Recently one small boy was killed and two others were seriously injured, as a result of playing "Marine Raiders" with a souvenir rifle from the German battlefield.

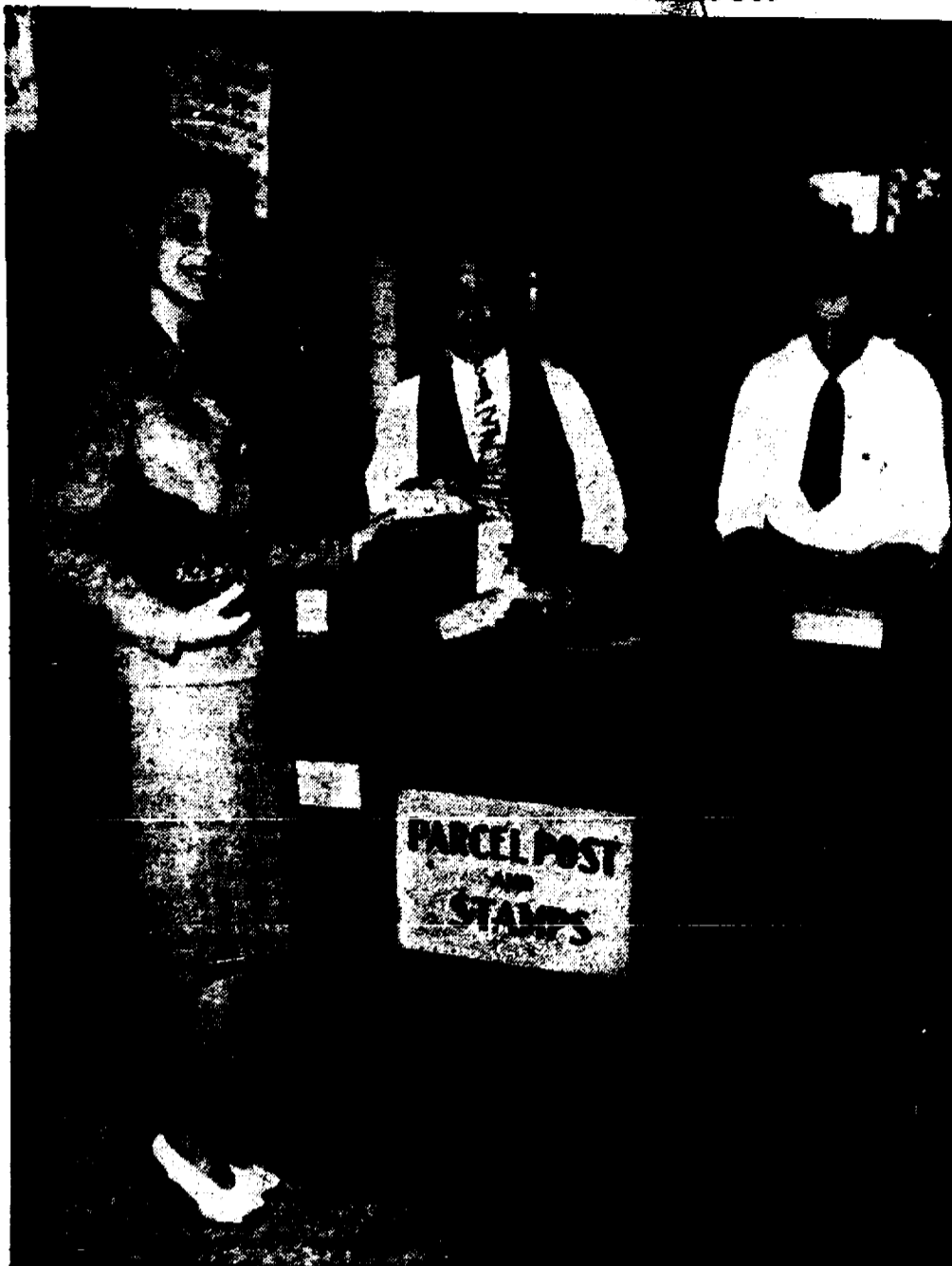
Even if the gun is not loaded, a child may find a bullet somewhere and insert it in the chamber. And since many of the guns picked up by soldiers are in a damaged condition...

A tax attorney before entering military service 2 1/2 years ago, Corporal McKee has been attached to an evacuation unit of the ATC and has

served in many sectors of the European and Mediterranean theatres, including Casablanca, Italy, France, etc. He will leave shortly for duty in the Pacific, where he was originally slated to go direct from Europe when he was granted the unexpected leave.

Donald S. Crampton, a member of the Army Airways Communications System, has recently been promoted to the rank of private first class, as a reward for his fidelity to duty and in recognition of the quality of leadership that he has demonstrated.

Aboard the U. S. S. Terror in the Pacific. — Homer W. Lombus, first class, USNR, whose wife lives at 1073 Wayburn, Grosse Pointe Park, served on this minelayer which directed operations of the mine fleet at Okinawa to highlight a combat career that has taken her into the Atlantic and nearly all waters of the Pacific.

Although primarily a minelayer, she also has been used as an ammunition ship, supplying shells for larger vessels of the fleet and for American units establishing beachheads on many Pacific atolls.

During the Saipan campaign, the Terror evacuated casualties to Pearl Harbor. She also transported wounded Japanese prisoners; twice she was in port for repairs, the last time early this year.

She arrived at Iwo Jima three days before invasion troops waded ashore, directing anti-mine operations, then left on D-Day carrying wounded to Saipan.

The Terror remained in port until preparations began for the Okinawa attack. She arrived eight days before the landings on that island and entered Kerama Rhetto three days before the landing to transport operations of the mine

From Hondo the graduates go either to Randolph Field, Tex., Maxwell Field, Ala., Lowry Field, Colo., or Roswell, N. M., to join other officer crew members for B-29 transitional training preparatory to entering combat.

Headquarters, 73rd Bomb Wing, Saipan. — With their combat tour completed, the crew of the B-29 "Skyscraper" looked back today on an air adventure that took them over the Japanese homeland 35 times.

Capt. John Garvin of North Bergen, N. J., and his crew had a "pre-view" of Tokyo last November 10 when they flew a secret mission 14 days before the first Tokyo strike. It can be told now that they were gathering weather information, checking the altitude, and accuracy of flak being thrown up at them, and making other observations. Since that day the "Skyscraper" crew has flown successful missions thru all kinds of weather and enemy opposition.

The entire crew, including Tech.

Sergt. Frank J. Oblock, central fire control gunner, of 1792 Roslyn road, Grosse Pointe, agreed that their toughest day was the famous Jan. 27th air battle over Tokyo. That day, the sky was full of Japanese fighters waiting for the B-29's.

Flying in the leading group over the target, Garvin's crew was credited with five Japs knocked down and one probable. Each gunner in the crew was credited with shooting down a Jap that day, and every man in the plane received the DFC. The plane returned to its base with five shell hits in the bomb bays and one in the tail.

The crew is particularly proud of "Skyscraper" because the firm at which the pilot had previously worked, had raised money in excess of the cost of a B-29. The airplane bore a special plaque, and at the crew's request, the employees of the firm

held a contest in which the plane was named.

Eighth Army Headquarters, Leyte, P. I. — To the deserving few who have been awarded the Bronze Star medal, the phrase "For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy," is a familiar one from the citation. To officers in the judge advocate general's section of Lieut. Gen. Robert L. Eichberger's Eighth Army Headquarters it means something more; records show that when the entire commissioned personnel of a staff section receive the coveted award it is indeed the exception rather than the rule.

The three officers in the section, all practicing lawyers before the war, include Capt. Harold T. Emmons, Jr., of 361 Rivard boulevard, Grosse Pointe.

10,000 More Wacs Sought in New Recruiting Program
A program to recruit 10,000 additional members in the next six months for the Wac was announced by the war department recently. Main purpose of the program is to supply trained workers to assist in redeployment of army troops to the Southwest Pacific, in line with the war department's over-all policy to speed the war against Japan, and to facilitate discharge procedure for veterans with high point scores returning from all battlefronts.

Recruitment will be pointed toward obtaining women with clerical skills or aptitudes. Skilled clerks, typists, and stenographers will be assigned to jobs upon completion of their basic training at the First War Training Center, Fort Des Moines, Ia. Untrained women will attend a clerk's school at Fort Des Moines following their basic course.

In all train, trained women will be recruited for the following assignments: Cryptographic technician, camera technician, war observer, airplane propeller specialist, airplane instruments specialist, optometrist, key punch machine operator, telephone exchange operator, typist, stenographer, clerk, draftsman and dental laboratory

Used Kitchen Fats Help War Plants Produce

Lubricants used in industrial production are made from salvaged household fats. Practically no metal object is produced without being drilled, turned on a lathe, or drawn. In each of these operations a lubricant is necessary to reduce friction,

remove heat, prevent corrosion and produce a smooth, accurate finish. Another valuable contribution is the fat base coating which eliminates the need for copper plating in the manufacture of 37 mm. cartridge cases. This fat base coating has been found a satisfactory substitute for copper in the first draw operation in making these cases, thus saving the copper for other war uses.

Viewed constructively from the annual reports of the principals to the superintendent, there are certain very definite observations of a strong and creative year of development in our schools. A few of the most significant of these observations are as follows:

A significant growth in the participation of school children in community services and in assuming responsibilities of citizenship. Probably in no year since the war have the students and teachers made as definite a part of their daily program as this year in the participation in the services of the community necessary to the winning of the war and the establishing of a peace. In addition to the regular weekly sales of war stamps and war bonds totalling \$89,827.00, the children of the Grosse Pointe schools and their teachers have organized and conducted a sale of war bonds for the Sixth and Seventh War Bond Drives that are a credit to the community. In the Sixth War Bond Drive the total sales of war bonds of children and the teachers in our local public schools were \$621,780. In the Seventh War Bond Drive the young salesmen of our public schools sold \$844,520 worth of bonds. In brief our schools have bought or sold \$1,556,127.00 worth of war bonds during the past school year.

In the Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh War Bond Drives there has passed through the hands of the children and their teachers of our schools three and two-tenths million dollars worth of transactions of war bonds. The civic and educational significance of this tremendous amount of activity, organization and financial responsibility that has been undertaken by the children of our schools should not be overlooked by the community in its appraisal of their educational program. Too often adults assume that children are irresponsible simply because they are children and yet they have actually handled over three million dollars worth of business with relatively no loss or violation of their trust.

Without any reference to specific cases, this is a far better record of trust and responsibility than many adult governments or business organizations can boast.

In addition our pupils and teachers have contributed earnestly and devotedly to the upbuilding of the national community in its war effort.

Contributions, in student government and control and in participation in all of the major community interests during the war period. How valuable these contributions have been to the community can only be estimated by a quick reflection of what the community would have probably done without the aid of its youth through their organized public schools.

The year has also shown evidences of growth in our health education and physical education. A committee of elementary teachers, parents and administrators has been at work during the entire year on planning a new and strengthened program in health and physical education. The board of education has authorized the provision of specialized direction of this work through what we are to call a **teacher-counselor in health education** who will be given half time to assist all of the elementary teachers in their health education work. The secondary physical education department is making plans for developing units of instruction to make physical education program in high school and junior high school more flexible.

The co-operation of the Grosse Pointe township board of health and Health Commissioner Davies and the improvement of its program during the year has been another step in the direction of improvement of our health in Grosse Pointe.

Similar planning and improvement is under way in the departments of art and music where, again, special provision has been made for the appointment of an elementary teacher-counselor in art and a committee of teachers from the entire system has been at work throughout the year in refining and improving the art program in both the secondary and elementary schools.

Attention has already been called to the fact that this has probably been the best year of any year since the war in our results in the fundamental skills in reading, writing, spelling and arithmetic in the elementary schools. Our testing program has shown excellent results along this line and has also pointed out areas that need further improvement. None of the elementary schools have made considerable advance in catching the social studies in introducing more of the expressive arts and increasing the variety of learning experiences. Two schools have made further progress in teaching desirable social attitudes, such as tolerance, responsibility and in the use of the toilet.

A committee has been at work during the year on the improvement of our kindergarten program.

Plans have been completed and work is under way for a decided step forward in our counseling program for which the board of education has authorized the appointment of specialized counselors in both the elementary and secondary schools. In the elementary schools the specialized counselor will be a visiting teacher working through the department of pupil personnel with parents and pupils on helping teachers to discover subtle problems of behavior affecting the learning process. In the secondary schools teacher-counselors have been appointed to give concentrated attention to the individual problem of children as they move through the school program toward emancipation from home and school when they must be able to make intelligent and independent decisions and judgments. Each counselor will have from 200 to 250 pupils for whom he will be responsible for individual counseling over a three-year period.

Our tests and various activities and exhibits in our schools have shown a growth in our instruction in improving the understanding of children regarding the resources and possibilities and potentialities of the United States, of the state of Michigan and of their local region.

Departmental reports from the secondary schools show that we are beginning to have encouraging results from the reorganization of a year ago of our secondary school subjects on a departmental basis. By the appointment of department heads, an attempt was made to decentralize the initiative in construction and development of our secondary school curriculum. Very small school systems and large cities must depend greatly upon curriculum centralization. Grosse Pointe is becoming too large to effectively direct or control curriculum from a central office; yet it is not large enough to demand a staff of research and curriculum specialists, even if that were desirable. Because of this and because we believe that the best potential designer of curriculum is the one who uses it, with a good educational "architect" available to assist the designers with co-ordination and technicalities, the plan of department heads, with no administrative responsibility, jointly responsible with the principal, fellow teachers and the assistant superintendent for curriculum development, was worked out last year.

The work-cumulative record of the year shows a definite improvement in the understanding and use of the core-curriculum and language arts in the elementary schools for which teaching guides were developed by the department of instruction in 1940 and 1941.

A special report of the assistant superintendent in charge of instruction has also shown a decided improvement in the use of visual aids in enriching the learning process and making instruction more significant. We have an increasing volume of use of our film library and an improved technique of the distribution of our slum equipment. Several schools have shown a decided improvement in the use of exhibits and of making the exhibit an instructive device both for children and parents.

In the junior high schools improved methods of administration and counseling have yielded results in the improvement of general conduct of pupils and decrease of discipline problems over previous year. The junior high schools have also shown results in improved methods of teaching reading and of teaching children how to study.

It is at this period that the development of independent study habits takes prominence in the life of the student and it is encouraging to see the growth and interest being taken along this line by our junior high schools.

Improvement in methods of physical examination and of determining the relationship of health problems to school life are also in evidence in the junior high school as well as the senior high school. Eighty-five per cent of our junior high school pupils show normal growth or better in arithmetic and their algebra tests are excellent in their results. Latin results, according to standardized tests, are above normal.

In the senior high school co-operative tests on a national scale show that the year has been satisfactory and that in all of these co-operative tests our Grosse Pointe high school pupils do better than the national norms. College records of our high school graduates are the best this year of any year in our history except one. Fifty per cent of all of the grades of our graduates who have entered college are A or B grades for their first semester and only two per cent of all grades in all subjects of pupils in their first semester of college for whom we have records are failures. Our graduates are accepted on recommendation of the principal in practically all accredited colleges, supported by reports of our standards.

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been cited nationally for their development of materials in the field of spelling, national publicity and recognition has been given to the program of the board of education in its program of community self-appraisal. Our school cafeteria has been the subject of study in their operation and maintenance during the war by many of the schools in this region; in five surveys of education in cities throughout the nation, members of our staff have been invited to participate. In significant committees on the development of education in the state our staff members have played important parts. Local enterprise in civic, religious and social affairs has invited our teachers, office workers and maintenance staff members to places of leadership. In these ways and in many others throughout the state and the nation the high quality of educational ability of our staff is recognized through the year.

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

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

Young men, so disciplined, are the best of tomorrow's America — on the march."



In far-away Burma, early in 1944—long before the B-29 became front-page news at home—long before our own forces in China and in India were notified to expect this great super-bomber—came news of its existence—uncomfortably accurate technical description—positive facts as to proposed bases . . . from the JAPS. 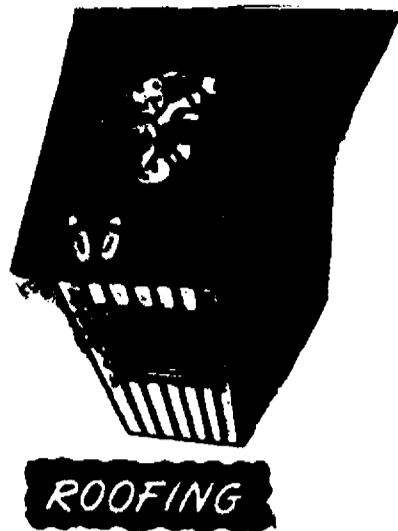
ership is that of the field of adult education. While many of the communities in the country are struggling to form the nucleus of an adult education program, and many which had an adult education program before the war have practically lost it or sacrificed it to other activities, Grosse Pointe's adult education program has continued to grow and to function in the life of the community.

Major of a monograph on education which described the adult education trends in nine public school systems and colleges of the Great Lakes region, among which is the program of Grosse Pointe. It is significant that this program is carried on largely through the self-support of those who participate and as a result of this type of program the Grosse Pointe adult education program is reaching annually from 1,200 to 1,500 adults in regular attendance in adult classes, as well as the series of lectures presented by the Grosse Pointe Lectures, Inc., in the promotion of which teachers and administrators and schools take a cooperative part. These lectures have brought the outstanding speakers of the nation to the community in a program of understanding of our national and international problems. The Grosse Pointe public library, under the direction of the board of education, is a vigorous agency for adult education in the community. In addition, to its continuous growth in the circulation of good books, it has this year exerted initiative and leadership in a series of adult discussion groups on topics of timely interest. It has continued to make available the splendid library of good records, it has co-operated with civic groups in providing book exhibits and reading lists on topics of interest and has even made available to hobbyists a fine collection of tools for basement shops in winter evenings in co-operation with the Grosse Pointe Rotary club.

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Overseas Workers Critically Needed

Work on vital construction projects in the Hawaiian Islands and elsewhere within the territory of the Central Pacific Command, may be seriously delayed unless civilian workers are secured at once by the U. S. Engineer Corps, according to an announcement released today by Col. Allison Miller, Detroit district engineer, U. S. Engineer office.

Qualified trades helpers to work under direct supervision of blacksmiths, boilermakers, carpenters, glaziers, mechanics, pipe fitters, plumbers, steel fitters, welders and other tradesmen, are most critically needed. Wages are 85 cents per hour for a 40-hour week, and time and a half for work in excess of 40 hours and double time on the seventh consecutive work day. The usual work week is 48 hours but in emergencies 54 or 60 hours may be worked.
