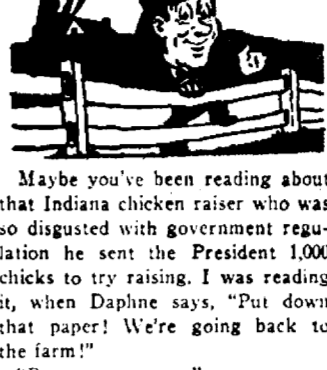

### Personal Recordings May Be Sent to Army Personnel

Effective last Friday, March 1, parcels not exceeding 22 pounds in weight or 48 inches in length or 72 inches in length and girth, containing articles requested by the addressee, may be accepted for mailing to army personnel overseas.

Personal recordings may now be accepted for mailing to army personnel overseas provided they are properly packed for shipping. These recordings may be sent without a request provided they do not exceed eight ounces in weight and are paid at the first class rate of three (3) cents per ounce.

### Regular Army Seeks New Recruits Now

A reminder to young men that they may now enlist directly in the regular army was issued today by Lieut. Col. A. J. Hannon, officer in charge of army recruiting in Detroit.

"Many men of draft age are apparently unaware that they may enlist in the army even though they have received their Selective Service pre-induction physical examination. However, with the draft board's approval, they can take advantage of one of the army's contracts ranging from 18 months to three years, even after they have completed their pre-induction exams," Colonel Hannon said.

Regular army enlistment is also available to young men who have reached their 17th birthday provided the consent of their parents or legal guardian is obtained.

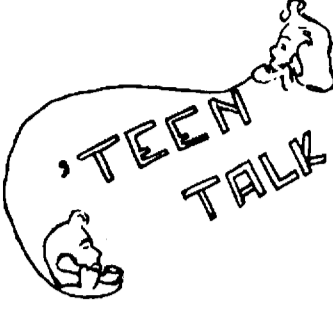

**Veteranews from the Office of Veterans' Affairs, Lansing**

A door-to-door canvass of an entire city points the way to help ease an acute housing problem determined to locate every inch of available housing space for the returned veteran and aided by a gigantic publicity campaign, a Detroit committee of representatives of the various veterans organizations, fraternal bodies and other forward-looking civic groups plan to enlist the services of volunteers who will ring every doorbell, knock on every door and ask every citizen with the view of locating any possible vacant housing space.

All public information channels, the newspapers, posters, radio stations are aware of the need and value of backing the program and units in publicly proclaiming the plan of attack.

Each community in the state can organize a similar public spirited committee designed to ferret out unused houses, apartments and rooms for the use of veterans. An active program patterned after the Detroit plan could well follow in Michigan communities where housing presents an acute question because of shortages. Through watching the progress of this present scheme, the local community would profit by the experience of the metropolitan.

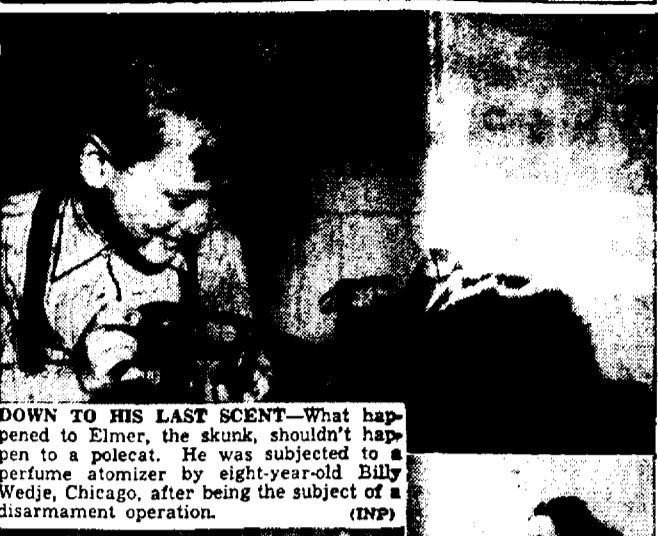

The President of the United States was a fugitive, wandering the country roads on horseback. Behind him, Washington was burning... Baltimore was panic-stricken, knowing it was next. The wealthier citizens buried their silver, hurried their ladies into the back country...  
 Those lines aren't from any imaginary account of a possible future Martian invasion. They're from Neil H. Swanson's "The Perilous Fight," and they describe what was actually going on here in America during the War of 1812.

**NEIL SWANSON**  
 occupied and burned part of Washington. The second was when they made an unsuccessful attack on Baltimore.  
 The rout of Bladensburg was not due to lack of courage of the militia, as some historians state, says Mr. Swanson, but was caused by conflicting orders from the top, and the intrusion of politicians. And for the victory at Baltimore, he gives credit to a little-known war hero named Sam Smith. He was a businessman by profession, and with the same shrewdness and courage he used in his business, he organized the defenses, saved the city—and incidentally made it possible for an elegant young man named Francis Scott Key to write our national anthem.

Erich Remarque, author of the Book-of-the-Month Club selection, "Arch of Triumph," had a varied career in depression-ridden Germany in the years following the first World War. He toured the country with a "gypsy caravan." He was a test driver for a Berlin tire company. His first writing job, doing dramatic reviews, ended when he was beaten up by a group of dissatisfied actors. But the job he remembers with the least gusto was with a firm specializing in small-town war memorials. "We plastered the whole landscape with imposing cast-iron lions and columns topped by eagles spreading their wings," he says.

**Vandenberg Urges 'Plain Speech' by U.S. Toward Russia**

United States must abandon the "miserable fiction" that firmness equal to Russia's jeopardizes our influence in settling world problems, Arthur A. Vandenberg declared last week when reporting to the senate on the United Nations assembly in London to which he was a delegate.  
 Though Vandenberg did not mention Secretary of State James Byrnes, chairman of the U. S. delegation, many newspapers linked the senator's criticism with Byrnes.  
 Vandenberg expressed concern at the Russian attitude which he said seemed "less interested in peace... than in friction" during assembly discussions and declared that the "supreme conundrum of our time" is the question: "What is Russia up to now?"  
 Vandenberg said Russia and the United States could live harmoniously only "if the United States speaks as plainly upon all occasions as Russia does; if the United States just as vigorously sustains its own purposes and its ideals... as Russia does; if we abandon the miserable fiction... that we somehow jeopardize the peace if our candor is as firm as Russia's always is; and if we assume a moral leadership which we have too frequently allowed to lapse."  
 It is essential, Vandenberg declared, that the United States' foreign policy "reestablish the habit of saying only what we mean and meaning every word we say."

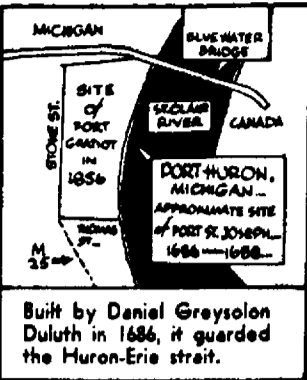

My candidacy is based on a deep-seated interest in good government and a desire to serve my community and its people. - 1. Public Transportation.** Our present transportation system is entirely inadequate. This condition is not due entirely to lack of facilities. I have frequently observed busses returning empty to the garage at the same time that others were going downtown loaded to a degree that was most uncomfortable and dangerous. I have counted 30 standees in a 29 passenger bus—59 passengers in all!
- 2. Business Encroachments.** This community was originally intended to be a strictly residential area. In recent years a number of small plants and similar establishments have located in the Park and have been enlarged. Some of this was a result of war work and probably could not be avoided. This infiltration should be corrected and attempts to continue it should be stopped.
- 3. Express Highways.** Aggressive support should be given to proposed plans for improving traffic conditions between the Park and downtown Detroit to eliminate time expended in going to and from downtown Detroit.

Among the other matters in which I am interested are: Planting of small trees on the public right-of-way to replace those which are dying; development and improvement of recreational facilities; improved distribution of information to residents concerning their Village government. I do not make the customary promise to lower taxes. It costs money to operate a government, but I do intend to see that your money is efficiently spent.

If elected, I will put forth every effort to give you a local government which is efficient and progressive and which remains alert to the changing needs of our community.
