Prior to the adoption of the amendment, Clerk Harry Furton read protests from the residents of 445 and 447 Moross road who objected to the location of the entrance of the proposed parking lot which would be in a close proximity to their homes. An argument for the last point was brought out by Councilman William Connolly, Jr., who said that the erection of homes which has been proposed by Charles Babcock in that area on Moross and Ridgemont (which will be extended), would enhance the two homes, rather than detract from them.

A second objection to the amendment was raised by legal counsel for H. S. Stabler who purchased the village property along Mack from Kerby to the theatre site.

Charles Babcock presented his formal plat for approval, his personal bond for improvements and the restrictions for his subdivision. The plat was accepted and the village

Additional Repairs To Be Made on Local Post Office

Investigating the possibilities of remodeling and repairing the Grosse Pointe post office branch located in the City-owned building on Maumee between St. Clair and Neff, Councilman Chester F. Carpenter found that if the building is to be used to the best of its advantage, an additional appropriation should be made to the \$150 allotted recently by the City council.

Mr. Carpenter found that the lighting system and remodeling and decorating of the interior as well as the removal of a small stoop at the entrance could be accomplished in such a manner that the residents of the City would be proud of it if a higher sum of money could be spent.

The councilmen, after this explanation, agreed to an additional \$250 to carry on this work. This will be done in accordance with the wishes of the postal officials who made certain demands on the City before a lease could be drawn. After the completion of this work, the lease between the City and the postoffice department will be signed.

Elworthy Told Of Necessity To Maintain Council

A recent communication to George Elworthy, chairman of the Grosse Pointe civilian defense council, from Capt. Donald S. Leonard, director of civilian defense for the state of Michigan, stated that the OCD program would remain in operation until hostilities were ended.

The defense councils were established under state law for the duration of the war and therefore cannot be abolished either by their own action or the action of any other governmental agency. They will remain legal entities until a dissolution directive is sent out by the state. It is expected that such a directive will be issued immediately after the war.

A similar set of regulations applies to members of these councils. Although members may resign, they are appointed by the governor upon the recommendation of the director, and no decision of any other governmental agency affects their membership or voids their responsibility for the essential civilian defense operations that still remain.

This communication from Captain Leonard has helped to clear up some of the confusion created by the order issued by President Truman, in which he discontinued the national OCD. This order has been misinterpreted in many communities as also affecting state and local organizations. Because the national office was created merely to serve as an advisory body and to provide for a uniform program of training protective service volunteers, President Truman specifically urged that the state and local branches operating through the present war effort. With state and local branches operating smoothly there is no longer any need for the national OCD.

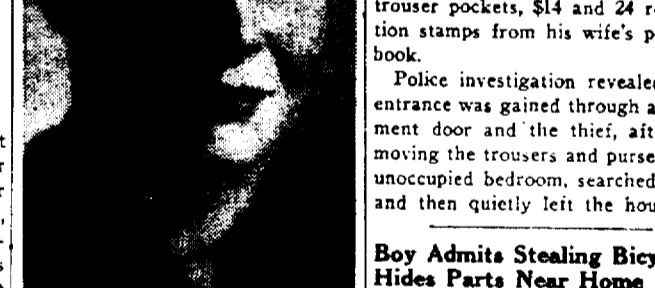
Because the OCD has been questioned by so many in this locality the explanation by Leonard should clarify many of the details about which Grosse Pointe residents and local OCD members have been

Canning Center Opens Wednesday

In view of the obvious food shortage, the Grosse Pointe community canning center, under the chairmanship of Countess Cyril Tolsted, will open at Grosse Pointe high school on Wednesday, July 25, to aid housewives with processing non-perishable food from their victory gardens. Home canning is considered more essential this year than at any time during the war. The preservation of food has become a battle station of primary importance, particularly for those who have the town gardens or who have had a very good garden. Fresh fruits, beans and vegetables are produced in abundance during a period of the year. This abundance of food is a source of pride and satisfaction to the community.

The center will be open on Wednesday, July 25, from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. All interested persons should bring their own jars and lids. The center is located at the high school, 15103 Kerckhove at Farmland.

Seek School Site on Pointe Property at Mack-Radnor

Announcement was made this week of a communication which the City of Grosse Pointe has received from the Fathers of Saint Augustine regarding a trade of property which would allow them to erect a school in a desirable section of Detroit.

The property in question is that which is owned by the City but located in Detroit from Mack to a short distance from Harper avenue and extending from Radnor to Detroit's property, a distance of 204 ft. This was purchased many years ago by the City for the erection of a disposal plant and city dump; in the past few years it has been used as a salvage depot for Grosse Pointe.

The communication asked that a trade be made between Detroit and the City of Grosse Pointe for a tract of this land. In turn, the Augustinian Fathers would then purchase the land from Detroit.

The real estate committee, Councilmen Hal Smith and D. M. Ferry Jr., and City Assessor Neil Blondell, were asked by the council to negotiate with the City of Detroit and establish a price for the sale of the entire piece of property and report their findings at the next meeting.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Editor, Grosse Pointe Review, Grosse Pointe Park 30, Mich. Dear Editor: After reading several articles in The Grosse Pointe Review which had to do with the Boy Scouts of Gratiot township and Scoutmaster S. M. Martin, and too, having watched this troop's drum and bugle corps as they paraded through the streets of our township a few weeks ago with the smartness and rhythm of veterans, the writer was so impressed, that he called on Mr. Martin for a visit. I learned just how he had accomplished so much with these boys after being with the troop only eight months.

My visit with Mr. Martin was very pleasant as well as one of great enlightenment. When I stated the nature of my visit which had been prompted from my interest in the rapid progress he had made with his Scouts, besides having a young son of my own of almost Scout age, he seemed most eager to reveal to me everything that he had accomplished; what he is doing at present, and the multitude of plans for the troop in the immediate future. After making me comfortable in his home, he started unfolding to me his career as a Scoutmaster, why he took such a keen interest in developing the boys; the many things he and his assistants had accomplished and what they had proposed and planned to promote the growth and welfare of the Boy Scouts of Gratiot township. He did not have to inform me as to just why he had and is spending so much time in the training of our

boys, for one can instantly see that he is a Scoutmaster at heart and will devote everything humanly possible to gain his end. I think that his achievement thus far in this noble work is convincing enough for the most skeptical. He does not, even for an instant, leave the impression that he is seeking glory. His only desire is to further his work with the thought of administering something to the coming generation that would be difficult for the parents in any mentioned area to accomplish otherwise.

The following is just part of what Scoutmaster Martin and his assistants have done in the past eight months since the organization of the Scouts in Gratiot township and their plans for the future.

Mr. Martin, Mr. McClellan and their committee have just finished three training courses; basic, advance and troop camping. Much space could be used to amplify each of the above courses but they all sift down to the proper development of the boys' bodies and minds. The Scouts are taught that God must be served as, well as outdoor sports, first aid, aggressiveness, ingenuity, leadership, elocution, craftsmanship and many other things too numerous to mention. To sum it all up they are taught to make themselves useful, sound thinking and God fearing American citizens, not for the present but for generations to come. If the people of this community as well as others, would take time out to learn just what a Scout has to do in order to finish all the courses and steps, which by the way is equivalent to a two year course in most of the subjects of high school, they would have a different perspective of a Boy Scout. Then the parents of a Boy Scout 12 years or older would be proud to say "my boy is a Scout." It's just as important to parents of girls to become active in assisting the Scout movement as it is to those with sons. As a matter of fact it is important to any one that seeks to live in a better community and has his or her country at heart and who would like a part in preventing juvenile delinquency.

In just a few months Mr. Jukuri has trained the Scouts' drum and bugle corps. Any that saw them parade will agree that Mr. Jukuri did a marvelous job and it is our firm conviction that he will remain unchallenged as a great trainer or instructor of any Boy Scout drum and bugle corps.

July 27, 28 and 29 the Scouts will camp on Gulf Island in the middle of Lake St. Clair. The boys are

looking forward to it. The three days outdoors will include every kind of sport and instruction. On the last day, which is Sunday, the boys of Protestant faith will attend a religious service, and those of Catholic faith will also attend services. What boy would not be delighted to make this trip? One can readily see that nothing is overlooked to teach better and cleaner living.

There will be a number of boys picked at random, to participate in a radio program entitled "The Quiz of Two Cities," the boys picked from Gratiot township troop will compete on the program with Scouts of a troop from Cleveland. What would please Gratiot township more than to have our boys take the honors? But whether they do or not, it will be more good training.

Reservations for a week-end at Ortonville has been made.

Now a word as to where the money goes that the Scouts earn. Any remuneration received by the boys from collecting scrap paper, etc., is their own and to do with as they please. This latter is well to know and remember as some people are prone to believe that this goes in the Scout fund. On these jobs the Scout does not wear his uniform. As a matter of fact he is forbidden to do so just as he would on any job where he is on his own. For example the Scout does not wear his uniform to deliver a paper route, etc. Any funds or articles however, that are donated to the Scout organization naturally are retained and used by the Scouts. For instance, the drum and bugle belong to the "Boy Scouts of America" as does any and everything they have, since our troop of Gratiot township is a part of the "Boy Scouts of America."

Mention should be made and thanks extended for the many favors that the citizens of Gratiot township and other communities have made for our local Scout troop. Mr. Powers has been very generous in loaning his truck for the paper drive. This is indeed appreciated and until such time as the boys, 41 in number, become the owners of a truck to serve for purposes of this kind and to take them back and forth on their trips, this is the only form of travel or transportation that they have. Mr. Martin, Mr. Jukuri and their committee are diligently occupied at the present time working for funds towards the purchase of a new truck which will become the property of the "Boy Scouts of America" but will be used solely by the Gratiot township troop.

Danielli, which formerly served the Germans to transport supplies and troops, is now being used by the Fifth Army as an excursion boat on Lake Garda, Italy. Music, dancing, rope shows and refreshment comprise the entertainment. Maintained by the 2633rd Service company, the organization responsible for all hotels and rest centers in the Fifth Army area, and commanded by First Lieut. Paul E. Grieder, 941 Nottingham road, Grosse Pointe Park, the excursion boat makes evening cruises six times weekly for prearranged parties, and one evening weekly for all comers, sponsored by the American Red Cross. Matinee cruises also are made regularly for the Red Cross and for private organizational parties. The steamboat leaves the pier at Fifth Army Headquarters on Lake Garda and once under way the master of ceremonies, Pvt. William H. Shockey, Jr., 6626 Franklin avenue, Hollywood, Calif., takes over. He acquaints the soldiers on board with the card room, dancing on the upper deck and the small Italian band. On evening cruises he takes charge of the floor show, and on matinee cruises he indicates points of interest along the lake shore. In the meantime, Mess Sgt. Joseph Heasell, 1362 Walnut street, Berkeley, Calif., and Mess Cook, Pfc. John M. Fleming, 10000 street, Uniontown, Pa., are busy in the ship's galley making the sandwiches, luncheon meat sandwiches, and coffee to serve later in the trip. Grieder and his assistant, Pfc. William B. Ledford, Hayesville, N. C., make their way about the boat to be sure that all is running smoothly. There is a qualified lifeguard on duty at all times. The Edward M. Danielli carries about two hundred persons on each cruise, though the Germans carried as many as 600 troops aboard to transport to other parts of the lake during the war. The ship is the only one of a fleet of nine not scuttled when the American forces reached Lake Garda.

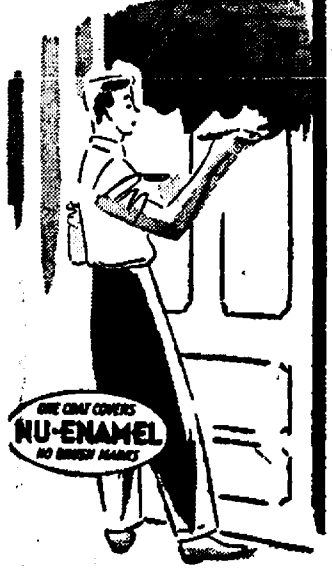

Social Security Planned for Aged

In general if you work for any manufacturing firm or corporation, you come under the social security act. You have a social security account with your government and you have, or should have, a social security account number card. This is issued to you under the federal old-age and survivors insurance system established by the social security act.

Have you figured out what this may mean to you? And to your wife? For example, suppose you are getting along in years. In January 1945, shall we say, you will be 65 years old and want to quit work for good. What would your social security benefits come to?

The amount of the benefits would depend on the pay you have been getting — your average monthly pay, figured over the years since the old-age and survivors insurance system was started, Jan. 1, 1937. If you have been paid an average of \$150 a month.

If your social security account shows an average monthly pay amounting to \$150, and you have been working since Jan. 1, 1937, your monthly retirement payment, figured by the rule which is given in the law, comes to \$32.40. Your wife, if she is 65 when you retire, or whenever she is 65, would get half as much as you would get, and the two of you would have \$48.60.

And when the navy's haberdashery runs low on supplies, she ups anchor and scoots off to the naval supply depot. Soon she is back again peddling her wares.

AAF 'Black Widow' Night Fighter Has Eight 'Stingers'

First official announcement of the armament carried by the AAF's "Black Widow" night fighter plane, released today at ATSC headquarters here, reveals that the "Widow" carries a powerful stinger — in fact, eight of them.

First official release on the Northrop built — P-61, which has been in combat action now for some months, was made last October, but for security reasons information on the plane's armament was kept on the restricted list.

Mounted in the belly of the plane are four millimeter cannon. In a power turret just above and behind the pilot are four more .50 calibre machine guns. The turret can be power-driven to fire to the rear, with

automatic cut-offs to miss the twin tail fins. All the guns are fired by pressing a button.

The twin-engined plane, was designed principally for night fighting, and in this phase of AAF operation has already won a reputation as a deadly fighter aircraft.

Need Used Kitchen Fats, Housewives Are Told

"Many women are not participating in the fat salvage program, because they find it necessary in these days of shortages to re-use cooking fats in their kitchens," Neil Blondell, Grosse Pointe salvage chairman, said today.

government asks them to do is turn in all those fats which they would normally throw away because they have no further re-use value.

"Persistent accumulation, spoonful by spoonful, is absolutely essential," Blondell points out. "Used fats turned in today for two red points and four cents a pound will have become pure glycerine and be on their way to munitions plants or medicinal laboratories in less than three weeks."

Every form of animal or vegetable fat, including cooking oils, is seriously needed. Fats used to be imported in huge quantities from islands of the Far East, now in Japanese hands. American housewives are asked today to make up this shortage. No matter how often fats have been used, how black they have become, or what cooking odors they have acquired, they still contain 10 per cent of crystal-clear glycerine. Many essential war supplies can be made only from glycerine.
