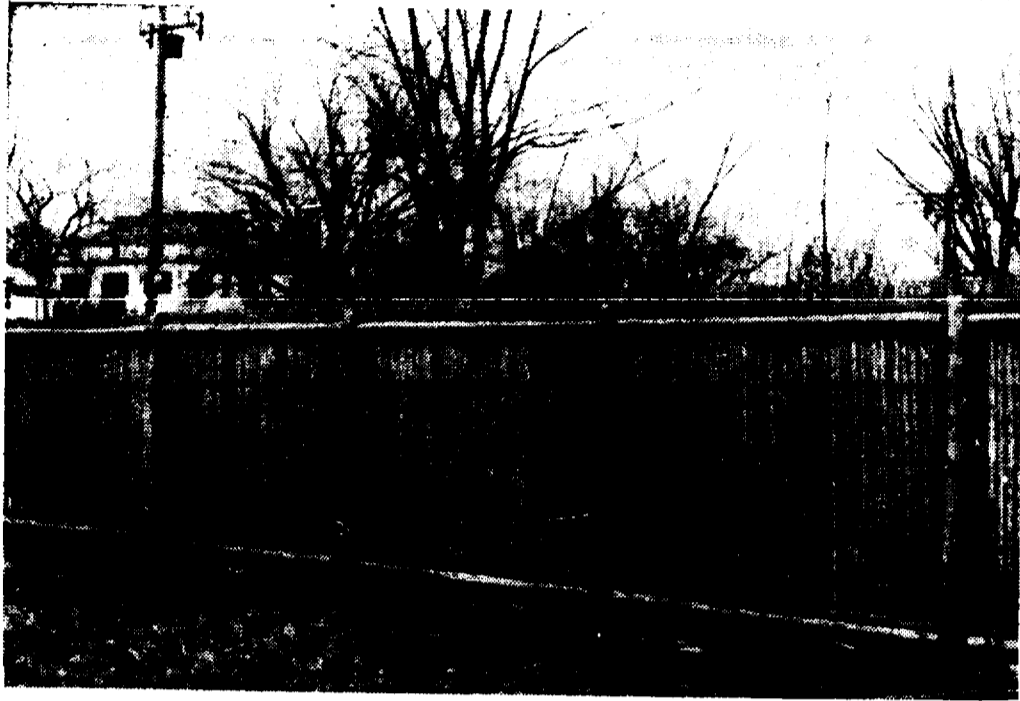


# SCHOOLS ENTER TAX FIGHT

## Board of Education and Wayne County Join Township

Grosse Pointe township will be joined by two other agencies in its defense of the supervisor's tax assessments for the past year. The Grosse Pointe board of education and Wayne county have notified township authorities that they will fight any reduction in the assessments. Last fall, a group of lakefront property owners appealed to the Michigan state tax commission, protesting Supervisor Carl Schweikart's assessments on their properties. This also included a group of residents owning mansion type homes off the lake shore.

At the hearing, held in the Grosse Pointe Park municipal building, legal counsel represented two groups of owners. They were Fred Behr and McMahon & Maxon. After study and deliberation, the tax commission upheld the supervisor's findings and granted slight decreases in some cases. Declaring that they would continue their fight further, many of the property owners banded together and paid their taxes "under protest." (The law states that the taxes must be paid, but if protested, litigation could be instituted to recover the protested sum.) Many of the residents retained Mr. Behr while others engaged John R. Watkins to bring suit in circuit court, claiming discrimination and fraud in the assessments. Because they are the largest recipient of the tax monies, the board of education decided to enter the defense. Realizing that they too, would lose a proportionate amount of tax money, the Wayne county authorities joined the township and board of education. The board of education receives approximately seventy per cent of the tax money, the county, 24 per cent and the township six per cent. In terms of dollars and cents, the school board's decrease would be approximately forty-seven thousand dollars.

One Hundred Dollars a Day Fine or thirty (30) days in jail, or both in the discretion of the court for every day of the violation of Ordinance No. 25, Village of Grosse Pointe Park, enacted March 5, 1920, is the penalty covering the type of fence pictured above.

Ironically, the apparently "illegal" fence of some six feet in height is located on the estate of C. Henry Buhl, at the foot of Bishop road. And, C. Henry Buhl is reputed to be the chief agitator to "get Tony, the Popcorn Man, off the streets."

It is ironic, too, that such an apparently "illegal" fence exists with the knowledge of the village council of the village of Grosse Pointe Park, which is or should be conversant with the village ordinances, which they so diligently pass and cause to be enforced. For example: Village of

Grosse Pointe Park vs. Tony Koinis. Section 5 of Ordinance No. 25, Village of Grosse Pointe Park provides: "That any wall or fence facing on any thoroughfare, street or public place of the village of Grosse Pointe Park, constructed at a height of more

than four (4) feet \* \* \* Section 1 of the same ordinance makes the provision for a wall or party fence. A commission which so meticulously legislates to remove a tradition in the form of a Veteran's business from the streets, should not guard another's apparent effort to obtain privacy. It seems that a violation is in the making and has been committed for some time. The law provides a penalty. A strict application is in order.

THE NEED IS STILL GREAT

Because of the world-wide food scarcity, President Truman has called on Victory Gardeners to continue in 1946 the home production of vegetables which added so much to the national food supply during the war.

It is recognized that only a serious emergency would have caused the appeal, and such an emergency now exists.

Reports of reduced commercial production and higher costs have been widely current, and predictions of a curtailed pack of canned goods have been made.

The President's appeal asks for both production and preserving of food by amateurs, just as during the war, in order to increase the country's total supply.

Forty per cent of this total in war years was credited to Victory gardens.

During the war period, gardening demonstrated its value to our people in many ways. The splendid response to the appeal for more home produced food was an important factor in making it possible during the war for the people of this country to be better fed than before the war while supplying the best fed fighting forces in the world, and providing essential food supplies to our Allies.

The threat of starvation in many parts of the world and the urgent need for food from this country emphasizes the importance of continuing the effort to add to our total food supply this year.

Grosse Pointers can continue to do their share by planting vegetable gardens again this year. According to reports, the Park has quite a large number of gardens left, waiting to be used this year; the Farms and City have a few remaining plots to accommodate prospective gardeners.

All are urged to reserve these plots as soon as possible with the clerks of these respective communities, so that digging and other work may be done soon.

ployees as well as members of the Lions, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs, made a tour of every street in the community.

With the approval of the annual budget for the fiscal year, Grosse Pointe Park village employees were recipients of a salary raise and bonus totaling approximately fifteen thousand dollars. The raise was retroactive to April 1.

Through the unanimous decision of the members of the Grosse Pointe Farms council, an ordinance adopted on Dec. 4, 1928, was amended to regulate the area of yards, courts and other spaces and to limit and restrict the minimum number of families which may be housed in dwellings. A section was eliminated from the new ordinance which permitted the erection of attached or multiple dwellings.

Grosse Pointe was planning to honor its war dead with appropriate ceremonies on Memorial Day... A fee was established for Farms boat owners... Woods merchants were collecting materials for the Cancer Society.

Five Years Ago... Dr. E. R. Van Kleck, superintendent of the Grosse Pointe schools, explained that the state law which required the five-year payoff of building debts. He said the school district under the state law and the state constitution as amended in 1932, left no choice in the matter for the school board to charge all debt service acquired after 1932, to operating cost.

Police led the City of Grosse Pointe police department to warn residents to keep their pets from running at large in the city. Instances were found where the dogs had eaten food, grass and other materials containing various chemicals used in spraying, fertilizing, on building materials, etc.

Residents were urged to alter corner landscaping... Noted horticulturist, William E. Fischer, addressed the local society.

15 Years Ago... The "Waterfront Park" in Grosse Pointe Park was scheduled for opening on July 4. An appropriate program of ceremonies to effectively dedicate the park were being planned. Improvements were to be carried out with an estimated cost, including landscaping, of \$116,000. This money was raised by a bond issue by the voters.

The board of education passed formal resolutions objecting to three measures brought before the state legislature: A tax on school bonds, state approval of the school budget and a tax on school property that is not used for school purposes.

The new filtration plant in the Farms was approved by the state... Action was delayed on the zoning ordinance in the Park... Damage estimated at fifteen hundred dollars was done to the Newberry home on Cloverly road... The first meeting of a Grosse Pointe VFW Post was held in the Otsiketa club on St. Paul avenue.

statement showing the following:

- 1. Whether the applicant intends to conduct a truly itinerant business and circulate about the village, or whether he intends to do a business in a substantially fixed location by concentrating his activities on one street or in one locality.
2. Whether most of the applicant's business will be with passing traffic.
3. The kind of business to be carried on on stop streets, if any, including the stop streets involved, the length of time he will remain in any one block and on any one stop street, and the time of day that such questions will take place.
4. What measures applicant will take to clean up popcorn boxes and other rubbish left by his customers.
5. Whether applicant will conform to Ordinance 139; and that the application, together with the additional data here requested, be referred to the chief of police for investigation and report as to whether the proposed activities will result in a nuisance.

Another hard legislative fight looms on Capitol Hill after the senate education and labor committee files its formal report on the Case labor bill. The administration has followed delaying tactics on this measure from the beginning. As approved by the house, the Case bill went directly to the heart of several important labor issues. The senate committee trimmed the bill down and left it largely meaningless, but a bi-partisan minority report will accompany the formal report.

The minority report will recommend six important amendments, substantially as follows:

- 1. Provide for an independent mediation board, although technically under the labor department, with duties of parties defined. These duties would include that of bargaining collectively and cooperating in mediation efforts, with a 60-day cooling-off period.
2. Provide for mutual responsibility by making unions subject to suit in federal court for violation of contracts.
3. Outlaw secondary boycotts by making them subject to anti-trust laws.
4. An anti-violence amendment under which it would be unlawful to bar entrances into and exits from plants.
5. Make it unnecessary for employers to bargain collectively with supervisory employees.
6. Order limited fact-finding in the case of public utilities. Under this proposal, 90 days would be given for negotiations before a strike could begin.

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### Exhausted Gas Supply Curtails All Applications for Space Heating Units

Applications for installations of gas for house heating and other space heating are being refused today by Michigan Consolidated Gas company.

Henry Fink, executive vice-president of the company, made this announcement following a record-breaking demand for space heating which has exhausted the amount of gas available to Detroit and Ann Arbor both from the pipe line which brings natural gas from Texas and the amounts the company is able to make in its own emergency manufacturing plants.

There will be no curtailment of supply to the company's present customers who have already installed gas heating equipment or to those whose applications have already been accepted, Mr. Fink said.

Applications have been pouring into the company's office at a record-breaking rate as high as 1,500 per day. This compares to the normal demand before the war of from 30 to 40 installations per day.

Michigan - Wisconsin Pipe Line company, which will be a wholly owned subsidiary of Michigan Consolidated has an application pending before the Federal Power Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity for the construction of a new pipe line from Texas to Detroit to supply the unprecedented demand for natural gas for house-

heating, industrial uses, cooking, hot water heating and refrigeration. Hearings on the application are being held in the Federal building. The new pipe line would supply gas to western Michigan and Wisconsin as well as the Detroit and Ann Arbor areas. The Detroit and Ann Arbor areas now get their gas from Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line company.

"We deeply regret the necessity of limiting the use of gas in any way at any time," said Mr. Fink. "And we wish to assure the public that the present limitation will be removed just as soon as possible."

"Since 1940 we have been limited by the pipe line company to 125 million cubic feet of natural gas per day. The capacity of our emergency plants manufacturing gas in 1945, was 35 million cubic feet per day. Operation of these plants enabled us to meet a peak day demand of 153 million cubic feet.

"However, since the removal of war restrictions on house-heating gas, our house-heating customers have increased from 53,860 to more than 82,000. Because of this and other increased uses, our peak day consumption is expected to be increased to 187 million cubic feet this coming winter.

"We would have been able to take care of the normally increase in new house-heating customers this year. But orders have already taken up the available supply.

"Faced with this unprecedented demand, we have added every possible facility to increase the efficiency and output of our gas manufacturing plants and we expect to be able to meet that demand. But we can do no more.

"There is no source from which any greater demand can be supplied at this time.

"For some time we have been fully aware of the need for more gas both in the Detroit area and in all other districts of Michigan served by us.

"We have been making plans which, when consummated, will assure an adequate supply of gas. However, it will be some months before additional supplies are available."

From the OFFICE OF VETERANS' AFFAIRS LANSING

Normally, credit is available to veterans for their service-acquired skills. This credit takes the form of academic credit in some cases, and in others it is translated into upgrading of veterans in their occupations. It must be emphasized that such credit is in no sense a "gift" to the veteran. It is merely recognition of that which the veteran possesses. It is a translation of his qualifications from one form to another - from the United States Armed Forces Institute (USAFI) courses, for instance, to high school and college credit.

Many veterans are not fully aware of the availability of this accreditation. They need to be told that they have an asset upon which they should capitalize.

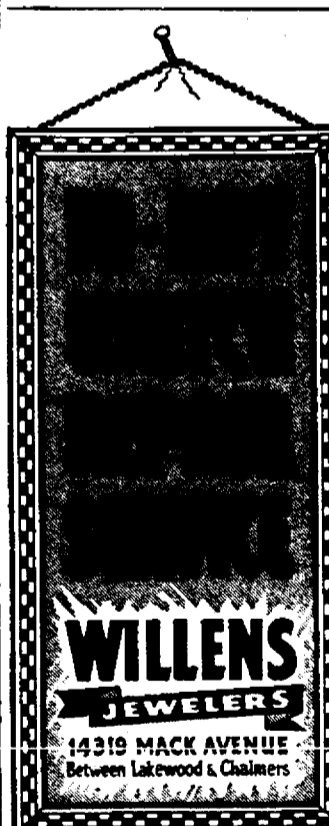

The last group of checks are scheduled to be mailed June 19 and should be delivered shortly after June 20.

Cash your refund checks promptly. They become void 60 days after date of issue.

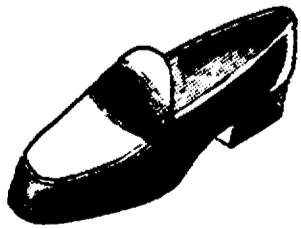

## Arthur G. Sherman Gives Platform As Candidate for Congress in 14th District

All persons earning \$3,000 and over should be exempted from federal income taxation, Arthur G. Sherman, the head of his own pharmaceutical company, declared today in his statement of principles covering his campaign for the Republican nomination to Congress in the Fourteenth District. His qualifying petitions were filed at the County Clerk's office Monday.

"Restoration and maintenance of purchasing power for the workers on a continued stable basis is as essential as the renewal of full production in this country," declared Sherman, who is 56 years old and a native Detroit. He lives at 1488 Burns avenue. He has spent 30 years in the pharmaceutical field and also headed the Covered Wagon Company with a plant in Mt. Clemens.

"Re-vamping of the federal taxation system, with accompanying reforms in Congressional committee procedure and a lessening of federal government costs must take place if the 270 billion federal indebtedness is to be sustained and paid off without crushing the workers of this country and subjecting them to periodic depressions.

"I have been struck by the widespread fear which I encounter among many working people that another crash and depression is inevitable. It need not be if our government's economic policies are re-examined and placed on a sounder basis. But we are not going in that direction now. We are spiraling into inflation, hastened by a black market condition which is appalling. This is the reason I have determined to offer my services for the Congressional position.

"I have had considerable dealings with union labor representatives in my business career. From what some of them tell me, I believe they will agree that if the withholding tax of approximately 17 per cent of their present earnings could be removed, there would be no need for their demand of 18 per cent wage increases to maintain their wartime take home pay levels in the face of advancing prices. If this course had been followed, the strikes that have delayed the resumption of full production might have been avoided and inflationary pressures would have been eased.

Pontiac's Conspiracy Against Fort Detroit's Commander Revealed by Many

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is one of a series dealing with myths and inaccuracies in Michigan history, some of which have persisted despite disclosure of the real facts.)

How Fort Detroit was warned of Pontiac's conspiracy has become one of the many myths which distort the Michigan history, according to F. Clever Bald, war historian at the University of Michigan.

The story involves an Indian woman who is reputed to have warned Major Gladwin, commander of Fort Detroit, that the Indian chieftain was planning to seize the fort. First accounts of the incident, Bald relates, said an old squaw named Catherine alerted the major to expect Indian treachery.

She is reported to have delivered a pair of moccasins to the major who was pleased with her work that he ordered another pair only to be told she could not make them. Asked her reason for refusing,

Gatherine supposedly revealed Pontiac's plot.

Bald declares a study made by Helen F. Humphrey, former curator of maps at University of Michigan's Clements Library, showed this account was used by five writers from 1766 to 1839. Then Miss Humphrey found that Francis Parkman in the first edition of "The Conspiracy of Pontiac" added a romantic touch.

Parkman changed the old squaw into a beautiful Indian maiden, the mistress of Major Gladwin who, it is assumed, would have let the officer in on Pontiac's skullduggery. This is the version the artist J. M. Stanley painted in "The Conspiracy of Pontiac Revealed." Bald declares the painting probably has done much to make this version of the story seem authentic.

In subsequent editions of his book, Parkman added footnotes giving other versions of the story, including to the heart interest theme. Of the story, Parkman wrote: "... those may believe it who will."

Veteran McNally Widely Endorsed For Prosecutor

First candidate to file for the office of Wayne County Prosecuting attorney, James N. McNally, 1314 Nottingham, was easily under the wire Tuesday as entries closed for the June 18 primary.

Running on the Republican ticket, McNally was drafted by prominent individuals and groups and the more than 25,000 citizens who signed his petitions are from every city, village and township in Wayne County.

A Lieut. Comdr. in the Navy, McNally saw five years of active duty in World War II and has been in the Naval Reserve service for 24 years.

One of the state's most colorful attorneys, and justice of the peace in the Pointe since 1935, McNally received national attention through his brilliant defense of John Klanauskas, the sailor aboard the U. S. S. Dubuque, who was charged with rape and murder. McNally obtained a verdict of "not guilty." He was re-elected justice while serving in the armed forces.

The candidate graduated from the Detroit College of Law in 1926 and has been in active practice since that date. He was born at Saginaw, Michigan, January 29, 1901.

While stationed at the naval base in Charleston, S. C., in 1944, Mrs. McNally succumbed following a serious illness. There are six children: James, 14; Gerald, 13; Thomas, 12; Patrick, 9; Mary Catherine, 6 and Carolyn Ann, 3.

Enthusiastic support is widely reported throughout Grosse Pointe township and greater Detroit, from the many friends and associates of this outstanding candidate for prosecuting attorney.

Rabaut's Amendment Adopted by House

WASHINGTON—The House of Representatives adopted an amendment offered by Congressman Louis C. Rabaut, Democrat of Grosse Pointe, to establish authority for proper Congressional Committees to investigate the files of Foreign Service officers in the Department of State.

Rabaut said that his proposal "is very necessary in view of the fact that this group has much to do with policy-making for our country. I am determined that devotion to American ideals must characterize their actions."

The measure was hailed on the floor of the House as a progressive and far-reaching step towards a proper investigation of State Department personnel.

Previously, Rabaut's subcommittee on appropriations for the State Department recommended a slash in funds for the Department's information and cultural program.

U. of M. Reunion Planned for June

University of Michigan alumni will return to the campus next June for the first big reunion to be held since 1941.

Entitled a Victory Reunion, the alumni gathering will open with a dinner on Thursday evening, June 20, and conclude with the University's 102nd Commencement Exercises on Saturday evening, June 22.

Plans for the reunion of alumni—now totaling more than 115,000—have been formulated by a committee appointed by Alexander G. Sullivan, president of the University. Karl L. Thompson, 1922, president of English, is general chairman of this committee.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor:

Six months ago my wife was apparently one of the healthiest and happiest women in our community. Then one day tragedy struck. I took her to one of the largest hospitals in our country where they cut part of her body away. But apparently it was too late. She has suffered every conceivable agony and torture, and I watched her go blind. The dozens of doctors that examined and tried to help her have always given me the same answer: "I am sorry, just try to make her comfortable."

She now has a few hours, or perhaps days, to live, and I have some satisfaction in knowing that she no longer suffers, for now she is in a coma and can no longer tell me of her tortures. There is nothing left for me but to await her death. But for the 17,000,000 Americans alive today, that are also destined to die of cancer, there must be an answer!

The cure for cancer is no more inconceivable than the discovery of the cure for other fatal diseases. Our nation has spent more than two billion dollars to discover the atomic bomb and yet, during this same time from Pearl Harbor to V-J Day, the nation has taken little interest in the fact that twice as many people died of cancer as were killed by the war.

We can conquer cancer but only if the public is aroused. There are thousands of wives, husbands, fathers, mothers, sons and daughters who may be the next victims of this scourge. I also was most complacent until cancer hit my happy home, but no man, rich or poor, white or black, knows when cancer may strike next.

There will be a cure for cancer if we give our great doctors and scientists the means to study. Help raise enough dollars and they will find the cure. Public opinion must be aroused and money must be raised either privately or through the government. There is no more important mission than to find a cure for a disease that our population.

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### Choral Union to Present 'Martha'

The Detroit Choral Union, under the direction of Dr. Harry W. Seitz, will present "Martha" at Music Hall on Wednesday May 1, at 8:30 p.m.

The opera will be presented in Concert form, and the chorus will be accompanied by members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. Margaret Mannebach is pianist for the Choral Union.

This chorus is a city-wide group of mixed voices and many promising young singers will be featured as guest soloists. Suzanne der Derian, now a singer at the University of Michigan, will sing the title role in "Martha." This former Cooley High School student won first place in the Young Student Musicians Contest for the State of Michigan and the Great Lakes District. In the fall of 1945, Miss der Derian was the finalist in the Philadelphia La Scala Opera Contest.

James Huston, recently returned from military service, will be the Lionel of the opera. He was soloist with the 601st Army Air Forces Band and performed in many GI shows and Bond drive promotions. Before he entered the service, Mr. Huston was soloist with the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra and did much radio work.

### Handicapped League Helps Hundreds of Afflicted Persons

More than 400 persons in the Metropolitan Detroit area have benefited during the past year from the services of the Detroit League for the Handicapped. Mrs. Nelson W. McCormick, director of this Community Fund agency, announced this week.

During the past year a new service was opened by the agency. A Hearing Aid Center where those who are hard of hearing can test various types of hearing aids and determine which will best suit their particular needs was established the middle of September. By the end of 1945 this center had served 144 persons.

Located at the League for the Handicapped offices in the Krolik Building, the Hearing Aid Center is the first center of its kind in the Detroit area. It is patterned after the War Department's Rural Rehabilitation Center for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing at Deshon General hospital, Butler, Pa.

The average number of persons employed in the League for the Handicapped sheltered workshop and in the home work program throughout the year 1945 was 144. In the sheltered workshop, handicapped persons operate a print and letter shop which includes printing, secretarial service, multigraphing, mimeographing, and mailing service; a chair canning department; and a hand assembly department where many different jobs are done including the insertion of telephone cords in envelopes, the assembling of paper plates and cups, the wiring of tags, the sealing of cellophane bags and the repairing of electric cords.

The sewing department and the home work program of this Community Fund agency are closely linked. The sewing department at the League office serves as the headquarters and distribution center, while most of the actual sewing is done by handicapped persons in their own homes. The department makes carpenter and shop aprons, money bags, household linens and the articles sold in the two Junior League shops.

Another service of this Community Fund agency is its case work. Trained social service workers employed by the Detroit League for the Handicapped helped more than 100 persons during the past year.

### Automotive Golden Jubilee Proves of Double Significance to Area

The Automotive Industry's Golden Jubilee will be celebrated in Detroit in a sweeping program, May 29 through June 9, which will commemorate two historical events of tremendous significance to the city, the nation and the world.

On two Spring days back in 1896, Henry Ford and Charles B. King ran the first automobiles on the streets of Detroit. One hundred and fifty years ago, the flag of the young American republic was raised over what was then a strategic outpost and gateway to the old Northwest Territory.

It is altogether fitting, therefore, that the Automotive Industry and the City of Detroit participate in this Golden Jubilee program of both local and national significance. Lieut. Gen. William S. Knudsen heads the National Automotive Industry Golden Jubilee Committee, sponsor of the industry events in the over-all celebration. As managing director, George Romney, general manager of the Automobile Manufacturers Association, is supervising preparations for this phase of the program.

Frederic M. Brown, chairman of the Detroit Edison Company, is chairman and George W. Stark is vice-chairman, of the Detroit Automotive Golden Jubilee Civic Committee which is sponsoring the civic events of the celebration. Actively in charge is William E. Stirton, on leave from his post as principal of

Cass Technical High School. The Golden Jubilee program will begin Wednesday evening, May 29, in a spectacular public ceremony at Grand Circus Park in which a pageant of international stature will participate.

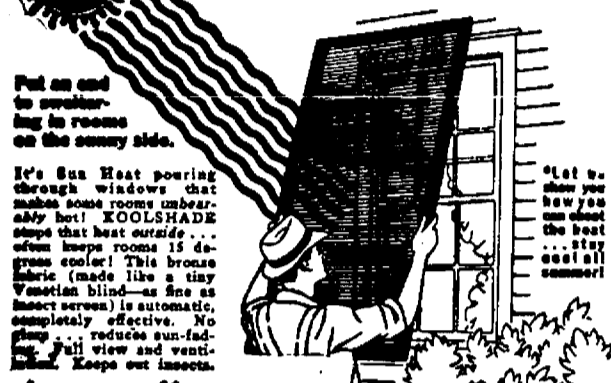
Then will follow, on succeeding days, a pilgrimage to the grave of Col. John F. Hamtramck, who accepted the British surrender of Detroit; a community pageant; an automotive industry banquet honoring outstanding pioneers; a parade of which only one feature will be a

float carrying the Jubilee Queen and her Princesses; a huge outdoor religious program at Briggs Stadium to which President Truman has been invited; a repeat performance of the community pageant; and, during the week beginning Monday, June 3, an Antique Automotive Exposition at Convention Hall.

Saturday night, June 1, will be given over to a downtown street festival, during which the coronation of the Jubilee Queen will take place. Famous screen, stage and radio personalities will provide music and entertainment around the loop area, while nationality groups will be sprinkled throughout the street festival, offering their ancestral folk songs and dances.

### Herman Kiefer Hospital Begins Rehabilitation Program Among Patients

With the appointment of John M. Glendenning of Minneapolis as director, the Tuberculosis and Health Society of Wayne County started its rehabilitation program among patients of the Herman Kiefer Hospital on April 2. With a 70-bed capacity of 800, the Kiefer Hospital ranks as the nation's third largest sanatorium.

According to William J. Scripps, society president, "rehabilitation of the tuberculous is designed to make taxpayers of tax consumers by providing vocational re-training and placement or arrested cases. Many sanatorium patients are unemployable because of their physical condition. Since the program actually starts among patients in the tb. hospital, it tends to greatly reduce "leaves without medical advice." This, says Mr. Scripps, is because vocational retraining gives bed patients an opportunity to learn a trade or occupation. About seventy per cent of human body weight is water.

### Ordinance No. 139 An Ordinance to Regulate the Business Use of the Public Right-of-Way and to Reduce Traffic Congestion

- THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:
- As used in this Ordinance:
    - "Business" means the selling or solicitation of sales at retail of goods, wares, or merchandise, excluding only newspapers and other printed material.
    - "Business with passing traffic" means business carried on in the public right-of-way with persons arriving at and leaving the vicinity in private vehicles.
    - A "stop street area" means the public right-of-way along a stop street or along that portion of an intersecting street lying within 200 feet of a stop street (measured from the stop street curb).
    - "Curb service" is that form of doing business in which orders are taken from vehicles standing at the curb or from persons on the sidewalk or elsewhere in the public right-of-way, but it does not include business by a transient vendor with occupants of adjacent buildings.
  - No person shall establish himself on or linger along any public right-of-way for the primary purpose of doing business with passing traffic. Such primary purpose exists whenever a majority of the sales in any hour are made to passing traffic.
  - No person in a stop street area shall:
    - Solicit business from or do business with passing traffic.
    - Display merchandise to the public at or near the curb or elsewhere in the public right-of-way.
    - Proceed on the street in a sales vehicle at a rate slower than five miles per hour except when required to do so by traffic rules or safety considerations.
    - Make any sales from a parked or stopped sales vehicle except to occupants of adjacent buildings or maintain a parked or stopped sales vehicle open for business for a period longer than required to fill orders from such occupants.
    - Furnish curb service.
  - Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$100 or by imprisonment not exceeding 90 days, or both, in the discretion of the court, together with the costs of prosecution. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute and be punishable as a separate and distinct offense.
  - Sections 1, 2 and 3, and each sentence, clause and exception therein shall be construed as separate. This ordinance shall take effect 20 days after its enactment.

Five possible ratings can be won at the festival.

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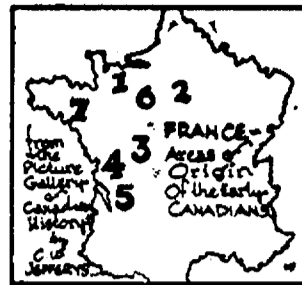

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Salvation Army to Help 'Liquidate' Devil's Island

The Salvation Army, through Major Charles A. Pean, of the French Salvation Army, will play an important role in the liquidation of the century-old penal settlement in French Guiana.

Major Pean, who has fought for the elimination of Devil's Island for 18 years and who is director of the Men's Social Department in France, has just arrived in New York City en route to French Guiana where on a special mission for the French government, he will start the liquidation of the famed prison colony, known to Americans as Devil's Island.

Under Major Pean's direction The Salvation Army in French Guiana, which has for 10 years operated three institutions in and around Cayenne, capital of French Guiana, will organize and supervise the repatriation of some 5,100 prisoners and "liberés" at the settlement. The liquidation of the penal settlement was voted by the French government in 1938, but was stopped by the war.

Major Pean's immediate job in French Guiana will be to arrange for the repatriation of 2,800 men who completed their prison terms during the war and who have been forced to remain there for the past seven years because of war conditions. The Salvation Army, with its workshops, banana plantation, and recreation halls, has been the only agency looking after these "liberés" and, according to Major Pean, it has carried on this work in spite of great hardships, notably lack of foodstuffs and lack of medical supplies.

Before the war, some 50,000 homes rented rooms to tourists. Napoleon invented income tax to pay for wars.

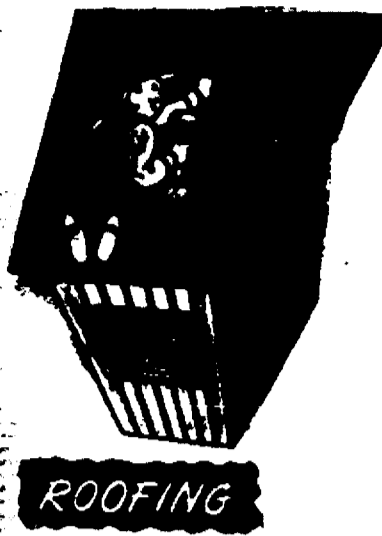
