BUS CONDUCT—FOR STUDENTS

Because of the increased number of students who ride the buses to and from school, a few timely suggestions here will do no harm; ignoring them might mean embarrassment or even injury to someone in the future:

Co-operate with the bus driver and patrol boy in every way possible.

Do not play with equipment on bus such as buzzer, fire extinguisher, emergency door or windows.

Line up when getting on or off the bus and do not push or shove.

Tear your tickets in half before getting in line so you won't hold up the line.

Hand your tickets to the patrol boy or the bus driver who is standing inside the door and move quickly on.

Sit down quickly in any seat available and do not block the aisle.

If you have to stand be sure to hang onto a rail so there will be no accidents if the bus turns a sharp corner, hits a bump, or stops suddenly. Keep over to one side so there is an aisle between seats.

Do not talk to the bus driver unless it is absolutely necessary because the driver cannot concentrate on his driving—your safety is at stake.

Yelling is not necessary! Talk in a moderate tone with your neighbor.

Do not put your arms and heads out of the window. It is dangerous.

Pilots based on this ship shot down 457 Jap planes and 76 probables, destroyed 695 and damaged 95 on the ground, and sank or helped sink many warships, including the battleship Yamato and the heavy cruiser Agano. The ship's anti-aircraft batteries shot down 14 aircraft.

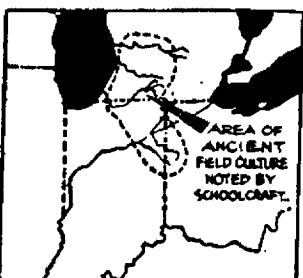

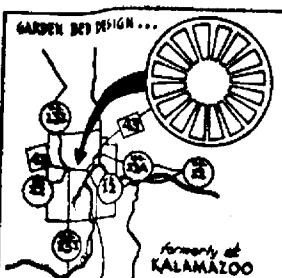

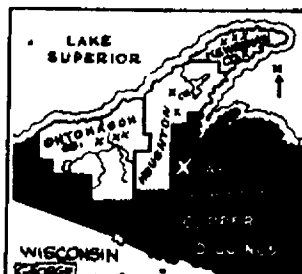

VFW Discussed Veterans' Problems at National Convention in Chicago Last Week

An international assembly made up of veterans representing the 90 countries which compose the United Nations featured the opening session of the 46th national encampment of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States in Chicago October 2, 3 and 4.

On Monday, Aug. 20, Commander-in-Chief Jean A. Brunner called at the White House to acquaint President Truman with the plans for this unique assembly, and to invite him to address the most dramatic gathering of heroes in recent history.

Those countries whose armed forces fought actively against the Axis powers, were invited to send decorated, combat veterans to the Chicago meeting.

All the nation's eyes turned toward this great metropolis during these three days, for many questions which are for the veterans' benefit, that remain unanswered will have a decision when this great body of men ended their meeting. A few of the problems to which the gathering devoted most of its time are as follows:

- 1. Demobilization procedure which will give honest discharge preference in the following order on the basic principle of length and type of service.
2. Liberalization of the service-men's readjustment act of 1944 with minimum of red tape and delay, including immediate construction of adequate veteran hospital facilities to care for all veterans in need of hospitalization.
3. Liberal and equalized compensation and pension payments to veterans and dependents of all wars.
4. Co-operation between government, management and labor in support of economic policies which will continue full employment and maintain present standard of living and permit all citizens to meet their tax obligations.
5. Adoption of a reconversion program that will sustain employment and prevent inflation, with a gradual elimination of wartime restrictions and regulations.
6. Immediate adoption of a com-

pulsory peace time military training program to maintain adequate trained civilian reserve at all times to meet any future threats from aggressor nations.

An invitation was accepted by Gen. Omar N. Bradley during a personal conference, between the latter and Commander-in-Chief Brunner in Washington, on Aug. 20 for General Bradley to address the opening session of the gathering on Oct. 2, said Chief Brunner. "I wish to assure you of the full and wholehearted co-operation of our organization in the great task that lies ahead, we have confidence in your ability and integrity to do an outstanding job. Our objective, explained Brunner, is the establishment of a VFW service office in every community and neighborhood throughout the nation."

Your Garden This Week

A simple, inexpensive method of outdoor winter storage for root vegetables is described by Paul R. Krone in the September issue of "Horticultural News." He says to put an assortment of beets, carrots, potatoes, rutabagas and turnips, and "possibly some cabbage," in crates or baskets in the ground, in a row about four feet apart; insert a ventilator made of four pieces of lath into the center of the crate (this must be long enough to protrude above the covering mound); and cover with two to three feet of straw or dead leaves and a four inch layer of soil. Cover the tops of containers with screening to keep out rats and mice; also the sides if there are gaps between the slats.

Do not set storage boxes in ground where water stands after a rain. The bottom of your trench should be covered with six inches or so of cinders, straw, or dry dead leaves to help drainage and to make removal of containers easier; also the sides of the trench should be lined with straw or leaves and the space between containers. Mr. Krone does not say how deep to set crates, but

probably about half their depth will be sufficient.

The purpose of the ventilator is to provide an escape route for gases given off by the drying out of vegetable tissues. The upper end should be covered with screening at first to keep out rodents, and later, when the thermometer stays well below

freezing, it should be plugged with straw.

Do not put vegetables into storage pits until freezing weather is really here — probably by late October. Store only those vegetables which are mature and in good condition. Leave the tops on beets, carrots and turnips.

Use the contents of one storage box before digging the next one.

Do not put vegetables back in outdoor storage which have been brought into a warm house.

This is not a satisfactory method for storing tomatoes, peppers, or pumpkins. They should be placed on shelves in a cool, light room

No Tax Cut on Luxuries in Sight Yet

WASHINGTON — Persons delaying purchase of such things as fur coats, jewelry and luggage in the hope of lower excise taxes may have to wait a long time.

In its first action on postwar tax-cutting, the House Ways and Means Committee ruled out any immediate reductions in the excise list.

Some members said the quick action was calculated to remove some of the resistance to the purchase of such items prior to the holiday season.

FOR THE FIRST time in 16 years the committee considered legislation reducing—not raising—taxes. It put the emphasis on cuts in individual and corporation income levies.

A new bill must be passed by Nov. 1 if 1946 incomes are to be affected, so the committee dispensed with public hearings.

War-time excise rates run until six months after the end of hostilities, as proclaimed by the President or by Congress.

No one knows now when this official termination will come. When it does, the levy on fur coats, jewelry and cosmetics will drop from 20 per cent to 10 (retail) unless present laws are changed.

The first peacetime draft in the history of the United States was scheduled to move into action on Oct. 16 when all men between the ages of 21 and 35 were to have registered as required under the Selective Service act.

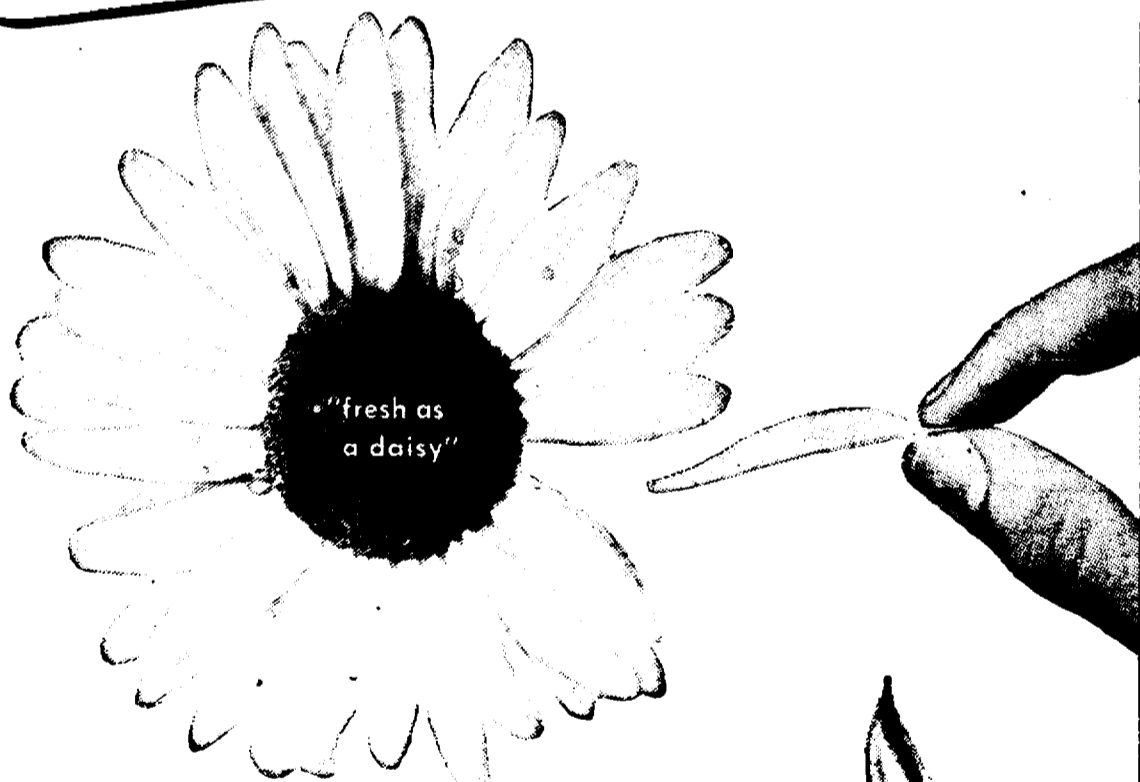

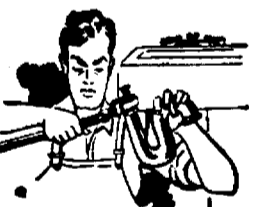
