Officials Urge Dignified "V-E Day" Celebration

OCD, Police Chiefs Warn Residents Of Undue Revelry

A special meeting was called by George Elworthy, OCD co-ordinator, at the Neighborhood club of the chiefs of police of the Grosse Pointe communities last Monday afternoon. Recommendations and plans for the procedure for observance of "V-E" Day were thoroughly discussed.

In a statement released by the co-ordinator, Mr. Elworthy said, "When the curtain falls upon the battle in Europe, and the guns are at last silenced, we must steel ourselves against yielding to any temptation to relax in the home front war effort in the erroneous belief our responsibility has been lessened or terminated. Japan remains a powerful and fanatical foe and all our energies and resources must be focused upon bringing about her defeat as rapidly as it can be accomplished. How speedily this is done will be measured not by the activities of our fighters alone, but by the support given them at home. Their courage and aggressiveness must be matched by our work and faithfulness.

Day As Prisoner of German Soldiers

A Grosse Pointe Park lad has described the experience of being captured by the Germans and being rescued by the Americans the following day in a letter to his mother, Mrs. Blanche Nugent of 1066 Maryland; the writer is M-Sergt. Floyd Nugent who is serving with the army in Europe.

The letter follows:
Dear Mother:
This is my first letter to you or anyone in a week. At present, I consider myself one of the luckiest men



in the U. S. Army. The other day I was captured by the Germans. The driver and I ran smack into their conveyance within 15 feet of them. I got out of the vehicle with my pistol in my hand and the next thing that happened was a large blast that blinded me, and I hit the ground. Later I found out that a Jerry threw a potato masher (a German grenade), and it landed about two or three feet from me. I still don't know how I'm alive to tell this.

Since fighting their last battle in the Meuse valley, the Division have fought their way thru North Africa, Sicily, Italy and France to Hitler's Reich.

Twice Wounded Lad Convalesces Here

Pvt. Jack Plasko, son of Mrs. Irene Plasko of 1155 Beaconsfield, will leave next week to return to Vaughn General hospital, Chicago, after a 30-day convalescence leave spent in Grosse Pointe, after having been wounded twice in battle within the last six months.

Wounded for the first time on November 19 in Germany, Private Plasko returned to active duty with the First Army in the infantry, and was hit the second time on February 1. He received the Purple Heart in France and the Oak Leaf Cluster while in Germany.

In addition, Private Plasko's group has received the Presidential Unit Citation for their activities on

D-Day when they landed on the coast of Normandy. He was also with the first troops to liberate Paris.

Sixth Army Group, Germany. — Among the best "Mr. Fixits" in the Western Front are the soldiers of the 601st Ordnance Base Armanent Maintenance Battalion, commanded by Maj. H. R. Hopkins of Portland, Ore.

The battalion is made up of four companies — a headquarters and service company, a base artillery and fire control maintenance company, a base armored vehicle maintenance company, and a small arms maintenance company.

Originally the First Battalion of the 301st Ordnance Regiment — the first such regiment in the history of the army — the battalion came overseas shortly after the North African landings and set up its shops in Oran, Algeria. There it remained for 21 months, assembling new equipment for the Tunisian campaign, servicing and rebuilding war-worn weapons, and preparing many thousands of armored vehicles, artillery pieces and small arms for the Sicilian and Italian campaigns. Among this group is Pvt. Marcel Vervacke, 1346 Beaconsfield, Grosse Pointe Park.

At a 12th AAF P-47 Base in Italy. — Corp. Thomas R. Swegles, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira B. Swegles, Grosse Pointe, now wears five bronze battle stars on his theatre ribbon for having taken part in five major campaigns — the Tunisian, Sicilian, two phases of the Italian and Southern France.

Corporal Swegles has shared the dangers and hardships of life in a fast moving tactical fighter group, which has been awarded the war department unit citation for outstanding performance of duty.

Overseas more than 24 months, Corporal Swegles is with a veteran fighter-bomber group of the 12th Air Force, which is actively engaged in dive-bombing and strafing of enemy military installations in the Po Valley and the Brenner Pass.

An Air Technical Service Command Station, "Somewhere in France." — Tech. Sergt. Robert J. Hoefflein, of 1423 Wayburn avenue, Grosse Pointe Park, is now in France helping to rush vitally-needed bombs and ordnance equipment to frontline airstrips with a crack ordnance outfit of the Central Air Depot Area of the Air Service Command.

How Simple Is SIMPLE SYRUP?

Frequently, the doctor orders drugs to be mixed with Simple Syrup. Let us see just how "simple" Simple Syrup is when prepared according to the rigid standards of the Pharmacopoeia of the United States. "Heat 450 cc. of distilled water to the boiling point and add 850 Gm. of sugar. Continue to heat cautiously, stirring until all the sugar is dissolved and the syrup has a temperature of 100 degrees Centigrade. Then filter it through purified cotton and pass enough distilled water through the cotton to make the product measure 1000 cc. when cold." There is nothing simple in pharmacy. The importance of each step in compounding medicine demands that it be taken with painstaking care.

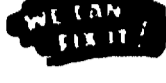

Grosse Pointers Salvage Tin Cans Monday, May 14

We have just been advised that the government stockpile of tin is at its lowest since the war began. The situation is critical. The largest source of tin is from salvaged tin cans obtained from all users as hotels, restaurants and housewives.

Grosse Pointe, because of its method of collection and the patriotic effort of their citizens, has done an outstanding job. But we know that there are a lot of people who are not doing their part in spite of continual effort and publicity.

During the next few weeks we will intensify our efforts to get out every available tin can for the next collection, Monday, May 14. Just an average of an extra can will give us a big increase in tonnage.

"Success in this patriotic effort will depend on the co-operation of everybody. We appreciate what you have done in the past and hope you will see your way clear to put an added pressure to help make our next collection the biggest ever," says Neil Blondell, chairman of tin salvage.

It Takes Lots of Rubber to Keep A Plane Flying

Youngsters who fly model airplanes with the help of rubber bands know that it takes a lot of rubber to keep their craft flying.

Likewise, it takes rubber — a lot of rubber — to fly America's combat planes. In addition to heavy rubber tires and tubes, AAF planes need the following rubber equipment: De-icers, fuel cells (gasoline tanks), hose, oil lines, life rafts, life vests, and hundreds of other items.

To "stretch" America's critical rubber supply, the Air Technical Service Command has undertaken a world-wide conservation program in co-operation with all AAF commands and air forces. This program is designed to cut consumption of airplane tires and other rubber parts by at least 25 per cent.

Bombardier Given Second Oak Leaf

An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England. — Second Lieut. Donald L. Morrison, son of Mrs. T. M. Morrison, 794 University Place, Grosse Pointe, has been awarded a second Oak Leaf Cluster to his Air Medal for "exceptionally meritorious achievement" while participating in sustained bomber combat operations over enemy occupied continental Europe, it recently was announced by the commanding general of the Eighth Air Force.

The citation accompanying the award read in part: "The courage, coolness and skill displayed by this officer upon these occasions reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States." Lieutenant Morrison, bombardier on a B-17 Flying Fortress, has flown on some of the Eighth Air Force's roughest missions over Germany, including Berlin, Merseburg, Stuttgart, Munich, and Mannheim. Trained Pigeons Play Important War Roles

Editor's Note—The following is the second in a series showing the valuable roles in which homing pigeons participate in this war.

The army has mobile lofts that house 50 pairs of birds. The lofts are well camouflaged and are usually kept about fifteen miles behind the front lines. The loft is connected by phone or other signal communications with the headquarters of an army, corps, division or other unit.

Airborne troops frequently use pigeons to communicate with their controlling headquarters. A paratrooper may have one or more pigeons strapped to his chest in a special protective jacket. (RAF planes usually carry two pigeons). U. S. heavy bombers usually carry pigeons. They are also carried on ships at sea.

When a bird enters a loft without any message, it is at once assumed that a plane has been forced down, a paratrooper killed or wounded or a ship blown up and that the bird somehow has escaped. During glider landings, messages are sent by pigeon upon landing.

The U. S. Army also drops pigeons from the air, using a six foot parachute for four-bird baskets and an eight foot parachute for eight-bird baskets.

The use of pigeons is, obviously, not "foolproof." When the RAF dropped cages by parachute to guerrilla fighters, the Nazis built similar cages and placed German homing pigeons in baskets, complete with English leg bands and dropped them by parachute to waiting French guerrillas. After the birds returned to their Nazi lofts, the Germans swooped in for a kill. The army has adopted counter-measures to such tactics, which cannot yet be revealed.

Army and navy homing pigeons found by civilians must be turned in. Civilians caught molesting or deterring the pigeons are subject to \$100 fine or six months imprisonment, or both.

1945-46 Budget Approved by Grosse Pointe Park Solons

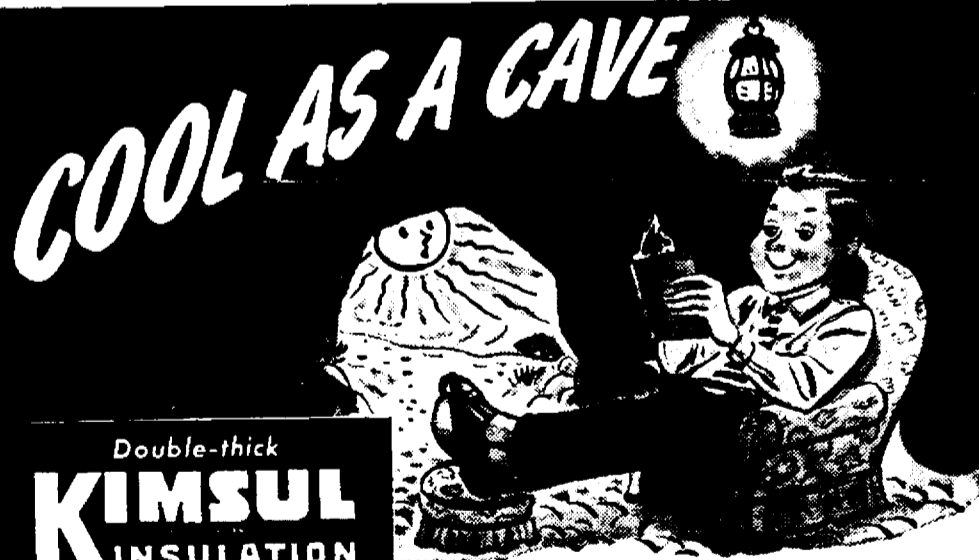

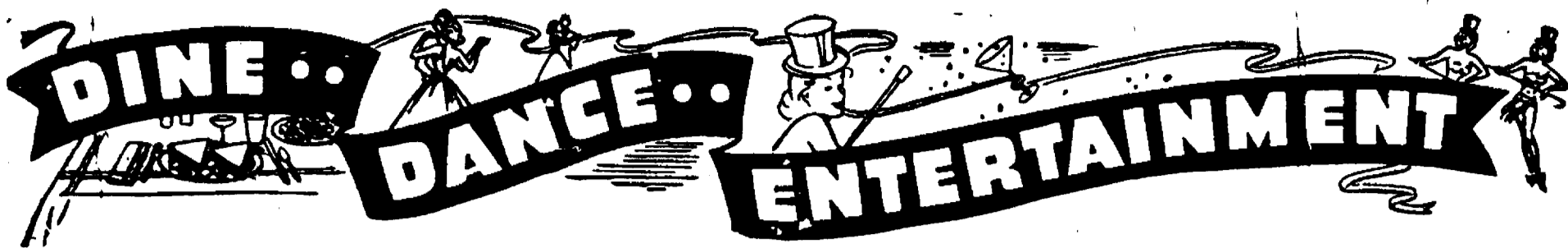

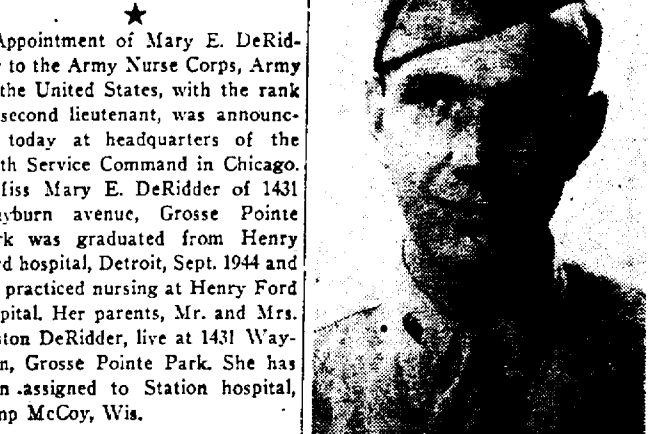
