

> The Chief started his list of precautions with the roof. "Your house should have a fire-resistent roof, to protect it from sparks or neighboring fires. Your chimney should be inspected for cracks and soot. Have it cleaned and repaired, if neces-

Continuing down into the house itself, the Chief stressed the importance of proper insulation. the walls nearby are not too warm for your hand. The same holds true for flues and pipes, especially where they are near woodwork. A particularly dangerous spot is the place where the smoke pipe enters

the chimney. "Many heating fires begin in the furnace room," the Chief pointed out, "either because the furnace is defective, or because it is not given the right care. The furnace should be inspected and cleaned before the heating season starts. If you have been getting along with a furnace too small for your needs during the war, now is a good time to have it replaced. The furnace should never be forced, or allowed to overheat."


