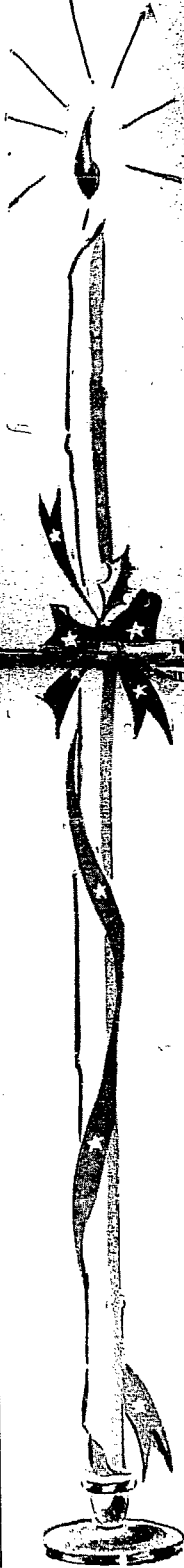

Consistent Bond Selling Chalked Up by High School

Approximately two and a half million dollars worth of bonds and stamps were sold by Grosse Pointe high school students in the war effort.

Officially Tuesday, Dec. 18. The total amount of bonds sold in this drive reached \$212,900. As usual, Brownell Junior high school students outdid the senior high school students in per cent sales by a considerable margin. Grosse Pointe high school participated in seven war bond drives. Weekly sales of stamps and bonds added about one hundred thousand dollars to the grand total. In bond drives alone, nearly ten thousand

E bonds were sold with a total value of \$1,206,025. Hundreds and hundreds of E bonds in addition were sold in weekly sales. When asked how Grosse Pointe high school compared with other schools, Walter R. Cleminson, principal, replied that if any other school had done better, he hadn't heard or read about it. Several schools have done exceptionally well on individual drives, but Grosse Pointe high school has been at the top consistently. Mr. Cleminson accorded praise for the success of the school bond participation with these words: "This remarkable record of our school is the result of much effort on the part of the students and the outstanding management given by H. L. Selmeier, who sponsored all of these drives, and members of the teaching staff."

"The greatness of it all could not have been achieved without much careful planning, special stunts, assembly programs, and general enthusiasm-rousing plots hatched up by student groups, hours and hours of sales work by over a thousand students," Mr. Cleminson said. "Naturally, we are exceedingly proud of this marvelous war effort contribution by Grosse Pointe high school."

Woods Civic League Opposes Proposed Zoning Revision

At a meeting last Thursday night the Grosse Pointe Woods Civic League decided, after serious consideration, to oppose the proposed change of the Woods zoning ordinance. This change involves rezoning from business to residential status a considerable amount of Mack avenue frontage extending from the village park to Bournemout and from Huntington to the village limits.

It was brought out that between fifteen and twenty per cent of all available business frontage would be eliminated should the areas concerned be voted residential. The loss in taxes would be substantial and the business area remaining would be insufficient to provide the convenient and necessary facilities for the fifteen to twenty thousand population the Woods expects to attain within the next few years.

Many residents believe that the proponents of the move are not interested in the general welfare of the village, but are concerned only with maintaining the isolated position which is now held. The Grosse Pointe Woods Civic League favors several changes to the present zoning ordinance, and feels the coming referendum to be discriminatory against other sections of the village and confiscatory to the present property owners. In the latter connection the League fears that much litigation and several damage suits may cause a large financial loss to Grosse Pointe Woods. The next meeting of the League will be held Jan. 3. The membership will be advised by mail when a suitable meeting place has been selected.

Commission Thanked for Village Pension Activity

A letter was read to the Park commission which was received from the Grosse Pointe Park Fire Fighters Association thanking them for their action in making the pension for municipal employees a reality. The letter was placed on file.

Accidents Send One to Hospital; Two Treated for Cuts

Several accidents occurred on Grosse Pointe streets last week-end, many of them due to the snow on the roadways. Three of them proved serious, with two victims treated for cuts and bruises, and the third taken to the hospital.

Dr. Edgar H. Morris of 607 Lakepointe suffered from a slight shock following a crash in which his car was struck by Louis W. Bohm of 711 Berkshire last Friday evening at Lakepointe and Korte.

Another driver who received cuts on his head was Carl G. Hasselblad of 859 Nottingham after he had driven into traffic at Jefferson and Nottingham last Saturday evening and was struck by Curtis V. Mower of 357 Roosevelt place. Hasselblad was ticketed by Park police.

The third crash which completely demolished one car and seriously damaged the second occurred at Somerset and Jefferson last Friday evening. Art Gevais of 672 St. Clair, while making a left turn into Somerset, was struck by a car driven by Rankin Peck of Lakeshore drive. The former was rushed to Bon Secours hospital by police where his condition was reported as temporarily serious. Statements of the accident were taken at the prosecutor's office.

Accidents Send One to Hospital; Two Treated for Cuts

Although the Grosse Pointe Woods village commission was asked for an opinion on whether a proposed dry cleaning plant to be erected on Mack avenue near Country Club Drive would violate the zoning ordinance, a decision was not given out because of the inaccuracy of the building plans submitted, last Tuesday night.

Residents objected to the plant on the grounds that dry cleaning plant comes under the heading of a "laundry, or similar or like industries" which are prohibited in the village. Discussion was held between opposing citizens, the counsel for the dry cleaner and the commissioners, but in the end the question was tabled until correct plans are presented to the village inspector.

New Depositories

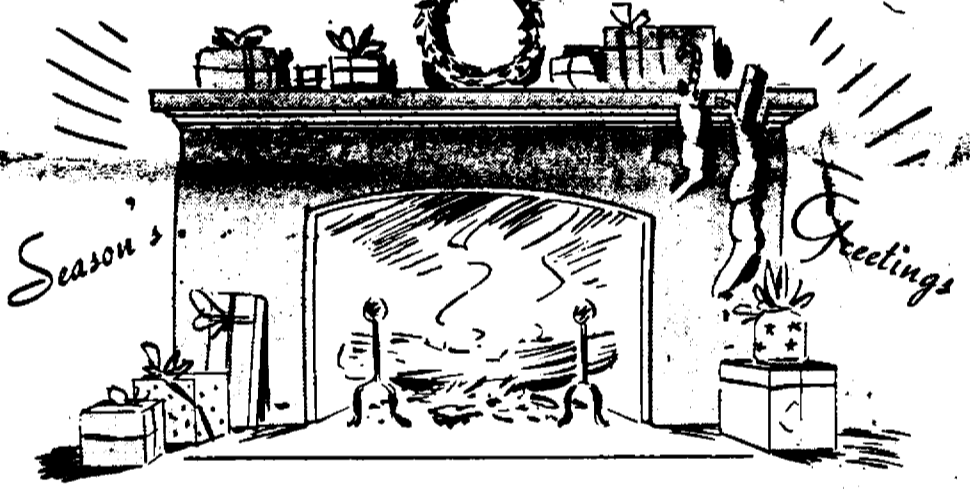

They escaped with money and thirteen quarts of liquor; the total amounted to an approximate \$245.

Goodfellows Pass \$5,000 In Annual Sale Last Tuesday

Dramatic success marked the 17th annual Lions Goodfellow sale on Tuesday with the five thousand dollar goal exceeded for the first time in the long honored history of the annual sale.

"Buy A Goodfellow Paper" was the cry heard from every prominent street corner in Grosse Pointe last Tuesday morning, as Lions club members supplemented by policemen and firemen of each municipality began their 17th annual paper sale.

To this cry, thousands of Grosse Pointe residents generously rallied, contributing over five thousand dollars, according to the co-chairmen of the drive, Carl Schweikart and Hon. Victor H. DeBaake.

"Such success could never have been achieved, this year or any year, were it not for the fine cooperation of the police and fire departments of the Grosse Pointe municipalities," said Carl Schweikart, co-chairman with Hon. Victor H. DeBaake, of the drive.

On the streets from 6 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., Pointe "newsboys" terminated the sale with a noon-day luncheon meeting at the Detroit Turners. Additional funds will undoubtedly be received by mail, and Lions members eventually hope to swell the fund to a final greater total.

This luncheon is provided by a special assessment of the Lions Club members for themselves and their guests, and was not purchased by the proceeds of the paper sale.

Following the luncheon, Dr. W. J. Watkins, president of the Lions club, introduced Maestro Phil Skillman, famous as Don Artiste of the air waves and universally popular pianist-composer, who acted as master of ceremonies for the entertainment.

First presented was a talented young lady with novel dance and rope twirling routines and a troupe of six dogs. Ben Young, of Bowery fame, led the guests in singing and rocked them with laughter with jokes. An ex-G.I. one-man band wound up the entertainment with dancing and musical gymnastics.

As in previous years, baskets of food and clothing will be distributed among the under-privileged in the community, and all excess money will be placed in a Goodfellow fund to be used the whole year 'round.

The Neighborhood Club, under the direction of George Elworthy, is the distributing agency for Grosse Pointe.

Construction on the Snay building has already been started.

Various objections were raised about the tavern on the grounds of the suitability of such an establishment in that neighborhood. They said that although the tavern would be conducted in a quiet and refined manner, there would still be noise, the sound of autos and other disturbances, especially at closing time.

Councilman Grylls again took the floor and explained that the two requests—the lumber yard and the tavern—were entirely different from each other and thought council action should not be identical.

Councilman Maxon immediately moved that the permit should not be rescinded; he was supported with affirmative votes by all the other councilmen.

In answering the question of what

the residents could further do in this matter, President Watkins explained that the only recourse open to them now is an appeal to the liquor control commission.

When this portion of the village meeting was concluded, indignant protests and impolite remarks were made by several of the residents, some of them almost amounting to threats.

The climax came later in the evening (or early next morning), when the council, realizing that it had not acted in good faith with Mr. Kockx who was conforming to the zoning ordinance of the village, moved to reconsider their earlier action. Councilman Grylls withdrew his original motion on rescinding the Kockx permit, and upon the agreement of all other members, left the matter as it existed before the hearing, i.e.,

Farms Council Upholds Issue of Building Permits

The council of Grosse Pointe Farms was put behind the well-known eight ball last Monday night, and remained there until after 1 a.m. when they reconsidered an earlier move made after the close of a three hour session with many local residents who petitioned and requested the rescinding of two building permits. The group, numbering between forty and fifty, were representatives of the Grosse Pointe Farms Property Owners' Association and property owners living in the vicinity of Touraine and Mack and Fisher-McKinley and Mack.

They attacked the plan proposed by Cornelius Kockx who intends to establish a retail lumber business at Touraine and Mack. Others were there to raise objection to the new location on Mack between Fisher and McKinley of a tavern now being moved from the Mack-Kerby section. The latter is owned by Joseph Snay, former 21-year member of the council.

The council came from behind the eight-ball when they decided to allow Kockx and Snay to go ahead with their building plans. Earlier in the evening they rescinded Kockx's building permit and took the opposite view when Snay's permit was up for discussion.

Several weeks ago, members of the Property Owners' Association met after they learned that a lumber business was proposed for the Mack-Touraine corner. They objected to this and circulated petitions among the neighbors deprecating the business as a factor in depreciating the value of their property, and as an unsightly structure in the area.

Mr. Kockx explained that the business would be conducted as any retail establishment is conducted and said the buildings and outside storage would not become an eyesore. He stated that all preliminary arrangements have been made al-

Fire Commissioner Cautions Against Holiday Fires

Fire Commissioner Elmer F. Ulrich of Grosse Pointe Park, has issued the following statement, urging safety for the Christmas holidays:

"According to the National Fire Protection Association your Christmas tree and the decorations on it are fire hazards which you will want to watch most carefully this Christmas. Remember when you bring a tree into your house it is going to dry up. A fresh cut tree will not take fire any more easily during the first day or two than would the evergreen shrubs growing outside, but it becomes a more serious fire hazard every hour. At the end of the week, it will be highly flammable. It is best to bring in a fresh tree as short a time before Christmas as possible, and to remove it as soon afterwards as you can. If you do this, ordinary cautions should prevent it from taking fire. Families, clubs, churches, and business men who want to keep their trees from a week or more before Christmas until after New Year's day need observe special safeguards to keep it reasonably safe."

"The tree can be kept fresh if you set it up in a pan of water and keep adding water during the entire period that the tree is in the house. The place you select for your tree should be well away from stoves, radiators, and other sources of heat. When you smoke, keep away from the tree.

"It is important that your Christmas lights be in good condition. A short circuit in wiring might be sufficient to start the tree burning.

"If you decorate your house elaborately you'll have a very serious hazard unless you use incombustible material. Elaborate decorations are an important feature of most parties held in clubs, and other public places but terrible tragedies have occurred when small fires flashed across halls filled with combustible hangings.

"Christmas wrappings burn like tinder and should be removed as soon as possible. See that all wrappings go into the waste basket and that it is taken out and dumped in a covered metal container, or incinerator. If your tree catches on fire, call the fire department immediately. Learn the location of your nearest fire alarm box, or post your own fire alarm box, and place it where it will be handy in case of fire. In Detroit six children lost their lives in fires during the Christmas season a year ago."

Police Chief Issues Warning to Residents Regarding Checks

Chief of Police Henry W. Piel announced that the United States Secret Service at Detroit again warns persons in this vicinity to be watchful for mail thieves and forgers, especially during the pre-holiday season.

When checks are stolen and forged it causes many hardships for those for whom the checks were intended. It sometimes takes months to get a duplicate check because of the time required to investigate the cases. Those who accept checks bearing forged endorsements lose the amounts of the checks involved.

Chief Piel and the Secret Service urge that the following rules be observed:

To Those Who Receive Checks

1. Have a good, deep mail box. KEEP it locked.
2. Print your name clearly on your mail box.
3. If you move, report change of address to your post office and the agency by whom your checks are issued.
4. Never endorse a check until you are actually in the presence of the person who will cash it.
5. Cash your check at the same place each month. Cash it yourself—don't send children to cash checks—it encourages juvenile delinquency.
6. Always be prepared to present proper identification when cashing checks.
7. Notify issuing agency immediately if checks are not received when due.

To Those Who Cash Checks

1. KNOW YOUR ENDORSER. Insist upon proper identification. Before you cash a check, ask yourself this question: "If this check is returned can I find the person who gave it to me?"
2. Never cash a check already endorsed without having it endorsed again in your presence.
3. Require employees who cash checks to initial them; also to write down on the check the type and serial number of identification presented.

DO NOT SPINDLE, PIN, FOLD OR MUTILATE ALLOWANCE AND ALLOTMENT CHECKS OR ANY CARD TYPE CHECK.

Chief Piel points out that unlocked mail boxes are easily accessible to professional mail thieves, and are a temptation to juveniles. When bankers and business people cash these checks or forged endorsements they aid the criminal and contribute to the delinquency of juveniles. Hardships and losses can be avoided and our juveniles kept out of trouble if these few simple rules are carefully observed.

Complete Plans for Mack Avenue Alley

Final plans have been made by Murray M. Smith, Grosse Pointe Farms village engineer with the Mack avenue alleys. All descriptions which are included in the deeds from the Stamler-Sloan property, as well as the Max Kogan land extending from Kerby road to Moross east of Mack have been checked satisfactorily by the engineering department.

Father and son went to make inquiry together at the Social Security Board office. Yes, if his daughter had worked for such a


long time in private industry or business and he had been dependent on her, then Ed Simpson was undoubtedly eligible for benefits.

Parents must be completely dependent on a child to receive social security benefits on the child's account, and some 6,000 parents the country over are receiving these insurance benefits. In order for a parent to receive benefits, the worker must not be survived by a widow or child.
