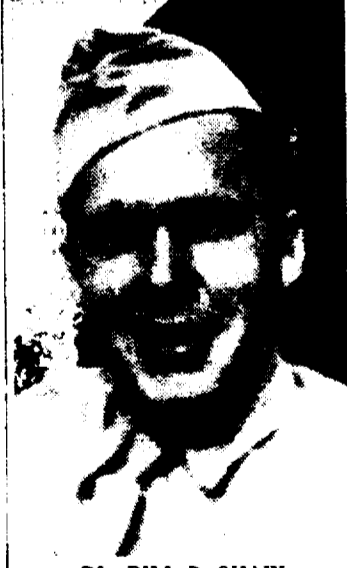

Italy Seven Days Before V-E Day

The day before he was to observe his second wedding anniversary in the far-off lands of Italy proved to be the last day of his life for on April 30, Pfc. Bill D. Shaw, 22, of Grosse Pointe Park was killed fighting the enemy in Northern Italy.

Mrs. Mildred Noble Shaw of 1411 Maryland, wife of Pfc. Shaw, was notified by the War Department on May 16 of the fate of her husband. In a letter received by this soldier's mother, Mrs. Vera Healy of 1166 Maryland, from Lt. Col. Wallace M. Hale, chaplain with her son's outfit, she was told that Pfc. Shaw was participating in an assault on an enemy-held house when he was struck and killed by enemy small arms fire.

Col. Hale continued: "Your son was buried in a U. S. Military Cemetery in Northern Italy, and I conducted a simple Protestant battle-field service at his graveyard. We tried to conduct it in a manner that was befitting his death and one that would have been pleasing to you if you could have been present."

Pfc. Shaw, a member of the armed forces for nearly a year, belonged to the "Blue Devils" division of the 1st Infantry division, of the 3rd Army in Italy. He left the States July 1, 1944 for overseas duty. He was originally a student at Grosse Pointe high school.

In addition to his wife, he also leaves a sister, WAVE, Debra Shaw, Hill, Mrs. S. S. (Mrs. Shaw). Mrs. S. S. (Mrs. Shaw) is the daughter of Mrs. and Mrs. J. H. Henry of 1441 Maryland.

High School Sets New Record in 7th War Loan Drive Here

Grosse Pointe high school has set a new record in home front activity with the announcement this week by W. R. Clemenson, principal, that the students have exceeded by 30 percent the quota of E bonds assigned to the school by the state chairman of the Seventh War Loan Drive.

In five days' participation in the drive, the students sold \$300,000 worth of war bonds. Of this amount, \$125,000 was in E bonds; the remaining amounts were in series G bonds and corporation bonds. The total of bonds is approximately twelve thousand dollars over the established quota.

Introduction of the added services of writing postal money orders and postal notes at the Grosse Pointe postoffice branch on Maumee last week met with enthusiastic response.

A total of more than fifteen hundred dollars in the postal money orders was bought during the first week by an average of eleven purchasers a day. Norbert P. Neff, city clerk, states that official recognition of the local office as a classified branch is in the immediate offing, according to his latest communications with Rep. Louis C. Rabaut and the first assistant postmaster general in Washington. The area postal inspector has reported that the 818 feet of floor space in the building meet the needs of the service and has recommended that the proposed lease which has been signed by the City of Grosse Pointe be accepted. Postal building and fixture installation engineers have made several visits to the location to survey permanent additions.

A JOINT PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS our nation is being gloriously defended by the thousands of our young men and women in the service of our country at home and on foreign battlefields;

WHEREAS it is fitting that their fellow citizens pay homage and honor to those who are now serving, those who have served and those who have died in order that this community may continue to exist in spiritual and material freedom;

NOW, THEREFORE, WE AS MAYOR AND PRESIDENTS of the five Grosse Pointe municipalities do hereby designate Wednesday, May 30, 1945 as Memorial Day and so set aside that day as a public occasion to honor those whose names appear upon the Grosse Pointe Honor Roll; and we call upon all citizens of these Grosse Pointes to attend a Commemoration Ceremony at the Honor Roll Edifice, located on the Grosse Pointe high school grounds, in order more fully to demonstrate our appreciation and humility to those whose strength, faith, loyalty and self sacrifice make the preservation of this democracy possible.

An Eighth Air Force Liberator Station, England—Bertram W. Secord, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bertram R. Secord, of 1626 Lochmoor blvd., Grosse Pointe, has been promoted from sergeant to staff sergeant.

A gunner of a B-24 Liberator, Sergeant Secord has taken part in bombing missions to Magdeburg, Kiel, Berlin, and other war production centers of Germany. He is a member of the 466th Bomb Group, commanded by Lt. Col. William A. Schmidt, of Corpus Christi, Texas, which has completed more than 250 missions against enemy targets. A veteran group in Major General William E. Kepner's second air division, it has participated in the steady bombing of the Rich. On March 24th the group joined other Eighth Air Force Liberators which dropped supplies to the First Allied Airborne Army east of the Rhine. The bombers roared over the dropping area at low altitude, dropping parachutes and bundles containing provisions, ammunition and medical supplies. In forty days, from February 14th to March 25th, the group went on thirty-five missions. Early in March the group bombed naval and military installations at the German port of Swinemunde. The attack was made in co-operation with Marshal Zhukov's Russian forces in the Baltic area.

Sergeant Secord has been awarded a second Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal, "for meritorious achievement in accomplishing with distinction aerial operational missions over enemy occupied Continental Europe. The courage, coolness and skill displayed by him in the face of determined opposition materially aided in

the successful completion of these missions. His actions reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States."

Sergeant Secord entered the service June 30, 1944, and at the time was a student at the Grosse Pointe High School. He received his wings at Laredo, Texas.

S/Sgt. William L. Bayer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wenzel Bayer, of 1422 Wayburn, has recently completed a three week tour with the USO thru various parts of France. Bill was a prominent member of the Glee club at Grosse Pointe high school and has sung at many dances and various occasions.

Pointe Bird Class Seeks Pine Woods As Nature Preserve

The Village Council of Grosse Pointe Farms received a communication from the Grosse Pointe Bird Class made up of residents of the entire Pointe, this past month, asking them to consider the purchase of the Pine Woods as an area for nature studies and recreational purposes.

At the time when this was brought up, there also lay on the council table a request from a real estate company which cares for this property, complaining that much destruction

has been done to the Pine Woods. The Bird Class signees of the letter continued that unsupervised children and adults have cut trees, removed soil and sod and dumped rubbish on the area. They said that if this became a supervised village park and wild life preserve this would be eliminated.

They said that hundreds of Pointe children and adults engage in nature activities. Here in Pine Woods the children could pick flowers, collect frogs, snakes and insects and build fires. Scouts could learn and practice their wild life and conservation activities throughout the year and in winter, the area could be used for winter sports.

It was suggested that part of the

plot could be used as a picnic grounds and the rest of it could be left in its wild state as a nature center and forest.

President James K. Watkins said that this proposition has its merits and should be given much attention by the council; he said investigation of this would reveal if the village could afford the purchase of this piece of land now and make it into a park.

Councilman R. Gervys Grylls said that he wishes to hear more opinions from the public in order to judge what their desires in such a proposition would be.

The entire matter was turned over to the real estate committee for further study.

YOUR GARDEN THIS WEEK

Do not attempt to work the soil in your garden while it clogs in wet lumps on your tools. Seeds planted in water-logged earth will not germinate properly and the soil will be harder to work later on. No time will be gained in the end. Persons attempting to drain gardens with ditches to the sewers are advised to be careful that their top soil does not wash off into the lake. The best answer to the problem is simply to wait until the land drains itself.

The best average dates for setting out tomato plants, egg plants, and peppers are from May 25th to Memorial Day. They are of semi-tropical origin and expect to be pampered with warm soil and warm air. If staked, tomato plants should be set 3 feet apart in all directions. Unstaked plants should be set 4 to 5 feet apart. Do not fertilize until fruit begins to form.

Make new plantings of all seeds sown early in May as soon as the ground dries enough to work. It might still be possible to get good crops of peas and spinach if July remains cool. If beans were planted earlier, they probably have not survived the wet weather. Set out more cabbage plants to have a continuous supply. Parsip seed should be sown—the seed germinates slowly and some radish seed mixed with it will serve to mark the row. Potatoes can be planted when the ground dries, also corn and New Zealand spinach. Plant squashes, melons and cucumbers after Memorial Day.

Plant potatoes in rows not less than 2 feet nor more than 3 feet apart; the hills should be 10 to 15 inches apart in rows. Corn should be planted in several short rows, not in one long one, because it is wind pollinated.

Vegetables planted in April and early May, which have survived the rains, will need thinning. Carrots should be thinned when they are 2 to 3 inches tall to stand 1-inch apart also beets, head lettuce will not head unless it is thinned. It is possible to reset the young lettuce thinnings,

making another row. Do thinning when the soil is moist so that the plants will pull out easily.

Cultivate frequently and pull the weeds from between the plants. Cultivating should be done as soon after each rain as the soil can be worked without sticking to the tools. It is easier to eliminate small weeds than large ones.

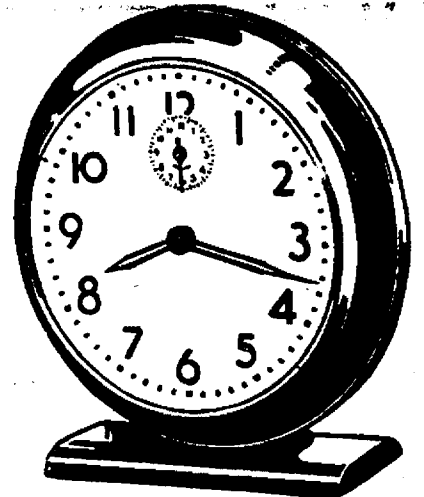

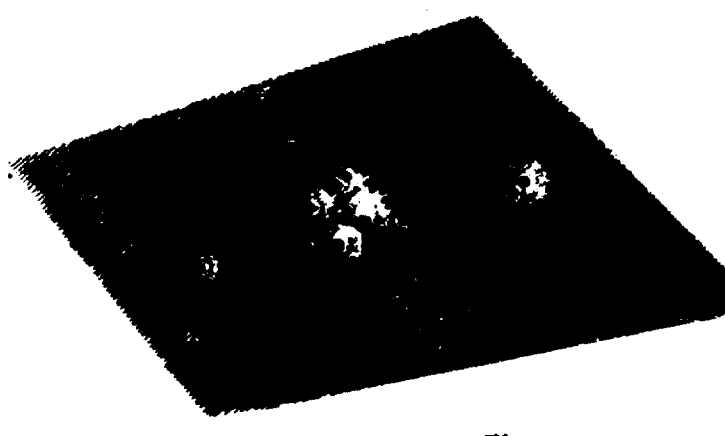

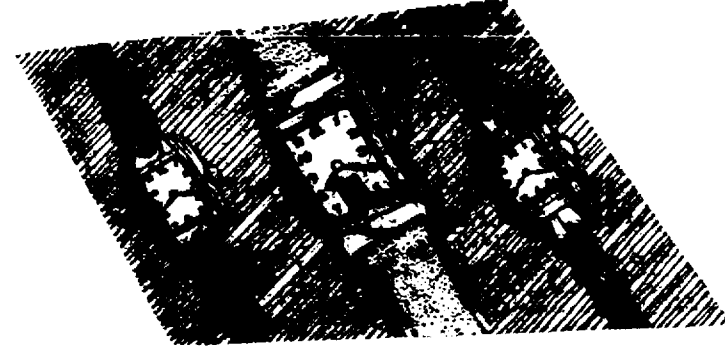
