MID THE SNOW AND FLURRY

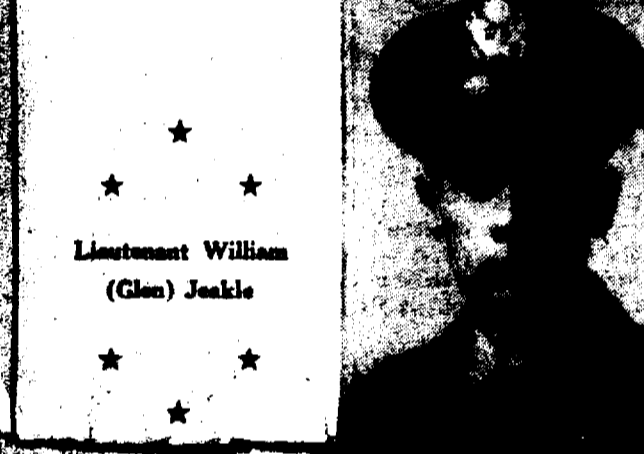

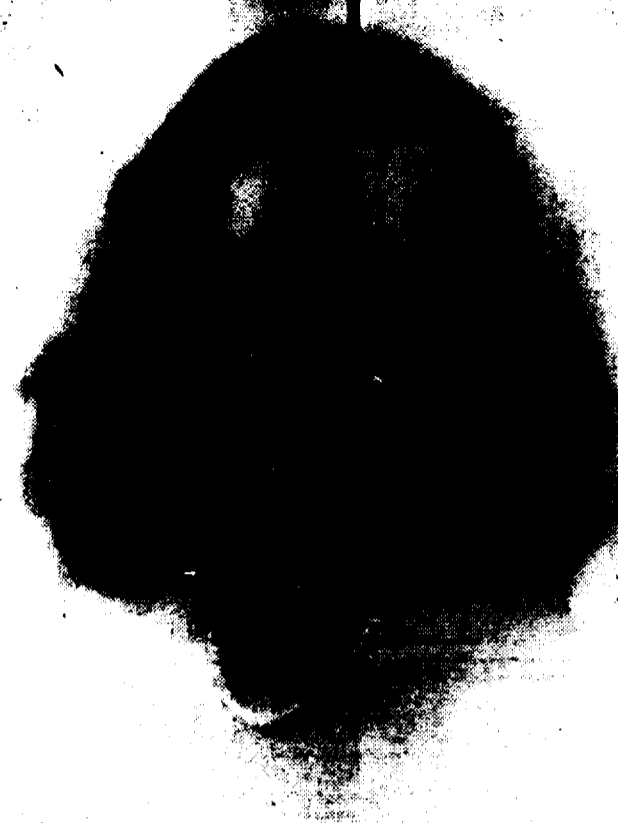

ON PUTTING WAR'S CORPSE AWAY

There is an old saying about cleanliness and godliness. But a survey of the country today would seem to indicate nothing more than the recent presence of the blustery gods of war. We see merely where deity in this sense left off and something less than "godliness" set in.

Certainly cleanliness is not involved at this stage, for cities and countryside both show too many tattered edges of the war regime — littered odds and ends, the blowing chaff, the unfettered and unsettled trash of war. Downtown streets may pass the test of a cursory inspection, for this is the obvious focus of that sort of policy tidying up which sweeps the all-too-apparent surfaces and leaves dirt around the edges.

Individually we can take stock and correct slipshod wartime tendencies which see haste and need of all-out effort indifferent to some of the laxities around us. Let's get some of the dirt out of the corners and remove those greater eyesores which don't even bother with seeking edges for concealment—but flap their scarecrow odds and ends and trailing bits in America's public places. Let's put war's corpse away and give peace a clean, new start!

Veteranews from the Office of Veterans' Affairs, Lansing

Dana C. Hill legal consultant of the American Legion has prepared the following essential information on income tax obligations and exemptions on the part of those who have served in the armed forces during the current war. At best this is rather a complex and intricate subject. However, it has been treated here in outline form and should prove helpful to veterans. It is understood, of course, that involved situations will require the expert advice and assistance of an income tax or internal revenue representative: There are three principal income tax benefits provided by congressional legislation and the Internal Revenue Code for persons on active duty in the armed forces of the United States. This includes army, navy, coast guard, and marine corps. It also applies to such duty with similar branches of the armed forces of allied governments. These benefits are:

1. Exemption. There is exempt from taxation so much of the compensation for active service in such armed forces as does not exceed \$1,500.
2. Abatement. a. All unpaid taxes assessed against any person on active duty with the armed forces between Dec. 7, 1941 and the termination of the present war, will be cancelled provided they are not paid prior to his/her death which occurs while he/she is on active duty. b. All taxes for the year during which such death occurred will be rebated and cancelled whether paid or unpaid.
3. Deferral. a. Filing income tax returns. The duty to file income tax returns is automatically postponed for any person who is on active duty with the armed forces of the United States or allied governments outside the continental limits of the United States for a period of 90 days or more. There will be no requirement to file until six months after the return to the United States of such person. Penalties and interest will not begin until the end of such period. b. Payment of income tax. The payment of tax on income which has been earned by such a member of the armed forces may be deferred without interest or penalty by permitting payment in 12 equal installments beginning six months after return to the United States and payable in 12 equal monthly installments for a period of three years. If in a person has other income which is reported separately insofar as the requirement for immediate payment is concerned and the balance of total tax may be deferred.

ping, steel and electric power distribution.

England, said the speaker, is rather desperately in need, economically, hence the impending U. S. loan. Asked if the loan would have been necessary had England "exploited her empire," Taylor said his answer would be no, if "exploited" were changed to "developed," for sections of Africa alone, excluding desert, dancing and jungle territories would feed, clothe and house 65,000,000 people harmoniously, with plenty of natural resources to develop for world trade markets.

Questioned concerning India, Taylor was humorously evasive, saying that he had been in India and was glad that he was in Detroit.

Taylor thinks Hitler is dead, as do all top Nazis, whom he interviewed. He also thinks that Hitler will be martyred by the German people, just as Napoleon, who caused epochal suffering in his era, is now martyred by the French.

The question of Germany will never be settled by the Allies, said Taylor. Other nations just don't settle questions when there are 15,000,000 troops sitting on that country's border (Soviets).

The speaker termed Patton an "extraordinary man," a fine gentleman and a genius as a general. He blasted several unfavorable publicity notices Patton received back here. He supported his military genius by pointing out his campaigns which netted 165,000 German prisoners, inflicted 41,000 casualties while our troops netted only 4,000 killed and some six thousand wounded.

Michigan Bell Telephone Opposes Order for Retroactive Rate Cut for 1944-45

The Michigan Bell Telephone company is challenging the order of the Public Service Commission directing the company to refund \$7,600,000 to customers from 1944-1945 revenues and to reduce 1946 rates by an amount computed at \$3,500,000 by the commission.

"We feel obligated to oppose any action that we believe will jeopardize the quality of future service to the public," said Thomas N. Lacy, president-elect, as the company filed a bill of complaint this week in the Ingham circuit court seeking to set aside the commission's order.

As to refunds, the company pointed out a similar order directing a refund of \$3,500,000 for 1944 was set aside by former Circuit Judge Leonard W. Carr on the grounds that the commission is without authority to make a retroactive rate cut. That issue is now before the supreme court on appeal.

Rate reductions under the order would greatly exceed the \$3,500,000 claimed by the commission, according to the company. "Unless conditions not now foreseeable were to improve the situation, the order would

reduce our earnings to the point of impairing our credit," Lacy said. "If continued too long, insolvency would be the inevitable result."

"When the financial structure of a public-service institution is impaired, rate increases are necessary or service slips. Michigan has had a recent example of that simple fact in the fare increase by Detroit's public transportation system."

Although the commission cited tax reductions for Michigan Bell in 1946, it ignored inflationary trends of increased wages and prices that would more than wipe out any such advantage, the company said.

The order, according to the company, would reduce earnings to less than half the average rate of leading manufacturers with which the Bell System must compete for funds—money needed to finance the company's \$120,000,000 postwar construction program, including more than twenty-seven million dollars scheduled for 1946.

Pointe Park's village commission passed a motion giving the five unnamed men 60 days, until March 15, in which to get back into condition. The year of 1940, according to statistics, saw all Grosse Pointe home construction records broken and the triennium, 1938-40, also established an all-time Grosse Pointe record. A total of 755 permits for homes were issued, and the three-year total was 1,892. Many Grosse Pointers were saddened to learn of the death of the Rev. James A. McDonald, O.S.A., in Lawrence, Mass., after a brief illness. Father McDonald was the founder and first pastor of the parish of St. Clare of Montefalco who organized the parish in 1925. The body of Jeannette Congdon of Rocky River, O., was recovered from Lake St. Clair a short distance from the dock of the Grosse Pointe Yacht club at Vernier and Lakeshore Drive. Police believed she took her own life after walking on the thin ice.

Competition to Run High With Two More Taxicab Companies

Two more taxicab companies are seeking permission to operate in Grosse Pointe. One request was received in the Park and the second one is in the Woods.

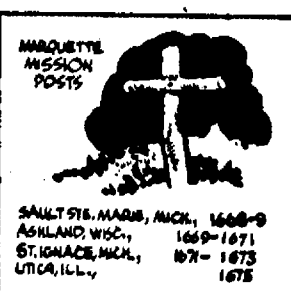

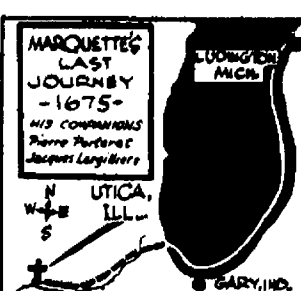

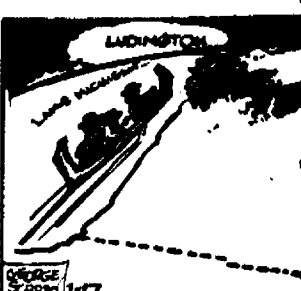

Electrical Engineer Explains Coming Uses of Electricity

New uses of electricity were described to the Grosse Pointe Rotary club by William B. Hurley, Edison company engineer, at the noon meeting of the group Monday at the Whittier hotel.

"We are at the beginning of an electrical and chemical age," said Mr. Hurley in introducing his subject. Among new uses of electricity are some of the following:

- Replacing the lamp for a gas and oil burner, which already are in great demand; air conditioning, soon to be available for residences at about \$600; electric blankets, which will reduce winter covers to sheets and this blanket, to sell for \$20 to \$30; deep freeze units; electrical clothes dryers, with automatic washers and ironers; automatic water heaters, using "off peak load" low night rates; refrigerators with revolving shelves, perhaps faucets for ice water and maybe levers to shoot ice cubes into highball glasses; electrical dust and bacteria precipitators; fluorescent lighting for homes; illuminated house numbers, to sell for \$5; soil heating cables, to advance seed germination; facsimile newspaper producing apparatus, to sell for around \$75; television, with 6x6 in. screen for \$250; "off peak" heat storage, in conjunction with solar heat; scientifically planned kitchens and cooking utensils of glass with heating element built in.

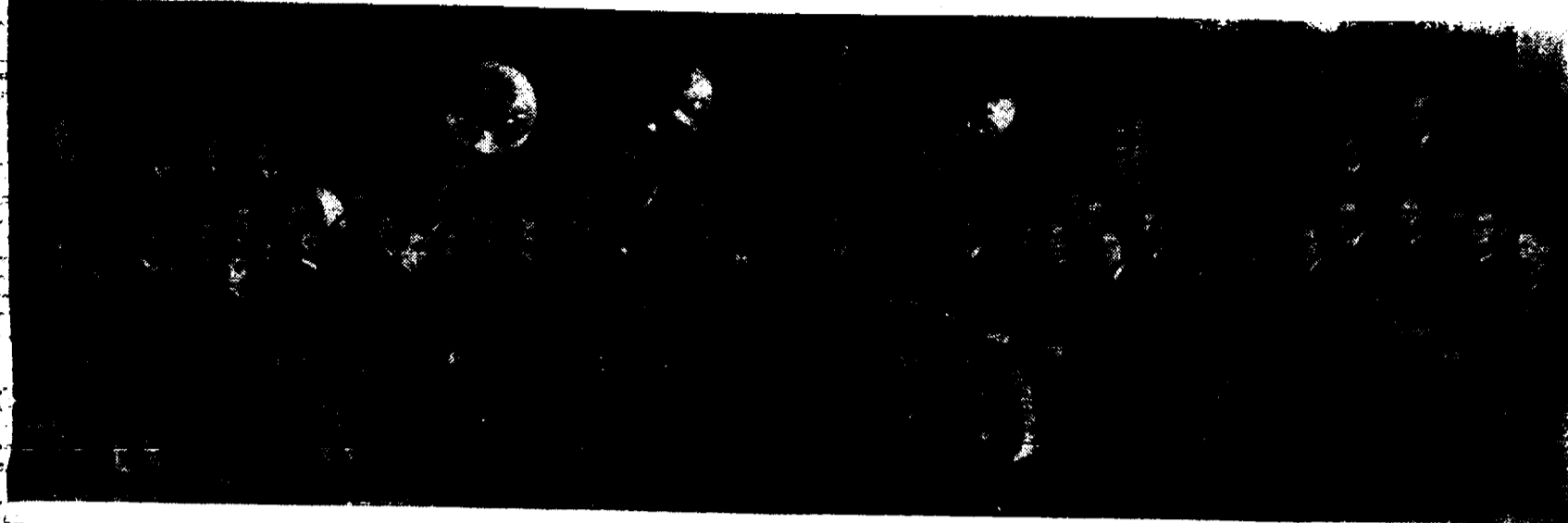


