By a vote of 10 to 1, the residents of the City of Grosse Pointe aproved a proposed amendment to provide a pension retirement system for all employes (except elective officials), at Tuesday's election.

The overwhelming vote of 1,160 approvals against the weak opposition of 161 "No" votes, definitely showed that the people wished their employees the benefits of a pension plan.

With the establishment of the pension systems in the City and the Park, all Grosse Pointe communities with the exception of Grosse Pointe Woods now provide for retirement benefits for their employees.

Upon the action of the Grosse Pointe Park village commission last Monday night, the village employees now have a pension system. This follows several years of requests by the employees and will eliminate an mportant factor which has been found in many general village elec-

The plan which was adopted was Plan B of the Municipal Employees' Retirement System, created by Act No. 135 of the Public Acts of 1945 of the State of Michigan.

The plan has been explained in detail to the employees and their respective representatives by A. G. Gabriel, actuary, who repeated his demonstrations and reported to the village commission Monday night.

Several weeks ago the employees gave their consent to the village commission to seek the counsel of Mr. Gabriel who was then requested to draw up a suitable plan for the Park, Following this; the commissioners adopted a resolution, setting forth their desire that such a valuation be made for the village and if
