Wood's Change 18 Business Lots Into Residential

The difficulty which arose on November 6 at the Grosse Pointe Woods commission meeting between the residents of the Country Club Woods subdivision and the owners of a business lot at Broadstone and Mack who intend to erect a floral and gift shop, continued at the meeting on November 20 when no agreement could be reached as to what the two opposing groups—the nearby residents and the business lot owners—should do.

It finally ended in a resolution which referred the matter to the village attorney, Jules Berns, who is to inquire into the authority which the village maintains to take action to amend the village zoning ordinance. He is to report to the commission on December 4.

The objections have been raised by the Country Club towards the eighteen business lots located at Broadstone and Mack, the only business property in the area; the residents stated they wanted to keep the entire locality residential.

In addition to the suggested change in the zoning ordinance, other proposals were made for the village to purchase this land, beautify it and make a parkway out of it. A third suggestion was made to the subdivision, telling them to purchase the business lots and then change the subdivision restrictions into residential property.

What the residents, the businessmen and village will do will be learned at the next commission meeting.

Official Explains

The taste which was noticeable in the water in Grosse Pointe Farms and Shores during the past weekend, was not caused by any change in or addition of chemical treatment to the water at the Filtration Plant," stated Murray Smith, superintendent of the water department of Grosse Pointe Farms, yesterday.

"It seems that some substance appeared in the raw water, and this substance in itself was both tasteless and odorless until it came in contact with the chlorine treatment which we are required by law to apply as a disinfecting agent to the raw water. The combination of this unknown and the chlorine created a taste which might be described as an iodine taste or odor.

"Although this taste proved very disagreeable to quite a number of the water consumers, still, all users can rest assured that no harmful effect can result as careful bacterial analysis showed that at no time were there any harmful bacteria reaching the tap water," he explained.

Steps were taken Saturday to eliminate the disagreeable taste by filtering all water through finely pulverized charcoal, which is recognized as the best agent for the removal of this type of taste.

It is expected that within a few days the taste problem will be cleared up.

563 Signatures on Petition Keeps Bus on Marter Loop

The Grosse Pointe Woods commission presented with the petition of 563 signatures on November 20, asking that the bus route be kept on Marter loop.

This petition was offered by John P. Connors of 1505 Brys drive after he and several women sought signs between November 6 and 20 when it was learned that some residents were asking that bus service be eliminated from Vernier, Marter and Brys drive.

The action which the commission took after this petition was examined was to make an unanimous decision to allow the Lake Shore Coach company to keep their present schedule on this village loop.

In explaining arguments which opposed those set up in the petition, Mr. Connors said that the safety argument would have to be ruled out, for the Lake Shore line would place second in a nation-wide contest of public vehicles drivers for their record. For every 100,000 miles traveled, the percentage in accidents is only 1.7 for this company; the second best percentage in the contest is 4.5/8. (The company, however, has not entered this contest.)

Appeal Issued to Employers by Veterans' Counselor

Of all veterans who seek assistance from the Grosse Pointe counseling center, their principal request is for aid in securing employment, according to Joseph R. O'Connor, who is in charge of the center, located at the AWWV headquarters, 16829 Kercheval near Cadieux.

"Of the 72 veterans who have already contacted us," Mr. O'Connor reported to the executive committee of the council today, "23 have indicated that they want help in connection with finding jobs."

"It would be very helpful," Mr. O'Connor stated, "if people in the Grosse Pointe and Gratiot township area would advise the center whenever they know of any jobs, temporary or permanent, that might be offered to any of the veterans. If any such people will phone TU 1-1629 whenever they hear of any such openings, the center and veterans can be so advised."

A good percentage of the applicants who have already come to the counseling center have been placed in jobs through the center, but the demand is increasing so rapidly that additional help would be very welcome.

The second most pressing requirements of veterans contacting the center is assistance in securing a place to live. Mr. O'Connor has also indicated that if anyone hears of housing facilities of any sort, they would be assisting returning veterans if they would so advise the Grosse Pointe Counseling center.

PEN AND SWORD

Charles Cana once said that what a newspaperman does is not news, but in World War II our American correspondents made part of the living record of victory through their gallantry in words and action.

In their war, too, part of the front was against a worldwide cult of hush, repression, and obliteration of the truth, and when our correspondents penetrated the actual fighting zones they carried their own campaign in terms of blood and sacrifice, as well as a new light of interpretation.

So newsmen have had their day in the news, after all. Their part of the victory was symbolized recently in Manila, where 25 war correspondents officially became civilian "foreign" correspondents. The transition was simple — merely the removal of army insignia — but it was as complete as demobilization of a doughboy.

In a sense, too, it was a reconversion. For now peace-time journalism on the foreign fronts has an even bigger job to do. Its duty now is to minimize instead of magnify any hint of alien propaganda and to stand on news, and news alone, instead of those convenient by-products of ambitious powers which bypass the American view of truth.

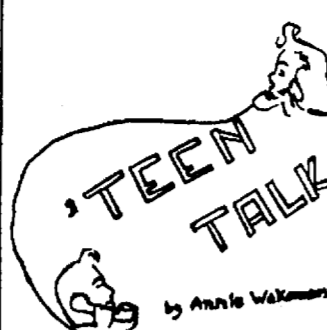

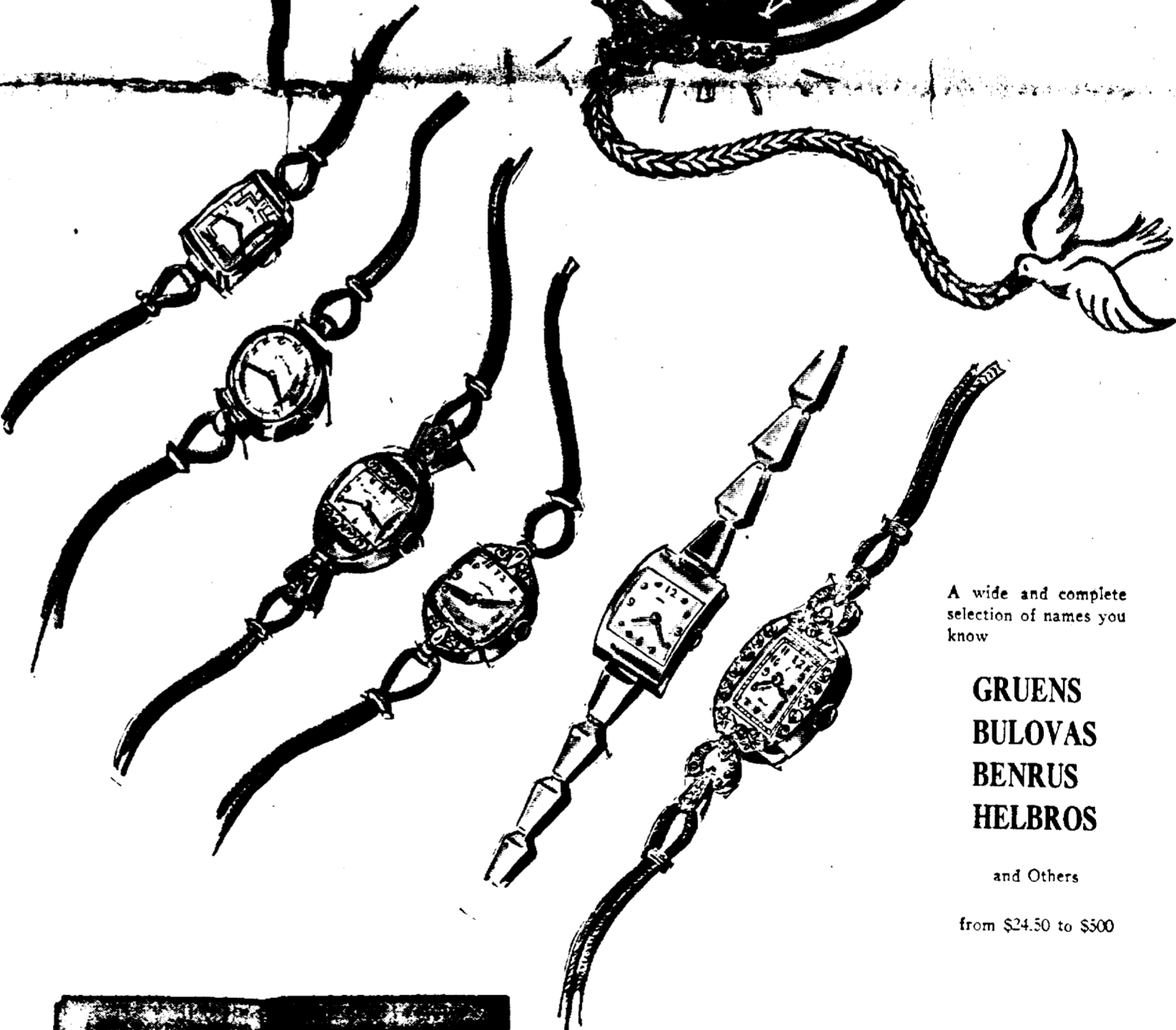

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SERVICE PARADE

Men and Women Still in Service

Mather Field, Calif.—Staff Sergeant Hugh Morrison of Grosse Pointe, a bombardier with 15 missions over the Japanese homeland, returned to the United States today on a six-month tour with the 34th Bombardment Wing at Mather Field in California.

Sgt. Morrison landed at Mather Field in a C-47 with 19 other high potential aviators who are being returned to the States for rotation, reassignment or discharge. The B-29 was the 105 aircraft of Colonel R. Storrie's 34th Wing which brought home some 20,000 officers and enlisted men by Nov. 5. Pointe men of the wing will be on duty at the Pacific fortress unit to return to the States following the arrival of the 58th and 73rd Bombardment Groups last month. Colonel Storrie's group dropped more than 60,000 bombs on 61 missions in the air war against the Japanese homeland, and leveled industrial targets ranging from the southern island of Kyushu to the city of Nagoya, 125 miles north of Tokyo.

Gen. Nathan F. Twining's 20th Air Force wrought destruction on the largest cities.

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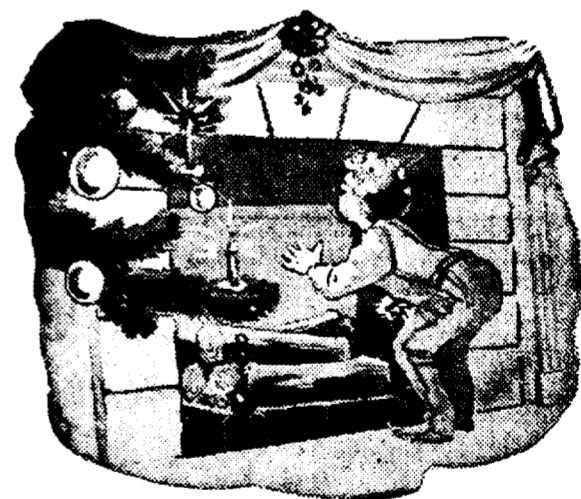

Police Chief Warns of Accidents Caused by Unsafe Autos

Automobile accidents will plague us in ever-increasing intensity during the approaching winter months, Henry W. Piel, Park police chief, predicted recently.

Judging from his own department's records, and from studies made by the National Safety Council, the chief said he based his forecast on the following facts:

1. Traffic accident rates for 36 northern states were 24 to 53 per cent higher in winter than in summer during recent years.
 2. The accident rate this year has risen sharply since lifting of gasoline rationing in mid-August. More cars are going more miles, and faster, with increased exposure to traffic dangers.
 3. Today the average car is eight years old, and more than one-half of all tires running are four years old. A great many vehicles are unsafe for any but the most careful use.
 4. Many drivers become involved in costly mishaps or near-accidents at the beginning of each winter, before they learn precautions are needed on slippery roads.
- The next few weeks will provide a crucial test for all drivers, the chief emphasized. Wise motorists will prepare to overcome winter's twin hazards, poor traction and reduced visibility. Preparations will include checking and servicing of all standard and special vehicle equipment for winter use, especially brakes, tire chains, windshield wipers, heaters, defrosters, lights, and the exhaust and cooling systems. The car owner who keeps his vehicle in good repair for winter driving has already won half the battle.

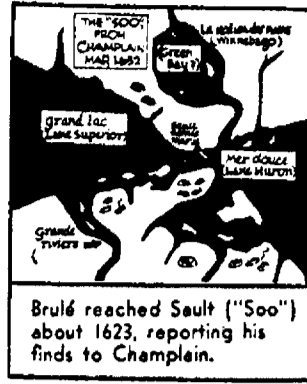

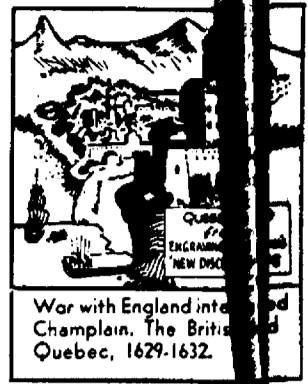

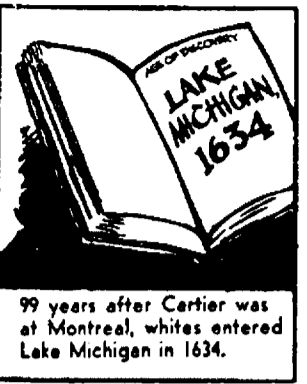

Ordinance No. 36 An Ordinance to License and Regulate Convalescent Homes Within the Village of Grosse Pointe Park; Provide A Penalty for the Violation Thereof and to Amend All Ordinances Inconsistent Therewith.

The Village Clerk shall keep a record of all licenses issued hereunder and shall furnish the Health Officer with a duplicate list, corrected from time to time as changes may occur.

Section 1. This shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to establish, maintain, operate, or conduct a convalescent home in the Village of Grosse Pointe Park without first obtaining a license therefor in the manner hereinafter provided.

Section 2. The term "convalescent home" as used in this ordinance shall include any building, or part of a building, used for the care of the sick, infirm or aged where two or more persons are or may be accommodated for compensation, but not including any hospital operated primarily for medical or surgical treatment and under the direct control and supervision of a physician or surgeon, nor any home for the aged operated by a charitable or eleemosynary organization.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation desiring to procure a license to establish, maintain, or operate a convalescent home, shall make application therefor, in writing, to the Village Clerk upon a form to be furnished by the Village Clerk.

Section 4. No license shall be issued except upon: (a) The finding by the Health Officer that: (1) The applicant is of good moral character and a proper person to conduct such convalescent home.

Section 5. If each of the officers charged with the duty of making such inspections, find that all of the conditions enumerated in Section 4 hereof, as to which he is required to investigate and report, exist, the Village Clerk shall issue a license on payment by the applicant of a license fee of \$25.00 per year or a portion thereof for such convalescent home with accommodations for not more than ten patients, plus license fee of \$2.00 per year or a portion thereof for each accommodation in excess of ten patients.

Telephone Company Establishes Unique Practice for Rehiring War Veterans

The Michigan Bell Telephone company today announced that, in recognition of experience in the armed forces, it will grant increased starting pay rates to returning veterans entering the company's service for the first time.

George M. Welch, president of the company, said the extent of the increase will depend upon the experience of veterans while in the armed forces. He emphasized, however, that the practice will not eliminate the element of judgment in the individual hiring of new employees.

"The new practice simply grants recognition to the fact that the veteran has undergone a measure of development useful in the telephone business while in the armed forces," Welch said. "For such purposes, veterans are placed into two general classifications: 1. Those with no communications experience but in whom military service has developed maturity and certain other abilities. 2. Those with communications experience related to telephone occupations, or have had specialized

training courses while in the service. For those without communications experience, the starting pay rates will be advanced up to a maximum of eight months on the wage-progression schedules, depending on the length of their military service. Starting pay of those with a year or more of communications experience will be advanced an additional four months on the schedules. Thus, if a veteran were in the armed forces 32 months, including a year of telephone training, a maximum credit of one year could be allowed.

The case of every veteran with telephone experience will be reviewed three months after entering the company's service. After comparing his progress with that of other employees in similar work, another adjustment may be made, depending on the ability shown by the veteran. Adjustments are to be made in the pay of veterans hired prior to the effective date of the plan.

Welch pointed out the practice applies only to veterans who never before worked for the company,

Employees in the armed forces are on leave of absence and, upon returning to the company, receive full credit for all service in the armed forces and the same pay rates had they remained on their old jobs.

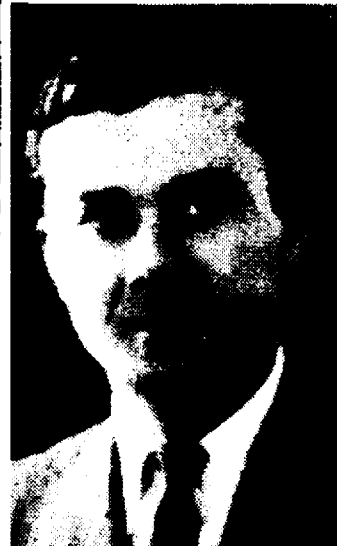
The company expects to employ two thousand new telephone workers, many of whom will come from the ranks of returning veterans when its \$120,000,000 postwar expansion program is well under way. Those are in addition to employees in the armed forces, originating more than three thousand who will return to their Michigan Bell now has about 468 employees in the service, 468 on the job from the armed forces and 53 on the Gold Star Roll.

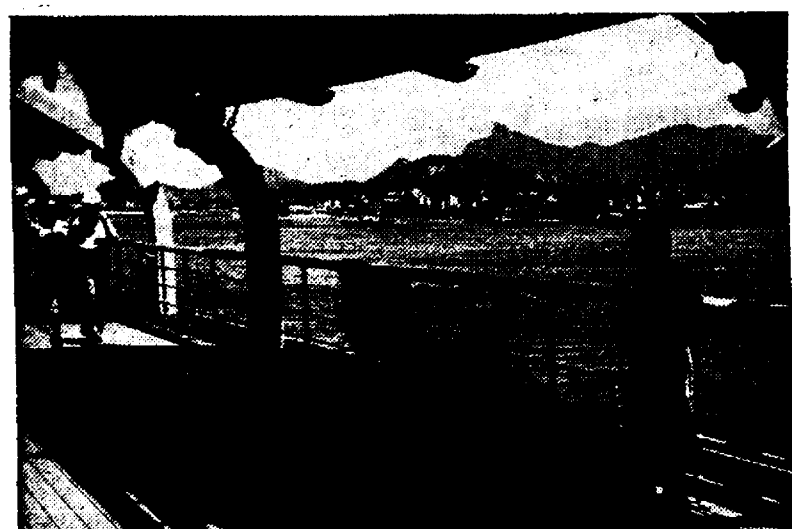

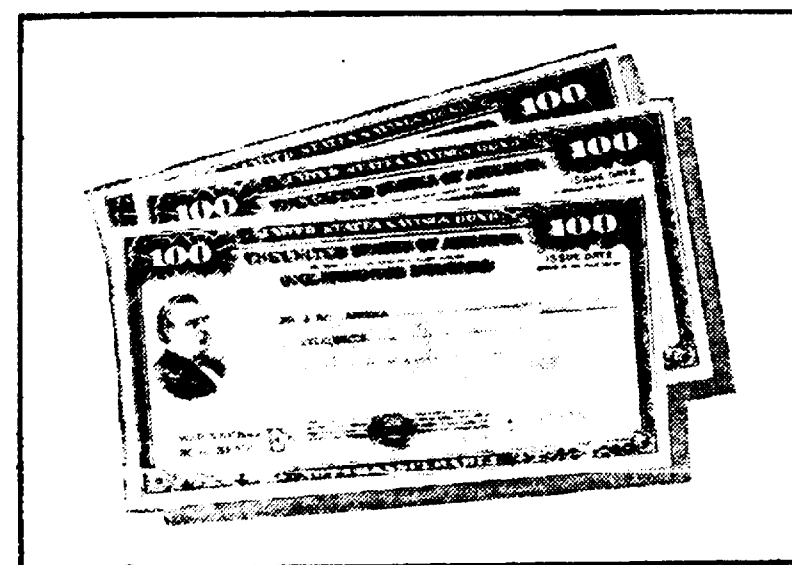
