## IT'S BETTER TO HAVE BEEN . . .

Local curbstone strategists who scoffed at the activities of the OCD as "unnecessary waste of time, money and effort" during the war emergency, deserve a little review of the facts. Receipt this week of a Certificate of Merit signed by the governor of Michigan and state OCD director prompts such a recital.

The FBI and the war department considered Detroit a "Target for Tonight" any day or night. Hundreds of special agents were stationed in this area dating from Pearl Harbor. The entire metropolitan area was ringed by radar, and airplane interceptor and fighter cover was within minutes from the city and on constant alert for combat upon any report of an unidentified plane approaching this area.

Many local buildings were rendered virtually bombproof upon recommendation from high government circles, at costs ranging well into the six cipher figure.

Japanese bomb-carrying balloons fell in Michigan, as close to Detroit as Plymouth. Fortunately Detroit (and Grosse Pointe could well have been included) did not receive more than the threat of an attack. If it had, those same local scoffers would have been the first to criticize over not being prepared. The above facts more than vindicate the judgment of those who saw to it that Grosse Pointe was alerted.

The local OCD, its director, the air raid wardens, fire wardens, block wardens, etc., are to be congratulated!

## Veteranews from the Office of Veterans' Affairs, Lansing

Reports tabulated from 81 of Michigan's veteran counseling centers reveals that 26,777 veterans called at these centers for information, counseling and guidance, during the month of November. July reports from the same centers showed only 9,865 veterans calling for the same services. This definitely shows the trend to be upward in a high degree.

Detroit led the state with 8,875 veterans applying at the center in November. This was against a figure of 2,863 for July. Grand Rapids was second with 7,497 in November as compared to 407 in July. The smallest total was Leslie with five in November and one in July. Leslie's center is a voluntary, part time service whereas Detroit operates full time with a staff of 20.

Michigan pioneered in the establishment of local counseling centers. Today Michigan's plan is being emulated across the nation. It is basically sound. The first obligation to a veteran is a community obligation. The state has formulated many plans to all federal care. The federal government has made many valuable services and benefits available to veterans. At the same time, the community has a duty to see that the veteran is not left alone and without a place to turn to for help. The first step is to throw up his hands in disgust and condemn all benefits to the inferno below.

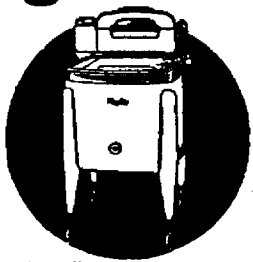

history of Grosse Pointe municipalities, and one which was the envy of municipal governments generally, the City of Grosse Pointe sold two bond issues with a net interest rate of 1.19 per cent.

Fished from the icy waters of Lake St. Clair by Grosse Pointe Shores patrolman Louis Baldwin, a wandering brown mongrel was the center of considerable attraction for several days when well over one hundred interested persons sought to identify the dog as "their lost pet" after his rescue.

Matthew Millenbach, Jr., was seriously injured in an auto accident on the way to a toboggan party near Pontiac. Residents of the City of Grosse Pointe were urged to register for voting. Pointers were asked to contribute reading material for the enlisted personnel at Selfridge Field.

**10 Years Ago**

Ground was broken and work officially started on the new elementary school building located on Cadieux road between Kercheval and Waterloo in the city. The school was being constructed as a federal PWA project on which the school district was given a federal grant of \$138,272 and for which the Grosse Pointe voters approved a bond issue for \$169,000 at a special election.

Approximately 400 interested persons attended the hearing relative to the proposed zoning ordinance to allow a shopping center at Lakeview and Grosse Pointe boulevard. The proposal was laid on the table for further consideration.

Mr. and Mrs. John Reaume of 572 St. Clair avenue celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. Two fires called out city firemen early Sunday morning. Rep. Louis Rabaut attended the inauguration of Manuel Quezon as the first president of the Philippine Commonwealth in Manila.

**15 Years Ago**

The Grosse Pointe school board was contemplating launching a legal battle with the board of education of Detroit because of the Wayburn avenue dividing line between the two municipalities. Detroit was including the boys and girls who attended the Pointe schools because the rear of their homes were located in Detroit, in their reports to the state, thus collecting state funds for them. The Pointe board of education, on the other hand, granted the reimbursement for the education of these children.

Building operations with a total value of \$102,135 were authorized in the Grosse Pointe villages according to reports of the village clerks. First floor plans for the proposed Cadieux elementary school on Cadieux road were being prepared by architects. The police radio system of Grosse Pointe township spent a busy month with 415 calls and proved to be of great aid to the community.

**Average Veteran at U. of M. Is 24, Served 32 Months**

The average veteran at the University of Michigan is 24½ years old, served 32 months in the armed services and was overseas 26 months.

This was disclosed by a statistical survey of the university's 2,093 veterans (2,056 men and 37 women). The survey has just been completed for the Veterans Service Bureau of the university by the statistical service of the registrar's office.

The survey also shows that 71 per cent of the male veterans served in the army, with 21 per cent in the navy, and 35 per cent in the marines. The remaining 45 per cent were in the coast guard, auxiliary services, or with foreign armies or navies. Among the women veterans, 51 per cent were in the army, 27 per cent in the navy with the other 22 per cent divided among the marines, coast guard, and auxiliary services.

As to rank, first lieutenants predominated among the veterans who served in the army, with privates next most numerous, and privates first class third in number. Among the former navy personnel, ordinary seamen top the list by a wide margin with lieutenants (jg), a poor second. Among the marine veterans, privates first class dominate the group. And the ex-coast guardsmen are the same as the navy men since most of them served as ordinary seamen.

And perhaps a surprising item disclosed by the survey is that 305 of the veterans are paying their own tuition.

**Tons of Red Tape**

Washington. — Fifteen million pounds of records which would fill 91 miles of office file-cabinet drawers laid end to end—that is the total of government wartime red tape that one agency alone (Civilian Production Administration) has on hand.

Great deal of it consists of filled-out and mailed-back questionnaires which bedeviled U. S. businessmen—many of which will now go up in smoke (the red tape, that is).

of the Country Club Woods subdivision. Their original request was for only the lots in that subdivision but this was later increased by the commission to include the areas now in the proposed amendment.

**Seek Change—**  
“The petitioners and others who are interested in having this change made, submit the following reasons in behalf of the proposed amendment:

1. That the district involved is at present entirely residential because no business buildings have ever been erected and that it should remain residential in character.

2. That the property on the east side of Mack avenue in Grosse Pointe Farms is restricted to residences and therefore that in the Woods should be similar.

3. That it would beautify the entrance to the village to be entirely residential.

4. That there is too much business frontage within the village for any present or future needs and that this would reduce the amount.

5. That the owners of these business lots have no vested rights to erect business structures in this area because none have as yet been erected and that these owners are subject to any ordinances the village may enact.

6. That it will depreciate the value of the homes in this area if business buildings are erected.

7. That the residents of other sections of the village should not be too concerned if the residents of the south end of the village want to keep their immediate surroundings strictly residential because it will not injure the balance of the village.

8. That the matter of taxes is not pertinent because when a municipality collects extra taxes it must expand the additional amount for additional services.

**Opposing Change—**  
“Those who oppose this proposed amendment give the following reasons for doing so:

1. That this property was originally subdivided as business frontage, some of it before the village was incorporated, this was recognized when the zoning ordinance was enacted in 1940 and the residents of the area were aware of this situation when they purchased the property and therefore, it should remain as is.

2. That the present zoning ordinance does not stop the restrictions from being changed.

3. That while at present there is too much business frontage in the village, after further growth this will not be true.

4. That it is unfair to the owners of the business lots in this area who have invested in them because the present values of \$75 to \$120 per front foot will drop to \$15 per front foot if changed to residential property.

5. That because these lots are generally only 20 feet wide, they are impractical for residential purposes and that it would be an especial hardship to the owners of a single lot who could not build without acquiring another lot.

6. That it will hurt the tax income of the village because:

A. Business property can be assessed higher for the same area; also personal taxes can be levied upon the stock and fixtures in a business establishment.

B. If this frontage on Mack avenue is prohibited to residential only, very few people will care to build a home on a main highway such as Mack avenue and that for this reason the lots will ultimately revert to the state for non-payment of taxes.

7. That the residents of the south portion of the village are unduly concerned about these business structures and that they will not be objectionable because the present zoning ordinance prohibits all business of that nature.

8. That if this amendment should be passed it will lead to innumerable lawsuits and that it will be very difficult for the village to enforce.

“It will be the duty of the voters

**Voters' Duty—**  
to decide on Jan. 14 which one of these two groups of reasons outweigh the other and vote accordingly. It is an important election and it is hoped that a large group will cast their ballot and settle this controversial problem in definite manner by a truly representative vote. If you have registered for any previous village election, you are eligible to vote; if not, you may register at any time during office hours at the village clerk's office up to 12 o'clock noon, Saturday, Jan. 12. Voting will be at the usual places.”

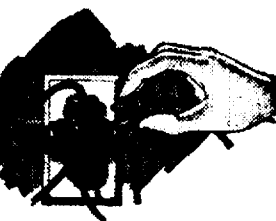

Commissioner Marco's opponent to the referendum vote.

Commissioner Rowe told different assembled groups at the village meetings that the Woods could support an additional shopping district and to deprive the housewives of this convenience would entail a serious handicap to the community.

Commissioner Marco opposed the referendum vote on the grounds that it was a hurried decision and that a thorough study of the zoning ordinance in the village should be made before it is brought to the voters. If changes should be made, he said, they could then be recommended as the proper solution to the residents' problems.

The other commissioners contended that the Woods residents should cast the deciding vote in this rezoning question.

It was brought out at the meetings in the village hall in November and December that the change-over of these lots from business to residential would cause the village to lose thousands of dollars of tax money from business establishments; this could not be equalled by taxes from residential property. It was stated that if the large municipal building program is started soon, this extra tax money would be well put into use.

Another argument opposing the rezoning was brought out by one resident when he said that if one subdivision can change its business lots, the other subdivision between Oxford and Vernier roads could do the same, thus depriving an entire section of a shopping center, and the village of taxes.

Larned, chairman of the Wayne county chapter, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. His statement was made in response to inquiries received from the public.

The March of Dimes, he said, is the same drive to fight the dread disease, poliomyelitis, which has been carried on for many years under the direction of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, founded by our late President, Franklin D. Roosevelt. It was he who symbolized our continuing crusade, Mr. Larned said, and he to whose memory this year's appeal shall be dedicated.

It is and always has been the aim of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to make sure that no victim of the disease goes untreated regardless of his financial status, his age, race, color or creed. It is the purpose of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to explore any new means of treatment which may be found, and to further scientific research into the causes of infantile paralysis so that we may some day find a means of prevention and a cure for this crippling menace to our children.

At the same time, he said, I feel it my duty to point out that it was the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis which has provided the funds for medical and scientific evaluation of the work of Sister Kenny and it was the National Foundation who provided the means for the introduction and teaching of her technique throughout the nation. ## Instructions for Family on Social Security Benefits

As a worker who is building social insurance protection on the job you should make it your business to tell your family:

1. That if you die they may be eligible for monthly old-age and survivors insurance benefits. Tell them that widows with children under 18 in their care get special consideration under the law. If you have neither wife nor child, but your parents are dependent upon you, tell your parents that if you die they may be eligible for monthly benefits at age 65. If you have no children, tell them that if you die they may be eligible for a lump sum death benefit, and the time for claiming this expires after two years.

2. That you have a social security card. Tell your family where you keep it. Tell them in case of your death to take it to the nearest social security board office and file a claim for benefits. It will save them time in starting the payments if they have your card.

3. That they don't have to pay anybody to get benefits for them. At the nearest office of the social security board they will get—free of charge—all the help they need in filing a claim. If they don't know where the social security board office is, they can ask at the post office.

4. That in case you die they should file their claim promptly. Survivors benefits are retroactive for only three months. If your family file their claim in the fourth month after the month in which you die, they will lose one month's payments. A claim for a lump-sum benefit must be filed within two years of your death.

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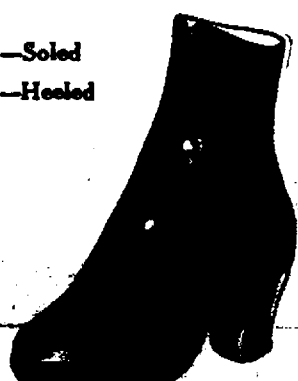

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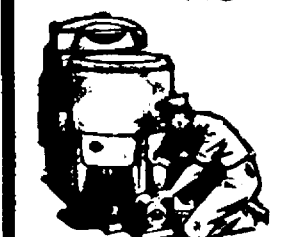
