Harper Defends Action

Defending his action in the opening of the gates of the Lakeshore Interceptor, Drain Commissioner William C. Harper of Macomb county, recently objected to the protest of Grosse Pointe Farms which claimed that Lake St. Clair is being polluted by the emptying of raw sewage from the Nine Mile road drain.

This announcement was sent to Dr. William E. DeKleine, State Health Commissioner as an answer to the Farms. He said that he is "neither interested in nor answerable to" the Farms, but is only acting in behalf of the communities in the southern portion of Macomb county. He said he was certain that any official would uphold his action in an attempt to aid the communities who are paying the heavy bill involved in sewage disposal.

The objection which the Farms raised is based on Harper's closing of the interceptor during a recent rainy period and allowing storm waters and sewage to flow directly into the lake via the Nine Mile drain.

State and federal health authorities were in accordance with an agreement which stated that as soon as the sewage flow across South Macomb reaches an amount twice the normal flow (the latter being 3,500,000 gallons a day), the storm waters have so weakened the raw sewage that no high degree of pollution exists. Therefore, a heavy flow after rainstorms may be channeled into the lake without harm to the water.

Mr. Harper was seen to say that the flow during the rainy period was over the eight million gallons and since it was not at a high state of pollution, he thought he was fully within his rights in dumping it in the lake.

He explained further by saying that he would not have permitted this amount of flow into the lake if this had been the bathing season. If, during the summer, the flow exceeded the normal flow of 3,500,000 gallons a day, the storm waters have so weakened the raw sewage that no high degree of pollution exists.

The Great Democratic Principle Again

A three to one increase in total votes cast over the previous election year in the City of Grosse Pointe last week, clearly indicated that some workings of the great democratic principle were in process, and they were.

To the uniformed people abroad, this great sprawling giant of America is a country where elections are bitterly waged and fought and then the public settles back peacefully for another term of office, only to take up the torch again as election time comes around. Such is largely the case.

Certain frictions developed in the campaign in the City recently, which bear pointed comment. Interest of one citizen in making a race for the Council seats (aided or at least abetted by an elected official of the City), prompted the aforementioned citizen to circulate a petition for the candidacy of a fourth man, wisely chosen from the standpoint of integrity and ability, but not well selected as a "good running" candidate, because he was not well known. Such action was immediately pounced upon and denounced by certain of the "old guard." We cannot see but that the first citizen was merely exercising our great American privilege. Certainly good government can only be accomplished by hearing from the minority.

Result of the certain amount of friction which was developed was one of the largest votes in the history of the City. Once again, the democratic principle was exerted.

Now that the election and the causes of ill-feeling which it developed have been removed with the passing of the election, it is hoped that the democratic process will again work, that harmony in the City administration will be found and all private feuds buried.

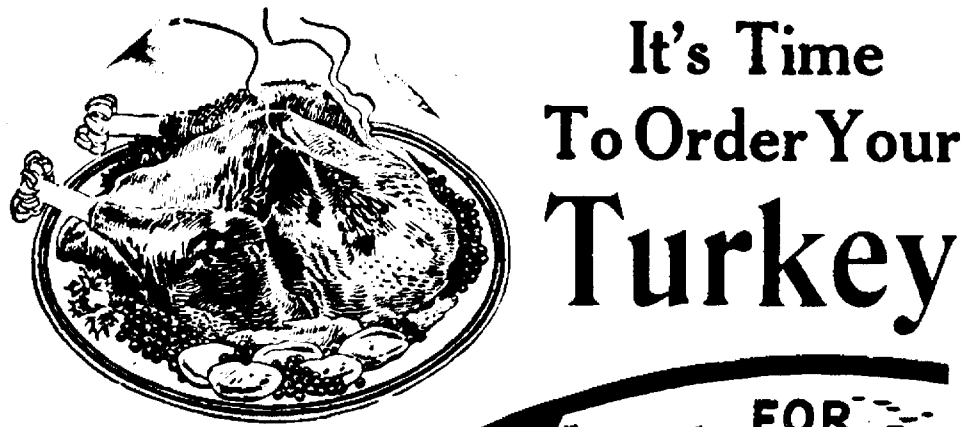

Russo-American Relations Biggest Factor in World Peace

The three biggest things in the world today are 1. U. S. 2. Russia and 3. the atomic bomb, according to Frazier Hunt, well-known author, radio commentator and newspaper correspondent, who addressed the Grosse Pointe Lectures, Incorporated, audience Tuesday night in Pierce auditorium.

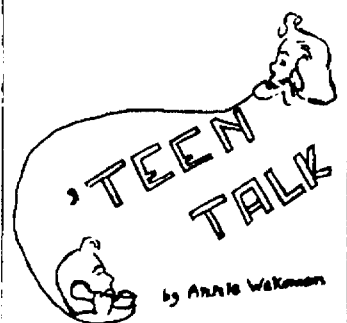
"It is of utmost importance to world peace," said Hunt, "that we understand Russia and the U. S. and if we do, the atomic bomb will take care of itself, once an understanding is reached between the U. S. and Russia."

Hunt sees Russia emerging from the War second only to America as a world power and forecast the recession of the British Empire as a leading world power. We must remove Russian suspicion, said the speaker, and Russia must change her suspicious world feeling, developed out of her inferiority complex and lift her censorship.

To accomplish understanding, said Hunt, both countries must deal in facts and truths, forget revenge in fairness and exercise patience as contrasted with wartime propaganda, retaliatory hatred and impetuous action.

Great care must be taken, the speaker asserted, to prevent the German economic entity from becoming a vacuum and burden to the rest of Europe and similarly, Japan and Asia.

With a per capita debt three and one-half times greater than any other country, as a result of the War, the United States has the right and it is our duty to say "stop to any war," said Hunt, "and whatever need be done must be done, for we can stand no more war."

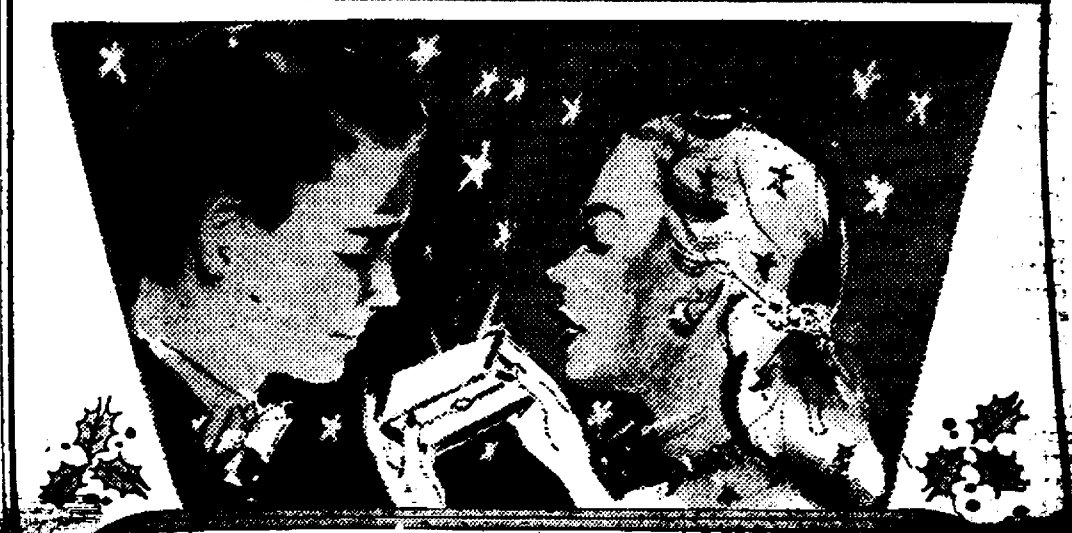

 Kwaj Lodge was a 1,000-watt station on Kwajalein, a dreary, glaring, sun-baked coral rock in the Marshall Islands. Beggs' fans soon

learned to know him as "Rock-Happy Roger," the proprietor of Kwaj Lodge.
 The Lodge started in the upper anatomy of Beggs' balding head and grew as G.I.'s wrote they were "nervous in the service," rock happy and living in a coral coma. In addition to thousands of G.I.'s the

Lodge counts as its members such distinguished visitors to the island as Bob Hope, Jack Benny and Carole Landis.

Most famous of Beggs' Kwaj Lodge programs was an interview with exotic Lauren Bécall. One sweaty afternoon, while swatting flies, as he is seen doing in the accompanying photograph, he decided to use a recording disc to ask her some questions, leaving blank spaces for her replies. La Bécall answered and the Lodge was immediately besieged with perspiring G.I.'s demanding "Where is she?" The 25-year-old broadcaster is a graduate of Wayne University and worked as a reporter on The Grosse Pointe Review about five years ago. He was a staff writer on a local radio station before the Army scooped him up and assigned him to the AFRS.

Other members of the deadly Pacific triumvirate were Bill Morrison, beloved to G.I.'s as "Boondock Barney," who operated WVTW at Peleiu and H. Ashley Sims, "Saipan Sam" on Saipan.

"The courage, ingenuity and hard work of the soldier-broadcasters completely captured the hearts of the G.I.'s who clawed their way across the Pacific," says Sher, "completely quelling that voice which was once so loud, the voice of Tokyo Rose." At the end of the war, M.P.'s walked into Yokohama's Bund Hotel and arrested a frightened chattering, bespectacled girl of

29, who said that she was Tokyo Rose. She turned out to be a dummy-looking doll, Niese born in California, about whom, thanks to Beggs and company nobody seemed to care any more.

Excellent Results in Victory Garden Council "Clean-Up"

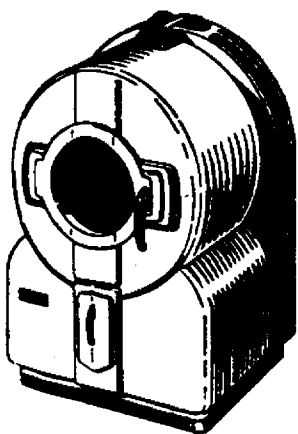

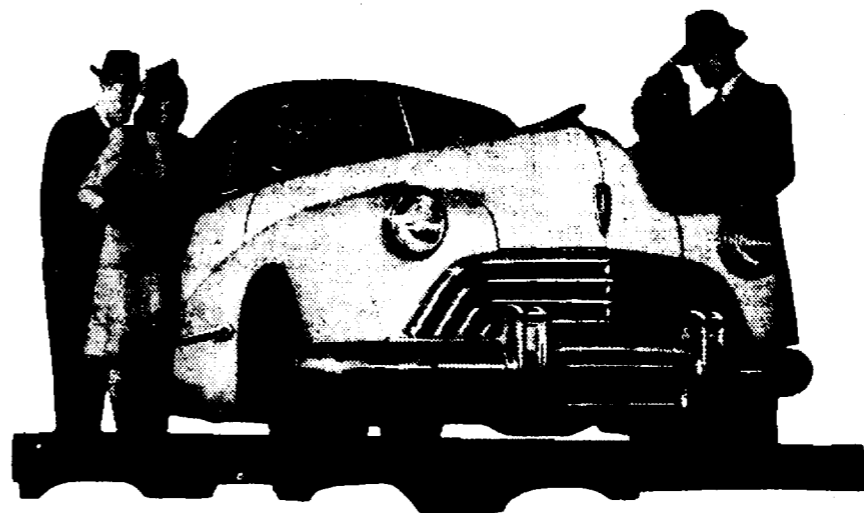
