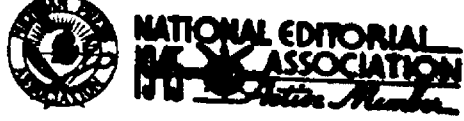

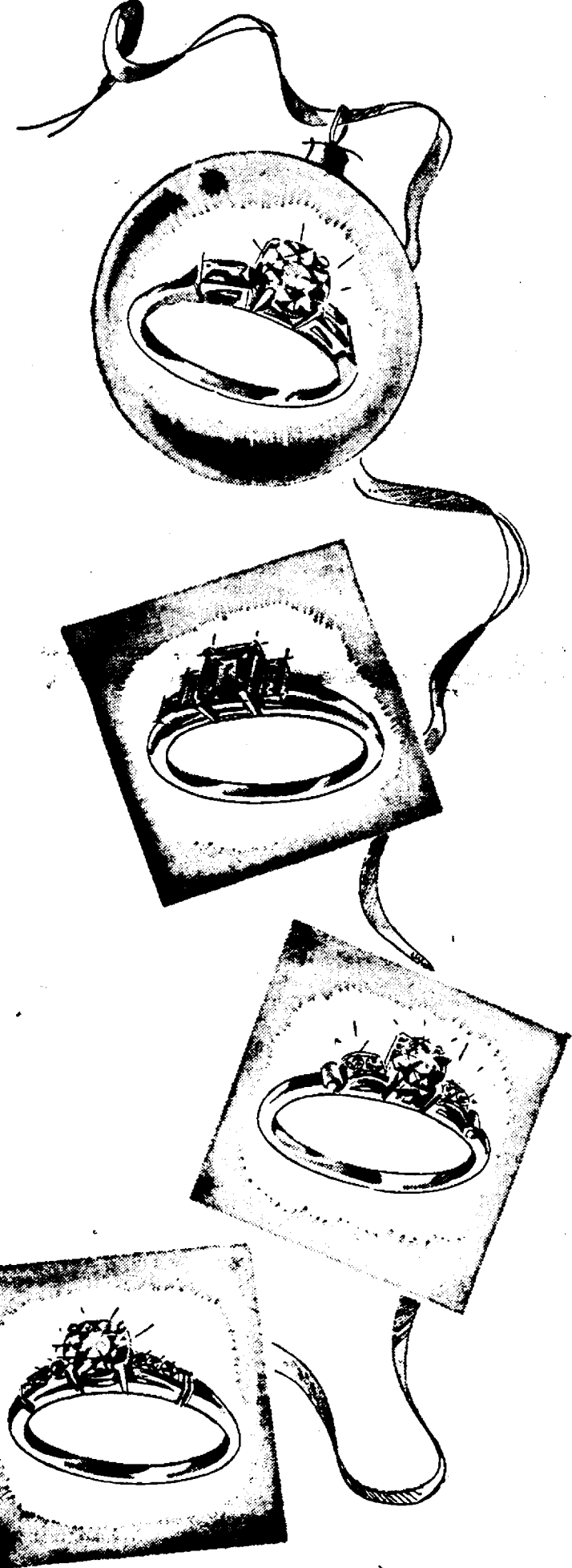

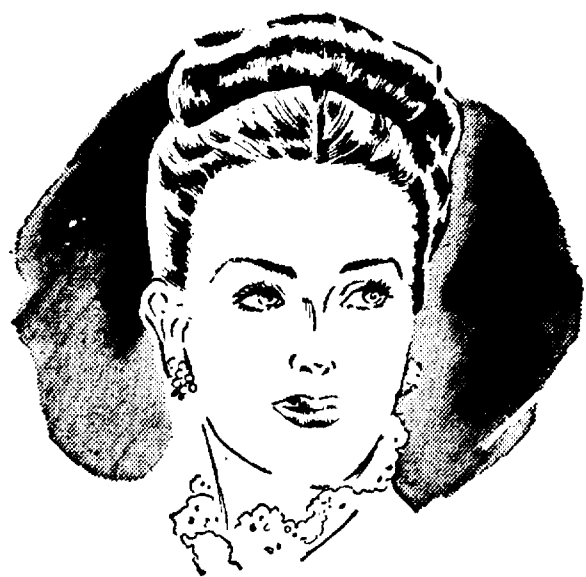

New Service Available To Pointe Housewives, Girls As Hourly Aides

Something new to this locality, although it operates in other sections of the country, is the Grosse Pointe Hourly Aide Club being organized by a group of housewives and managed by Mrs. William K. Williams.

The idea is primarily to assure the young mother that, in her hours of relaxation, her children are in competent hands; also to help the householder, who is either unable to procure or unable to afford all-time service, secure competent aid in light housekeeping duties.

To insure this, a free course of twelve hours will be given the girls and women who join the Club as Aides. The course will consist of demonstrations in the proper bathing of babies and children, correct way of feeding, simple preparation of food, what to do and what not to do in case of accident. Classes will begin Monday, December 3.

Talks on the psychology of the pre-school child, as well as school-age child, and types of entertainment for both age groups.

For those who are interested, there will also be classes on table-service, bed-making, and other light household duties for part-time service.

Any age, from high school-up, may apply for membership. Mrs. Williams, who was director of the Counseling Department of Hudson Motor Car Company during the war says:

"Training is very important. I learned that fact at the plant, where we had a splendid school in machine and riveting. Job knowledge gives one self-assurance and a feeling of responsibility follows naturally."

There are many girls and middle-aged women who are anxious to make extra money and here is a great opportunity.

We hope we'll have a large membership and everyone, regardless of race or creed, is invited to inquire of Mrs. Williams, at 313 Beaufre or call Niagara 0792. Of course, references and a clean bill of health will be requirements.

These clubs are also being organized in Detroit in various localities.

Parents need have no worry about the environment their daughters will be working in and the older women need not hesitate to accept any job offered in the Club Membership. As employer membership, any

housewife in the Pointes' or adjacent neighborhoods is welcome to join. There will be no solicitation and further inquiries may be made by calling Mrs. Williams at Niagara 0792.

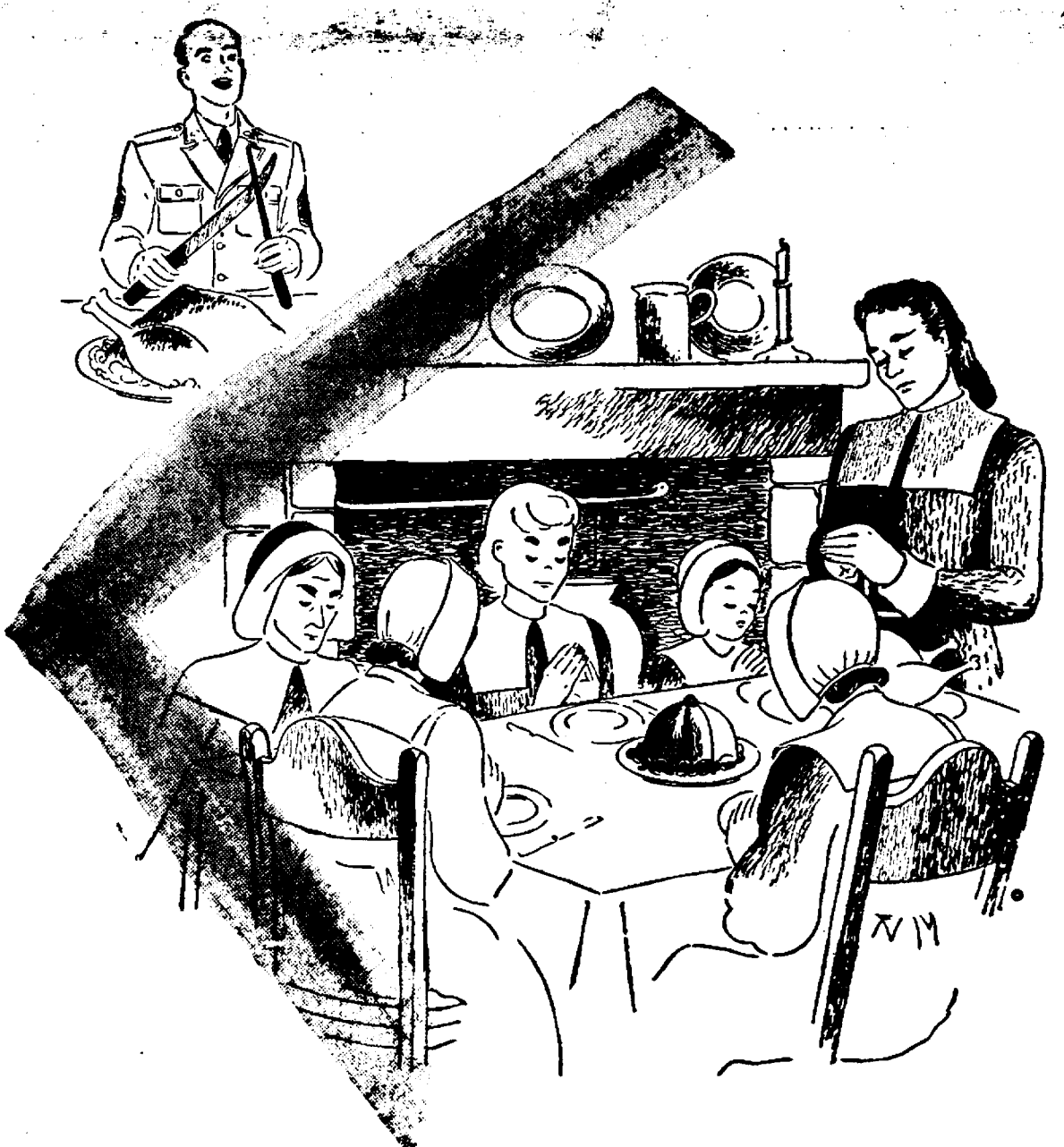

The children were much interested and surprised to learn how much time and unceasing energy Gabriel Richard spent to bring better health, culture and education to this growing village at that time. Stories, poems and short biographies were written in his honor. A display case showing his writings, some of his portraits, stories by the children, and pictures showing Detroit at that time. We all hope that our community will continue to follow the humanitarian deeds of this great man.

Pointe Lecturer Tells of Children's Needs In Europe

Dr. Howard E. Kershner, vice-president and chairman of the Overseas Committee of Save the Children Federation, spoke on the subject, Europe's children—four months after the war, at the Pierce Junior high school auditorium under the sponsorship of the Junior League of Detroit, Wednesday evening, Nov. 7.

Those who listened to this first hand report of one just returned from two months observation of conditions in Norway, Holland, Belgium, France and Sweden will never forget the picture of desolation, of hunger, of courage, too, to meet frightening obstacles, without tools and materials with which to build. Each year, Dr. Kershner reminds his audience, we are invaded by young barbarians who in the first twenty years must be taught their cultural heritage else civilization is lost. But in these invaded countries the teachers have little or nothing in many schools with which to teach. And the children are hungry and weak until such help as America can send to supplement their own efforts. Save the Children Federation has a sponsored plan whereby help can be sent to individual schools. These schools are selected by the officials in each country and all administration is in the hands of the country's Save the Children organization. In none of the countries where the Federation works is help received from UNRRA and the work of all voluntary agencies as Save the Children Federation clears through the Council of voluntary agencies so there is no duplication.

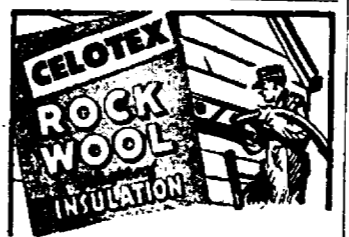

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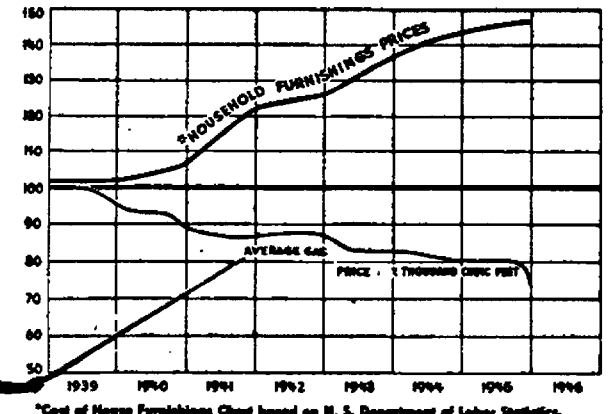

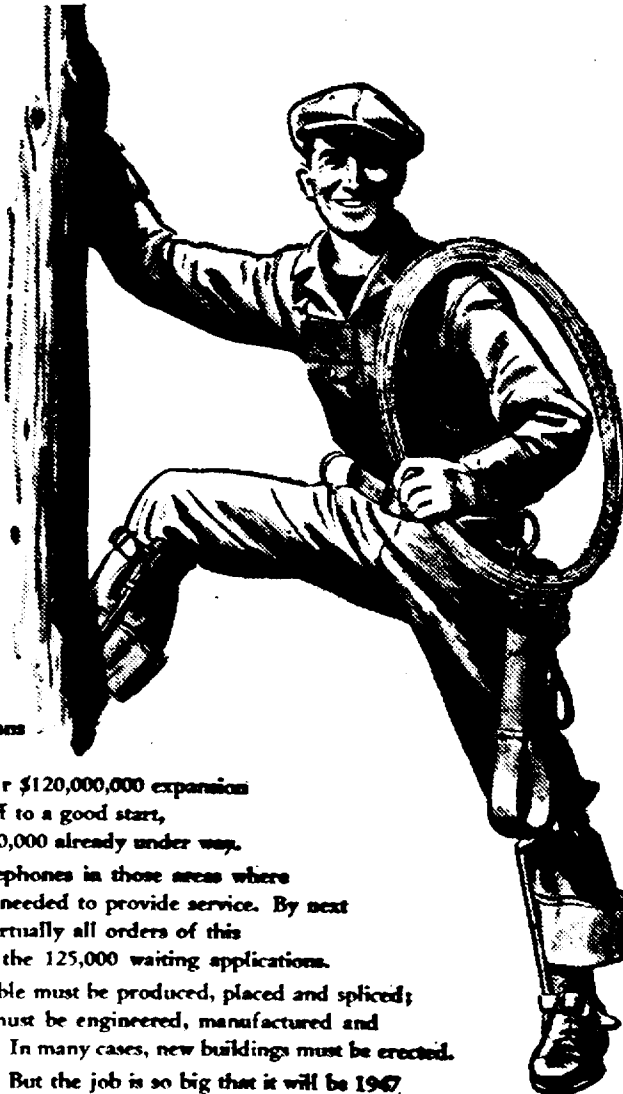

growth resulting from building would probably leave less expansion capacity than is estimated at the present time.

The second step would be a combination elementary school and junior high school plant on Vernier and Mack. This plant would have a capacity for 900 children and would house the junior high school children now attending the high school and others east of Moran road; all

children west of Moran would go to Pierce. One wing of the new building would be set aside temporarily for elementary children in the fifth and sixth grades who live in the Woods, in Gratiot township and in the Shores, until building in the east end of Grosse Pointe had pro-

gressed far enough to determine whether a new elementary school needed to be built later at another school site now owned by the board of education.

Sites are at Roslyn road between Fairway and W street, just south of Oxford road and one in the Gratiot portion of the Grosse Pointe school district, between Roxford and Camden on Lancaster.

The present population of the Grosse Pointe school district including the five Grosse Pointes and a portion of Gratiot township, is approximately thirty-eight thousand. Surveys and studies of population growth indicate that by 1950 this population may reach 43,000 to 45,000. The board of education esti-

mates that this growth would mean an additional three to four hundred pupils annually over and above the present congestion that exists in the Mason, Vernier and Kerby schools and in Grosse Pointe high school.

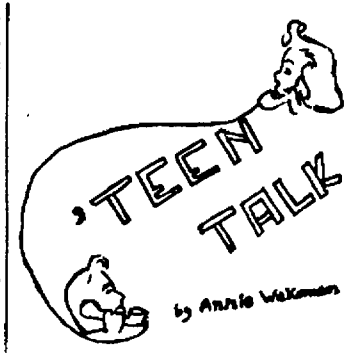

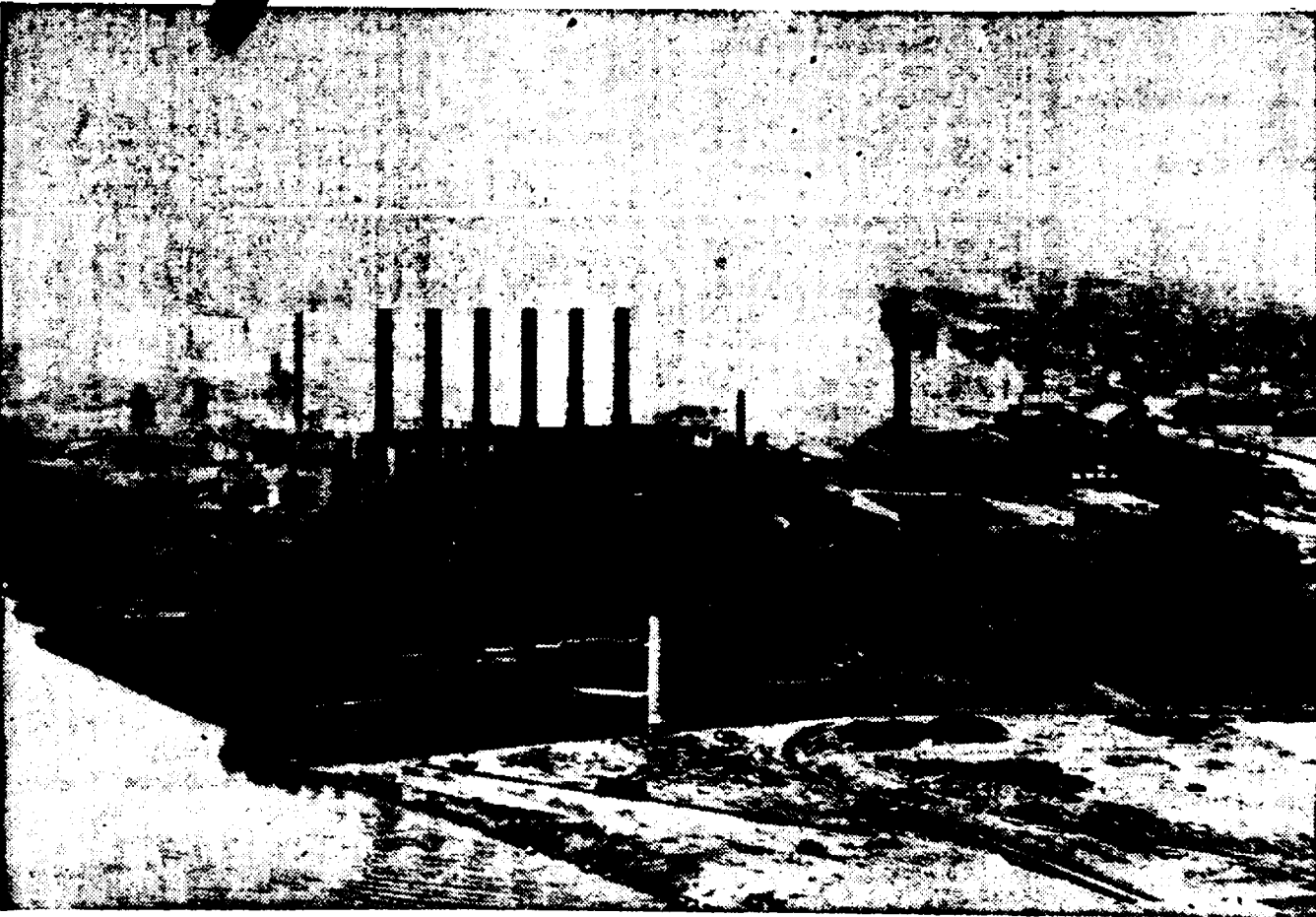

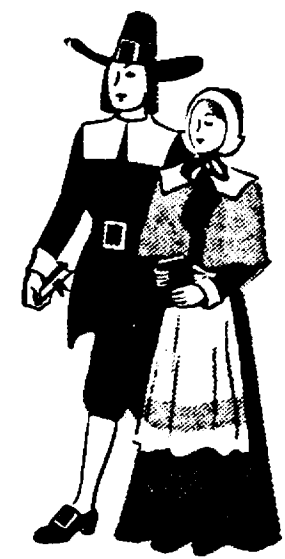

Park Fire Chief Lists Precautions To Avoid Flames

"If you see the fire trucks going by more often in cold weather, it isn't because our firemen are trying to keep warm," said Fire Chief E. L. Rector of Grosse Pointe Park today in reminding Grosse Pointe Park residents of winter fire dangers. "It's because cold weather means more fires."

"Turning on the heat at home is one of the biggest causes of fire," explained the Chief. "Use your heat to heat your house, not to burn it," he advised.

The Chief started his list of precautions with the roof. "Your house should have a fire-resistant roof, to protect it from sparks or neighboring fires. Your chimney should be inspected for cracks and soot. Have it cleaned and repaired, if necessary."

Continuing down into the house itself, the Chief stressed the importance of proper insulation. "The chimney should be insulated so that the walls nearby are not too warm for your hand. The same holds true for flues and pipes, especially where they are near woodwork. A particularly dangerous spot is the place where the smoke pipe enters the chimney."

"Many heating fires begin in the furnace room," the Chief pointed out, "either because the furnace is defective, or because it is not given the right care. The furnace should be inspected and cleaned before the heating season starts. If you have been getting along with a furnace too small for your needs during the war, now is a good time to have it replaced. The furnace should never be forced, or allowed to overheat."

The City of Grosse Pointe Ordains: Section I. The Zoning ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe as amended, shall be further amended by amending Section VII thereof, which section is entitled: "Local Business Districts."

Local Business Districts (A) USES. In a Local Business District no building or premises, except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, shall be erected or used for any purpose except for one or more of the following specified purposes: (1) Any use permitted in a Residence District... (2) A mercantile establishment for the sale of goods at retail... (3) Signs, bulletins and advertising displays only if pertaining to the use of the premises on which located or to goods sold or activities conducted thereon.
