Woods to Consider Registration Date Change in Charter

Grosse Pointe Woods village officials are considering amending the village charter which would eliminate the taking of registrations for voting up to and including the Saturday before an election.

The charter now provides that the clerk can register any person up to the second and third day preceding an election day.

Jules Berns, village attorney, believes that an error was made in the charter and recommended the change to correspond with the state law, i.e., registrations can be taken up to and including the twentieth day before an election.

Pointe Challenged In Clothing Drive

Unless clothing is contributed to them somehow, millions of men, women and children in war-devastated areas all over the world will be exposed to cold, suffering and death.

The Victory Clothing Collection for overseas relief ends one short week from today and citizens of Grosse Pointe are challenged to act immediately. A quota of 100 box cars of clothing has been set as the goal from Grosse Pointe. The national quota is 100,000,000 garments.

Fire halls and schools have been designated as deposit depots for Grosse Pointe by the area chairman, Willard S. Hosking.

Each day items will be picked up from the depots and taken to box cars already standing on sidings near Grosse Pointe. These cars will be sealed by the treasury department, and under extreme penalty for tampering or pilfering.

No bottleneck of sorting, repairing, cleaning or baling will be done in Detroit on this drive. This will all be done by a well-organized department of the federal government, experienced in doing just this sort of job in an efficient manner.

The "Able to Launch" plan of the campaign assures speedy transportation of contributions to stock areas. Residents of Grosse Pointe are respectfully requested to search their cupboards, closets and attics for clothing and bedding and to bring them to the nearest school or fire hall.

His request was granted by the council who set March 1 as the retirement date. No action was taken regarding the naming of a new police chief.

5 Mill Increase Asked For School Expansion Plans

A special election of qualified voters of the school district has been scheduled for Monday, March 4, as the result of a resolution unanimously adopted by the Grosse Pointe board of education at a special meeting held Wednesday, January 15.

The election would be for the purpose of permitting the board to levy taxes up to \$5.00 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation above the 15-mill constitutional limitation for a five-year period. If this authorization is granted it is proposed to set aside \$3.50 on every \$1,000 of assessed

'Chief Tecumseh Dined Here'

Indian Chief Tecumseh was wined and dined in a "castle" on the shores of Lake St. Clair, or so says history and hearsay.

The story goes... one Capt. Alexander Grant, progenitor of one son and 11 daughters (the fairest on the lakes), who was commander of the British fleet on the Great Lakes about the year 1775, built a large home just east of the present Moran road on Lakeshore Drive, which was of such proportions that it was dubbed "Grant's Castle." Reports have it that the structure was at least 90 feet wide by some two hundred feet long, or larger.

The "castle" stood in the vicinity of the million dollar John Dodge house, which has recently been torn down and near the Lothrop home, which stands home on the lake. Built in 1842, which will be 100 years old next year.

The Grosse Pointe Historical society is currently requested to contribute to the fund for the purchase of the site, which will be used for a museum and historical site.

Veteranews from the Office of Veterans' Affairs, Lansing

Pending the completion of a new building now under construction at Ann Arbor, the Veterans' Readjustment Center will be located on a floor of the University hospital, Ann Arbor. The floor is now staffed and the Readjustment Center will receive patients requiring treatment for emotional disturbances.

Veterans requiring this care will be admitted upon the recommendation of the director of a local veterans' clinic. Veterans can secure complete details at local counseling centers.

Such appointments are usually outside the jurisdiction of the U. S. Civil Service commission, and application should be made directly to the Washington office of the department concerned.

For overseas employment with the war department, application should be made to the Overseas Branch, Civilian Personnel Division, office of the secretary of war, Washington, D. C. Applications for overseas appointments with the navy department (other than the Pearl Harbor navy yard) should be sent to the Director of Civilian Personnel, Navy Department, Washington, D. C. For appointment at the Pearl Harbor Navy Yard, applications should be sent to the Recorder, Labor Board, Pearl Harbor Navy Yard, Territory of Hawaii.

Appointments in Puerto Rico and the Panama Canal Zone are handled by the Commandant, 15th Naval District, Balboa, Canal Zone.

Employment in Alaska is under the jurisdiction of the Eleventh Civil Service Region, 437 Central Building, Seattle 4, Wash., and inquiries should be directed to that office. For overseas employment with other agencies, applications should be submitted to the director of personnel of the particular department in Washington, D. C.

Capacity—
Quantity of delivery shall be the quantity designated as follows: 3/4"x3/4" meter 20 G.P.M., 3/4" meter 30 G.P.M., 1" meter 50 G.P.M., 1 1/2" meter 90 G.P.M.
Length—
The length of the meters shall be as follows: 3/4"x3/4" meter 7 3/4" inches, 3/4" meter 9 inches, 1" meter 10 3/4" inches, 1 1/2" meter 13 inches.
Cases—
All meters shall have an outer case with a separate measuring chamber in which the piston operates, and this case shall be made of bronze composition. Cast iron frost bottoms, protected by bronze liners. All meters shall have cast on them, in raised characters, the size and model. The direction of the flow through the meter shall be properly indicated.
Registers—
Registers shall be straight reading, indicating cubic feet. The register pinion and spur gears shall be firmly fastened on their spindles, shall fully mesh with each other and run freely and shall be constructed that they cannot become unmeshed. The spindle bearings in the top and bottom register plates shall be bushed with hard vulcanized rubber or other non-metallic bushings. The maximum capacity of the register shall be as follows: Minimum test flow, 3/4"x3/4" meter, 1/4 G.P.M.; 3/4" meter, 1/2 G.P.M.; 1" meter, 3/4 G.P.M.; 1 1/2" meter, 1 1/2 G.P.M. Maximum speed of piston oscillation or rotations of disks per cubic foot to be as follows: 3/4"x3/4" meter, 360; 3/4" meter, 250; 1" meter, 115; 1 1/2" meter, 48.
Register Boxes—
Register boxes and lids shall be made of bronze composition, or of the same material as the top case.
Pistons—
Pistons shall be made of vulcanized hard rubber, shall be smoothly machined, shall be fitted accurately

with the name of the manufacturer cast on the lid in raised letters. The serial number of the meter shall be plainly stamped on the lid. If required, the serial number shall also be stamped on the case. The lid shall be recessed and shall lap over the box to prevent dirt from accumulating on the glass. The glass shall be inserted from the inside and securely held in place without the use of putty or pins. All register compartments shall be provided with a water escape hole 1/8 inch in diameter.
Intermediate Gear Trains—
Intermediate gear trains shall be mounted on the measuring chamber so that the upper half of the measuring chamber shall form the lower bearing plate of the gear train. Gear train cases, plates, spindles, gears and pinions shall be made of durable non-ferrous material. Pinions and spur gears shall be firmly fastened, shall fully mesh with each other, and shall run freely. The lower end bearings for pinion and spur gear spindles shall be fitted with hard vulcanized rubber, or other non-metallic bushings, fastened in place so they will not fall or work out, and shall be easily removable. These bushings shall completely enclose the ends of the spindles, except for those spindles which go completely through the bushings. All gear trains shall be of the oil-enclosed type and shall operate in a suitable lubricant.
The gear train case shall be held in place in a recess of the upper half of the measuring chamber, and shall be clamped in the main casing without the use of screws. Reduction ratio of the gear train shall be 256 to 1, and it shall contain no more and no less than four pinions and four mating gears.
Measuring Chamber—
The measuring chambers for all meters shall be made of bronze or non-ferrous composition, and shall not be cast as part of the outer casing. They shall be machined carefully and secured in position in the outer casing so that any slight distortion which might occur under 150 pound pressure will not affect the sensitiveness of the meters. Measuring chambers shall consist of an upper half and a lower half, held together by a snap joint and set into a tapered bore in the main casing.
Pistons—
Pistons shall be made of vulcanized hard rubber, shall be smoothly machined, shall be fitted accurately

in their measuring chambers and shall operate smoothly and freely. Pistons shall be of the oscillating type and shall be equipped with guide rollers and shall operate in a slot in the lower half of the measuring chamber.
Strainers—
All meters shall be provided with strainers. Strainer screens shall be installed in the meter, and shall be made of heavy sheet copper, or copper alloy, shall be perforated, shall be rigid, shall fit snugly, and shall be easily removed. They shall have an effective straining area as large as practicable, and at least double that of the meter main case inlet.
Registration—
The registration on the meter dial shall indicate the quantity recorded to be not less than 99 per cent nor more than 101 per cent of the water actually passed through the meter while it is being tested under "Normal Test Flow Limits" as follows: 3/4"x3/4" meter, 1 to 20 G.P.M.; 3/4" meter, 2 to 30 G.P.M.; 1" meter, 3 to 50 G.P.M.; 1 1/2" meter, 5 to 100 G.P.M. with water having a temperature of less than 80° F.
Pressure Test—
Meters shall be guaranteed to operate under a working pressure of 150 pounds per square inch without leakage or damage to any part.
Workmanship and Materials—
Meters shall be guaranteed against defects in materials and workmanship for a period of one year from date of shipment. Parts to replace those in which a defect has developed within such period shall be supplied without charge, piece for piece, upon the return of such defective parts to the manufacturer thereof, or upon proper proof of such defect.
Rejected Meters—
The manufacturer shall at his own expense replace or satisfactorily re-adjust all meters rejected for failure to comply with these specifications.

quality of service in its personnel, it must increase the earning possibilities of those who serve the children of this community.

(2) to maintain, teach and administer expected pupil growth. Conservative estimates of increased pupil growth over the next five years would add 1500 new pupils to public school membership. The average cost per pupil will exceed \$200.
Board Discusses Proposals
The action of the board of education to place this issue before the public was taken following a conference last Wednesday evening with approximately fifty citizens who were residents of all of the Grosse Pointe villages and came from parent and citizen groups of each of the ten schools in the system.

At this conference the president of the board of education, Charles A. Parcels, and other board members, and the superintendent of schools, Dr. Paul L. Essert, reviewed the financial management of the school district during the war years of increasing costs. They pointed out that school expenditures since 1940 have increased only 12 1/2 per cent and the school tax rates only 10.8 per cent, while costs of goods and services generally in the area have increased 25% to 30%.

"Meanwhile," said Dr. Essert, "sources of revenue for schools have fallen off. Wealth per pupil in the district has decreased 10%; this has resulted from losses in assessment valuation and increased pupil membership. The state aid share of local expenditures has decreased 2%, continuing a trend since 1935-36, during which time there has been a total decrease of 20% in the state's share of local expenditures. But, even with these modest increases in expenditures, and in spite of decreases in revenue, the schools have provided education for 495 more pupils than in 1940. They have also raised each step of the salary schedule for teaching and non-teaching employees at least 14%, have built and paid for sixty additional classrooms, laboratories and shops, have supported and maintained a first-class public library system and have provided transportation for 1,000 pupils annually."

Community Should Decide
"With this situation of conservative financial management and high standards of service in the past, and having reached our tax limitation," said Mr. Parcels in summarizing the issue, "we face, in the coming few years, these two alternatives: (1) either increase the tax rate, or (2) curtail educational services.

"It is the judgment and recommendation of the board and the administration that the tax rate be increased, but it is now an issue for the community to decide as to whether it shall empower its board of education to exceed the 15-mill limitation by 5 mills for the purposes and needs set forth."
After the exhaustive discussion of the above proposal, a resolution was passed by those present to endorse the proposal of the board to call the special election to submit this issue to the voters. While there were contrary opinions expressed, and the advisability of a sinking fund rather than a bond issue was challenged, it seemed to be the unanimous opinion of those assembled that the issue should be squarely faced by this community at the polls as to whether the present standards of public education in Grosse Pointe should be maintained and strengthened, or, whether the program should be curtailed.

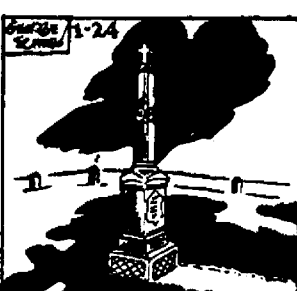

Mortality Rates Best Detroit Has Known

Provisional vital statistics for Detroit during 1945 show the city has experienced unusually good health. The death rate from all causes was 8.2 per 1,000 population for the year which is within one-tenth of a point of the lowest rate that the city ever experienced, according to Dr. Bruce H. Douglas, commissioner of health. This all-time low rate occurred in 1941 and 1942. The 1945 rate is computed on a population estimated at 1,685,000 which is believed to be a conservative estimate.

Detroit's infant mortality rate was the lowest ever recorded. It was 33.6 deaths under one year of age per 1,000 live births. A new low record was established for mothers who died in childbirth. The rate was 1.6 per 1,000 live births. The birth rate for 1945 was 21.4 per 1,000 population—slightly higher than the 1944 rate of 21.0.

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Benefits of Enlisting in Army Cited

Benefits resulting from enlistment and service with the regular army were today emphasized by Lieut. Col. A. J. Hannon, local army recruiting officer in announcing a New Year effort to sign more county men to the service.

Education, travel, excellent pay and allowances, plus a retirement system which offers security for life are among the advantages young men can enjoy by serving their country, he pointed out. Those who sign and serve for three year terms are entitled, upon discharge, to free tuition and other school expenses in an approved school up to \$500 per year, plus \$65 per month for those without dependents and \$90 monthly for those with one or more. Other benefits under the G.I. Bill of Rights will be available to men who enlist before the present emergency has ended, including the \$300 mustering out pay, providing part of their service is outside the continental limits of the country.

Enlistment now allows the recruit to choose the overseas theatre in which he wants to serve, including the following: European, Pacific, China, Mediterranean, Caribbean Defense Command or Alaskan department. Enlisted men are also encouraged to visit scenic, historical and civic centers in countries accessible to them from their station. An example of this are the special furloughs being arranged for soldiers in Germany to Switzerland, Norway, France and other European countries.

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Co-eds Enter New Fields of Learning

The world is fast-becoming one of better educated women according to Miss Helen E. Kean, dean of women at the University of Detroit.

According to a report released by the dean's office, co-ed enrollment at U. of D. rose 400 per cent during the war years of 1941-45. First semester registration figures for 1941 numbered 342 co-eds while the rolls for the same period in 1945 listed 1,406, an increase of 1,064 women students.

A trend toward greater interest in commerce and science was shown. During the five-year period, co-eds enrolled in the commerce, marketing, advertising, foreign trade and business administration departments rose from 118 to 405. At the same time, courses in physical sciences attracted more and more women students, with the total co-ed enrollment in the college of arts and sciences rising from 183 in 1941 to 591 in 1945. During this period, the engineering college, for 31 years a strictly male institution, was opened to co-eds in order to fill the ever-increasing demands of industry for trained technicians.

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
