Petition to Vacate Bishop Road in Park Again Denied

Because no definite statement of future plans was presented by them, the trustees of the Stroh Estate will be notified that their request to vacate Bishop road (adjoining the Stroh property), has been denied by the Grosse Pointe Park village commission.

In the preliminary communication which was received by the commission, it was stated that the large estate would be subdivided with a center drive for the homes. They asked that Bishop be vacated and divided to the two property owners adjacent to it: The Strohs on one side, the C. H. Buhl family on the other.

Commissioner Sage fought this petition by saying that it appeared to be the desire of the Strohs to take away a public right-of-way without a guarantee of another one in the Stroh property. In the communication read Monday night, Manager Lane said that the latter had no intention of providing a roadway to the lake, but would subdivide so that only two lake front lots remained.

In support of this, M. Collinson of Westchester road, asked the commission to deny this request; he said that the people of the Park have a right to the lake through Bishop. He said residents of Westchester were very indignant many years ago when their right-of-way was closed, eliminating direct access

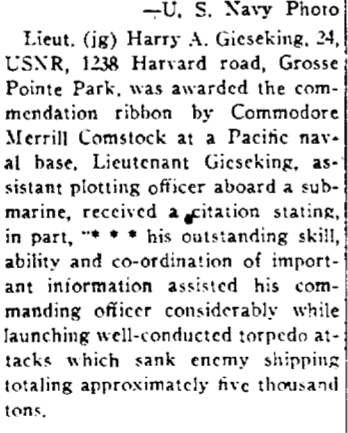
Last Minute Tips Offered For Show

One Year Ago This Week An epidemic of infantile paralysis delayed the opening of the public schools for an entire week, according to a recommendation passed by the board of health. Parochial schools were also scheduled to open on the 18th. The total number of polio cases reported in the township at the time reached five.

# SERVICE PARADE

With the 32nd Infantry Division in Northern Luzon, P. I. — Corp. Bruce D. Allor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence J. Allor of 81 Mapleton road, Grosse Pointe Farms, is returning to the United States under the army's redeployment plan. Allor, a veteran of four years with

the 32nd "Red Arrow" Infantry division was a public relations correspondent for the 121st Field Artillery Battalion.

He came into the army June 29, 1941, completed his basic training at Fort Sill, Okla., and embarked for overseas duty, April 22, 1942. He saw action in Sidor, Aitape, Biak of the Netherlands East Indies, Leyte and Luzon of the Philippines.

He was awarded the Bronze Arrowhead for participation in the initial landing at Biak, the army good conduct medal, and is authorized to wear Asiatic-Pacific Theatre and Philippines Liberation ribbons.

Before entering the army, Allor, a graduate of St. Paul high school in Grosse Pointe, was employed in the glass plant of the Ford Motor company, Dearborn.

Allor has four brothers in the service: Sergeant Robert, with the medical corp in the Philippines; Y2C Richard, on a sub chaser in the Southwest Pacific; Y2C Bernard, training in Mississippi; and Pte. Lawrence in Germany.

Robert J. Louwers, son of Mrs. Irma Louwers of 1388 Beaconsfield, was recently promoted from second to first lieutenant. He is stationed at Iwo Jima with the army air corps.

Corp. John Maison, of the USMC, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Maison of Lakeview avenue, Grosse Pointe

Farms, returned to Virginia last week for further hospitalization, following his return to the States several months ago after being wounded while in the South Pacific.

Corporal Maison, a graduate of St. Paul's, enlisted in the Marines three years ago and is a veteran of seven major Pacific battles. He was with the group which made the initial landing in Guadalcanal, and fought with the "Leathernecks" through their next six campaigns. He was shipped home four days before the historic landing at Iwo Jima.

"Red" as he is known in Grosse Pointe, was wounded in one arm and hand, and after recuperating sufficiently to enter battle again, received serious injuries to his other arm.

Corporal Maison is the recipient of the Purple Heart and the Presidential Citation.

On An Essex Class Carrier in the Western Pacific. — Robert N. Hess, seaman, first class, USNR, as an assistant in the navigation division of this fast carrier, has helped take this ship deep into the inner defenses of the Japanese homeland.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel P. Hess, 224 Fisher road, Grosse Pointe Farms, and is the former sales manager for the Detroit Steel Products company, Detroit.

With the 45th Infantry Division in the Assembly Area Command, France. — The 45th Infantry Division is coming home from Europe. The division, of which Corp. Fred J. Bell, 456 Cloverly road, Grosse Pointe Farms, is a member, has established a brilliant record as a spearhead unit in the drive to free Europe from Nazi rule.

Now, at Camp St. Louis in the Mourmelon Sub-Area of the Assembly Area Command, it is undergoing processing for redeployment. Under command of Maj. Gen. Robert T. Frederick, the Thunderbird division has fought through 511 of the most savage days of the European war, crushing powerful German defensive positions in four invasions, over more than 1,000 miles of the most difficult combat country in the world.

Men of the 45th charged ashore on D-Days in Sicily and at Salerno. They created, grimly held and finally broke out of the Anzio beachhead, and chased first-line Nazi troops out of Rome.

They hit the coast of southern France, drove the Germans up the Rhone, and finally fought into the heart of the Nazis' "Southern Reservoir," overrunning Nuremberg and Munich and, in the capture of the Dachau concentration camp, receiving a direct object lesson in the reason for their fight.

They won, among them, five Congressional Medals of Honor and more than 4,500 other individual and unit decorations for valor.

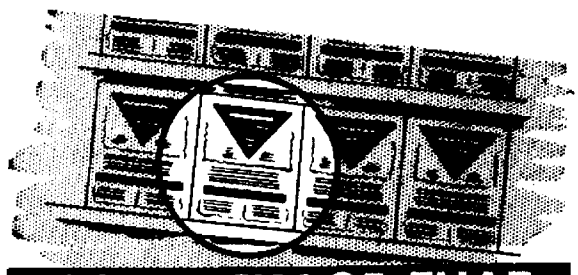
With the 100th Division of Seventh Army in Germany. — Award of a Presidential Citation — highest honor an army unit can receive—to the 3rd battalion, 397th infantry regiment of the 100th division, has recently been announced by Seventh Army Headquarters.

The citation reads, in part: " . . . The 3rd battalion occupied a defensive position on the left flank of the (100th) division. Suddenly, at midnight on New Year's Eve, the enemy, the 17th SS Panzer Grenadier Division, launched a heavy and fanatical attack. The unit on the left of the 3rd battalion was driven back during the course of the day some five thousand yards . . . For five days the battalion, in this exposed

position, was subjected to repeated attacks from the front, flank, and rear, by enemy tanks and infantry, accompanied by mortar and artillery fire . . . The 3rd battalion, nearly surrounded, still held on despite heavy losses and a disadvantageous tactical situation, which warranted withdrawal. However, in so doing, it inflicted such heavy losses upon the enemy and impressed upon him so

successfully the will of our troops to hold on, that further offensive action on this part of the front by the enemy was discontinued.

A local man who is a member of the 3rd battalion, 397th infantry regiment, and contributed to its winning of the Presidential Citation is Pte. Arthur A. Martin, 564 Notre Dame.

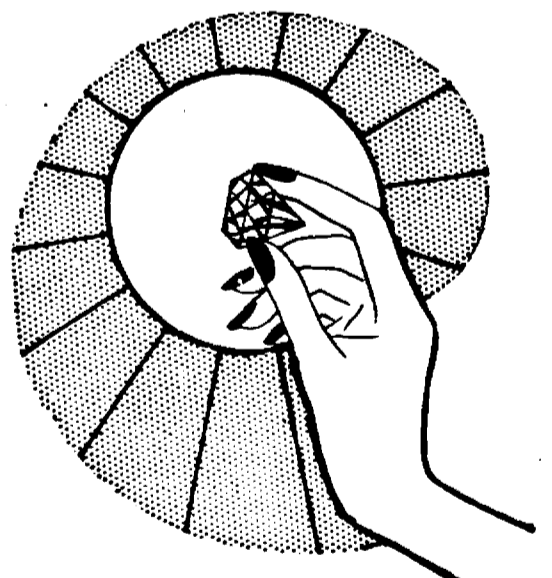

 and setting up the office can be completed within a very short time. The salary will be \$3,600 per year and the counselor's secretary will be paid \$1,800 per year when the office is operating on a full time basis. The executive board has set up seven committees to assist the counselor, comprising some of the most outstanding people in their respective fields.

Invitations have been sent to the following people to head the respective committees:  
 John J. O'Brien, chairman, organization and finance. This committee consists of Mr. O'Brien, who is chairman of the executive board and the six representatives of the governing agencies that are financing the program; i.e. Grosse Pointe Park, City of Grosse Pointe, Farms, Shores, Woods, and Gratiot township. These six governmental units as members of the executive board, have agreed to finance the budget of \$7,000 on a pro-rated basis according to the assessed valuation of each governmental municipality on real property as set by the townships of Grosse Pointe and Gratiot for 1944. Other committees and their chairmen who have been invited or have accepted invitations are: Vincent E. Schoeck, chairman, rights and benefits; Henry Roesch, chairman, employment; chairman to be appointed for physical and mental health; the Rev. Vincent Horkan, personal and social problems; Forrest Geary, education and vocational training; James W. Lee II, publicity and public information; Mrs. T.W.P. Livingstone, research and existing agencies.

class calls for a specimen, it means just that. If two, three, five or even 12 of the same kind is called for, again, that is what it means — **No more—No less.** Over or under count will lead to disqualification by the judges.

When more than one kind is called for, try to get each well matched.

The general principle outlined also applies to flowers, especially regarding quality of bloom, count and condition. Take for example, perfect blooms but poor foliage would mean a loss of points.

5. In preparing your vegetables, a soft brush can be used to remove fine particles of soil from the skin. Beets and carrots can be washed and rubbed by hand or soft cloth.

Do not wash beans or such like vegetables with a dull skin surface; just dust them off with care.

Things like cucumber, tomatoes, squash and peppers can be wiped with a clean damp cloth.

6. Above all, remember to enter your best and give real competition. This should bring blue ribbon awards. But in any case it will be an experience with lots of fun.
