Appetite appeal: With the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons approaching, roast turkey, chicken and other fowl will be the appetite tickling delicacy that will grace tables in most Michigan homes.

To put that final "just right" finish to the roast bird, Miss Roberta Hershey, of Michigan State college, offers these suggestions:

To prepare a fowl for roasting, rub it with salt, brush with cooking oil or melted fat, and place on a rack in the roaster with the wings and legs drawn under the body and tied. Brown in a hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 20 to 30 minutes; then lower the temperature to about 300 to 325 degrees F., roasting 20 to 30 minutes for each pound the bird weighs. For added flavor, baste every half hour with drippings.

Miss Hershey says a young bird should never be covered during roasting. But, if the bird is fairly old and tough, a little water may be added after browning, and the pan covered.

Employees Benefit By Decisions of Officials, Voters

By a vote of 10 to 1, the residents of the City of Grosse Pointe approved a proposed amendment to provide a pension retirement system for all employees (except elective officials), at Tuesday's election. The overwhelming vote of 1,160 approvals against the weak opposition of 161 "No" votes, definitely showed that the people wished their employees the benefits of a pension plan. With the establishment of the pension systems in the City and the Park, all Grosse Pointe communities with the exception of Grosse Pointe Woods now provide for retirement benefits for their employees.

Victory Loan Drive Slowly Gaining Impetus in Pointe

Although the nation has been in the midst of the Victory Loan Drive, the people of Grosse Pointe and Wayne county have been concentrating on the current Community War Chest campaign. This has been given as the main reason for the slow progress of the Victory Loan Drive.

The efforts of Grosse Pointers in selling bonds has been concentrated in the schools, with individual groups in the elementary grades of the public school system working through the Grosse Pointe AWWS office.

The total in bonds sold up to and including Monday night, Nov. 5, was estimated at one hundred thirty-one thousand dollars. However, an increase in sales was already noted Tuesday, and officials of the drive are confident that when the totals are tabulated that Grosse Pointe will have bought its quota.

Country Club Woods Objects to Business Frontage; Suggests That Village Buy It

Acting upon a petition signed by 58 residents of Country Club Woods subdivision, the Grosse Pointe Woods village commission postponed for two weeks the granting or denial of a permit to erect a floral and gift shop at the corner of Broadstone and Mack avenue. The petition urgently requested the commission to start proceedings which would change 18 business lots located at Broadstone and Mack to residential property. Spokesmen for the association asked if this could be done so as to keep the entire area residential.

President A. A. Giesquiere told the group that the best way to change these lots would be to purchase them and make the change themselves. A spokesman, Leonard Landon, said that this would cost the subdivision residents a vast sum of money, and asked the village president if the village could purchase the property and make a parkway out of it. Mr. Giesquiere said this would be similar to what was done for the Lakeshore subdivision. At this point, various other members of the group and commission spoke on the subject. Captain Sempliner Named Commander of Historic Bataan

Capt. Arthur W. Sempliner, 32, has been appointed the provincial military commander of historic Bataan, it was announced here recently. He is a former Wayne county circuit court commissioner.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur W. Sempliner, 2485 Burns avenue, Detroit, he has accepted the surrender of more than six hundred guerrilla Japanese. These men continued to fight even after the capitulation of their homeland.

Overseas for 33 months, Captain Sempliner took over his administrative post after two years as a special combat inspector-general with the Second Engineers (special brigade). This group geared landing operations in the Pacific island-hopping campaign.

His duties consisted of designing new landing equipment and plotting new techniques for pushing the enemy from their strongholds. He accompanied assaults at Luzon, Philippines, Arava, Hollandia and the Philippines and has been wounded in combat.

Mrs. Sempliner lives in Detroit with their two-year-old son whom the father has never seen. Captain Sempliner graduated from the University of Michigan law school and also attended DUS and Cranford.

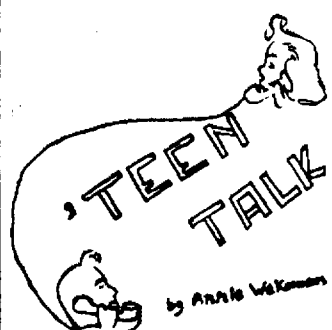

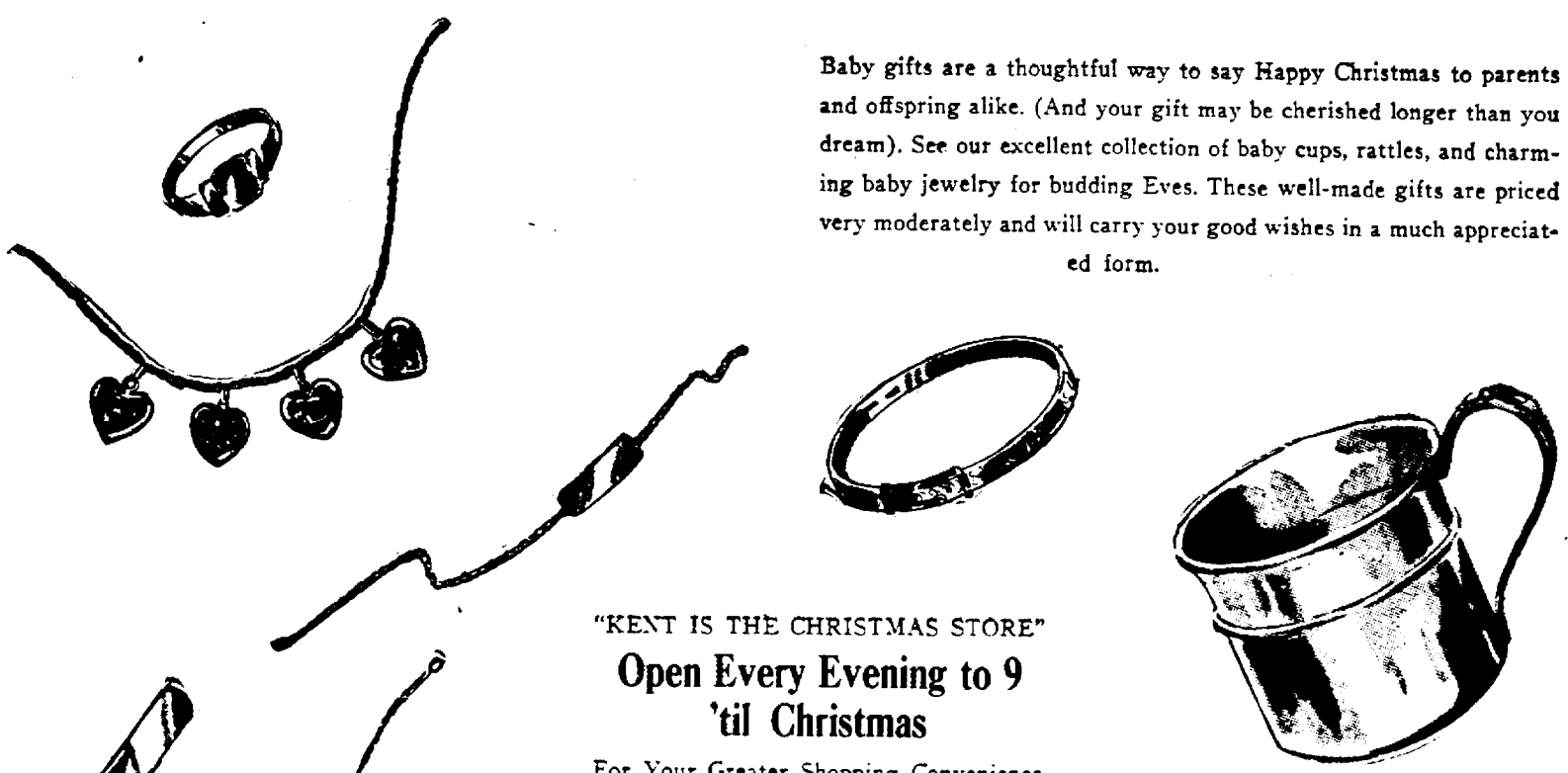

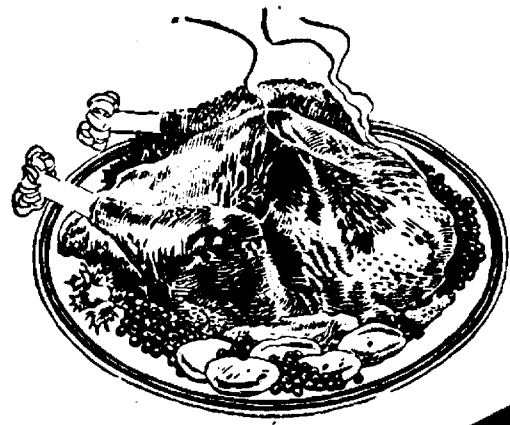

What members of the Lycoming's crew saw was the fire-blackened shell of a bombed-out target. Much

of the northern sector had been blasted to fine rubble by the second atomic bomb. The navy men found windows shattered throughout the sprawling city and in the suburbs of surrounding hills.

The Lycoming's occupation assignment was the climax to 50,000 miles of sea travel, during which the ship carried troops to Eniwetok, Ulithi, the Palau, New Guinea, Leyte, Manila, Saipan, and Okinawa.

Five Years Ago
Sprawling over two blocks in the City of Grosse Pointe's Kercheval avenue shopping center, the gigantic outdoor community Halloween celebration, definitely proved its merits when a week-end checkup of police department activities in the five Pointe communities showed the smallest number of Halloween complaints on record.

A car driven by John R. O'Hara of 504 Barrington road, crashed into a tree near Balfour road and Essex and seriously injured Virginia McFatridge, 207 Riverside drive.

Final returns from the City of Grosse Pointe in the national election gave Republican Wilkie a four-to-one majority over Democrat Roosevelt. The winner was re-elected to serve a precedent-breaking third term.

Grosse Pointe Boy Scouts were to take part in the Armistice Day parade... High school students planned a flag dedication for Armistice Day... The first alien-class was held in the high school... Gratiot township's rubbish removal system was changed.

10 Years Ago
It was in 1935 that the Grosse Pointe Bank was opened for business at Jefferson and Rivard; it was organized by a group largely composed of residents of the community and former stockholders in the Grosse Pointe Savings Bank, a former unit of the Detroit Bankers company. Joseph B. Schlotman was named the first president.

A pan-handler, killed accidentally, in downtown Detroit, was found to have had approximately ten thousand dollars on her person when taken to the hospital... A one-man strike in St. Louis halted a quarter of a million dollar project; that's what you might call tying up the works... they said that to live as a Vanderbilt, it took \$1,000 a week, but many were living like kings on that in those days.

Social Security No Matter at What Age You Die

Here is something you want to tell your family: Under old-age and survivors insurance, survivors benefits are payable when you die—no matter at what age that happens.

That is something some workers' families still don't understand. The wife and child of a living wage earner can't get benefits until the worker is 65 or over and stops work. But they can get survivors benefits when the worker dies any time, whether it's before he is 65 or after—provided he is insured at the time of his death. There may be monthly benefits, or just a lump-sum, depending on who makes up the family. But almost always something is payable to an insured worker's family when he dies.

If the worker leaves no one immediately eligible for monthly benefits a lump-sum death benefit is payable if a claim is filed within two years. This lump-sum goes to the widow, widower, child, grandchild, or parent, in the order named. If the worker is not survived by any such relative the lump-sum may be paid to other relatives or friends in reimbursement for burial expenses.

So don't delay telling your family. You are building benefit rights for them. Make sure they know they can get their benefits when you are gone—no matter at what age death comes.
