A Tribute To Grosse Pointe's Heroes

Lake Frontage, "Mansion Type" Homes Affected

Adjustments in the assessments of lake frontage property and the "mansion" type homes in Grosse Pointe township have been made by Carl Schweikart, supervisor of the township. Similar deductions have also been made by the Grosse Pointe Park Board of Review upon the petitions of several property owners.

Michigan tax commission, Mr. Schweikart has reduced the assessment of that property between the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club and Fisher road, ten percent. He has also made the reductions on the "mansion" type homes throughout the Pointe.

Driver Hits Parked Car; Continues On Into Theatre Lobby

In the "free hours of Monday morning," May 28, Grosse Pointe Park police were sent to investigate an auto crash in the vicinity of Jefferson and Beaconsfield.

Over a million dollar reduction in land and building valuations was asked by property owners and their representatives in the Park but the village considered the building valuations only. Because no such reductions were asked in the other villages, the village tax in these municipalities will be unaffected.

The total deduction which the Board of Review of the Park made on the "mansion" type homes amounted to \$121,540 in valuations or \$2,065 in actual money. The latter amount is based upon the approximate current tax rate in the village. This total represents a decrease in the assessments of twenty-nine parcels of property.

Councilmen Appointed

Richard L. Maxon, Farms councilman and Elmer Ulrich, Park commissioner, were appointed to represent their respective communities.

Farms Prepares 1945-46 Budgets; No Increase Found

The village budget of 1945-46 for Grosse Pointe Farms has been prepared and the department heads have distributed their reports to their committee members for approval. It was announced at the village meeting Monday evening.

Operating budgets submitted by department heads do not indicate any particular increases, except for retirement system requirements, which is offset by a like drop in left service assessments are not expected to change materially, indicating a probable tax rate, similar to 1944, of approximately \$12.00 per thousand which includes an arbitrary allowance of approximately \$5,000 for extraordinary improvements.

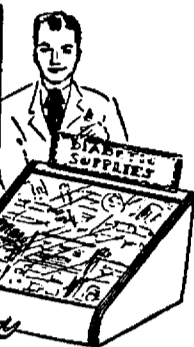
Parents Learn That Son Is Liberated

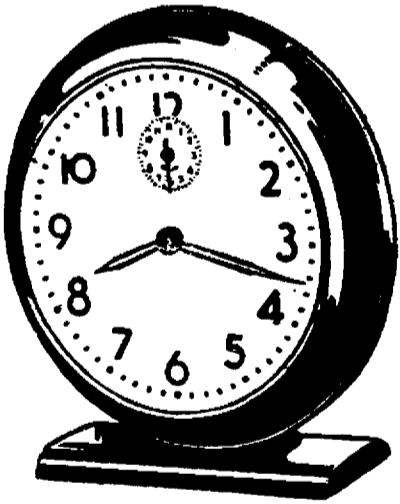

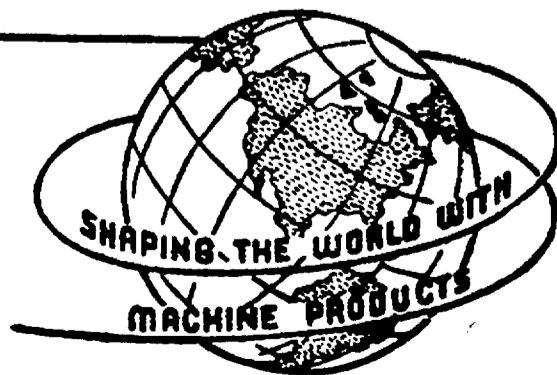
