1944 Graduates in Colleges Earn High Honor Point Record

Exceptionally high marks were earned by recommended graduates of Grosse Pointe high school who entered colleges and universities as freshmen in 1944, according to W. R. Cleminson, principal.

Mr. Cleminson has recently completed a compilation of reports of the freshmen marks of Grosse Pointe graduates received from 31 institutions of higher learning scattered from coast to coast and from Michigan to the Gulf of Mexico.

He found that the recommended group of 1944 earned more A's and B's as first semester college marks than any other group in history. More than fifty per cent of all the marks reported were A's and B's.

Eighty-five graduates of Grosse Pointe high school entered colleges and universities upon the recommendation of the high school in 1944. They carried a total of 1,268 semester hours of work and made an honor-point average of 1.52.

In only one year since 1932 has a higher honor-point average been attained and that was in 1943 when recommended graduates scored an honor-point average of 1.54.

Further Decrease Asked In Park And Township

Additional adjustments in their assessments have been asked by approximately eighty property owners of Grosse Pointe township of the latter's board of review and the supervisor, it was revealed this week.

Legal representative for the group told Carl Schweikart, township supervisor, that his clients were not satisfied with the adjustments he recently made upon the recommendation of the Michigan Tax Commission.

Upon the recommendation of the commission, Schweikart has already reduced the assessment on that property on the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club, Fisher road, 10 per cent. He also made the reduction of "mansion type" houses situated on the Pointe.

Yesterday, the board met again and reopened the question of these township property assessments. After a great deal of discussion, it was decided the board's first action stand; additional adjustments will not be granted.

Existence Under Fire As 'Necessity'

President Howard Parshall of the Grosse Pointe Park village commission raised the question "Is the gasoline emergency over?" when it was suggested to the commission that the OGD parking lot of Pemberton and Jefferson be discontinued.

This was brought up because Commissioner Homer Fritsch reported that since the national OGD is being discontinued and the state and local OGD groups might also follow suit, who is to bear the expense of the parking lot? Since the lot has been established, the upkeep has been shared by the five municipalities through their participation in the OGD.

A check was made by Henry Piel, Park police chief, of the number of cars and the addresses of their owners on May 29, 30, 31, and June 1 to determine the extent of the use of the lot. It was found that 67 Detroit cars used the lot, with the following totals: Park, 143; City, 37; Farms, 42; Shores, 3; Woods, 17; and St. Clair Shores, 14.

Because the lot was used mainly by Park residents, it was decided to forego definite immediate abandonment of the lot; E. R. Lane, village manager, was asked to check with the officials of the other communities for their opinions. A report will be made at the next meeting and it will then be determined what to do with the parking lot.

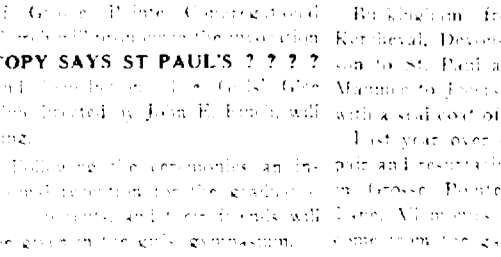

VETERAN OF 96 MISSIONS



A First Tactical Air Force Fighter-Bomber Group, France. — First Lieut. John E. He is a veteran invader pilot of 96 missions.

The 12 planes were part of Lieut. Col. George "Tom Man" Lee's Invaders, a fighter group of the First Tactical Air Force. They dropped 15,000 pounds of bombs on the ammunition dump, starting large fires and destroying a number of buildings and a gas station.

Cruikshank, headmaster of the school.

Members of the graduating class include Hugo Higbie, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harley G. Higbie of Grosse Pointe Farms. Higbie has been a member of the Glee club and was manager of the golf team. He expects to enter Yale university this fall.

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**Grosse Pointe High School Expects Record Enrollment for Summer Sessions**

The regular Grosse Pointe summer school begins its registration tomorrow, June 15, at 2 p.m., in the high school building and will continue enrolling students Saturday morning and during the early part of next week. On Monday, June 18, regular classes will begin at eight o'clock in the morning. Those in charge urge the use of the Friday and Saturday registration periods. "Not only will it enable students to start promptly on Monday but it will offer the greater opportunity for individual attention to each student's selection of courses," said H. Leroy Seimeier, the summer school principal.

Advance requests for information point to a large summer school. As has been true in more recent years the percentage of summer school students who are forced to attend because of their failures in the regular session has become less and less. The modern summer school seems to appeal to the more ambitious boys who wish to get all the science and mathematics they can before graduation. Many girls as well as boys take courses in typing and music which they cannot crowd in the program during the regular year.

This interest of students is particularly expressed in 1945 by their request for two new courses in music. One in theory will give the elements of musical harmony. The other in voice will help students secure the correct tone production for work in speech, dramatics, or solo singing. These musical opportunities will be under the direction of Glen Woods and are in addition to the regular instrumental instruction which will be conducted by Samuel Trickey.

High school foreign language study has been expanded considerably. Spanish and French as well as Latin will be available. The full facilities of the high school library will enrich the teaching of English and social studies just as it does in the regular session.

All courses are thoroughly covered in the eight week period ending June 22. Classes are held five days a week, Monday through Friday, but since class periods are twice as long, this concentrated effort works no hardship on the student. Working under qualified teachers the student must meet the same test standards as in the normal school year.

The regular fee of \$6 per course is required of all residents of Grosse Pointe at the time of registration while a fee of \$12 per course is required of all non-residents before they may enter any classes.

As has been customary for many years, special instruction in the elementary school subjects of arithmetic, spelling, and reading for the third, fourth, fifth, and sixth grades will be available. The emphasis is placed upon the growth in these fundamentals by each individual child. Past records have shown many fine cases of improvement in the fall after such a summer's work in one or more of these elementary school subjects. This summer, these courses will be led by Miss Nault, Mrs. Westphal, and Mr. Schaffer.

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# SERVICE PARADE

With the 33rd Division in the Philippines. — Fierce and bloody fighting is almost commonplace to the doughboys of the 33rd Division pushing their way through the rugged mountainous terrain of Northern Luzon and only with the aid of accurate artillery firing could the infantrymen forge ahead.

Lieut. Walter V. Desimpel, of 1264 Buckingham road, Grosse Pointe Park, serving with the 210th Field Artillery Battalion, an artillery forward observer, accompanied an infantry company which was assaulting Bue Bue Mountain in Northern Luzon at a point where the Japs in

well dug-in fortifications were offering strong opposition from many advantageous positions.

During the infantry assault in the rough terrain the infantry company were under thick fire from heavy enemy machine gun and mortar fire, and forced to withdraw after suffering casualties. Second Lieutenant Desimpel remained with a squad of 15 infantrymen who were furnishing covering fire for the withdrawal of the rest of the company. Desimpel in spite of being in a precarious position, easily in range of the enemy weapons, remained and directed artillery fire to the extent of sending

700 rounds of artillery shells raining down on the enemy fortifications and guns. During the time that the artillery shells were blasting the Japs, the fanatical Nips stuck to their weapons, wounding several of the 15 infantrymen covering the retreat.

For his courage and heroism performed in action against the enemy Lieutenant Desimpel has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal and at present also wears the shiny silver bar of a first lieutenant.

"Here" is the First Cavalry Division rest camp in southern Luzon for war-weary cavalrymen. Private Kreutz is one of 200 guests for four days and is having a wonderful time.

Named "Mabuhay," which means "long live" in Tagalog, the camp has a large fresh-water swimming pool, a reading and writing room, and a recreation hall. Swing music is broadcast throughout the day and the First Cavalry Division band holds concerts in the late afternoon. Movies are shown every night in the outdoor theatre and a dance every third night, with cute Filipino girls

invited from nearby towns, make Camp Mabuhay tops with Private Kreutz and his comrades.

The American Red Cross does its share by giving cigarettes, chewing gum, candy, and one can of beer a day to the cavalrymen. It also furnishes two attractive Red Cross girls to serve ice-cold Coca-Cola. As Private Kreutz remarked, "It's wonderful here but it doesn't last long enough!"

**Landing of Jap Balloon in Michigan Brings OCD Warning**

Disclosure that at least one Japanese bomb-carrying balloon has been found in Michigan has brought warning from George Elworthy Director of the Pointe OCD that persons discovering a suspicious or strange object should definitely not touch it, but report their find to the nearest civilian defense official or police.  
 "Recently six persons were killed in the west when one of them apparently disturbed a balloon-bomb which had failed to explode when it landed," Elworthy stated.  
 "It should be remembered that not always will the bomb be found with the balloon, therefore do not touch any detached object that could in any possible way be a bomb."  
 Elworthy pointed out that the Army has set up special boards to investigate balloon-bomb incidents.  
 "Pending the arrival of such a board, a guard should be established and permit no unauthorized persons to have access to the site of the recovery of a balloon-bomb," Elworthy stated. "This is especially important as such cases would not only be hazardous, but might result in important military information or evidence being lost or destroyed."  
 "If a balloon-bomb is discovered it should be reported immediately to the nearest Civilian Defense official or the police. They will take prompt action, give instructions, and notify the proper Army authorities. Under no circumstances should the individual meddle with the contraption, as he will do so at his own peril."

For military security reasons, Elworthy said, it is not possible to reveal where the balloon was found in Michigan. Military censorship permitted only release of information that one had been recovered in the State, when the news accidentally leaked out in New York. There was no indication as to whether there may have been more than one.

According to the Japanese minister of propaganda, hundreds of the balloons are being launched daily. They ascend to a height where the prevailing east to west winds bring them to this continent. The balloons carry both explosive and fire bombs. Japan has now threatened to man them with suicide pilots.

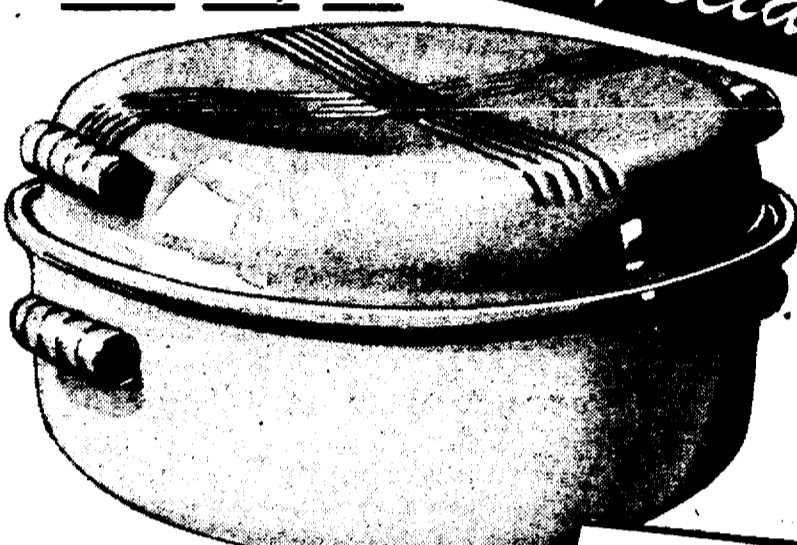

**Sergeant Has 84 Points; Home on 30 Day Furlough**

Sergt. David R. Nagel, son of Julius Nagel of St. Clair, arrived in Grosse Pointe last Wednesday for a 30-day furlough, after docking at an eastern port June 3 on the Monticello, former Italian luxury liner which carried some ten thousand troops of Lieut. Gen. Courtney Hodges' crack First Army.

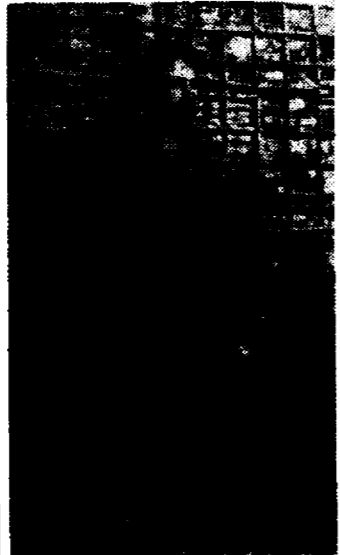

### Local Consumers of Fuel Warned of Increasing Shortage

Fuel users in this community — the domestic consumers of coal, coke and briquettes — are urged to accept such kinds and sizes of fuel usable in their equipment as their dealer can supply them rather than wait for preferred kinds or sizes, officials of the Solid Fuels Administration announced here recently.

This warning has been issued because the aggregate production of those southern coals generally preferred by domestic consumers such as Pocahontas and the soft coals of Virginia, West Virginia and Eastern Kentucky was more than 3 1/2 million tons less than last year; production of hard coal was more than six million tons less.

Vastly larger quantities of coke are also being withdrawn from domestic use this season than last year for the use of heavy war industries.

By accepting now the kinds and sizes of fuel which dealers can deliver such as Ohio, Northern West Virginia, Pennsylvania and the less scarce coals of Indiana, Illinois and Western Kentucky, consumers will at least assure themselves of a supply of usable fuel which may not be available later.

By waiting, in what appears to be a forlorn hope, for preferred kinds or sizes of fuel, which seems to be the prevailing tendency, domestic consumers will throw a burden upon
