### Father Presented With Air Medal for Missing Son

Presentation of AAF decorations was made yesterday at Selfridge Field, Mich., to 12 recipients of the Air Medal for missing in action.

Pursuant to general order 4321, headquarters of the 15th Air Force, the Air Medal was awarded to Second Lieut. George C. Phelps Jr., for meritorious achievement in aerial flight while participating in sustained operational activities against the enemy from Sept. 17 to Oct. 13, 1944.

The presentation of the Air Medal was made to George C. Phelps Sr., father of Lieutenant Phelps for the loss of his son.

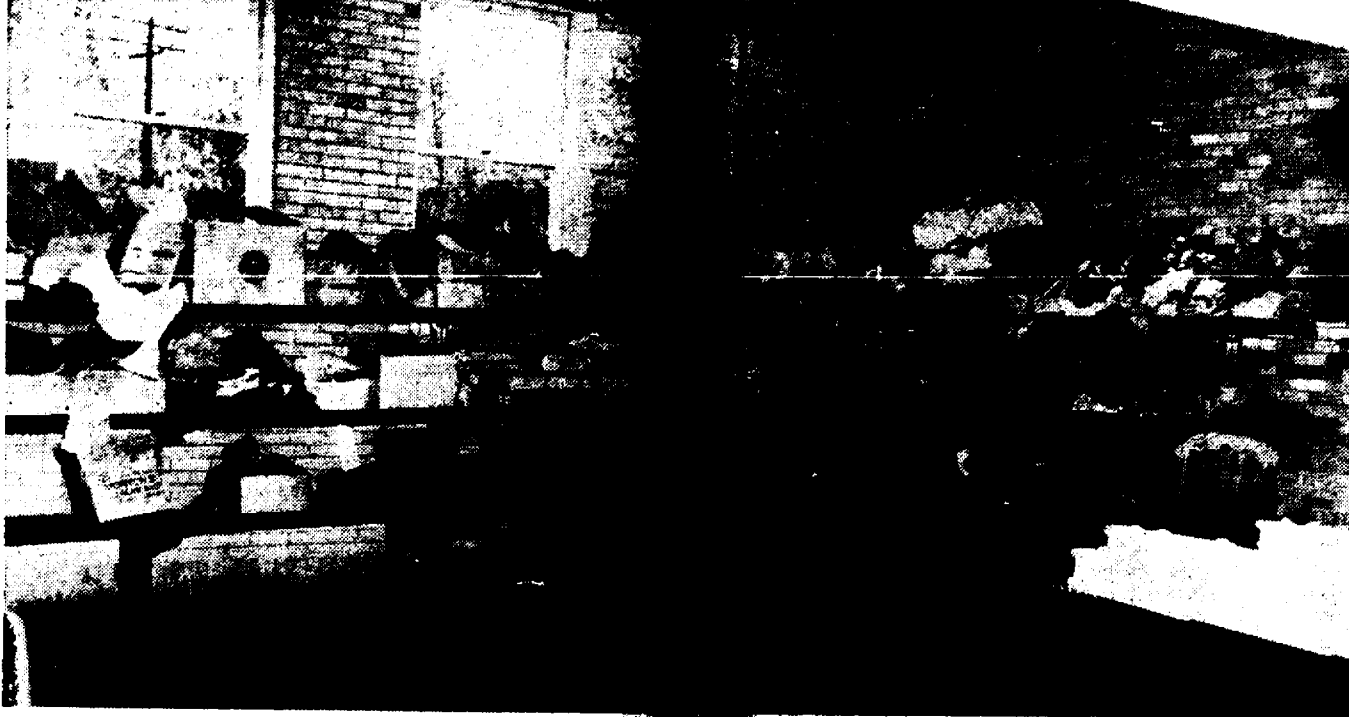

### City Trucks Travel 94 Miles to Farm for Garbage Disposal

Renewed cries for an incinerator in Grosse Pointe were heard at the City council meeting Monday night when it was learned that City trucks carrying garbage from City homes travel a 94-mile round trip, to a pig farm for disposal.

Washington WPB authorities have approved priorities for this truck if the name and model is submitted to them for the purchase.

After some discussion by the council members, it was agreed that the matter be tabled for 30 days' study.

### City Offers Lease to Post Office for Present Quarters

A lease, retroactive to Nov. 1, 1944, will be drawn up by the City of Grosse Pointe attorney and offered to the U. S. post office department for the leasing of the City-owned building which has been used by the department for over 15 months.

The building is located on Maumee between St. Clair and Neff.

The post office department will pay \$100 a month; this will include heat and light but not janitor service.

Negotiations have been under way for several months by the City and the post office department to close the deal whereby the Pointe will have a permanent post office. A letter confirming the offer of the building for the \$100 rental fee was sent to post office officials, but it was not until this week when definite plans were made, after the City was notified that a lease was desired.

### Seeks Permission to Operate Taxicabs

Although permission was granted by the City council Monday night for the operation of a taxicab company in Grosse Pointe, final approval by the ODT must still be obtained before James Webb, proprietor of a service station at St. Clair and Kercheval, will send an initial fleet of four cabs into service here.

When seeking permission from the council, Mr. Webb explained that if allowed to operate, the cabs would stand on his own property and would be on call 24 hours a day. The cabs would not be limited to Grosse Pointe, he further explained, and the fares to be charged will be the same as those charged by Detroit cab companies.

It was agreed that permission be granted subject to the approval of the City attorney after a study of existing ordinances is made.

### Farms Residents See Need for Local Citizens' Committee

Several Grosse Pointe Farms residents have taken it upon themselves to begin forming an organization in their village which will ultimately become a citizens' protective association made up of home owners and taxpayers of the Farms.

Organizational meetings are scheduled by the group with representation from all parts of the village. It is hoped by these men that after the organization has been set up, officers elected and committees named, a drive will be carried on throughout the village so that all residents will become members.

### Engineer Explains WPB Denial for Wading Pool Repairs

Mason L. Brown, consulting engineer for the City of Grosse Pointe, explained to the City council Monday night that because of a basic order with the WPB, their request for priorities for the rebuilding of the children's wading pool in the City park was denied.

When the rejection reached Mr. Brown, he at once sought to ascertain the reasons, because as he explained, the construction work to be done was not new construction but repairs to an old project for the safety and health of the children. Representatives of the WPB said that their orders read that any municipality under 20,000 population, such as the City does not warrant such construction.

Although 14 bids have been received by the City from contractors who have the time, materials and manpower necessary, the fact remains that such bids cannot be accepted.

An appeal has been filed with the WPB, but Mr. Brown said that if this appeal is denied, a substitute request will be made so that the repairs can be made as soon as possible.

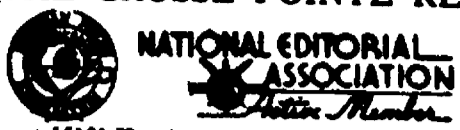

# SERVICE PARADE

Mr. and Mrs. William A. Hoefflein of 1423 Wayburn avenue, recently received a letter from their son, T. Sgt. Robert J. Hoefflein, saying that he received a surprise when his brother, Pfc. William A., Jr., came to visit him at his camp. Bill had been trying to locate Bob ever since October, 1944, when he arrived in France. He was issued a 48-hour pass and hitch-hiked to Bob's camp. They spent March 8 and 9 together after being separated since February, 1944, when they met in England.

Technical Sergeant Robert has been overseas for 33 months out of his four years of service in the ordnance department of the air corps and Private William has been overseas for 15 months of his 30 month's service in the ground crew of the AAF.

The two boys have another brother, Staff Sergeant Edward, who has over four years of service in the quartermaster corps and is located at the AAF in Venice, Fla.

8th Army Group, Germany—Target for the 155-mm. howitzers of the 182nd Field Artillery Battalion, a

medium artillery unit supporting U. S. Seventh Army troops in General Jacob L. Devers' 6th Army Group, was the main fortress of the Maginot Line west of Biche. These howitzers fired 73-armor-piercing shells, scoring 26 direct hits on the face of the fort and 19 on the top.

This was but one incident in the 182nd's mission of paving the way for infantry advance. During night months of varied combat operations in France, the battalion has expended over 50,000 rounds of ammunition, marking up such rapid-fire records as six rounds fired by one howitzer in 46 seconds.

When strong Germany infantry and armored forces attacked a Northern Vosges sector near Silzheim, these howitzers fired 3,982 shells in a week. After slight gains, the enemy was repulsed and pushed back on German soil.

Formerly a Michigan National Guard unit from Detroit, the 182nd was activated on April 7, 1941, landed in England in April, 1944, and came into Normandy on July 25. It participated in the breakthrough to the Seine and later in the thrust to the Rhine.

He was inducted into the radio division of the navy with the last contingent to leave the Pointe on March 28.

"Great Lakes, Ill.

"Dear Mother and Dad:

"Yesterday, on the 30th, everybody in company 448 took their physical. We started out in the morning and all day long we just 'hurry up and wait,' until we were done. When I came up for my eye test, I was held over for further testing; it appears that my eyes are correctable to 20-20, so I was assigned for 'special duty.' I'm not quite sure what that means, but I do know that I will receive the same boot and radio training as the rest of the boys.

"There was a boy from Jackson, Michigan—a real swell fellow, my own age, who I had been chumming around with, and who was in the same predicament that I was in; only one of his eyes wasn't correctable and he will get a medical discharge soon. Believe me, I felt sorry for him and I will miss his companionship.

"After I finally passed my physical, I was given my issue of clothing. This is quite a business. First, they give you a big white sack, about 5 1/2-feet long and about 2-ft. in diameter. Then, of course, after many frequent and prolonged waiting periods, we were told to pass down in front of a long counter—as you walk along, they literally throw your clothes at you. Then you try them on, in an equally fast manner,

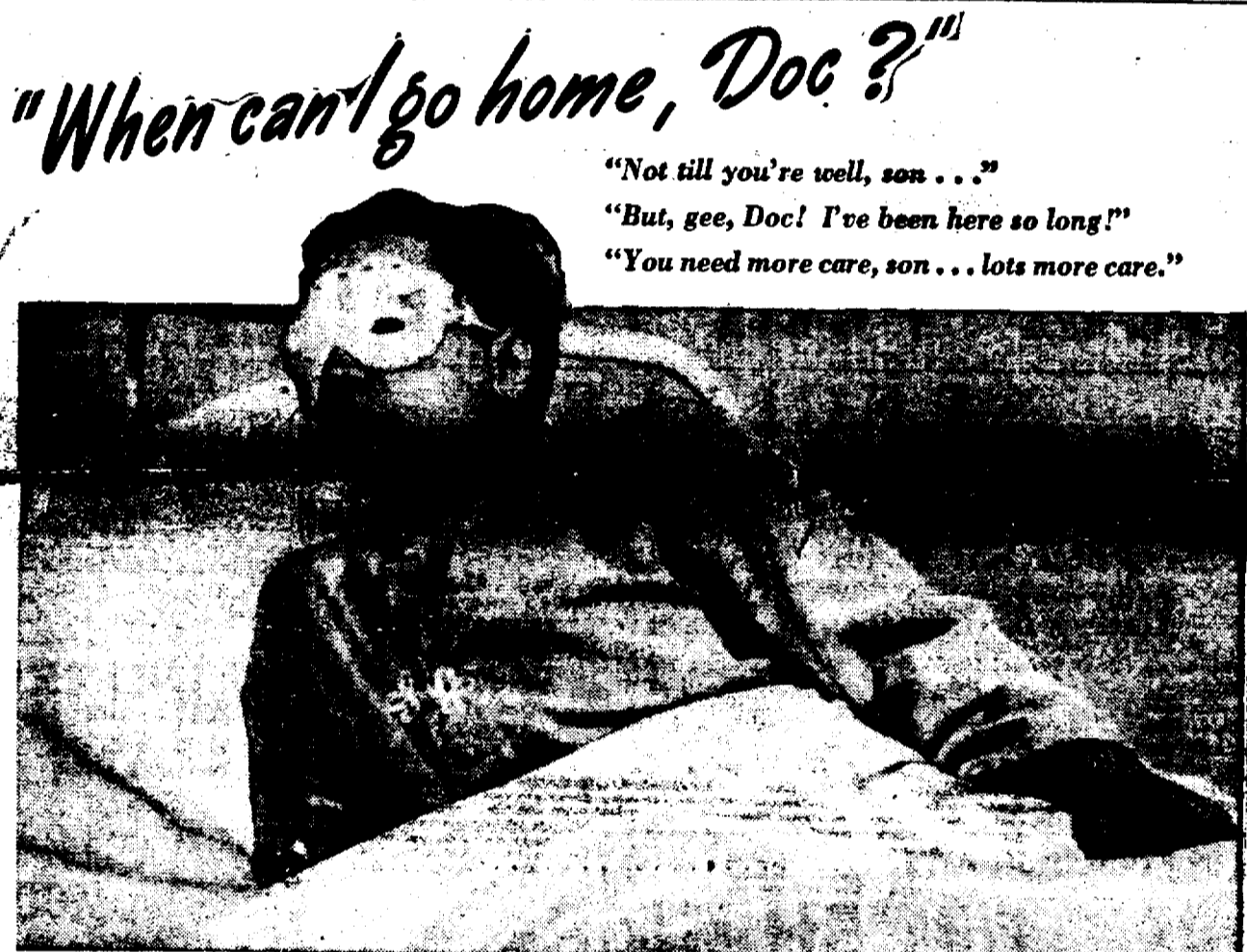

### Aged Parent Gets Benefits From Deceased Son

A generous but fantastic idea be-

came fact in one of the social security board field offices recently. An elderly woman escorted by a white-haired man came in and asked to see the manager alone for a few minutes.

"That old gentleman is an old friend," she said. "He's over seventy, but for the past 12 years he has been living with my husband and me on our farm, 50 miles from here. Every month, his son who worked in a

shipyard on the east coast, sent him a small check which covered his board and personal expenses. Last month we received a telegram telling us of the death of the son. The old man is heartbroken. But besides the personal loss, he is now completely penniless.

The woman hesitated a moment. "We think a great deal of that man," she went on. "We want to keep him with us until the end of his days. But he won't stay if he thinks we're offering him charity. I don't know what he'll do. Will you help us in a plan that, well, isn't quite honest? Will you tell him his son left him some social security? Tell him social security will pay his board?"

The idea was fantastic, of course, but the manager realized there might be some facts to make it less so. He asked several questions and discovered that the son's wife had died the year before and that there were no children. As an aged parent who had been completely supported by his son, the old man was entitled to survivors insurance payments.

An inquiry sent to Baltimore, where the social security wage records are kept, brought the information needed about the son's social security account. With the information, the field office figured that the old man would receive payments of \$20.62 a month for the rest of his life. A social security card, sent to his father with other personal effects of his son, was the clue which led to the board's office. In itself, this case is not unusual. Thousands of aged parents are today receiving monthly payments on the social security accounts of deceased children who had wholly supported them. But what made the incident outstanding was the human kindness which prompted this generous woman to come to the office of the social security board for help.

### New Air-Speed Indicator Protects AAF Fighter Pilots

Wright Field, Ohio—The Army Air Forces standardized a new air-speed indicator for fighter planes which is equipped with two hands to indicate the safe airspeed for a plane as well as the actual flying rate.

The new indicator, or "movable red line," designed and developed by Air Tech Service Command technicians will replace the standard indicator which has a fixed red line.

At high altitudes, a phenomenon of compressibility, a phenomenon which occurs when a plane approaches the speed of sound. Compressibility marks the points at which the air surrounding a plane stops behaving normally and burbles down on the plane's surface with enormous pressure. Unless a plane slows up when it encounters this phenomenon the wings and tail may snap off, or it may dive to a crash with controls frozen.

Since the speed of sound differs at various altitudes, designers found that the stationary red line, indicating safe speed at altitudes near sea level, did not serve as a safeguard at higher levels.

The new indicator has two hands, one which is red always indicates safe airspeed. The other is the conventional yellow air speed pointer. Thus a pilot needs only a glance to see that speed registered by the yellow hand never exceeds that indicated by the red.

### Matches Are Cause Of Many Home Fires, Says Chief

"The kitchen is usually thought of as a cozy, friendly, gathering spot for the family, but actually it is one of the most fire hazardous places in the home," according to Fire Chief Edward L. Rector, of the Park.

"Think how many times women use matches in the kitchen," the Chief said. "Carelessness with matches starts thousands of fires every year. And then, during cooking, if the stove is greasy, a fire can start very easily. Frilly curtains left hanging loose so they can blow into the flames of the stove also cause many kitchen fires."

"Ironing is often done in the kitchen," the Chief continued. "About 40 fires a day are started in the United States when housewives leave irons connected while they go to the telephone or at the door. Many housewives dry clean clothes in the kitchen, too. Every year about a thousand people are hurt, and some are killed, in fires or explosions that were caused by flammable cleaning fluids."

To eliminate these causes of kitchen fires, the Chief urged all housewives to observe the following precautions:

1. Handle matches with care. Use only one paper book matches. Keep matches in their original container away from heat and light. Do not use matches in a glass.
2. Keep your kitchen stove free

of grease. It's not only cleaner but safer. If the kitchen stove is near a window, either fasten the curtains back so they can't blow into the gas flame or use window-tight curtains. If your kitchen fire extinguisher is near the stove (and the extinguisher ought to be of a type that is approved by the Underwriters' Laboratories) move it so that you won't have to "go through fire" to get at it. A good place is near a door.

3. Always disconnect the electric iron or any other electrical appliance before answering the telephone or the doorbell. Keep electrical equipment in good condition. 6. Never use a flammable liquid for dry cleaning. It's cheaper and safer to send clothes to the cleaner. If you just want to remove a few spots, use a cleaning fluid that won't burn.

"Get rid of the fire hazards in your kitchen this month," concluded the Chief, "and then keep it fire-safe the rest of the year."

### PCA Establishes Record This Week!

In recording the two-millionth passenger to be flown by PCA (Pennsylvania-Central Airlines) since its founding nearly 18 years ago, PCA this week became the fifth airline to pass that milestone in aviation progress, J. J. Donovan, PCA Vice-President, announced.

Serving eastern and southern America, PCA now carries as many passengers in six months as it did during the first ten years of its existence. Mr. Donovan reported. Last year The Capital Airline carried nearly a half-million passengers, which was as many as all domestic airlines flew in a year, only a decade ago.

At the rate travelers are boarding PCA planes currently, the airline is carrying as many passengers per month as it did during the entire year of 1935, at which time PCA was an eight-year-old veteran in this

new industry. In 1930 the airline that now carries nearly a half-million passengers a year carried but 710 air-travelers. The totals of the first ten years of the company's operation show that but 235,000 passengers flew aboard PCA planes.

### Mason Children Study World of Today in Classes

### Coal Users Urged to File Declaration Statements Now

As coal and coke users throughout this area began filing consumer declarations and placing orders for their supplies for the next 12 months, Edward C. Crowley, area distribution manager for the Solid Fuels Administration for War, emphasized the advantages which result from filling out their forms immediately.

"Those consumers of residential types of coal, coke and other solid fuels who fill out their declarations and put them, along with specific orders, in the hands of their dealers between April 1 and May 15 will be entitled to special preferential treatment," Mr. Crowley declared.

"The new regulations which went into effect April 1," he explained, "require dealers to deliver at least 30 per cent of a full normal year's supply before Oct. 1 to customers who file their declarations plus their orders between those dates. They

must be willing, however, to accept the kinds of usable solid fuel which dealers can supply.

"The coal in a consumer's bin at the time he files his declaration is just so much 'velvet,'" the Solid Fuels official said, "since, unless he consumes 25 tons or more, it will not be counted as a part of the year's allotment. Under no circumstances, though," he added, "can more than 80 per cent of a normal year's supply be delivered after April 1. In other words, householders must make four tons do the work of five. And every pound that is burned from now on comes out of the amount available for next winter."

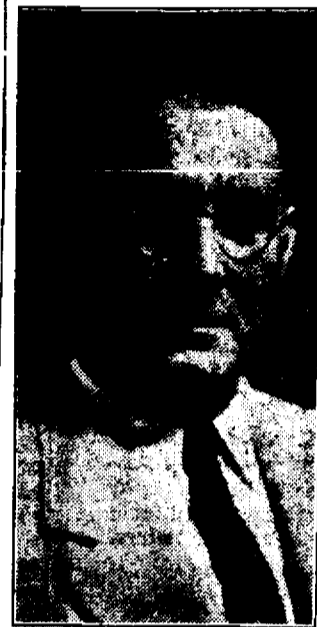

The committee announced that Walter W. Snider, installer at Wayne, will receive the Vail Medal and a cash award while Jesse R. Peters, district plant engineer, and Douglas G. Shoppert, plant field engineer, both of Pontiac, will be given special citations.

Snider was credited with saving the life of 3-year-old Sandra Tripp, who suffered severe burns from a bonfire last April 18. When her clothing caught fire, Snider hurried down a pole where he was at work, smothered the flames, and rushed the child to the home of her mother, Mrs. George Tripp, where a doctor was called.

Peters and Shoppert rescued Barney Soule, Utica war worker, from his burning automobile near that community, January 18, 1944. While driving to Mt. Clemens, the telephone men noticed the burning car and found Soule unconscious in the back seat. He had dropped a lighted cigarette upon going to sleep after working all night.

Snider's award is the 70th in Michigan since the Vail Medal plan was instituted 25 years ago.

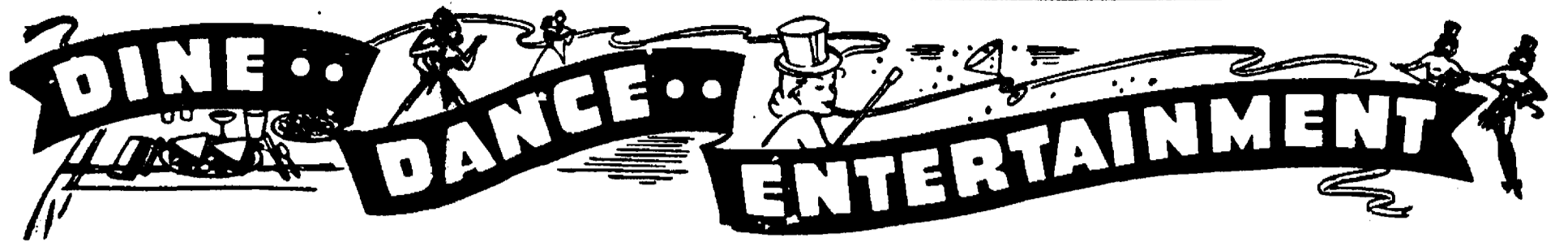

Backed by Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions Clubs and with participation by AFL, CIO and about 50 war relief organizations, the drive is being held locally under a general committee headed by **W. J. Brown**, chairman of the Detroit 1945-46 United National Clothing Collection.

Contributors may leave bundles of clothing at the collection station or drop box near their homes.

The types of garments needed include men's and boys' coats, suits, underwear and shoes; women's dresses, coats, underwear and shoes, and the same items of clothing for girls. Women's hats, tuxedos, evening dresses and dress suits cannot be used. Brown pointed out.

Contributors are asked to give only serviceable clothing and to see that cotton and other washable materials are washed. Wooleens should be in good repair and shoes should be tied securely together in pairs.

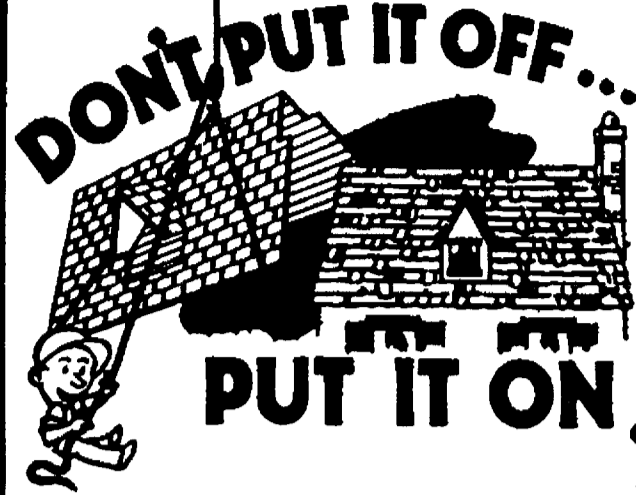
