# WOODS VOTE ON RE-ZONING

## Farms Residents Oppose Proposed Lumber Yard

### Ask Study Be Made For Up-To-Date Zoning Revision

At a special meeting called by the council committee on zoning ordinance, Friday, Nov. 30, Fred J. Asmus, officer of Grosse Pointe Farms Property Owners Association together with property owners in the vicinity of Touraine and Mack, strenuously objected to Messrs. Kocak's proposed erection of lumber storage buildings on the corner of Mack and Touraine.

Residential property owners pointed out that a lumber yard would be

obnoxious and an eyesore besides depreciating values of surrounding homes. They requested the council to change existing outmoded zoning laws to an up-to-date basis. To prevent commercial business, wholesale business, and other undesirable uses of business frontage, the council zoning committee, composed of Messrs. Watkins, Kirby and Grylls, informed the property owners present that a committee was working on a program to bring the zoning ordinance up-to-date and expected to submit their recommendations for changes within a month.

Property owners pointed out that the City of Grosse Pointe and St. Clair Shores have revised their zoning ordinances recently. They requested early action by the village of Grosse Pointe Farms. Property owners interested in protecting the existing value of their homes are invited to join with the property owners present at the meeting, by contacting the Grosse Pointe Farms Property Owners Association, Fred J. The continuance of a peace time army and navy continues as six men from Grosse Pointe are to report for induction on Wednesday morning, Dec. 12. The men who are scheduled to leave are James R. Brown, 270 Merriweather; Robert K. Stark, 253 Hillcrest; Robert C. Peltier, 1211 Maryland; John A. Kuecken, 806 Hawthorne; Godfrey Deneve, 4712 Maryland; and John E. Holmes, Grand Blanc, Mich. These men, their families and friends are asked to report at the Neighborhood club on Wednesday morning at 6:30, for the traditional sendoff ceremonies. These "good-bye" gestures began soon after the first draftees left the Pointe for the armed services and are continuing for the present time.

### City Salvage Plant Destroyed by Fire Last Monday Night

A fire which took more than three hours to quell practically destroyed the City of Grosse Pointe salvage plant at Radnor and Warren avenues last Monday night. The flames were discovered at 7:30 by a nearby resident who called the Detroit fire department; the City fire department was also notified. Three trucks battled the blaze until after 10:30 p.m. Cause of the fire was laid to electric wiring inside the plant; damage was estimated by City fire department officials at thirty-five hundred dollars. Everything was insured. The plant contained waste paper, rags, and large amounts of corrugated paperboard. It had not been determined just how much of this salvagable material was stored in the building at the time of the fire. Established in 1936, the salvage plant was instrumental in sending paper, cardboard, tin, glass, metals and rags to various plants and mills which used the material in the war effort. During the war years, it handled over ten million pounds of critical materials which were saved in the nation's all-out salvage campaign.

The building will be rebuilt after a sale and exchange of this property is completed between Detroit, the Automobile Fraternity and the City of Grosse Pointe.

### Village To Ballot On Business Lot Changes on Mack

In an attempt to be fair to the residents of Grosse Pointe Woods, the home owners of Country Club Woods subdivision and 18 business lot owners, the Woods village commission decided Tuesday night to throw the question of rezoning the western part of Mack avenue from business into residential, into a referendum vote.

### Township Awaits Decision

Basing their arguments on the belief that 95% of Grosse Pointe township is under assessed and five per cent are over assessed, thus causing "an inequality" among the taxpayers, representatives of approximately fifty residents appealed to the Michigan state tax commission Wednesday, Nov. 28, in the Grosse Pointe Park Municipal Building, to bring about a change in the assessment.

later upheld by the township's board of review on the lake shore and mansion type homes were attacked by Fred Behr, representing a large group of residents, and McMahon & Maxon, speaking for 13 clients. Between the two, they asked for a reduction of from 3/4 to four million dollars in assessments in the township on real property.

Mr. Schweikart points out that if this were granted, the entire township tax rate would have to be increased to make up for the deficit. An appeal was made to the commission last year by approximately the same people, but the former agreed that Mr. Schweikart's decisions were equal and fair to all taxpayers. However, they recommended a few changes and these homes received a reduction ranging from 9/10 of one per cent to six per cent on their assessments.

Because of this hearing, the township tax bills have been delayed; they will be sent through the mails as soon as the tax rate has been definitely settled. The findings of the commission, headed by Louis Nims, have not been received by Mr. Schweikart, who is expecting their report any day.

It was argued that, therefore, the village was obliged to issue the building permit.

Discussion at the hearing indicated that the zoning ordinance, which designates Mack avenue frontage as being a "Commercial District," is limited in its scope to the extent that permits cannot be refused for any building regardless of the degree to which it violates the standards of the ordinance.

The ordinance, as it stands, will not allow the village to prohibit many types of businesses that are undesirable in nature, and does not restrict the manner, method, or hours of operation of any business enterprise.

The following petition has been circulated among the residents of Mack, Madison, Manor, Cloverly, Touhy, Calvin, and Ballanger avenues in the Mack and Chalfonte area. It will be submitted to the Fairview village council.

We, the undersigned property owners of Grosse Pointe Farms, hereby protest the erection of a lumber storage yard and sales office on Mack and Touraine, as outlined in letter of Nov. 24, 1945 from Grosse Pointe Farms Property Owners Association, and request that the council immediately delay erection of said improvements until such time as the property owners receive a hearing before the council.

In addition, we request that the council review the zoning ordinance for the village in order to:

- 1. Establish a method of controlling and restricting the type of homes to be erected in the various subdivisions in the Farms, so that buildings are not based on dollar value.
2. To set up a plan of restrictions for business frontage designed to prevent the erection of undesirable buildings and that will prohibit operation of those businesses that will depreciate surrounding property values because of the nature of the business, the hours of operation, etc.

We, the undersigned, feel that an immediate revision of the village zoning ordinance is essential because of the impending boom in residential and commercial building in the Farms and the prevailing high costs of building.

The activities of the association have been restricted during the war period. Officers of the association are now laying plans for resuming their duties. A meeting of the members will be called in the near future.

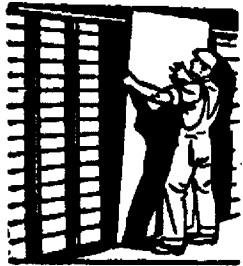

(Continued from Page One.) where this problem concerned anyone in the village except that group. They said that the homes and property in the subdivision would be depreciated if businesses were established. Mr. Burgess explained that the property owners bought into that area under the impression that all was residential and it wasn't until recently that they all learned that these 18 business lots were not included in the general re-zoning which took place several years ago. The blame for this was placed on a local real estate broker who left the people under the impression that

no business lots existed in this section. Both Burgess and Beauchamp live in this subdivision. Various resolutions were offered for action but upon the recommendation of President Ghesquiere, Commissioner Burgess resolved that the referendum be held to determine if the frontage from the village park to Bourne-mouth and from Huntington to the village limits should be re-zoned. Questions which were brought up by commissioners and spectators and which will be answered by the people in the referendum vote will be: Shall this entire area be made residential? Will nearby homes and property be depreciated by business? Will this depreciation be equivalent

to the loss which the business lot owners will sustain if rezoned into residential? What can one business man do with one 20-foot lot? George M. Welch Retires From Office of Michigan Bell Co.

The board of directors of the Michigan Bell Telephone company has accepted the retirement of President George M. Welch, effective Jan. 31, and has elected Thomas N. Lacy, vice-president and general manager, as his successor as president. Ben R. Marsh, general commercial manager, will become vice-president and general manager; William E. Shane, division commercial superintendent at Detroit, will succeed Marsh as head of the company's commercial department; and James B. Kaler, general commercial supervisor, takes over Shane's duties. Upon retirement from active service after 42 years with the Bell System, Welch will continue as a Michigan Bell director. He has been president for 11 years. At 35, he was the company's general manager, one of the youngest top officials in Bell System history. He is leaving under the company's rule providing for automatic retirement at 65. Welch started in the telephone business as a clerk-stenographer at Minneapolis in 1904 and four years later came with the Michigan Bell at Detroit. He was made vice-president in 1920 and president in 1934. In 1941, in recognition of his leadership in the industry, Welch was awarded the honorary degree of doctor of business administration by the University of Michigan. He was international president of the Telephone Pioneers of America in 1942. A one-time "boy operator," Lacy as vice-president and general manager for 11 years, has been Welch's right-hand man. He has been with the Bell System 39 years but started in the telephone business 44 years ago as a 16-year-old night operator for an independent company in his home town of Lititz, Pa. He is an electrical engineering graduate of Lehigh University.

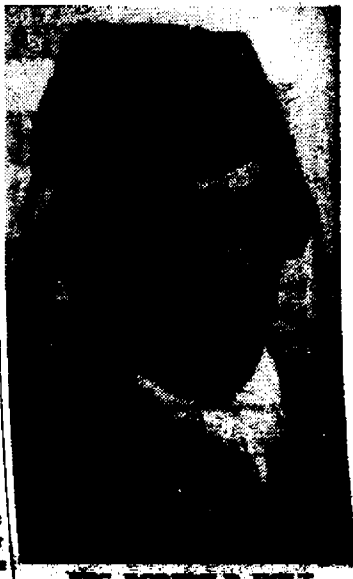

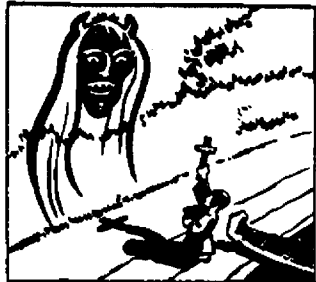

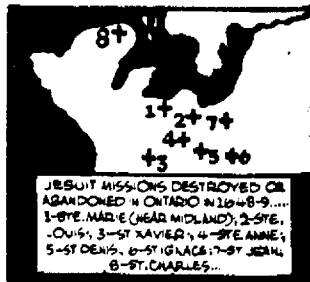

**Methods, Not Drugs Helped Mortality Rates in War II**

According to information recently released by the U. S. Surgeon General's office, decline of the mortality rate in World War II to 3%, as compared with 15-18% in World War I, is credited to several factors.

A. J. Meyer, addressing the noon luncheon of the Grosse Pointe Rotary club Monday, told the guests that the Surgeon General's office gives full credit to the achievement of medical science, which includes the development of penicillin and the sulfa drugs, but also ascribes considerable credit to these factors:

1. Speedy air evacuation of critical cases;
2. Development of the use of blood plasma and whole blood;
3. Medical units in the front lines and accompanying troops on assault boats during invasion;
4. The experience obtained by medical men in the wide field of techniques which were developed, of necessity, by the large number of casualties.

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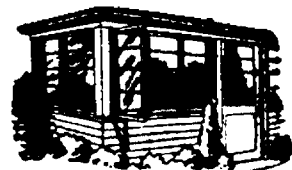
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
