monday night, at the commission meeting, Manager Lane read his "additional facts concerning recent changes in water rates," hereinafter referred to as Lane Communique No. 2. Presumably, water consumers will soon have this treatise in their hands and know less about why they are paying more than before.

The explanation is not satisfactory, nor apparently too accurate in several respects, to-wit:

1. Reference is made to annual and anticipated expense for "extensions," meaning extension of water main service. The Review is advised that all needed water mains are laid and have been laid for years and we are reminded that the Village has certain fixed boundaries and could hardly be looking toward further expansion.

2. A 17% loss in the amount of water purchased from Detroit and the actual metered to customers has heretofore been paid from the general fund of the Village. Included in this loss, of course, we must naturally deduct the water used in the Village buildings, fire department and fire hydrants. It would hardly seem consistent with good business practices to make the utility pay the load on an expense which is a general obligation of the Village and as such should be spread on the tax rolls, instead of assumed by large water consumers in increasing proportions.

3. According to Communique No. 2, total direct expense of operating the water department in 1943-44 was \$67,489.33. Under the efficient direction of Mr. Lane, it is personally estimated by him that it will be \$71,500.00 for 1944-45, or an increased cost of \$4,000.

Communique No. 2 did not reveal that the entire salary to men and the cost and maintenance of a truck, which is for various and other purposes in the village, is entirely paid as a water department expense. This is not, it would be correct allocation of expense, nor is it quite a clean deal for water consumers to pay a heavier load in this case.

Needed flushing of water mains, referred to in Communique No. 2, while not disputed as to actual need, is an unfair expense against water consumers, large or small, because the water that properly escapes the charge, yet his expense is not paid.

It would seem that there is still much more to come in the water rate raise in Grosse Pointe Park, and, from time to time, for the benefit of water consumers in the village. The Review will continue to point out the facts in the case.

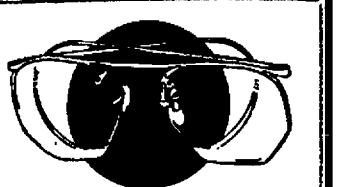

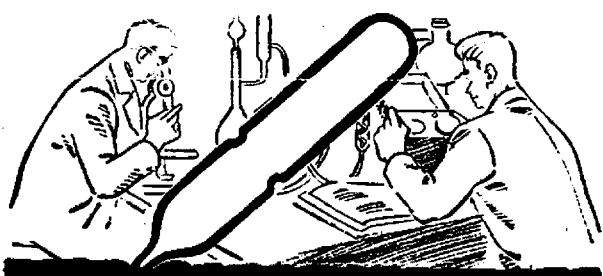

of road surfacing does not work away or deteriorate and serves as a foundation for the next application the following spring. By this method a solid road is eventually created. Also necessary maintenance to roads can be carried on without harm to the dust laying properties of this preparation. In a period of three to four years a surface comparable to a paved street is created.

The Wayne County road commission will apply this Bituminous layer and maintain the roads. The necessary action is to create special assessment districts in the township. The cost of surfacing is then spread on the tax rolls equally between the resident owner and the vacant property owner.

The investment to the average cents a foot for a strip 18-feet wide

owner would be approximately ten which would also cover cross streets and intersections. To properly present this proposal it is necessary to circulate petitions whereby township residents would show the township board they are willing to assume the cost and give the board the powers to proceed in presenting the request to the Wayne County road commission.

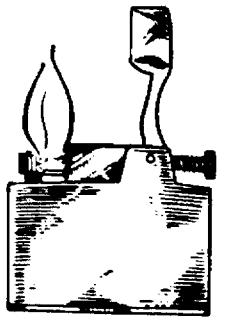

Son Sends Photo Taken After Rescue By American Forces In Philippines

Additional word has been received by William Moran, 87, of 1317 Alter road, one of Grosse Pointe's pioneers from his son, 57-year-old Lawrence Moran who was rescued by American forces from the Los Banos interment camp in the Philippines.

Included in the letter which the elder Mr. Moran received, was a photograph of Lawrence as he was pictured the day after his rescue. His weight had dropped from 186 pounds to 124 pounds during the time he was held prisoner after the fall of Manila.

The letter gives a first hand description of the method used by the Japs towards their prisoners and also gives an idea of the future business opportunities in the Philippines.

The letter follows:
Sunday, March 11, 1945
My Dear Dad:
I am now in my third week of American protection and feeling much better. The change in food and of being dragged from the Japs upset most of the internees. I am enclosing a snap taken the day after our rescue.

I was in Manila a week ago and I can assure you the damage, destruction and wanton murder committed by the Japs is beyond description. I hope to move into Manila from this camp this coming week. When you write, note the change in address.

There is a lot of industrial valuation work to be done here. My first job will be to organize field crews to do the work. After this is completed, I will come to the States to set up the pricing organization. I doubt if there will be any commercial business here for at least one year. I do not expect to go into any contracting. I will, however, reorganize my machinery business when the proper time comes.

Give my regards to all the folks My best to you and mother.
