Two letters have arrived at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Troester at 1220 Lakepointe recently from Pfc. William R. Troester, who is a prisoner of war in Germany. The first letter, received two weeks ago, was the first word which the Troester family had received

from their son since he had been reported as missing in action by the war department in Belgium on Dec. 19, 1944. He was with the 10th army. Private Troester entered service in November, 1942 and left for overseas in August, 1944; he is a graduate of Grosse Pointe high school. Dr. Norman Karpis, of the Detroit Council of Churches, will act as discussion leader. The meeting is being assisted by Mrs. Beulah Karpis, a member of Mayor Edsel Ford's interracial committee.

Seven Mile Zoning Change to Permit Large, New Hospital

A change in zoning to permit the Sisters of St. Joseph of Nazareth to build a hospital on Moross road between Mack, Linville and the city limits has been recommended by the Detroit planning commission.

The commission has recommended that this 17 acre tract, owned by the St. Joseph Hospital corporation and now vacant, be rezoned from one and two-family houses to a classification which permits hospitals.

The recommendation was made to the common council with the provision that the hospital group be required to dedicate a strip of land 30 feet wide for the extension of Kingsville avenue.

The Sisters of St. Joseph plan to build a 125 bed hospital, which will later be enlarged to 350 beds. Adequate off-street parking space is provided in the plans, the commission said, so that a hospital of that size will not cause traffic congestion in a residential neighborhood.

Although last night's attendance at the victory gardeners' class in the high school was very large, many more gardeners are urged to attend the two remaining sessions in the course. They will be held on Wednesday nights, April 11 and 18.

Because of the success which our armed forces are meeting on the world's fronts, many residents who have been cultivating their grounds to grow vegetables, have become negligent this year. The need for more family victory gardens is even greater this year than ever before, for more food is being diverted to the military and to the devastated countries. Because of this situation, the ration points on canned food has been increased.

Pool in City Park Denied Priorities

A communication was received by the City of Grosse Pointe this week from the Detroit WPB, denying them priorities for the construction of the children's wading pool in the city park.

Necessary steps are being taken to place an appeal before this board, but if the outcome is still the same, the city will proceed with a repair project and attempt to place the present pool in a healthy condition for the children.

The denial which the City received is as follows:
"Your application for authority to Form WPB-617, has been received and has been reviewed in the light of the essentiality of your project and its contribution to the over-all war effort."

"In order that the consumption of labor, materials, and equipment by construction activities shall not impede the production of combat supplies and equipment, it is essential that all construction, whether financed by government or other funds, be reduced to the absolute minimum necessary for the war effort. This applies also to construction essential for vital civilian needs."

Park Village Commission Still Has Vacancy

Although several residents of Grosse Pointe Park are under consideration to fill the vacancy in the village commission, no definite appointment has been made, according to the village president, Howard Parshall.

After the appointment has been made, approval by the commission is necessary before the oath of office can be administered.

Family, Friends, Military Personnel to Pay Tribute to the Late Lieutenant Loughlin

A posthumous military decoration ceremony as a tribute to the memory of Lieut. David Loughlin, will be held at 8:15 tomorrow night (Friday), in the Grosse Pointe high school auditorium.

Lieutenant Loughlin was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas E. Loughlin, and was graduated from Grosse Pointe high school in January, 1943.

Grosse Pointe high school is cooperating with the parents and military in being host for this ceremony. The military arrangements have been made by Capt. B. P. McAtee, who will serve as adjutant and read the citation: Lieut. Col. David S. Strickland will present the awards and give a brief address; and Maj. W. C. Langendorf will serve as military escort. (All military personnel are from the Air Technical Service Command of the AAF.) Dr. Paul L. Essert, superintendent of schools, will preside at the short ceremony.

Lieut. David "Casey" Loughlin was inducted into the army air forces in December, 1942. He became a lieutenant in September, 1943 and went overseas in April, 1944, as a pilot of a B-17 Flying Fortress which he nicknamed "Casey's Strawberry Blonde." June 10, 1944 was the day when he flew his first

Relating one of the finer experiences which have come out of this war, Staff Sgt. John Hume Jr., in a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Hume of 1105 Maryland, told of a visit which he was able to make to Buckingham palace in London, while he was stationed in the south of England.

In a letter dated Feb. 25, Sergeant Hume says: "You will be delighted to hear that I had an invitation from your friend, Mrs. Ferguson, to visit her at 'The Palace.' Naturally I was anxious to meet her, so on Saturday, precisely at two o'clock, I presented myself at the gates of the palace and was taken by escort to the apartment of Mrs. Ferguson where I was ushered into her dressing room and received a most cordial welcome."

Gas Coupons Stolen

Park police were told Friday by Mrs. Gordon Heyler that gasoline coupons were stolen from her car while parked at her home at 806 Lincoln Friday.

For the first time since the boat dock and harbor was built as a municipal project, Grosse Pointe Farms will levy a dockage fee for all boat owners. This decision was made Tuesday night by the village trustees and will become a law by passage of a village ordinance.

Objection was made to the provision of a dockage fee by a large group of residents and boat owners who registered their protest with the village trustees. It was explained to them by Trustee B. Dave Bushaw that, as head of the park and pier committee, he drew up the new ordinance and inserted the stipulation for a fee, not for revenue purposes, but only as a regulatory measure.

It was explained to the assembly by President James Watkins that the feeling was that because of the great number of boat owners who are unable to obtain space on the dock (the dock accommodates 100 boats), those who have been and are obtaining space should be charged for this privilege.

Boat Owners Object to Mooring Space Fee at Farms Pier

Many on the floor answered by stating that because it is a municipally owned dock, the taxpayers should not be charged further.

In addition to the proposed fee, the boat owners also objected to the granting of priorities for boat space. After some discussion, it was decided that those who had space in 1944 would be given first priority for this season; a drawing from excessive applications will be made if and when an empty boat space occurs.

The new ordinance and regulations will take effect April 24.

Hillier, 1,318, constables.

Four sticker candidates were placed beside Schweikart's name with one vote each; they are R. L. Mason, Peter Clark, Karl Goddard and Bert LaBelle. Paul Moreland and Charles Cox received one vote for clerk and Kenneth Cunningham, one vote for treasurer.

Ben Behrmann received 33 votes for constable as a sticker candidate; 17 other names also appeared as stickers for this office.

Lichtwardt, of 1043 Beaconsfield, in recognition of individual action in the division's fighting on the southern end of the French front. The award was among those made during the past month.

The award singled out the part these men played in four months of the division's fight through the Vosges Mountains and the Alsatian-France sectors of the western front.

The 100th is the American division which has broken all previous records for time spent in the front lines during its first trip into combat. It is now celebrating its 135th consecutive day in contact with the enemy since it first reached the Seventh Army front in early November as a "green" division. Several other older organizations have piled up signalizing bravery and ability in combat.

Garden Council Issues Helpful Hints To Gardeners

This new garden calendar is a special service designed by your victory Garden Committee, of the Michigan Office of Civilian Defense, to remind you of the things to be done in your Victory Garden.

To avoid as much trouble with insects as possible, clean up the garden and destroy all weeds in a area extending at least 10 feet in each direction from the garden. It is best to plow or spade them under deeply. If this can't be done, cut them off or burn them over.

Be sure that all corn stalks are burned or plowed under to destroy corn borers which live over winter in them.

Buy your commercial fertilizer, 3 pounds per 100 square feet of garden, so you will have it on hand just before discing or spading. The phosphorus in the fertilizer needs to be worked down to where the roots can get at it. (Gardens used last summer for vegetables should be fertilized.

Either well rotted manure, compost, or your well rotted leaf pile will be particularly valuable to improve and feed your Victory Garden. It will add humus to the ground, making clay soils friable and giving body to sandy soils. Leaf mold is not a complete fertilizer and a commercial product should be used with it.)

Don't get overly enthusiastic and spade or plow clay soils when they're too wet. If you do, you'll have hard clods to fight all summer.

Don't apply lime to your garden soil unless you are sure the soil is acid. The only way to be really sure is to test it and the simplest way to test it is with Soiltest available from your County Agent.

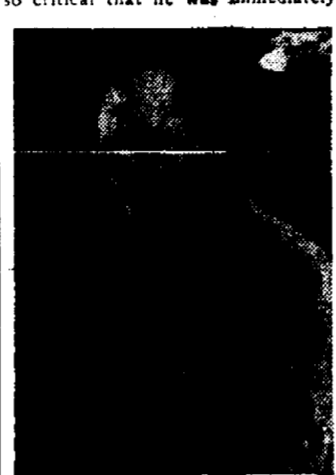

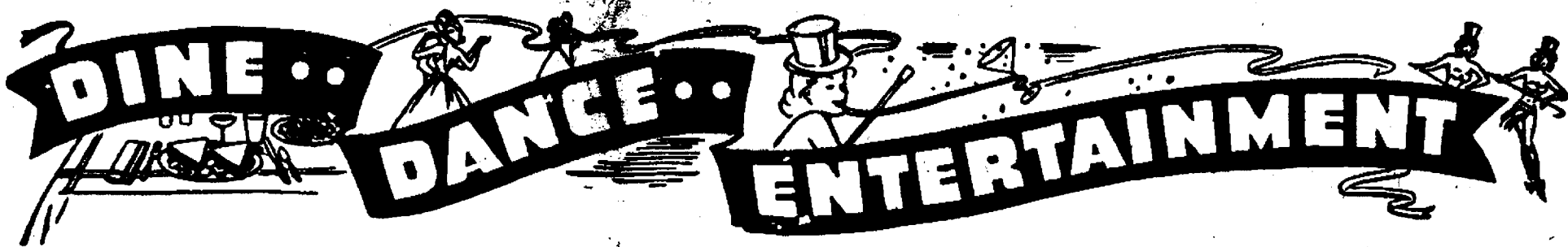
