



The President of the United States was a fugitive, wandering the country roads on horseback. Behind him, Washington was burning . . . Baltimore was panic-stricken, knowing it was next. The wealthier citizens buried their silver, hur-

ried their ladies into the back country. . . . Those lines aren't from any imaginary account of a possible future Martian invasion. They're from Neil H. Swanson's "The Perilous Fight," and they describe what was actually going on here in America during the War of 1812.

"The Perikan Biolog" is bistory, though it reads like a novel at their with two engagements which have been neglected in most of our history books. The first was the Battle of Bladensburg, when British troops and ships defeated American militia,

occupied and burned part of Washington. The second was when they made an unsuccessful attack on Baltimore. The rout of Bladensburg was not due to lack of courage of the militia, as some historians state, says Mr. Swanson, but was caused by conflicting orders from the top, and the intrusion of politicians. And for the victory at Baltimore, he gives credit to a little-known war hero named Sam Smith. He was a businessman by profession, and with the same shrewdness and courage he used in his business, he organ-

ized the defenses, saved the city-and incidentally made it possible for an elegant young man named Francis Scott Key to write our national anthem.

Erich Remarque, author of the Book-of-the-Month Club selection, 'Arch of Triumph," had a varied career in depression-ridden Germany in the years following the first

World War. He toured the country with a "gypsy caravan." He was a test driver for a Berlin tire company. His first writing job, doing dramatic reviews, ended when he was beaten up by a group of dis-satisfied actors. But the job he remembers

with the least gusto was with a firm specializing in small-town war memorials. "We plastered the whole landscape with imposing cast-iron lions and columns topped by eagles spreading their wings," he says.

Vandenberg said Russia and the United States could live harmoni ously only "if the United States speaks as plainly upon all occasions as Russia does; if the United States just as vigorously sustains its own purposes and its ideals as Russia does; if we abandon the miserable fiction . . . that we somehow jeopardize the peace if our candor is as firm as Russia's always is; and if we assume a moral leadership which we have too frequently allowed to lapse."

It is essential, Vandenberg declared, that the United States' foreign policy "reestablish the habit of saying only what we mean and meaning every word we say."





QUALIFICATIONS AND PLANS TO SERVE GROSSE POINTE PARK

by THOMAS L. LOTT

CANDIDATE FOR VILLAGE COMMISSIONER GROSSE POINTE TARK

At next Monday's election, the name, Thomas L. Lott, will appear on the ballot for your consideration as a candidate for Village Commissioner of Grosse Pointe Park. So that you may vote wisely, I believe it is my duty to give you a few salient facts concerning my background and plans for our community. Therefore, I have prepared this statement to reach those of you with whom I have not had the privilege of becoming personally acquainted.

I am 35 years of age, married, with one youngster, and have owned my home at 1153 Grayton Road since 1941. Since 1936, I have been actively engaged in the practice of law and am a member of the law firm of Foster & Lott. In 1927, I was graduated from Northern High School. Detroit, and subsequently from Dartmouth College (1932) and University of Michigan Law School (1935). During the war, I helped patrol the Detroit River and Lake St. Clair as a member of the U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, in which I re-

My candidacy is based on a deep-seated interest in good government and a desire to serve my community and its people. Now that the war is over, it is possible to go ahead with improvements in our public services without resorting to frills, and to make our Park in all respects a better place in which to live. This calls for more than honesty and competence—it requires planning and an alertness to the needs of the community which require specific and immediate attention. Among these are:

1. Public Transportation. Our present transportation system is entirely inadequate. This condition is not due entirely to lack of facilities. I have frequently observed busses returning empty to the garage at the same time that others were going downtown loaded to a degree that was most uncomfortable and dangerous. I have counted 30 standees in a 29 passenger bus-50 passengers in all!

2. Business Encroachments. This community was originally intended to be a strictly residential area. In recent years a number of small plants and similar establishments have located in the Park and have been enlarged. Some of this was a result of war work and probably could not be avoided. This infiltration should be corrected and attempts to continue it should be stopped.

3. Express Highways. Aggressive support should be given to proposed plans for improving traffic conditions between the Park and downtown Detroit to eliminate time expended in going to and from downtown Detroit.


Among the other matters in which I am interested are: Planting of small trees on the public right-of-way to replace those which are dving; development and improvement of recreational facilities; improved distribution of information to residents concerning their Village government. I do not make the customary promise to lower taxes. It costs money to operate a government, but I do intend to see that your money is efficiently spent.

If elected, I will put forth every effort to give you a local government which is difficient and progressive and which remains alert to the changing needs of our community.
