### Park Employees Receive \$15,000 Wage Increase

With the approval of the annual budget for the fiscal year, 1945-46, the Grosse Pointe Park village commission, at its Monday evening session, has voted to increase the salaries of the village employees by approximately \$15,000. The increase is retroactive to April 1. Several changes were made in the budget to allow for this raise. The money allocated for the village debt service is over forty thousand dollars less this year than 1944. This is made up in the increase which is found under general government; from \$16,430 last year to \$18,735 for this coming year.

(Continued from Page One) when he enlisted on April 15, 1941. That same day, a Cecil Robitaille of Detroit also enlisted. Together they were sent to the same training camp, Camp Livingston, La., and were buddies in the same company and platoon for three years.

In 1944, Robitaille was sent overseas and Dick stayed home for an additional month. The former went through the African invasion, Italy and Southern France, while Dick took part in the Normandy invasion. During this time, the two lost track of each other. On July 16, 1944, Dick was taken prisoner at St. Lo and taken to a war prison camp.

While looking over a new contingent of prisoners who were arriving in his camp on Friday, October 13, Dick found his buddy coming into the camp. The two buddies were released together from Germany to the Michigan Central Station where their respective families claimed them.

Sgt. Sauer had his 21 day furlough revoked Tuesday by army officials; instead, it was extended to a 60-day furlough. He is at home with his parents and his wife Cammie, of California.

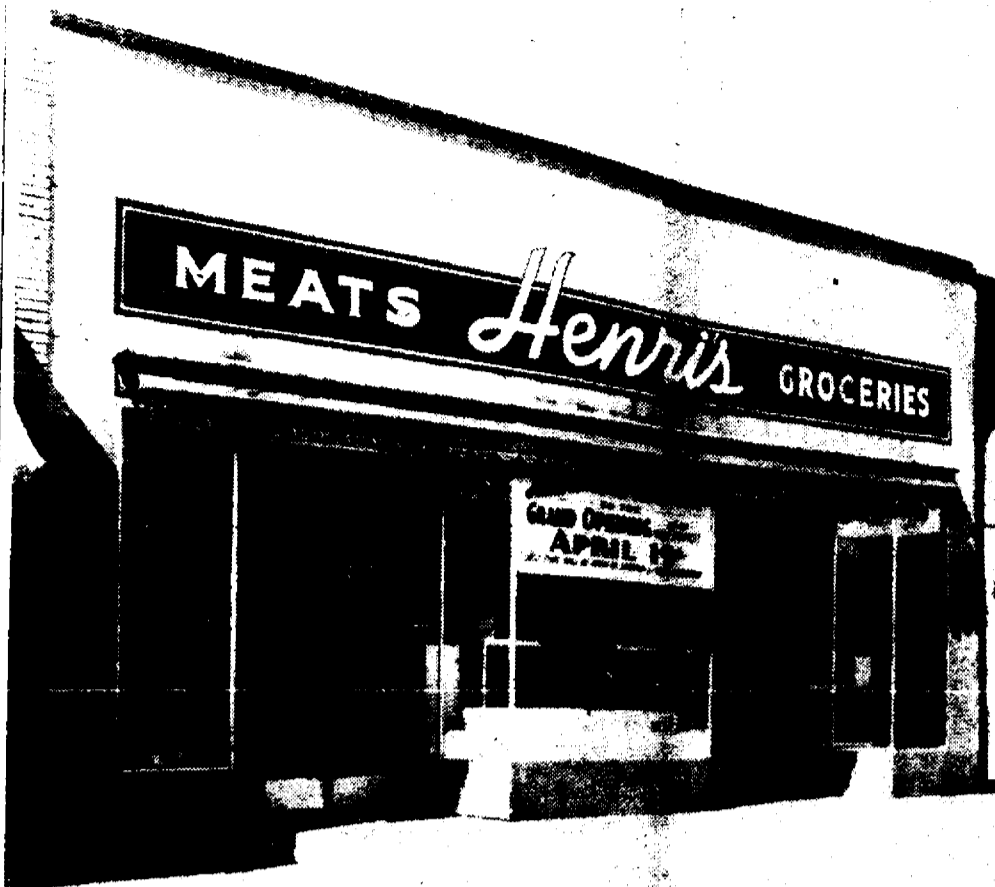

### Your Garden This Week

(Issued by the Michigan Office of Civilian Defense)

If your garden was in sod last year, you had better anticipate cut worm trouble and avoid it by mixing and applying a poison bait to the soil before setting out plants. Add 1 ounce of Paris Green to 1 pound of dandelion greens, chop them up fine and spread over the ground in early evening.

Peas, onions, head lettuce, radishes and spinach can be sown this week if you've been able to get your soil in condition. To be profitable peas should be sown early. They will not pod up well during the hot summer months. In addition, the production per square foot will not justify devoting the soil to them all summer. Plant the min rows spaced far enough apart that tomatoes can be interplanted with them later to give you two crops from the same area.

Seeds of carrots, beets, chard, parsnips and salsify can be sown as the soil is ready. Treat the seeds with Semesan, Aposan or Spergon to reduce the damping off or seedling rot. These materials can be purchased in small packets. Place the amount that will stick on a flat tooth-pick in a package of small seed, shake thoroughly and sow the seed.

Plants of early cabbage, head lettuce, sweet potatoes, onions, broccoli and cauliflower can be set out now. These plants will stand some frost, but if a hard freeze threatens better be sure they are covered with plant protectors such as hot caps or row covers. Many growers also use paper tents or hot caps over early sowings of seed to hasten germination and protect early growth. Hot caps made of specially treated paper can be purchased or you can make them from oiled paper. They not only protect early plants from frost, but, by protecting plants from wind, reduce the amount of wilting encountered following transplanting.

Planting three or four varieties of early cabbage that vary in the number of days necessary to ripen may extend the maturing period enough so that you will be able to use all of the heads before they split. Early Jersey Wakefield matures in 60 days, Golden Acre in 65, Copenhagen market in 70 and Glory of Eankhui-

in 75. **Lower like cool** if planned out early a good crop can be obtained.

Make paper discs to slip around the stems of cabbage, broccoli and cauliflower plants when you set them out. A piece 3 to 4 inches in diameter, with a slit in the center and a hole punched out to accommodate the stem, will lie flat on the ground and keep away the flies that lay the eggs of cabbage worms.

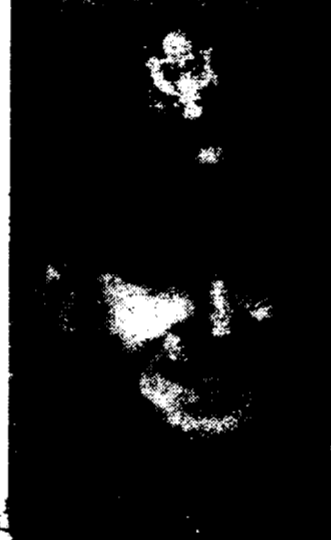

### AN ORDINANCE

TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC PEACE"

### Employers Should Furnish Earned Wage Statement

Every worker is entitled to a receipt for the old-age and survivors insurance taxes deducted from his pay by his employer, Francis L. Pendergast, manager of the Harper office of the social security board, 8037 Harper avenue, pointed out recently.

The internal revenue code, as amended, in the section which relates to old-age and survivors insurance taxes, provides that "every employer shall furnish to each of his employees a written statement or statements, in a form suitable for retention by the employee, showing the wages paid by him to the employee after Dec. 31, 1939," Mr. Pendergast said.

This, Mr. Pendergast said, specifies that the statement shall be furnished at least once a year, and in every instance when the employee leaves the employment, no matter what the reason, it must be furnished at the time of the last payment of wages. The statement must show the name of the employer, the name of the employee, the period covered by the statement, the total amount of wages paid within the period, and the amount of the old-age and survivors insurance tax deducted. In case the employer gives the worker such a statement with each payment of wages, he may substitute the date of the payment for the period covered.

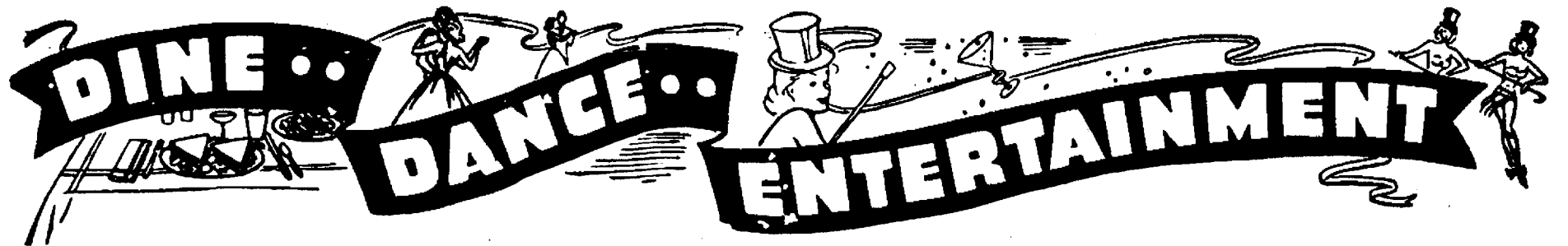

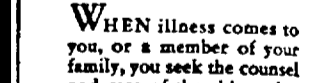
